District Court

A hearing was held in Justice of the Peace Alton Gray's court in Ruidoso Downs Monday and Emil Armstrong was bound over to district court, charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

Four juveniles from Carrizozo were processed in district court September 19 for permitted themselves to be served an alcoholic beverage. They admitted the allegation and each was assessed \$25 costs and placed on probation. One juvenile from Ruidoso was charged with driving a car with an illegal muffler. The charge was dismissed.

State of New Mexico vs. Manuel Vigil, charged with permitting himself to be served an alcoholic beverage. He was represented by Attorney H. Elfred Jones. A plea of guilty was entered and the court assessed \$100 costs, with \$75 suspended.

State vs. David Cardona, charged with driving while intoxicated, reckless driving and driving while license revoked. Attorney Jones was appointed by the court to represent the defendant. Cardona was placed on probation 1 year. Assessed \$150 costs and to serve 45 days in the county jail.

State vs. V. C. Waldon, charged with selling liquor to minors. He was represented by H. Elfred Jones. The charge was dismissed.

District Attorney Dan Sosa represented the State of New Mexico in the above matters.

State of New Mexico vs. Pete Swan, charged with giving, selling or procuring liquor for minors. The court appointed Atty Jones to represent the defendant. After hearing the testimony of witnesses the court found the defendant guilty. He was placed on probation 1 year; assessed \$100 costs.

Judge Scoggin will return for district court October 14. On October 10, Judge Allen D. Walker will open the Fall term of court. He will call the criminal docket.

Judge Scoggin will call the civil docket for the Fall term on October 14.

BOOKS CHARGED WITH EMBEZZLEMENT Morris S. Booths, former Ruidoso village clerk, was arrested in Ruidoso Tuesday and brought to the Lincoln County Jail. His bond was set at \$3,000 cash or \$10,000 property.

Booths is charged with the embezzlement of over \$50. His arraignment has been set for Friday at 2 p.m. before Justice of the Peace Harold Graham.

A shortage of several thousand dollars from Ruidoso village funds has been reported by state auditors.

After resigning July 23 from the position of village clerk Booths has been operating the Club Cafe in Ruidoso.

September 12 Court Proceedings Judge W. T. Scoggin presided over district court in Carrizozo September 12.

The first case was that of State of New Mexico vs. Pete Swan, charged with selling or giving liquor to minors. H. Elfred Jones was appointed by the court as attorney for the defendant. A plea of not guilty to the charge was entered and bond continued until September 19.

State vs. Emil Armstrong (represented by Atty Wm W. Osburn, Roswell) remained back to justice of the peace court for preliminary hearing next Monday. Two charges have been filed. Assault with a deadly weapon and driving or handling a deadly weapon in a threatening manner.

This case grew out of an alleged assault on Junior Perry August 27 at the Biscuit Hill Cafe in Ruidoso. Perry was cut on the face by his alleged assailants, Armstrong, a jockey, and Melvin Alexander, a race track attendant. The latter is charged with assault and battery. The pair were arrested by Bob Miller, State Highway Patrolman and Frank Barajas, deputy sheriff.

A plea of not guilty to the charge of selling liquor to minors was entered in district court by V. C. Waldon. He was represented by Attorney H. Elfred Jones. Bond was continued until September 19.

State of New Mexico vs. Abdon Joe Cruz, charged with abandonment and non support. Defendant was represented by Attorney John W. Thompson. A plea of guilty was entered. Bond on probation 1 year.

State vs. Benito Aragon, charged with driving while intoxicated and reckless driving. The reckless driving charge was dismissed and plea of guilty entered to DWI. Placed on 1 year probation; to serve 30 days in jail and assessed \$150 costs.

Two juveniles were processed, charged with driving too close and causing an accident. They admitted the charge. One was assessed \$3 costs; the other \$25 costs.

Myrtle White to face first degree murder charge

Mrs. Myrtle Leslie White was still in Carrizozo hospital this Thursday morning, where she has been a patient since shooting her husband, Bobby J. White early Sunday morning.

She went into a state of shock later in the day at the county jail and she was taken to the hospital on the recommendation of Dr. A. N. Spencer.

A first degree murder charge has been filed and Sheriff S. M. Ortiz said her arraignment and preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace R. L. Sherrill will be held as soon as she is released by the hospital.

The remains of White, who was 30, were taken to Muleshoe, Tex., Sunday for interment.

The Whites had four children. Two were Mrs. White's and two were his by a former marriage.

Sheriff Ortiz said he got a call from Mrs. White at 12:15 Sunday morning. Ortiz was at his office booking a drunk. Mrs. White told him that Bobby was out in the yard and that she believed he was hurt bad.

Ortiz locked up the drunk and went to the White home, 5-10th of a mile south of the Southern Pacific tracks. He found White lying on the lawn, bleeding severely. He called for the Shaw ambulance and in 5 minutes Dr. Spencer arrived. White was conscious and told the doctor he had been shot in the lung and couldn't get his breath.

He was taken to the hospital in the ambulance and in a short time Dr. Spencer returned with the information that White had died at 12:35. Mrs. White went into a state of shock and Dr. Spencer recommended that she be put in the hospital.

She was taken out of the hospital later in the day and placed in jail, but when she had a fainting spell and became hysterical, Dr. Spencer suggested she be returned to the hospital.

The bullet that killed White was fired from a .30-30 Marlin repeating rifle. The slug crashed through the lower sash of a front window striking him in the right breast.

Sheriff Ortiz said Mrs. White had given him the following account of events leading up to the shooting:

Before the shooting they had been in Jennie's bar and left for home. Between the bar and home she said White got to belligerent and they had an argument.

He drove the pickup to the home of a neighbor, where she said she got out of the pickup and walked home. There she phoned Vernon Scarcey, Bobby White's employer, and asked Scarcey and his wife to go to her mother's house (Mrs. Ward Leale) and pick up the couple's four children.

When Scarcey returned with the children Mrs. White said she told them about the trouble she and Bobby were having. When they were about ready to leave, Vernon saw White drive back in a pickup. He made the remark, "There he goes. He'll be home in a minute and will be cooled off." The Scarceys then went home.

Mrs. White continued that her husband drove up in front of the house in the pickup and parked it. He went up to the window and started "peering and belligerent" her.

Her statement said that she took the gun from behind the bed where she had kept it while White was in the service and called to him that if he didn't shut up and leave her alone, she was going to use the gun.

She said that White kept on cursing her and that she fired the shot.

Services Thursday for Dr. P. M. Shaver A funeral service was conducted this Thursday afternoon at the Church of Christ in Carrizozo for Dr. Peter M. Shaver, 90, who died at 6:50 p.m., Tuesday, September 20, in the Carrizozo hospital. Interment followed in the family plot in Evergreen cemetery.

Dr. Shaver was a family physician in the old tradition, as he began his practice as a country doctor who traveled by horse and buggy. However, his practice continued into the days of modern medicine and until three years ago he was still treating patients at an office in his home.

Peter Monroe Shaver was born December 20, 1869 in Arkansas. He began his medical work in 1890 in that state and was graduated from the Barnes Medical School in the Spring of 1900.

In 1900 he married Virginia Ellen Conner in Digger, Ark. They decided to come west and Dr. Shaver practiced medicine at Vaughn for two years.

When the Carrizozo physician, Dr. Johnson, joined the Army in 1918, Dr. Shaver took over his practice and he and his family moved to Carrizozo. Here he began a practice that was to last for nearly forty years.

Mrs. Shaver died in 1958. He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. E. R. Brown of Carrizozo; Mrs. E. W. Williams of Tucuman; and Mrs. Paul Wrye of Dallas, Texas; by a son Paul Mack Shaver of Little Rock, Ark.; also by five grandchildren and by four great grandchildren.

Brooks Lewis Services were held September 19 at 2 p.m., in the First Baptist Church in Carrizozo for Brooks Lewis, who died early Saturday morning, September 17.

Rev. Harold Ely officiated. Interment was in the family plot in Evergreen cemetery.

Mr. Lewis is survived by his widow, Esther, of Artesia; two sons, Scott of Alamogordo and Ralph of Artesia; one daughter, Shirley Ann Lewis of Artesia, by a sister, Mrs. John Harris of Bronte, Texas; three brothers, Rex of Carrizozo and John and Moses of Denver, Colo.; also by one grandchild.

Honorary bearers were J. E. Thornton and Wm. Gallacher Jr. The Shaw Mortuary was in charge of arrangements.

Demo barbecue was attended by 3,000 persons

Democrats of the Southwest and other parts of the country were graciously welcomed to the Desse Sawyer Quadrennial Democratic Celebration, held at the home of her daughter and son-in-law, Mrs. Fern Dunn and James Dunn, at Nogal last Sunday afternoon.

Guests were shown through the spacious ranch home and moved out to the patio to greet the candidates and old-time friends and new ones. Excellent barbecued beef was served for lunch.

The speeches began promptly at 2:30, with Senator Clinton P. Anderson introducing Vice-presidential candidate Lyndon B. Johnson. Johnson outlined the Democratic platform, along with Senator John Kennedy's qualifications for the office, which he termed "excellent."

He made a comparison of the progress of the Democratic party to what he termed "the retrogression of the Republican party."

The Republicans, he said, were not interested in the welfare of their nation and that the Democratic party is very much interested in the nation's welfare.

"This is best illustrated," he said, "by the bread and soup lines of the twenties and thirties."

U. S. Representative Joseph M. Montoya spoke of the farm and agriculture situation.

Governor Burroughs gave a short talk and pledged his full support to the Democratic ticket.

The Dunn ranch home was lavishly decorated with flowers everywhere and the swimming pool decorations were outstanding. In the pool were two boats made of styrofoam. One boat contained cutouts of our state senators and representatives, headed by a large cardboard model of Governor Burroughs.

A second boat contained cardboard cutouts of Kennedy, Johnson and Mrs. Desse Sawyer. Both boats had a plywood and crepe paper Democratic donkey in the bow.

A model of the White House was placed on the diving board and the Sawyer-Kennedy-Johnson boat had a sign on the bow reading "Going Down to Washington."

A dress, similar to the novel one worn by Mrs. Sawyer to the National Convention, was presented to Mrs. Lyndon Johnson.

It was estimated that approximately 3,000 persons were present during the afternoon.

CHERRY JOHNSON'S party came by plane to the Carrizozo airstrip. The big twin-engine plane made a perfect landing on the dirt runway and took off for the return to Texas around 3:30 in the afternoon.

County to buy grader on purchase plan

At their regular meeting Sept. 8 in Carrizozo the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners voted to purchase a Caterpillar 12 motor grader from the Rust Tractor Co., the same to be made on a purchase agreement contract.

The commissioners went on record as wanting it understood that "the county will never maintain the bridge crossing the Ruidoso River on the road leading into the Ruidoso Gardens Subdivision," but that the road will be maintained by property owners.

Nine persons from Pine Lodge appeared before the commissioners requesting that the county grader be left on the road between Pine Lodge and State Highway 48 so that the work could be completed. The commissioners agreed.

The bid of the Hamilton Roofing Co. was accepted to re-roof the courthouse building. It was requested the roofing be done under a 20-year bond, for which an extra fee of \$1.75 per square was to be allowed.

The commissioners agreed to improve the 1 1/2 mile of road to the Heater ranch as part consideration for the right of way for State Road 42.

A letter from the State Auditor's office classified Lincoln County as a first class county with a net assessed valuation of \$15,876,979.

The commissioners' next meeting will be Friday, October 7.





Range conditions fair in New Mexico

The monthly range and livestock report, USDA, states that the condition of sheep and lamb conditions below average in all Western States except Texas and New Mexico. The market of slaughter lambs has been somewhat early in many areas of the West, as producers were forced to move lambs because of drying feed.

Reports from growers indicate that about two-fifths of the expected fall range movement of sheep and lambs had already been traded for by September 1. This is the same percentage that was sold or contracted for at this date last year, and compares with half of the intended fall marketing transaction that were completed by September 1, 1959.
