The bandwagon leaves Ruidoso Friday morning for a tour of communities along Highways 70 and 380. The itinerary will be: Leave Ruidoso, Oct. 7 at 9 a.m. Arrive Hondo Cafe for coffee at 9:45. Arrive Lincoln 10:45. Arrive Capitan 12 noon. Arrive Fort Stanton 1:45 p.m. Arrive Carrizozo 4 p.m.

Youth Commission work to be topic at October PTA meeting

Juvenile in custody after store robbery

Within a half hour after a theft was reported at the Pacello Jewelry store in Carrizozo, a juvenile was apprehended for the theft.

She is Martha Christopher, 10, who was taken into custody at her home a few blocks from the jewelry store and all loot recovered.

It consisted of four rings, a wrist watch, a locket and about \$10 in cash.

Sheriff G. M. Ortiz said his office received a call from A. F. Roscall at 9 o'clock Monday morning, stating his store had been broken into and a number of pieces of jewelry taken.

Sheriff Ortiz said the girl was tracked by means of footprints made by the coils of her shoes.

She is reported to have said that she broke the back door glass of the jewelry store and gained entrance by reaching inside and opening the lock on the door. She then went to bed on a cot in the store, and slept until early Monday morning. She had been away from her home since Saturday evening.

The girl was to be processed in juvenile court at Alamogordo, probably this Friday.

6 YEARS OR 47 THEY DON'T KNOW

Santa Fe, Sept. 28—Half the candidates for the state senate this year don't know whether they are running for six or four-year terms.

On the same day the senate candidates are up for election, Nov. 8, the people will also vote on a proposition to give half the counties six-year terms for one time and after that put them all on four-year terms under a plan in which only half the membership would come up for election at the same time.

As it is all the 32 members are up for election in each presidential year.

SIXTEEN COUNTIES ON EACH SIDE

The counties that would get the six-year terms if the change is approved starting next January, 1, are Bernalillo, Chaves, Curry, DeBakey, Grant, Lea, Lincoln, Luna, Sandoval, San Juan, San Miguel, Socorro, Taos, Torrance, Union and Valencia.

Remaining on four-year terms would be Catron, Colfax, Dona Ana, Eddy, Guadalupe, Harding, Hidalgo, Los Alamos, McKinley, Mori, Otero, Quay Rio Arriba, Roosevelt, Santa Fe and Sierra.

SPECIAL SESSION OUT THE WINDOW

Prospects of a special session of the legislature to bail the schools out of their money trouble are dead until at least after the November 8 election.

And the talked about possibility of three-fifths of the members of each house calling themselves into an early special session never was even remotely close. It was suggested by James Duck Arambula, Saragolite of Santa Fe and got no consideration except from reporters looking for something to fill space.

TWELVE YEARS, NO ACTION YET

The governor can call a special session of the legislature any time he chooses and the legislature can act only on the items specified by the governor.

A constitutional amendment of 1948 gave the legislators the right to summon themselves into special session on petition of three fifths of the members with no limit on what they act upon but the authority has not been invoked in its twelve years.



## Mary Jane Mercier writes from Tripoli

(Ed. Note—The following interesting letter is from Mary Jane Mercier (formerly Mary Jane Chavez of Tularosa), describing their experiences on a route to and their new location at an American Air Force Base in Tripoli. Because of its length, the letter will be printed in five installments.)

### Part I

I'd like to dedicate this column to all my relatives and friends I do not write to. I wish I could write to each and everyone, but with the job of getting settled again and four little ones to care for, it's almost impossible, so I thought this would be the best way to take care of everyone.

I guess I could start back in California, at Edwards AFB, where we were stationed prior to this assignment, when my husband called me from the office one day to ask if I'd like to come to Tripoli. I was very excited at the thought of coming to Tripoli and perhaps a little sad at the thought of leaving my mother and my close relatives for three years. The tour is three years here, with dependents, and two years without dependents.

Soon we were in the process of preparing for our trip. First of all came the shots, 45 in all. I had eight and each of the children had eight and my husband got off easy with only three booster shots.

Then came the process of getting our passports. We had to drive to Bakersfield to get all our papers notarized.

Finally our packing started. We were allowed to send 600 pounds in advance, so we sent our baby crib (almost a must), our high chair, drapes, a few blankets, an electric frying pan, plus a hot plate. The movers packed everything else from dishes to linens, plus all our furniture.

After bidding some sad farewells to all our good friends and my sister Emma (Mrs. Clovis Aguilar in Lancaster, Calif.), we were finally on our way. It was hard to believe we had nearly 8,000 miles to go, but we were excited because we had so much to look forward to.

Our first stop, of course, was in my home town of Tularosa. We were fortunate enough to get there just in time for the St. Francis Fiesta and the Centennial celebration and enjoyed every minute of it. We got to see so many of our friends in two days that we hadn't expected to see. It was just wonderful!

We also got a little work done at mom's home, painting and redecorating, as she can tell you, so as we left Tularosa, we had a feeling of some accomplishment.





## Finish entrance road at Gran Quivira

## "Cull and Dry" Cow program under way

Ralph Dunlap, Lincoln county extension agent, reports that lots to mark cattle in the cull and dry cow program were mailed to many ranchers in Lincoln County this week.

Instructions for applying the numbers are in the box, he says. "Number any cow you think might go to slaughter so that you can get credit for this test."

"It is hoped that cattle from Lincoln County will be enough to recertify the county in a three-year period. To do this, we need to test 5% of the breeding cattle in the county each year for a period of three years," he adds.

## Pioneer White Oaks resident attends N. M. State Fair

(From the Albuquerque Tribune, issue of September 20, 1960.) David L. Jackson, 90-year-old pioneer resident of the Lincoln County ghost town of White Oaks, is in Albuquerque attending the 1960 New Mexico State Fair—his first fair visit since the Territorial Exposition of 1911.

Mr. Jackson, perennial justice of the peace at White Oaks, recalled that he saw his first airplane flight at the 1911 fair here. He wanted to go up with the aviator, Lincoln Beachy, but Beachy could take only one passenger and he had his passenger booked for that day.

Judge Jackson went to White Oaks in 1897, when it was still a thriving mining town, and he has watched the gradual disintegration of the community to a "ghost town" of about 20 persons.

During his residence there he has been associated in mining ventures with such well known mining men of the town as Judge John Y. Hewitt and Judge Andrew H. Hudspeth.

He worked as a miner in the Old Abe, one of the richest gold producers in New Mexico history, and developed gold mines of his own.

Jackson was born at Melissa, Texas, April 5, 1870, and worked as a boy and young man at McKinney, Wichita Falls, Dallas and Galveston. In 1897, he went to El Paso and worked in a wagon yard.

He went to White Oaks the same year, traveling north to San Antonio, N. M., on a train and taking a stagecoach east to the mining town, arriving there July 5, 1897.

Jackson recalled attending a Republican political meeting at White Oaks in 1902 when the prin-
