

Water rates for summer reduced

A schedule of lower rates for water in Carrizozo during the months of May, June and July was adopted by the town board at its meeting Tuesday night.

This move has been made to encourage the planting of lawns, trees, shrubs and otherwise beautifying the town wherever and whenever possible.

The monthly minimum will continue to be \$2.50 for the first 3000 gallons, but all water used in excess of 3000 gallons will be at rates cut 20 cents per thousand gallons for those three months.

An example of the benefits derived would be a family using 13,000 gallons:

The board hopes to see the townspeople take advantage of the reduced rates by starting new lawns and otherwise beautifying their homes with flowers and shrubs.

Mayor Wayne Withers called the board meeting to order and asked Town Attorney H. Elfred Jones to administer the oath of office to Police Magistrate Robert E. Warden, who in turn gave the oath of office to Mayor-elect W. T. Ball and Justice-elect Leandro S. Vega and Justices-elect.

The board reappointed Town Clerk J. S. Stearns, Town Attorney H. Elfred Jones and Town Marshal Concepcion Morales.

Occupation licenses were read and it was noted that all applications had been made except one.

Building permits were granted the Church of Christ for an addition to its church and to W. L. Burnett for an addition to his residence.

Attorney Jones reported that he had several new ordinances ready to be adopted and made a part of the town code, and several ordinances pertaining to traffic control, liquor violations and fire rules that would be gone over with the board prior to adoption.

The trustees voted to continue the services of E. Forrest Sanders and Associates, attorneys, as counsel on the paying district suit which is still to be settled in court.

As the board was in receipt of complaints about the "wino" situation and the fact that "winos" were begging money and making general nuisances of themselves, a resolution was adopted to report instances of vagrancy or other complaints they may have against these individuals to the town marshal.

The sheriff's office and deputies had a sleepless night last week trying to find two men who were reported to have robbed "Pop" Kelso of Alamogordo of \$3,200 in cash.

Kelso informed the sheriff's office that he had parked his truck at the Mal Pals roadside park and gone to sleep. He was awakened by two men, he said, who robbed him and left in a car he described as a "black Ford or Chevrolet."

Later a report came in that a shot had been fired from a car at guards at Ocuero Range Camp. Throughout most of the night a search was made of roads through the range but no trace of the men or car could be found.

Officers this week said they were inclined to doubt Kelso's story.

To acquaint legislative candidates with their operation, the board of directors of the Central New Mexico Electric Cooperative held a meeting Tuesday of this week at their office in Mountainair.

Officers from Lincoln County are J. L. Merritt, president, and D. N. Dean, member of the board of trustees.

John E. Hall, attorney of Albuquerque, gave a brief and informative talk on the history and present coverage of the Central N. M. Electric Coop., emphasizing that it was a non-profit cooperative made up of user members, each having only one vote.

Any profit accruing from operations goes into reduced rates, he said, or in some cases, dividends to the user.

Legislative candidates attending from the five other counties served by the Central N. M. Cooperative were Daniel Burquette, Victor Calderon, John Welch, Earl Farber and Helen Wells.

Wanda Ruelker is office manager, Carl Turner, state manager, and John E. Hall, attorney for the cooperative.

B. F. Sumner, manager, stated that in 1959, \$10,811.87 was paid to the State of New Mexico in taxes and \$1,770.29 to Lincoln County for taxes.

Candidates present from Lincoln County were William G. (Bill) Shreevogost, Republican, for the House of Representatives, and Herman E. Kelt, Democrat, for State Senate.

In reporting the above meeting to the News, Shreevogost said he was interested in the management and development of the Central New Mexico Electric Coop because it supplies the northern half of Lincoln County with electrical power, increasing our economy and furnishing electricity to the agricultural people.

"It is through active participation, electing officers and backing them after they are elected, that we can maintain this excellent REA cooperative," he said.

Dear F. V.: Thanks for the letter. I'm sure most of the teachers are sincere — because very few like preaching; you do it because you have to!  
However, I don't believe the solution is necessarily the PTA. It's true that a good turnout is encouraging to the teachers and the administration but too much interference is bad, too. When because of political pressure a teacher is forced to pass a student in spite of poor grades and so forth a great injustice is done to that child — perhaps one that he will never overcome! And yet, what is a teacher to do when he fails to "cooperate"? The parent wants his child passed — certain pressure is brought to bear and it is done. Let's not blame our administration nor our teachers, but the parents for a situation like that.—H. R.

Dear Mr. Reid: I think the only solution to the school problem is parochial schools. In the parochial school politics do not enter. The teachers are devoted people who have given their lives to the church and to the service of mankind — this is something the average public school teacher has not done. The public school teacher expects to be paid a high salary; have a beautiful place to live; plenty of vacation and "sick-leave" and so forth. The parochial is really in it for what he or she can give, not for what they get out of it. I think the Catholic Church is right in expecting taxes from the government for their schools — after all where do you find the best schools, the best teachers and finally, the best scholars? It speaks for itself. Let's take politics out of our schools, our hospitals and our welfare dept.—"A TRUE CITIZEN."

### Old religious customs join military victory in theme of celebration

Old religious customs can now be witnessed each May when the Fiesta honoring San Francisco de Paula is held in Tularosa. The true full meaning has been brought back into the Fiesta which, through the years, had gradually become just a celebration of a military victory.

This year, residents of Tularosa will mark the 92nd anniversary of the victory won by pioneer settlers of this tiny southern New Mexico village over Apaches at Round Mountain on April 17, 1868.

An effort to stress the religious importance of the fiesta was culminated last year. The event honoring the patron saint of the church, which was the only one serving Tularosa for 42 years, has resumed its intended meaning.

This emphasis attracted still more spectators than ever before. The crowd remained at approximately 400, even with the coming and going, and by the second day, thousands had viewed at least a portion of the tribute to the Saint to whom the pioneers appealed as they went into battle.

Preparations by Las Dams and Los Caballeros, the religious organizations of the church, the elected mayordomos and the Franciscan fathers had been proven worthwhile.

A spirit of cooperation behind the religious observance permeated the atmosphere. For the first time, the religious men of the church wore combrecas with their deep brown habits. Father Celestino Chinn had only the broad-brimmed straw, but Fr. Miguel Sentens also added a gay serape across his shoulder.

The Fiesta was colorful even though returned to the church from the Chamber of Commerce. Like event it had become.

### Saint Francis, carved of richly shining wood, was borne to a place of honor by four Caballeros dressed as Charros. They were Emilio Padilla, Victor Jaramillo, Raymond Duran and Sisto Garcia.

The patron saint received the homage paid him in the kidly manner with which he had heeded the prayers of the handful of settlers who went, outnumbered, into battle with such crude weapons as axes, lances and bows.

The Vigil (First Vespers) of the Feast was announced by the Yuncaso, a loud explosion which accompanied the shooting of the anvils. This is made by filling a hole of the upper of two anvils with live coal affixed to a long stick, gunpowder and lighting it with a match.

That was noon Saturday. Other Yuncasos were scheduled during the Fiesta to mark certain phases. A final one closed the celebration. Las Vesperas — the Rosary, La Promesa Solemne, and the Benediction with the Blessed Sacrament were held in the early part of the first day.

La Danza, a religious dance, was performed by the Caballeros before Saint Francis while four others held him. Those dancing before the church wore symbolic costumes and masks. One man was the monarch. He asked each man to go forward and pray with him.

Last year was the first time in fifty or more years that this Indian dance was performed. It was first danced after the fight at Round Mountain by Tularosans and the Cavalrymen when they returned to this village after the battle. Some linelt at Higuera while others danced.

Another first, but for the very first time, was the staging of Las Mananitas. This was done by Los Caballeros and the townfolk early Sunday morning before high mass and the Gun Yuncasos at the elevation. This was a morning greeting for the patron saint.

The Yuncasos and Las Mananitas are tributes to royalty and sweethearts, respectively, in real life.






