

2nd Candidates forum in Ruidoso Thursday evening

The first of five "Meet Your Candidates" forums, held in Ruidoso Tuesday night, was declared to be a success by both the participating candidates and the Lincoln County Farm & Livestock Bureau, sponsoring organization. The panel discussion was attended by approximately a hundred persons.

M. K. Vance was chairman of arrangements and served as chairman of the committee on screening of questions. Other members of the screening committee were Ernest Sultemeier and A. W. Spatkowski of Farm Bureau; Edward Penfield, Democrat and Mrs. R. A. Perkins, Republican.

E. R. Bagley was the timer and each candidate was limited to two minutes.

Bob Porter of Las Cruces, commodity director of the New Mexico Farm & Livestock Bureau, was the panel moderator and introduced Henry Shier, chairman of the Republican County Central Committee and Hollis Cummins, chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee.

All the county candidates were introduced and the moderator then presented the questions, most of which went to the legislative and commissioner candidates.

Refreshments for a social hour were furnished by the central committees of the two parties.

District Court

Judge Allen D. Walker opened the Fall term of district court in Carrizozo Monday. As the criminal docket was called, District Attorney Dan Sosa Jr. represented the State of New Mexico. He was accompanied to court by his new assistant district attorney, Richard A. Parsona.

State vs. Jimmie Lucero, charged with assault with a deadly weapon. (The defendant was jailed after an alleged stabbing near a Lincoln dance hall.) Defendant was represented by H. E. Jones. Jury trial set for October 24.

State vs. Hayford Tucker, charged with obtaining property and money under false pretenses. Dismissed.

State vs. Teodoro Zamora, charged with obtaining property and money under false pretenses. Dismissed.

For a suggestion on a way to improve the efficiency of an office form, used by ASC offices throughout the nation, Mrs. Earlena Tubbs has been given a cash award of fifty dollars.

The form, known as AD-287-2, is an index Bristol sheet on which data is typed. The card is printed on both sides. Mrs. Tubbs' simple suggestion was that the form be printed in "tumble" fashion, so that the typist when working on one side of the card can have easy access to the heading on the reverse side. New cards embodying her suggestion have already been printed and are in use in ASC offices over the nation.

Mrs. Tubbs is chief clerk of the Lincoln County ASC office in the courthouse in Carrizozo.

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Frank Tatti re-visits scenes of childhood

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Tatti, of Bend, Ore., were in Carrizozo last week, hoping to find some information about Mr. Tatti's father and uncle who lived in the area from 1887, to 1899.

The elder Tatti, also Frank and his brother Joseph Tatti settled at what is now the Silva Ranch and also had a mine in White Oaks. Frank lived here until he was four years of age at which time his parents returned to their native Switzerland.

At the age of 16, young Frank returned to America and Prineville, Ore., in 1912, where he worked for his uncle.

In 1937 he returned to Switzerland and married, later bringing his wife to America and settling in Oregon.

Through the help of many old timers here, Frank Tatti's childhood days in Lincoln County are being pieced together. He has discovered that his godmother is Beatrice Chavez of Truth or Consequences and his sister's godmother is Rebecca Silva, after whom she was named. When Frank Tatti came into this world in 1895, Dr. (Uncle) Tom Henley attended his mother.

Youth crushed in car-trailer wreck near Carrizozo

A couple returned to their home in Decorah, Iowa, early Sunday morning by train, after a tragic car accident near Carrizozo had claimed the life of their only son, eight years of age.

He was Terry Cronin, son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Cronin of Decorah, Iowa. They were en route to a new location in Arizona, when their car and house trailer jack-knifed on Highway 54, ten miles south of Carrizozo. Terry, riding in the back seat was pinned as the heavy house trailer crashed into and partly over the rear of the passenger car which was towing it.

Terry cried for help, but it was impossible to extricate him until a wrecker arrived to pull the vehicles apart. The youth died from a basal skull fracture. He was taken to Carrizozo hospital by S. M. Ortiz in the Shaw ambulance.

The accident occurred early Friday afternoon. Mrs. Cronin, who was driving, told investigating officers Tim Pino of the State Police and Deputy Sheriff Libe Mirabal that the trailer started to sway just before it crashed into the rear of the Cronin car. The trailer was heavily loaded with household effects and clothing of the family. Most of their possessions were destroyed as was their car and the front end of the trailer house.

The Cronins were house guests of Rev. and Mrs. Thomas A. Banks at the Methodist parsonage, until their departure for Iowa. When they left the Cronins said their future plans were undecided. He is a salesman.

In this accident report, Patrolman Pino noted that the crash was caused by an inexperienced driver.

Before leaving, the Cronins expressed their gratitude to the people of Carrizozo for their many acts of kindness and offers to help.

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Panel discusses work of County Youth Commission

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K. S. Barnhill of Alamogordo, chief probation officer of the Third Judicial District, moderated the panel. Members were Dwight Watkins, Ruidoso High School principal; Frank Wagner, Carrizozo High School principal; Mrs. Fred English and Fred Miller, both of Carrizozo.

J. T. Clegg is president of the Lincoln County Youth Commission and Mrs. J. P. Turner planned the evening's program.

Following an introduction by Barnhill, dealing with the make-up and mechanics of the newly organized Lincoln County Youth Commission, the panel brought out the various areas in which the commission can help youths who have become confused and misguided in their moral and social relationships.

Emphasized by Barnhill was the advisory capacity of the commission in aiding the juvenile court to arrive at a constructive decision regarding a youth who must be judged by the court.

Because members of the commission's committee called to assist the court are much more conversant with the youth and his background, the court can be given much information that will enter into a final decision regarding the juvenile, Barnhill said.

Both high school principals emphasized the growing need for parents and teachers to be less permissive with the youths in their care. Discussion by the panel brought out the idea that the lack of directive discipline breeds resentment and insecurity in the growing teenager, who is neither adult nor child and in great need of guidance and understanding.

"Several years ago our standards were high, even though our actions usually failed to meet them," Barnhill said. "Now we are tragically lowering our standards to meet our level of conduct, rather than striving to meet high standards. Both adult and teenager have become more lax in reaching upward to higher goals."

Representatives from Hondo, Ruidoso, Fort Stanton and Corona attended the meeting. A social hour after the meeting was enjoyed by all and gave everyone a chance to get better acquainted.

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Liquor Licenses in Spotlight

Santa Fe — The firing of the state liquor director, Kern Aldridge, right after Clovis voted wet and opened the way for 12 new liquor licenses has turned the spotlight on liquor permits like never before.

The state will get \$25 each for the 12 licenses. People in the liquor business have been saying they are worth \$25,000 each and the sum looks realistic in consideration of the number lining up trying to get the things.

Political pull and influence at the statehouse is more highly regarded in Clovis right now than any time since the town was panting and begging Sen. Dennis Chavez for the Air Force base that was finally activated at Clovis.

ALDRIDGE, BURROUGHS WERE LONG FRIENDS

Kern Aldridge of Hobbs, a long-time personal friend of Gov. John Burroughs, was busted out of the liquor job and replaced by state police officer Don Hammond, who had been Burroughs' automobile driver.

Aldridge closed his automobile agency in Hobbs and sold his home to take the Santa Fe job. He and Burroughs had been classmates as freshmen at Texas Tech. The break between the old friends is serious.

RICH MONOPOLY FOR 12 SALOONS

The value of the liquor peddling permits is thoroughly understood by people in the liquor trade.

The 12 outlets will have a monopoly in the city of 24,000 at the state-supported price minimum that are right at the highest in the nation.

No competition can develop outside of town because rural Curry county continues dry. Roosevelt county to the south is dry and many of the Texas counties immediately to the east are dry.

The Clovis 12 should enjoy a volume of trade far above liquor merchants in comparable areas where the number of outlets is two to ten times as many.

STATE LIMITED TO A MERE 12

The state cannot get more than the \$25 fee for the permits. Anything paid in excess of that would be to other than the state and on the monkey business side.

Legal sales in Clovis are almost sure to spur law enforcement agencies to squash the bootlegging industry that thrived in the dry county and maybe also close down the illegal operators in neighboring Peralta.

The state enforcement people didn't give a hoot about law observance in dry Curry but now there will be 12 \$25 legal licenses in operation—enforcement is likely to be stern.

Meanwhile, applicants for the licenses, perhaps a hundred of them, are on the hook until after the Nov. 9 election. All the permits could be issued before that date but they won't be. That shouldn't hurt Governor Burroughs with maybe a hundred license hopefuls trying to show how much they can do for their old buddy and that in a city where Burroughs was facing serious election trouble.

KENNEDY'S PEOPLE AVOIDING JOHNSON

The Kennedy people are trying to keep Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson as far away and as inconspicuous as possible.

One of Sen. Jack Kennedy's Harvard braintrustees said the other day that the Kennedy office wasn't any longer hearing from Johnson and it was "just as well."

Vice President Dick Nixon has been goading Kennedy about Johnson, daring him to send the vice-presidential candidate into the south in support of the Democratic civil rights plank.

Meanwhile Pro Republican Texas voters are casting the New Mexico capital on casting Johnson more than Kennedy. A common crack from them is that they are looking forward to election day when they can vote against the Texan twice—once for vice president and second for senator. He's running for both offices. These are the same ones who wanted to fight and bet when any Johnson criticism was offered before the convention.

HIT THE SKIDS WITH ACCEPTANCE

Seldom in politics has there been such a turnaround. Johnson was a tremendously big and popular figure before the Los Angeles convention. His nomination was viewed here as guaranteeing the election of every Democrat on the ticket from precinct constables to governor.

Even upon losing the nomination he continued of great stature for the few hours until he accepted second place and with it complete acceptance of the Democratic platform. That was the start of the skid.

The help for the Democrats that was expected here by Johnson's name on the ticket, even in the second place, hasn't materialized and the campaigners are no longer talking about him, or trying to promote him for a return visit.

LOCAL GOING IT WITHOUT COATTAIL

The fading of Johnson leaves the local Democrats going it without a coat.

Tom Bolack returns from U. S. CofC meet in San Francisco

Albuquerque, Oct. 11 — New Mexico, represented by two delegates and several friends among the more than 30 members of the Natural Resources Committee of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, fared extremely well in the annual deliberations of the committee at San Francisco, according to member Tom Bolack, who returned to New Mexico Sunday.

Bolack helped write new policy for the national body in connection with its stand on petroleum and natural gas taxation.

The committee went on record as declaring that "tax laws must recognize that rising industry demands in this nation require that constant development and maintenance of a healthy petroleum industry, exploration and development of petroleum resources grow more difficult, more costly, and financially more hazardous. Venturing capital will continue to be attracted in this field only if reward for success are commensurate with risks involved. Therefore, to meet national needs and insure replacement of oil and natural gas produced for energy, use-tax laws must continue to provide adequate depletion allowances."

The committee called attention to the probability that bills to reduce or eliminate the depletion allowance will be introduced in the 87th Congress, and it decided to support the tax depletion allowance and "use every means to educate the public that depletion is not a loophole."

After bitter debate, the committee adopted action which Bolack helped foster, opposing legislation for the establishment of a congressional committee on natural fuels policy. The chamber committee decision was that such a study might lead to creation of a Federal control board over end-use of such fuels as natural gas, and it opposed Federal control of production, use and price of petroleum and natural gas.

With reference to Federal land ownership, the committee pointed out that the Federal government owns approximately 50% of the lands in the 11 western states and that while some are needed for permanent use and should remain under Federal ownership, others should be disposed of, preferably to private ownership and placed on the tax rolls. Congress, the committee said, should authorize the establishment of a study committee of Federal and State and private ownership to make recommendations for necessary changes.

Bolack returned to New Mexico Sunday to join the Nixon-New Mexico Bandwagon. He said New Mexico's resources interests were well represented and well protected at the meeting and that in addition to his own membership, New Mexico has a second delegate in Robert P. Tinnin of Albuquerque, and a number of special friends among others of the 44 delegates.



I am pleased to serve on the committee, not only to help point up this issue during the campaign, but in order to help determine the policy of the new administration."







Scholastic tests for Carrizozo Juniors

Juniors of Carrizozo High School and students of various parts of the world are to take the preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test, sponsored by the Educational Testing Service of Los Angeles, Calif. Carrizozo juniors are to take the test Tuesday, Oct. 18, under the direction of Mrs. Florence Flisk, an accredited guidance counselor.

The tests are scaled and no student is permitted to break the seal until told to do so by the administrator. Students who achieve high scores are recommended to take the college entrance examination board tests which determine if a student can win a scholarship. Students with a B average in high school may win a scholarship to any college in the United States for four years, if they pass this test.

This preliminary scholastic aptitude test also determines as near as possible the field for which the student has the best ability. There is a charge of 50 cents for each test, which is being paid for by the Carrizozo schools.

Finally on Tuesday afternoon at 2 p.m., we boarded a very MATS airplane and were ready for take-off. Very soon after we're flying over the Atlantic Ocean. It is really something to look at from up there. Also the clouds look so pretty. The children said "Look, Mommie, there's snow."

We landed in Bermuda about 7 p.m. for two hours and had a snack there. Bermuda is very pretty and green.

Shortly after takeoff, they served supper on the plane and soon we were all sleeping. It was rather hard for me to go to sleep with all the excitement.

We landed in the Azores (an island that belongs to Portugal) at 8:30 a.m. in time for breakfast. The Azores is a very pretty island and very green. Most of the people there are Portuguese, tried my Spanish there and they understood me very well. We were here only an hour.

We flew over Elizabeth, Spain, next. It looked so pretty from up there. I was hoping we'd land. Everyone in a while, we were notified over the speaker-what our altitude was and our speed. Our normal altitude was 17,000 feet and averaged 300 miles an hour.

We flew from 9:20 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. and then we were notified that we were getting ready to land in Tripoli. We were all so happy and excited. The lights below looked so good to us.

Finally our plane came to a stop and after a short prayer of thanks for a safe journey and untangling our safety belts, we were on our way off the airplane.

Bernard was waiting for us right by the ramp and Debbie, our five-year old, couldn't wait to get to "Daddy." She jumped three steps to him. I don't know what was worse, his leaving or our getting there. I couldn't hold back the tears. I was so happy to be together again.

Tripoli is a very interesting place. It is one of the capitals of Libya. Bengazi is the other capital. Their ruler is King Adriaus. He lives three or four months here and goes to Bengazi for a few months. The Arabs are a very sensitive people. They're jealous of one another if King Adriaus spends too much time in one capital. He's about 75 years old. His castle is in downtown Tripoli and is constantly guarded. Our house boy says in six months they have little open house in his castle, so that should be very interesting.

Their means of transportation varies from donkeys to horse and buggy. Their taxis are very colorful at night. They have the horse and carriage and use lanterns for light. They dress up the horses as well as the carriage and look quite fancy. The Arabs riding on don-

"Members of the legislature shall be elected as follows: Those senators from Bernalillo, Chaves, Curry, DeBaca, Grant, Lea, Lincoln, Luna, Sandoval, San Juan, San Miguel, Socorro, Taos, Torrance, Union and Valencia counties for a term of six years starting January 1, 1961, and after serving such terms shall be elected for a term of four years thereafter; those senators from all other counties for the term of four years, and members of the house of representatives for a term of two years. There shall be elected on the day provided by law for holding the general election of state officers or representatives in congress if a vacancy occurs in the office of senator or member of the house of representatives for any reason the county commissioners of the county wherein the vacancy occurs shall fill such vacancy by appointment. Such legislative appointments as provided in this section shall be for a term ending on December 31, subsequent to the next succeeding general election."

(1) budget, appropriations and revenue bills;

(2) bills correcting or amending legislation enacted in the last previous regular session;

(3) bills drawn pursuant to special messages of the governor;

(4) bills of the last previous regular session voted by the governor; and

(5) bills introduced by interim legislative committees."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election, or at any special election held previous to the general election.

All lands, together with the natural products thereof and the money proceeds of any of the lands and products, held in trust for the institutions, respectively, under their former names, and all properties heretofore granted to or owned by, or which may hereafter be granted or conveyed to, the institutions, shall, in like manner as hereinafter provided, be held in trust for, or owned by, or considered granted to, the institutions individually under their names as herein above adopted and confirmed. The appropriations made and which may hereafter be made to the state by the United States for agriculture and mechanical colleges and experimental stations in connection therewith, shall be paid to the New Mexico State University, formerly known as New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts."

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CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 9

TWENTY-FOURTH LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO
House Joint Resolution No. 24

INTRODUCED BY: W. O. CULBERTSON, JR., RALPH GALLEGOS, ANDREW J. CLOUD, MACK EASLEY AND WILLIAM GRIMALVA, JR.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 2 SECTION 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE CONTINUITY OF GOVERNMENT IN THE EVENT OF A DISASTER EMERGENCY CAUSED BY ENEMY ATTACK.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"In addition to the powers herein enumerated, the legislature shall have all powers necessary to the legislature of a free state, including the power to enact reasonable and appropriate laws to guarantee the continuity and effective operation of state and local government by providing emergency procedure for use only during periods of disaster emergency. A disaster emergency is defined as a period when damage or injury to persons or property in this state, caused by enemy attack, of such magnitude that a state of martial law is declared to exist in the state, and a disaster emergency is declared by the chief executive officer of the United States and the chief executive officer of this state, and the legislature has not declared by joint resolution that the disaster emergency is ended. Upon the declaration of a disaster emergency the chief executive of the state shall within seven days call a special session of the legislature which shall remain in continuous session during the disaster emergency, and may recess from time to time for more than three days."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

Section 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

Section 4. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

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Section 42. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

special needs for additional facilities, with the concurrence of the state board of finance. This determination of funds for each institution is to be made within a period of six months prior to the time the monies are to be made available.

Section 4. The principal of the bonds shall be payable to bearer, or if registered as in this 1959 act provided, to the registered holder, as the same becomes due. Interest coupons payable to bearer shall be attached to each of the bonds and shall be consecutively numbered specifying the number of the bond to which they are attached. The coupons shall bear the engraved lithographed facsimile of the signature of the state treasurer in the office at the time the bonds and coupons are prepared and ordered to be engraved or lithographed, and such coupons shall be valid obligations of the state notwithstanding that the person whose signature appears thereon may have ceased to be such treasurer when such bonds are issued and sold and the bonds, when duly signed, attested, countersigned, issued, and sold as in this 1959 act provided, shall be valid obligations of the state although they may be issued and sold after the persons so signing, attesting, and countersigning the same shall have died or resigned their offices and although the state treasurer countersigning said bonds be a different person from the person whose facsimile signature appears on the coupons.

Section 5. The bonds authorized under this 1959 act shall be sold by the state board of finance at such times and in such manner and amounts as said board may elect, to the highest bidder for cash at not less than par and accrued interest to date of sale. The state board of finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the state and also in a recognized financial journal, outside the state. Such publication shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks next prior to the date fixed for such sale, the last publication thereof to be at least ten days prior to the date of sale. Such notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity, and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, day, and hour at which sealed bids therefor shall be received. At the time and place specified in such notice the state board of finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds, or any part thereof, to the bidder or bidders offering the highest price therefor. No bid shall be accepted which is less than the par value of such bonds plus the interest accrued from the last preceding interest date to the date of sale. Before delivering any bonds sold the state treasurer shall detach therefrom and cancel all interest coupons which may have matured prior to the date of sale. The said board may reject any or all bids and readvertise. The said board may, at any time, sell the said bonds, or any part thereof, to the state treasurer at private sale at not more than four percent interest. The state treasurer is authorized to purchase any of such bonds with the permanent funds in his hands for investment in any investment which shall be legal investment for any person or board charged with the investment of public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposits of public money.

Section 6. The department of finance and administration shall make a record in a book kept for that purpose in which shall be entered the date, number and amount of each bond sold and the amount for which the same was sold. Any of the bonds sold may be registered by the state treasurer upon presentation of the bonds and may be, at the request and in the name of the holder thereof in a book kept for that purpose, registered as to principal and interest. In both latter cases all coupons attached to such registration with the date thereof shall be endorsed by the state treasurer on each bond so registered.

Section 7. The expenses incurred by the state board of finance in the preparation and sale of said bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of said bonds, before such proceeds are distributed to the state educational institutions specified in this 1959 act.

Section 8. To provide for the payment of the interest and principal of the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of this 1959 act there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of said bonds shall be outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the state of New Mexico subject to taxation for state purposes sufficient to produce an amount equal to one year's interest on all bonds then outstanding, together with an amount sufficient to pay the principal of all bonds as they mature. The taxes hereby authorized, imposed, and levied shall be levied, assessed, and collected at the times and in the manner that other taxes for state purposes are levied, assessed, and collected, and it shall be the duty of all tax officials and authorities to cause such taxes to be levied, assessed, and collected.

Section 9. The state treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all money collected under the taxes hereby imposed and levied, and shall use the same only for the purposes of paying the interest and principal of said bonds as the same become due.



Oct. 30 date of trek to Trinity Bomb site

Alamogordo — The site of the explosion of the world's first atomic bomb will be the object of a pilgrimage beginning in this southern New Mexico city on Sunday morning, Oct. 30.

The actual site of the first detonation lies some fifty miles northwest of Alamogordo on the flat desert lands. The pilgrimage is one of the most unique in the world, commemorating the event that ushered in a new age in the history of mankind.

The Atomic Age was born in the pre-dawn hours of July 16, 1945. Some of the world's most renowned scientists were gathered for the momentous occasion including Enrico Fermi and J. Robert Oppenheimer.

There is not much to see today: A few ruined buildings, the bunker from which the blast was observed, some twisted girders and a few concrete blocks. The main attraction is just standing on the spot where the first atomic blast went off.

The annual trek to the area, known as Trinity Site, is sponsored by the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce.

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

During this campaign, the question I am most often asked is, how I would provide additional funds for our fast growing New Mexico Schools.

I believe one answer to this important problem is the transfer, to New Mexico, of State grazing lands now owned by the Federal Government and administered by the Bureau of Land Management of the Department of Interior.

When New Mexico and ten other sparsely settled Western States were admitted to the Union the Federal Government retained ownership of much of the land. Of the total land area of New Mexico, approximately 44%, or 22.8 million acres, are federally owned or held. The Bureau of Land Management administers 18.3 million acres of this land.

I believe New Mexico has a rightful claim to these grazing lands, and if a comparison of grants of public lands is made between New Mexico and Alaska on admission to the Union, New Mexico has further claim, on the basis of fair and equal treatment. For example, New Mexico receives 37 1/2% in proceeds from the Federal Mineral Leasing Act; Alaska receives 90%. If treated equally, New Mexico would have received an additional 9 million dollars, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1958.

If elected as your State Senator, I will work diligently for the return of these lands and revenues to New Mexico, for support of New Mexico schools.

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
