Over 60 per cent of registered voters in county cast their ballots

Perfect weather and a number of contests in both state, county and for judicial offices, drew well over half of Lincoln County's registered voters to the primary election Tuesday.

A total of 1623 Democrats cast their ballots, for a percentage of 61% out of the number registered, 1040 Republicans voted for a percentage of 69% out of the total number registered.

An unofficial tally of votes in the Third-Judicial-district gave incumbent Judge W. T. Scoggin a lead of 578 over his nearest opponent Richard A. Stanley.

Stanley carried Lincoln county by 298 votes, according to unofficial returns.

Judge Allan D. Walker was an easy winner over Lafe E. Oman for the second judgeship in the Third Judicial District.

Corona precinct 13 was the first to report at the County Clerk's office Tuesday night. Their box was followed by those of Hondo, Ancho and Carrizozo 14A, all in by 10:30.

It was nearly two hours later before other precincts began to come in, with Captain precinct 9, being the last to report at 3:30 in the morning.

In the close race for sheriff on the Republican ballot, only two votes separated W. G. Bradley and Albert M. Richardson when the first four boxes that came in were tallied.

GOP SHERIFF RACE CLOSE Bradley's final margin of victory, in an unofficial tally, was 50 votes.

Other contests that were not settled until later precincts came in were state senator on the Democratic ballot and the Democratic two-way contests for sheriff and county clerk.

All returns are unofficial. Edwin L. Mechem, Republican candidate for governor, ran away from his opponent in Lincoln county balloting, with 871 votes against 63 for Paul W. Robinson.

Primary winners on the Republican ballot in which there were contests were Ignacio Torres for county commissioner, District 1, and Lloyd Vigil for county assessor. He led the Republican ticket with a margin of 510 votes over W. Scott Campbell.

Austin Wooten for assessor, led the Democratic ticket for offices where there were contests. His margin over Ramon S. Luna was 564 votes.

In Donito precinct 12 the Republican voters registered turned out 100%, casting 13 votes.

Democratic primary winners in county contests were Herman E. Kelt for state senator, in a three-way contest; Charles A. Jones for county commissioner, District 2; Clarence E. Shaw for county clerk; Austin Wooten, assessor; Frank Barajas, county sheriff; Cecil Clark for justice of the peace Precinct 14; Harold M. Graham, justice of the peace Precinct 19 and Alton Gray, justice of the peace in precinct 10. D. Herrera won the Republican nomination for justice of the peace, Hondo precinct.

Corona delegate to General Assembly of Presbyterian Church Walter M. Pfeiffer of Corona has been elected to the general assembly of the United Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A., which will meet in Cleveland May 18 to 25.

A commissioner is an official delegate. The general assembly is the supreme governing body of the 3,159,562-member church. Commissioners will elect a moderator (presiding officer) and will vote on matters affecting the prayer book and the official views on racial and social issues.

Speakers at the assembly will include Dr. Charles Malik of Lebanon, former president of the UN general assembly, and Bishop Leslie Newbigin, general secretary of the International Missionary Council.

Pfeiffer will be representing the Rio Grande Presbytery. He is an elder in the Presbyterian Church of Corona. He will also attend a pre-conference evangelism meeting May 24 and 27 at Cleveland.

Church bonds to be offered to public

Construction of a new addition to the First Baptist Church in Carrizozo will begin in about three weeks, according to plans and in the meantime the old parsonage is to be removed.

In financing the new facilities the church is using the Broadway Plan, which has been used extensively for church finance throughout the country for over 20 years.

The plan is a simple variation of municipal finance, in which the church sells 5% interest bearing bonds to its members and friends of the church.

Sale of the bonds will begin on May 16.

LAW SUIT LOOMS ON MONEY CUT

Santa Fe, May 11—The 10% cut levied against all agencies and institutions receiving money from the state general account is pinching so hard in some places that a lawsuit is likely on the legality of the cut, and a special session of the legislature possible to relieve the shortage.

The state is shy something more than \$3 million of the amount appropriated by the legislature for the year starting July 1, and it would be something of a state-house miracle if such a surplus developed, in next year's collections.

One of the state colleges is considering a legal test of the finance board's reduction of the legislative appropriations and legal opinion here is almost unanimous in holding that the cut is illegal as ordered by the finance board.

NEED LEGISLATURE TO GET THE CASH

Winning such a law suit, however, wouldn't produce money where there was none before and the only hope lies in the legislature raising the dough by new or higher taxes.

And, of course, the colleges and agencies could suffer through for a year with 10% less money than they had planned to spend.

The money situation at the state-house will be much more severe in the year starting July 1 than in the current period.

GOVERNOR'S OFFICE SUBJECT TO CUT

The cut ordered by the governor's finance board will fall on the governor's office, among others, in the amount of \$3,122.

It cannot affect the governor's pay of \$17,500 a year, and it isn't possible to make much of a reduction in the \$7,400 appropriated for maintenance, retirement and bonds.

That leaves two places for the \$3,000 cut—the governor's expense account money of \$23,500 a year and the \$40,820 a year set up for the office help.

EXPENSE ACCOUNT SUBJECT TO CUT

The governor draws \$2,123 a month for expenses which he may spend or put in his pocket, there being no audit or check of any kind on what goes with the money.

That's the \$23,500 expense account. There's another item of \$15,000 a year for operating the governor's residence. That's for grocery bills, utilities, lawn cutting and such, which would also be subject to the 10% cut.

The governor's wife recently told a gathering of ladies at Portales that the \$15,000 was barely enough.

SUPREME COURT IS DEFIANT

Some agencies stand to be exempt from the cut. The supreme court, for instance, was excluded from a similar cut a few years ago when it cut word to the finance board that it would investigate a challenge of the legality of the cut if it were enforced on the court.

This year the civil defense office which is perhaps the cruelest political operation in the state government, has been exempt from the money reduction.

The governor is on the spot to take the reduction in his office money and that for his residence or face the gaff that would follow.

STATE LOSING ON WALL STREET

Stocks purchased by the state investment council from June thru March were quoted at the end of April as worth \$253,000 less than the purchase price. Former attorney general Fred Stanley who was hired by the highway department at \$12,000 a year for part-time service, replaces Republican Jack Watson who was let out, because the department needed a full-time lawyer. . . . Georgia Lusk, mother of congressional aspirant Gene Lusk, and former state school superintendent and congresswoman, quit her \$500 a month place in the

A 1956 graduate of Carrizozo High School, the 20-year-old soldier attended New Mexico A&M College in Las Cruces.



Yakima Firing Center, Wash. (AHTNC)—Army Pfc. Orlando R. Pacheco, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fernin Pacheco of San Patricio, is scheduled to participate with other personnel from the 4th Infantry Division in Exercise Elk Horn, a Strategic Army Corps (STRAC) field maneuver, at the Yakima (Wash.) 
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

## TALKING BACK

By HOMER REID

Dear Rev. Reid: I don't mean to be critical, just state some facts (you asked for that) and the fact is that I don't think a preacher or a priest should take such an active part in civic affairs as you do. I know you are some executive with the census, you sell advertising and I suppose you do other things of a secular nature. It seems to me that a preacher or a so-called "man of God" should devote himself to sacred things and not be busy with the ordinary man. You must find some time for devotions and religious studies and so forth in order to bring these ideas to others. — JUST ASKING.

Dear "J. A.": You, of course, have a very pertinent point to make here. A man must take time for his devotions—and, I believe, at regular times; but your idea of a preacher or a priest "set apart," is something that I have opposed for some time.

Truly religious people should not be those who live in a little world of their own where they say their prayers, go to services, enjoy the "consolations of religion," have little devotional experiences, and believe that God is interested in only what they call "religious" work. Real religion is continuous with the whole of life, not something behind an iron curtain from which we emerge to do the "work of the world."

All life, for the really religious man, is life in God's world. It is fatal to have one foot in God's world and the other in a different kind of world, altogether. The division exists only in a mind that is thinking falsely, for the world of the worldly is fantasy. It isn't real at all.

If I had my way, I would cut out from our vocabulary adjectives like "worldly" and nouns like "worldliness." I know that there is immense value in warning young people about phases of life that cannot contribute to their spiritual well-being, and I know that the saints call that worldliness, but what I am trying to say is that the religious man integrates all the activities of life and does not see two worlds, but one, and that one is hot through and through with the beauty and purposes of God.

Actually the church has offended against this conception. It has divided activities into the sacred and the secular. I am said to be engaged in a sacred task and my shoemaker in a secular task. But the religious man should not hold that distinction as valid. The religious shoemaker is as much a servant of God as the man who hands you the sacrament. He is, in fact, in God's world doing God's work for God's people and for the sake of God. He is helping God answer the prayers of his people for health. Because he is a religious shoemaker, he cannot put cardboard instead of leather into shoes. Making a good pair of shoes thoroughly is a divine service because it is a contribution to the welfare of men and service to man in the only way of serving God.

It was when Jesus had been a carpenter for twenty years and had never preached a single sermon that the Voice said, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." The church has said so often that life in the world is something apart from religion that now men have come to think that religion is something apart from life in the world.

Religion is life! Religion is everything. Nothing matters but religion. The universe is God's universe. Everything He created in it proclaims His glory. It exists for Him and our religion should be expressing itself through everything we do. I have found this work with the census bureau very enlightening. I have found where the home is religious—the atmosphere is different; the folk are kind and considerate and completely honest, but where there is not religion—no interest in things of the spirit—the people are discourteous; crude in their lives and hiding something. They are afraid and it is this fear and guilt in

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## King size Cokes to be on market

A \$60,000 expansion program is under way at the Alamogordo Coca Cola Bottling Co. plant and is expected to be completed about the middle of May.

The process of conversion, under the direction of Tom Lucky, manager, has been under way for several weeks and will be completed with the installation of one more major piece of equipment.

At the completion of their conversion the Alamogordo Coca Cola Co. plant will begin bottling king-size Cokes for the entire sales area to be sold along with the conventional size bottles.

The \$60,000 expansion program includes an investment of about \$30,000 in a new bottle washer, manufactured in Georgia. It is designed to clean and sterilize 150 bottles a minute and is completely automatic, except for loading.

When the bottles are washed and sterilized they are automatically fed into the filling machine and after they enter the washer they are not touched by human hands.

The Alamogordo Coca Cola Bottling Co. plant was completed and opened for business in October of 1955. Sales volume has continually climbed since that time, Lucky says, and this expansion program is indicative of the company's faith in the Otero-Lincoln county areas which it serves.

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
