

# Old and new talent combine to enact Billy the Kid Pageant opening Friday



"Rim Rock Red" to double in Pageant Parts

Old Lincolnton, New Mexico—Ghosts of Charlie Bowdre and Bob Olinger will live again in the person of Harmon Hann of Hobbs, better known as "Rim Rock Red," in the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" pageant to be presented August 5, 6 and 7 in Lincoln, N. M.

Last week's call for gun, with horse, with man, resulted in Red's volunteering his services for the bang-up drama of early New Mexico. He will double in both parts and will bring his own surry and stage coach to help with other parts of the pageant.

This year's annual Billy the Kid pageant has drawn actors from considerable distance and promises to outdo all previous performances. The pageant dates are the evenings of August 5, 6 and 7 in Lincoln.

Director John Meigs has recruited the services of actors from Hobbs, El Paso, Carlsbad and even the help of Dr. Gulah Wahid of Afghanistan, who is currently studying hospital methods at nearby Fort Stanton.

In addition, the "Ghosts of Tombstone," a volunteer organization dedicated to promoting their town October celebration, will be on hand to perform some skits and gun play operations on the streets of Lincoln.

The group, led by Capt. "Boots" Glrard, will include can-can dancers, gunfighters and actors representing actual characters of Old Tombstone.

They will perform Saturday afternoon from 3 to 6 on the pageant grounds in Lincoln and will take part in the Lincoln Old Timers Day on Sunday.

Saturday afternoon activities will be the first time a program has been set up for this day.

Betty Shreevogst will be MC for the activities and will conduct the Old Timers Fiddler Contest on Sunday. Activities on Sunday start at 10 in the morning and will be continuous.

**OLD CARS ON PARADE**  
At 2:30 Sunday there will be a parade featuring the El Paso Antique Auto Club and Bill Geertz' antique autos from Roswell with a 1925 Oakland and a 1929 Ford pickup.

Harmon Hann of Hobbs will have his surry and stagecoach from Rim Rock City near Odessa and his trained dog Jubal.

Mr. and Mrs. Roman Macs will feature old cars and early wagons from their extensive collection.

The Waterusers Association of Lincoln is sponsoring chuck wagon suppers and luncheons, to be served at the Lincoln schoolhouse by Mr. Boggs, whose Wagon Train Restaurant in Ruidoso is receiving wide recognition.

Jimmie Coleman of Carlsbad is coming to join the cast. He wrote Director Meigs that he "worked on a ranch, could ride, shoot and milk a cow." The director is going to make use of his first-mentioned talents and says he might even use the last, if a good cow can be found. Jimmie will bring a gun that he says is the exact model of one Billy the Kid used.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Villaiba of El Paso are bringing their talents and will join the Fred McTeague dancers for the fiesta scenes in the pageant.

Harmon Hann will provide surry and stagecoach rides up and down the streets of Lincoln town starting from the middle of this week. Known as "Rim Rock Red" to the kids of the Midland-Odessa area, he promises to be a hit with the youngsters of New Mexico also.

John Thomas of San Patricio will play the role of Billy the Kid; Joe Freeland as Pat Garrett, Kenneth Noeker as Governor Lew Wallace; Dan Storm in his special role of Buckshot Roberts and Barney Adams and Fred McTeague as Deputy Bell and a member of the Murphy-Dolan gang, respectively.

Dan Storm's father, Lyn Storm, will take the part of Murphy. The important roles of Mr. and Mrs. McSween will be played by Kay Kelley of Captain and Judy McKnight, with Juddy McKnight substituting for Kelley on Friday.

Angelina Gonzales will add a dash of humor to the proceedings. Renee Noeker will again re-enact the role of Minnie Shields and will be the foil for Buckshot Roberts' act. Dick Standefer of Ruidoso will narrate and be the voice of Billy the Kid.

Other standby members of the voice cast include Edward Penfield as director and Fred Stauson, E. C. Bruce, Betty Shreevogst, Dan Storm, Fatsy Nunez, Vernon Gierhart and Rev. Wm. Brown.

## County jail inmate attempts suicide

Jinjo Lucero, 23, of Roswell, a prisoner at the county jail, failed in an attempt to take his life Tuesday about supper time.

He was found unconscious in his cell by Libe Mirabal, jailer, after another prisoner had reported he believed something was wrong with the prisoner in an adjoining cell.

Lucero was lying on the floor, a blanket partly covering him, a noose fashioned from a blanket and a shoe string, around his neck.

Mirabal cut him loose and applied artificial respiration to the man who shortly began to show signs of life. Dr. J. P. Turner was called and after examining the prisoner said he would be all right.

Lucero was up and around Wednesday, apparently suffering no ill effects from his attempt to take his life.

Before attempting to hang himself, Lucero had left a suicide note on the bunk in his cell, along with a note to his girl friend. It was a rambling account, disclaiming responsibility for a man being stabbed near a Lincoln dance hall, also that he was tired of being in jail.

Before his arrest in connection with the stabbing of Godfrey Chavez July 10 at the Lincoln dance, Lucero had been committed at the age of 14 to Springer and later served time in the penitentiary, according to Sheriff S. M. Ortiz.

Chavez, still in the Carrizozo Hospital, with a severe stab wound alongside his stomach, Sunday identified Lucero as his assailant.

He was arraigned Tuesday of this week and his case set for August 15. He is charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

Sheriff Ortiz said the case had been a hard one to solve because he had little information to go on. None of the deputies at the dance hall, or others known to be there could give him any information on Chavez's attackers. Finally on July 30, Ortiz received some information from a source in the Valley that led to Lucero's arrest. He has implicated two other men.

Also scratched by a blade in the stabbing affray, was Ralph Herrera of Pularosa.

As an aftermath of the fight, ten residents of Lincoln protested to District Attorney Dan Saso Jr. that the dance hall was a public nuisance and should be closed.

The District Attorney wrote letters to all justices of the peace in the county and to the probate judge, advising them to use discretion in granting permits for the Lincoln dance.

The memorandum to justices of the peace informed them they could legally refuse to grant permits, if they feel that the applicant for a permit cannot keep the peace.

The news was informed this week that Roman Macs, proprietor of the dance hall, had secured about 200 signatures to a counter petition asking that the dances be allowed to continue.

T. B. Smoot, probate judge, has issued a permit for another dance there the nights of August 5 and 6 which are pageant nights in Lincoln. The permit stipulates that the dances end at midnight.

## Services held for Orlando Lucero

Fyneral services were held Monday in Carrizozo for Orlando Lucero, a popular youth, who was the tragic victim of drowning last Thursday, July 28, at Thornton Lake, near Albany, Oregon.

Rosary services were held in the chapel of the Shaw Mortuary July 31 at 8 p.m., by Rev. Clay Dennis. Mass was read Monday, August 1, at 9:30 a.m. in the Saint Rita Catholic Church, with Rev. Dennis officiating. Interment followed in Saint Rita cemetery.

Orlando was born in Carrizozo October 26, 1942, and was a student in Carrizozo High School.

He was a summer visitor to Oregon, where he had been staying at the Joe Gabbert family home where his sister-in-law, Mrs. James Lucero Jr., resided. Orlando had been working at a cafe in Tangent, Oregon.

Details of his drowning were printed in the Albany Democrat-Herald newspaper, as follows:

"The youth's body was discovered by two skin divers at 10:55 a.m., some 1 1/2 to 2 hours after he disappeared.

"The boy was swimming with Dennis Carter, 16, of Albany. The two were spacing inner tubes on the lake and then swimming between them.

"I put an inner tube out, and he said, 'That's far enough,' young Carter said. 'He started swimming and got about 10 feet from the tube and then said he couldn't make it.

"The Carter youth said he swam out to aid the stricken swimmer. 'I got hold of him... we went down twice... I just couldn't help him,' Carter reported in a low-pitched voice that broke from time to time.

"Carter then went to shore and called the police and fire departments, then returned to the lake to mark the spot where the youth went down.

"Despite the accurate marking of the area, divers were unable to find the body immediately because of the muddy water which made visibility extremely poor at the bottom. The depth of the water where the boy went down was between 15 and 20 feet.

"Hank Varat was the first diver at the scene and he was joined shortly afterward by Ron Griffin. The body was found by Ernest Lebow and Dee Williams. Other men not wearing diving apparatus, also joined in the search but were hampered by the depth of the water.

Young Lucero's death was the third caused by drowning in three days in the Albany area.

He is survived by his parents, Jimmy and Juanita Lucero of Carrizozo; by four brothers, Jimmy Jr. of Oregon, Albert of Washington, D. C., and Gilbert and Alfonso of Carrizozo; by a sister, Mary Ann of Carrizozo; and by his paternal grandmother, Mrs. Sarah Sanchez of Albuquerque.

Casket bearers were Manuel Ortiz, Wayland Hill, Jerry Doltran, Robert Ortiz, Dobby Dan Crenshaw and Sammy Hicks. The Shaw Mortuary was in charge of local arrangements.

## Food important in world peace struggle

Hi Overton of Yasa, N. M., president of the New Mexico Wool Growers Association, addressed the regular luncheon meeting of the Carrizozo Rotary Club.

In the struggle for world peace, food is an important weapon, Overton said. "There are 47 million more people in the world each day who have to be fed."

Comparing the rise in costs over the past few years, the speaker pointed out that retail prices of food are about the same as they were seven years ago. The farmer does not receive a high share of the retail price, he said. It takes 2 hours and 29 minutes of labor out of an 8-hour day for the farmer to pay his taxes.

Overton referred to the farm subsidy and pointed out that many services of the federal government are charged to it, including the school lunch and school milk programs and upkeep of the recreation areas in the national forest.

Accompanying Overton were Bill Wells of Las Cruces, who is organization director of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, and Joe Sisco of Pecos, president of the Lincoln County Farm & Livestock Bureau.

Attention of the board was called to the loading dock at the rear of the old Harley Lumber Company building, which encroaches on the alley.


As the town's garbage disposal pit is full, another one needs to be dug and pieces for moving this dirt are to be secured from dirt movers.

## GUIDEPOST TO HOSPITALITY AT THE WORTLEY HOTEL



## Lincoln, N. M.—Like the legendary Phoenix bird, which rose from ashes to live again, the old Wortley Hotel in Lincoln is again alive and kicking; in fact, preparing itself for the biggest three days in the history of its second lease on life.

This will be on August 5, 6 and 7, when Billy the Kid rides again in the annual pageant at Lincoln. Only this time the Wortley will be open for business and sight-seeing.

The Hotel, scene of exciting events in the Lincoln County Range War of 1878, was recently restored completely by the State and is back in business as a unique combination of historical museum piece and working hotel with restaurant.

It was in the old Wortley (known in its early years as "Murphy's Mess") that Bob Olinger was sitting, eating lunch, a few minutes before he met death at the hands of Billy the Kid. Today, visitors may partake of much the

same food as the old Hotel used to serve: Steaks and fried chicken, home-made pies and bread, and so forth.

The rooms are complete with brass bedsteads (with modern, orthopedic mattresses), marble-topped bureau, lace curtains, braided rugs and a wood-burning fireplace in every room.

Non-historic touches include central heating, toilet showers and an ultra-modern kitchen, with ice machine and freezer.

Aside from such concessions to modernity, the builders—hewed strictly to authenticity in the restoration procedures. After excavating the foundation, Curator John Boylan, of the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, made a scale model from photographs of the original structure. Plans were drawn, using the model for reference, and the recollections of old-timers like Lloyd Gilbert were drawn upon heavily for additional details. Hulbert's party operated the original Wortley

in the old days. True to the original, the new Wortley has wide pine floors, and is built of adobe, 20 inches thick. Doors and windows were milled especially for the restoration and the window locks were the originals found in the cellar of the Tunstall store in Lincoln.

The countryside was searched and several sturdy old rocking chairs were acquired which see steady service on the portal-covered, 92-foot long porch. There is even an antique high chair, used daily, in the dining room.

Carvers and Ivies prints adorn the walls and the picture is completed by a white picket fence encircling the front yard. The fence was milled from a pattern drawn from an old photograph of the hotel.

Situated on a bluff, the Wortley overlooks the valley of the Bonito River and commands an excellent view of the Capitan Mountain tango beyond.

### County lags in savings bonds sales

During the first half of 1960, purchases of Series E and H, U. S. Savings Bonds in New Mexico increased by \$113,280.52, or 1.60%, from \$7,079,190.41, in 1959, to \$7,192,470.93, according to reports by the Treasury Department to J. P. Brandenburg, Taos, State Chairman of the U. S. Savings Bonds Committee. Lincoln county's part of the State's purchases totaled \$24,253.45 during the first 6-month period of this year. Last year, the amount was \$36,928.80 for a similar period, the Treasury Department has notified Tom Hood, county savings bonds chairman. This county has now reached 26.95% of its \$90,000 annual goal. June's purchases in the county totaled \$1,392.51 this year, and \$4,485.01 in June 1959, the county chairman further announced.

### Henry Hale named on FHA committee

Appointment of Henry Hale as a member of the Farmers Home Administration county committee has been announced by Thomas E. Dwyer, the agency's county supervisor serving Chaves and Lincoln counties, whose office is located in Roswell. Mr. Hale owns and operates a farm and ranch near Glencoe. He has lived in the valley for many years and is familiar with the area and the people. He is 55 years of age and was selected to serve on the Lincoln county committee because of his qualifications. Two other members make up the 3-member committee which works with the county supervisor to see that the best possible use is made of the agency's farm credit service program, consistent with local farmers' and ranchers' needs. The other two members are Corbin Hester of Corona and Robert McDaniel of Glencoe. Mr. Hester will serve as committee chairman during the next, or 1961, fiscal year. Each member is appointed for a 3-year term. Mr. Hale succeeds Paul Jones, whose 3-year term expired this year. The committee determines the eligibility of individual applicants for all types of loans. It also reviews borrowers' progress and aids the county supervisor in adapting the agency's loan policies to conditions faced by farmers in this area. Members are selected and appointed so that, so far as possible, different areas or neighborhoods are represented. The Farmers Home Administration makes annual or intermediate term loans to farmers who need adequate funds to buy equipment and livestock, and longer term loans to build or repair houses and other essential farm buildings, and to purchase or improve land suitable for family-type farm operations. It also advances credit to farmers or their non-profit associations to establish and carry out approved soil and water conservation practices, and to install and improve irrigation and farmstead water facilities.

### New type payment for oil and gas leases

Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton recently announced the amendment of Title 43, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 19243.3, requiring that oil and gas leases be accompanied by separate remittances to cover payment of the filing fee and payment of the advance rental required by the regulations in Title 43, CFR 192, with respect to type of checks to be submitted for advance rental in connection with simultaneous non-

competitive oil and gas lease applications. The remittance covering payment of the advance rental must be made by cash, money order, certified check, bank draft, or bank cashier's check. The filing fee may be paid by a similar remittance or by uncertified check. The foregoing amendment is effective for simultaneous non-competitive oil and gas lease offers filed beginning July 15, 1960. Pictures from around the world will be shown at the N. M. 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
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

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

## Inside the Capital

**BURROUGHS NAMES FIVE TO THE COURTS**  
SANTA FE—The swearing in of M. E. (Zig) Noble of Las Vegas gives Gov. John Burroughs three appointees on the supreme court of five, more than any other governor ever had and better than the great politico FDR could do in his first effort to load the U. S. Supreme Court.

Zig Johns Burroughs' appointees Irwin Molsa of Albuquerque and David Chavez of Santa Fe. On district court seats by appointment of the governor are Judge Sam Montoya of Santa Fe and Judge Frank Zinn of Gallup.

All this appointing to the elective judicial positions fall to the first non-lawyer governor since 1940.

## DEMS GAGGING ON KENNEDY

New Mexico Democratic leaders are drinking bitter tea in working for Sen. Jack Kennedy for President. The very top figures in the party not only opposed him for nomination but spoke of him in contempt and ridicule before the Los Angeles convention.

But that doesn't mean they are not going to work for him here. The success of Governor Burroughs and others on the Democratic ticket is tied closely to the vote that Kennedy receives in New Mexico.

## DEMS FISH UP FOUR ELECTIONS

Six weeks after the state party convention Democrats here learned that they had chosen four electors to carry the state vote to Washington in the event the party wins.

They are J. O. Garcia of Rio Arriba, Will Ketcher of Albuquerque, Lawrence Walker of Las Cruces and Deulah Wilcox of Clayton. Jess Mitchell, assistant state chairman, said the convention had overlooked the election of electors and the elected State Chairman Seaborn Collins as favoring later action on picking the electors.

It was planned, Mitchell said, to view the elector positions of the ticket as "vacancies" and let the party's executive committee fill the vacancies.

But all that trouble was avoided, Mitchell said, when the approved minutes of the convention came in from Convention Chairman Mack Easton of Hobbs showing that the four had been selected on the same resolution that named the delegates to the national convention.

"Some guy from Albuquerque," Mitchell said, "was making so much noise at the time of the reading of the resolution that I didn't hear the electors named and I guess a lot of others didn't."

## TIBO CHAVEZ EYES FOR SENATE POST

There is increasing talk among politicians for Tibo Chavez of Belen for Demo floor leader of the state senate if he makes it through the November voting.

Gen. Leo Morgan of Fortales and Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe have been actively seeking the place but generating opposition as well as support.

Morgan, senator from the governor's home county, hurt his chances with the politicians in backing loser Gene Lusk against U. S. Rep. Joe M. Montoya for Congress. The Montoyas are expected to take a hand in the organization of the state senate.

## MONTOKA FORS LOSING JOBS

The kickback from Montoya's topped win has already been felt elsewhere in the statehouse. Small-time payroller Tony Montoya who filed against Congressman Montoya in the primary and withdrew two days later has been fired, obviously for the filing, not the withdrawing.

(Tony Montoya claims that he got out of the race upon a promise by Revenue Commissioner Bob Walker to raise his pay from \$260 to \$360 a month and a promise by Forts of Entry Director Tom Montoya, brother of the congressman, to employ his son. Neither came through.)

Lefty Baker, Demo chairman of the Loving precinct in Edly county, who worked hard for Lusk against Montoya, was busted off his \$200-a-month place in the gasoline tax division.

**BURROUGHS SAVES DOLLAR FOR STATE**  
Governor Burroughs returned \$15,084 to the state bank account which had been appropriated for his office and not spent. Most all of it came from a sum of \$26,350.

The chief product the firm sells the state is reflecting material purchased almost entirely by the highway department.

Harold Leonard of Albuquerque had the agency before he went on the highway commission and chided it to Ribble.

## FARMING AROUND

Night money may do more to cut farm surpluses than legislation. Bankers have many demands for any available money, so they are quite properly taking the best and safest of the loans. The days of easy credit are no longer with us. Fewer broker houses are going up; it's harder to borrow money to buy land and our large livestock numbers scare many in the money-lending business. Many think this tightening-up will help establish, capable farmers and they will hold the line for better days. Marginal land and crops of high risk will be cut and this, many think, will continue until money and credit are much easier than now.

The "farm problem" is getting help from an unexpected source. Federal reports show that cities and towns under 50,000 population away from metropolitan

areas are increasingly popular as industrial plant sites in recent years. Labor not needed on farms and in farming business makes exceptionally competent employees when trained for the new work. Also an increasing number hold their jobs at the plant and do their farming after work week-end and holidays. Some save enough to buy more land and become full-time farmers and others get better-paying jobs at the plant and sell out their farm interests.

Anyway, people solving their own problems on their home grounds, through their own efforts is a heartening sight.


