HOMER FOLKS RESENT PAYROLLERS' ADVICE

Santa Fe, Sept. 14—Ed Guthmann of the Springer Tribune had an article a while back deploring the practice of state payrollers coming home at election time and telling the local folks how to vote.

He touched a sore situation that is throbbing all over New Mexico. During the primary campaign I had half a dozen inquiries from as many places in the state wanting to know if this or that payroll was drawing state pay while politicking in his home county.

Soon there will be similar questions about state employees showing up in their home communities for the general election campaign, and it's fairly certain that each of them will repel more votes than he attracts.

But the statehouse bosses continue to send them home, more often than not at state expense, to get out the vote for the governor or the bosses of the departments in which they work.

The real influence of these people is limited to their families and maybe their creditors.

PAYROLL CHAIRMEN ALSO A LIABILITY

The "futility of sending state jobholders out to influence working people goes along with another political anachronism that has been under much discussion here.

That concerns the benefit, or harm, that comes from giving statehouse jobs to county chairmen, precinct officers and such.

While the local politicians may be helpful to their employers in the party primaries it is pretty well agreed among all but the stoneagers that they are a liability.

Their employment looks bad to the general public and when they grab off jobs for themselves that are supposed to get for the people they represent in their districts, resentment is inevitable.

And there again, do you know anybody who votes for a candidate or a party because the neighborhood politician is on the payroll?

John Burroughs who ran for governor in 1933 without anybody on the state payroll is going again this time against an army of maybe 500 influential politicians from the state payroll supporting him.

MAJOR JAMES A. SNOW New commanding officer of Stallion Site Camp and Detachment 5, U. S. Army Garrison (4564), White Sands Missile Range. He assumed command July 8, 1950. Major and Mrs. Snow and family are residents of Nogal.

Major Snow entered military service in 1940 with the Artillery National Guard. He trained at Ft. Bliss and later served 14 months in the Pacific Theater as sergeant-major of the 206th CA AAA Regiment.

Commissioned August 26, 1943, after completing the Anti-aircraft Officers Candidate School at Camp Davis, N. C., Snow served in various artillery command and staff assignments through five campaigns in the European Theater of Operations during World War II.

After being discharged in December 1945, he was recalled to active duty in August 1948 and was assigned as aide-de-camp to the commanding general, AA & GM Center, Fort Bliss. A concurrent assignment was that of range acquisition officer and he was the first project officer for the extension of the Fort Bliss Military Reservation north of U. S. Highway 380.

He was serving in Japan when the U. N. police action was begun in Korea. He served with G2-Air in the Army-Air Force Joint Operations Center in Korea, returning to the U. S. in December 1950.

Friday is Selective Service System Day

Friday, September 16, has been proclaimed by Governor John Burroughs as "Selective Service System Day" in New Mexico, honoring one of America's oldest institutions.

Selective Service as we know it today, has evolved by a process of trial and error in the history of our country, as manpower was needed to meet emergencies.

It has grown into a system whereby young men of our nation are prepared to defend our way of life.

Local board members, appeal board members and medical advisors are appointed by the President upon recommendation of the Governor. Each local board is manned by a compensated clerk appointed under Civil Service procedure.

The Lincoln County local board is composed of five members: Roy E. Shafer, chairman, with 20 years of service; Florentino Lopez, 6 years; Raymond L. Sherrill, 12 years; C. D. May, 2 years and Fructoso J. Osorio, 2 years.

A medical advisor, Dr. J. P. Turner, advises the board on medical matters. He has served with the board 20 years.

Previous members associated with Selective Service in Lincoln County are Herman E. Kelt, who served as chairman for 18 years; Juan Martinez, Art Rowland and Dewey Stoker.

The total registration in the Selective Service system is 22,700,000, of which New Mexico's registration is 110,000 and Lincoln County, Local Board No. 14, 1,273. Of this 1,273 registration for Lincoln County, there are 237 Class 1-A. There are 101 Lincoln County registrants in the Armed Forces at the present time.

New Mexico Success Story



TOM BOLACK of Farmington is a director of the Petro-Atlas Corp., and the Hidden Splendor Mining Co. He was one of 11 recipients this week of FEAA's 1948 American Success Story Awards. Bolack also is an independent oil, gas and mining operator and a candidate for lieutenant governor of New Mexico.

New York City, Sept. 14—American Success Stories were presented today by the Free Enterprise Awards Association, Inc., to eleven men who rose from humble jobs to become owners and heads of plant industries. The recipients, including four immigrants, one from Russia, praised U. S. democracy, testifying that it gave freedom and opportunity for success to all.

Presentation of FEAA's annual awards were made at the Savoy Hilton Hotel by FEAA's Awards Chairman, Talbot T. Speer, Maryland publisher, owner of America's oldest newspaper, the 233-year-old Maryland Gazette.

Mr. Speer declared, "The recipients represent Americans in all fields whose own success has provided jobs, security and a higher standard of living for all. They are proof that any American can set high goals and achieve them in these days of crisis, ideological warfare and totalitarian brain-washing, do not lose faith in the American democratic system. It has blessed America with more freedom and material abundance than eclectics, totalitarian or orthodoxy, centuries older."

A New Mexico resident was among the eleven men honored by the Freedom Award. He is Tom Bolack, 42, of Farmington, and a thumbnail sketch of his achievements follows:

Independent oil, gas and mining operator. Director of Petro-Atlas Corp., Hidden Splendor Mining Co. and others. Statesman, philanthropist. Was ranch hand, oil field laborer. Took mail-course in geology. Despite coiffers and ridicule searched 350,000 miles through San Juan Basin for four years to discover rich oil lands that he leased on borrowed \$600 which he parlayed into a \$7 million fortune.

Cited for his personal sacrifices in pushing through the Colorado River Storage Project, the Navajo Dam and his service to New Mexico in its land, water, farm and industrial development. Past mayor of Farmington and member of New Mexico State Legislature. He is currently running for lieutenant governor of New Mexico. His success story and service to his state is only beginning.

On August 29 foresters of 71 nations met in Seattle, Wash., for a 13-day congress. With 2,000 attending, it was the largest international gathering of forestry and other natural resource people ever assembled.

Even so, all classrooms in the system are in very good repair. They are equipped throughout with new desks and chairs. No dilapidated furniture is used by the pupils.

Perhaps one of the best advantages offered in the Carrizozo schools is the personal contact between student and instructor. Classes are kept at a size which is not unwieldy or disadvantageous to either pupil or teacher. This allows for individual attention, so important at each level.

Furthermore, pupils in the junior high grades who show better than average ability are provided with the means and opportunity to grow intellectually broader and deeper. This has proved an advantage to all concerned and has helped accelerate the academic program for potential college students.

Carrizozo has a friendly, efficient school, with all of the advantages and very few of the disadvantages of a smaller system; no gangs, no cliques, no ruffians. This is something to consider.

Farm-gas tax refund

Deadline is Sept. 30

Deadline for filing by farmers for refunds on gasoline is Sept. 30. Refunds will cover federal tax paid on gasoline used on farms during the period July 1, 1959-June 30, 1960.

Federal Internal Revenue Service Form 2249 must be used for the refund application. These forms are available at the office of the district director of Internal Revenue, Albuquerque, N. M.

The federal tax on gasoline increased from 3 cents to 4 cents per gallon in October 1959. If farmers bought and used gasoline for farming purpose before that time, the refund will be 3 cents a gallon; after that date, 4 cents a gallon.

The refund form indicates that refund records may have to be supported by receipts if the district director requests such verification.


