

Three officials named for Carrizozo vs. Chama 'C' Championship game

With a crowd upward of 1,500 expected at the State C championship football game in Carrizozo Friday, Nov. 4, extra bleachers are to be provided.

Arrell Posey is arranging to borrow bleachers from Captain High School.

Chama High School, champions of northern district 1C, will meet Carrizozo High School, winner of the 2-C crown for the second consecutive year, in an afternoon game starting at 2 o'clock.

Three of the four necessary officials have been hired. They are from Artesia. Officials for the championship game are required to pass tests on football rules and regulations and they must have been registered in the state for at least three years.

The Chama team will arrive in Carrizozo Thursday night before the game and spend the night here. Admission prices will be the same as for regular games—\$1 for adults and 50 cents for all children of school age.

C. OF C. ASKS BUSINESS HOUSES TO CLOSE FOR GAME

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce is asking business houses in town to close during the football game Friday afternoon, Nov. 4, between Carrizozo and Chama high schools for the State C football championship.

Marvin H. Roberts, Chamber of Commerce president, said he hoped all who possibly could do so would close their places of business for two hours to enable proprietors and their employees to "back the Grizzlies in their big try to bring Carrizozo its first C championship trophy."

Jury finds Lucero guilty of assault

A district court jury, after deliberating nearly three hours Monday, returned a verdict of guilty in the case of State of New Mexico vs. Jinlo Lucero, charged with assault with a deadly weapon.

The defendant was represented by Attorney Albert J. Rivera and the state's case was presented by District Attorney Dan Sosa Jr. and Richard Parsons, assistant D.A.

The jury retired at 5:32 p.m., and deliberated until 6:27, at which time they adjourned for lunch. They resumed deliberations at 7:45 and reached a verdict at 9:50. The finding of guilty was reported by Mrs. Charley G. Dobbs, foreman.

The defendant will be sentenced Monday, at which time the judge will have before him the findings by a pre-sentence investigation of the defendant.

Also in district court Monday, in "State vs. Eloy Scallio, charged with breaking and entering, a plea of not guilty was entered. Defendant was represented by Attorney Rivera. The case was continued.

In case State vs. Eustacio Chavez, charged with violation of regulations driving while intoxicated and reckless driving, a plea of not guilty was entered. The case was set for hearing October 31.

DIVORCE GRANTED

The case State of New Mexico vs. Teodoro Zamora, on justice of the peace appeal and charged with resisting and abusing an officer is docketed to come up before Judge Allan D. Walker in district court October 27. The defendant of a pre-sentence investigation of C. Chase.

Also the case State of New Mexico vs. Leo Chavez, charged with permitting himself to be served an alcoholic beverage (Defendant represented by C. C. Chase).

November 15 is the tentative date to resume trial by jury.

The Mid-County Farm and Livestock Bureau local met Tuesday, Oct. 25 at the Captain school cafeteria.



Army to be host on Trinity Site tour

Alamogordo, N. M.—The annual tour to Trinity Site, point of explosion of the first atomic bomb, will be a birthday party with officials of White Sands Missile Range serving hot coffee and cake at the site.

A project of the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce, the tour will be Sunday, Oct. 30. A caravan will leave the chamber office on U. S. 54-70 at 9:30 a.m.

Meeting point for cars from other areas will be the Occura Range camp gate on U. S. 54, 29 miles north of Tularosa and 16 miles south of Carrizozo, and Stallion Site gate, off U. S. 350, south on N. M. 525, approximately 50 miles west of Carrizozo and about 15 miles east of San Antonio, N. M. Cars will form caravans at these points.

Departure from the gates will be at 10:30 a.m., promptly, under military police escort. No vehicles will be admitted after the caravan has passed through the gate, since the site is located in a remote area on the White Sands Missile Range.

Length of entire range tour is expected to be 4 1/2 hours. No charge is made and no passes are required. Reservations are not necessary, officials state. Major James A. Snow, Camp Commander, Stallion Site, is in charge.

Those planning to take the tour are asked to take their own picnic lunch and water.

The site of the world's first nuclear explosion is surrounded by more than a mile of cyclone fence on which weathered signs in English and Spanish warn: DANGEROUS AREA: KEEP OUT. The fence weaves irregularly around the 500-yard radius blast area which is centered by a depression, the remains of the crater made by the explosion.

On July 15, 1945, concrete piers held a massive, 100-foot steel tower on which the bomb was to be detonated. Three bunkers which housed instruments were manned. And then—the explosion—which has since been dwarfed by more advanced United States nuclear tests in Nevada and the Pacific.

Today, the concrete piers, which formed a square nine yards on each side, are scarred from that explosion. One is level with the desert floor.

The three dugouts, 6 x 12 feet, with concrete sides and tops, stand doorless but still show evidence of tight-fitting entrance hatches. The maze of concrete panels inside the doorway indicates how the inhabitants were protected from blowback.

And, scattered around the area, are bits of the green glass—trinitite—fused desert sand, a result of the intense heat of that historic explosion.

Tours to Trinity Site were changed from July to October by the Chamber of Commerce, as heat and dust in crossing the missile range made the trip uncomfortable. Present weather is ideal.

Bond issue to aid ten state colleges

Along with election of the national, state and county officials, New Mexico voters are being asked to approve an \$8,000,000 bond issue on November 8.

This bond issue is marked for ten state colleges and special schools with allocations to be made by the State Board of Educational Finance and the State Board of Finance.

The proposed bond issue is to be used for new buildings, remodeling, equipment and land purchase at the state institutions. No self-financing projects, such as dormitories, dining halls and recreation facilities are to be built with bond funds.

The bond issue is non-partisan and is endorsed by a large number of organizations, including the PTA and Farm Bureau.

The six four-year institutions of higher education supported by the state, are New Mexico Highlands University, Las Vegas; New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, Socorro; University of New Mexico, Albuquerque; and New Mexico State University, Las Cruces.

The state supports a program covering high school and the first two years of college at New Mexico Military Institute in Roswell. Special schools are Northern New Mexico School in El Rito; the School for the Visually Handicapped, Alamogordo and the school for the deaf, Santa Fe.

Search party hunts missing woman

An intensive search has been under way since Wednesday morning in the Black ranch area for Mrs. Bert Minter, who has been missing from her home since early that morning.

Sheriff's deputies, State Patrolmen, Mounted Patrol and ranchers have searched a wooded and brushy country night and day and up until Thursday noon, no trace of her had been found.

Two planes from the Ralph Brown Flying Service and from the Willis Lovelace ranch aided in the search, also a bloodhound belonging to a civilian in Albuquerque.

The hound's work was handicapped, it is said, by the dryness of the ground, but it was believed footprints made by Mrs. Minter were found at two points, only to be lost again.

Mrs. Minter's disappearance from the Minter's home at the elk pasture against the mountains, was noted about 3 o'clock Wednesday morning. It is believed she was wearing only a corduroy dress, without coat, and the nights have been quite cold in the area.

A party of about 25 men started the search Wednesday morning and the size of the group has grown as the hunt for the missing woman continues.

REASON ENOUGH FOR CHAVEZ IRE

ON-THE-ROAD — Sen. Dennis Chavez is raising heck about Amendment No. 4 which would change from two to four years the terms of state elective officials.

The senator's objection seems to be based on the possibility that the amendment could serve to give John Burroughs a total of 12 years as governor.

That's reason enough considering the way Chavez feels about Burroughs.

FOUR-YEAR TERMS START IN 1962

This Amendment 5 would change the elective terms to four years and allow a limit of two consecutive four-year terms. If approved at the Nov. 8 election it would be effective in the 1962 election.

The amendment doesn't say so in so many words but it would permit officers who have already had one or two two-year terms to hold two more four-year terms.

This is what bugs Chavez. If Burroughs is elected for another two-year term this time he would be eligible for two more four-year terms. So would all the others elected in the Nov. 8 voting.

Considering the big advantage that an incumbent officer has in running for re-election the thing could give us some long timers in Santa Fe.

STATE ELECTIONS IN-THE OFF YEARS

If No. 5 is approved it would throw the state elections into the non-presidential years, starting in 1962. That would be for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, auditor, treasurer, land commissioner, attorney general.

In the presidential election years the state would vote on congressmen, whatever senator position happened to be up, corporation commissioner, and supreme court judges.

Corporation commissioners who serve six-year terms and justices who serve eight-year terms would not be affected by the amendment.

CHAVEZ INFLUENCE AT A LOW POINT

Chavez's influence in this election doesn't amount to much, although he has a popular position in opposing the long term deal among people who find two years often too long for some elected officials.

Chavez' prestige is at its lowest point since 1952 when Diamond Tooth Miller took a couple of counties from him in the Demo primary run and Pat Hurley gave him a scare in the main event.

The senator can't almost out of sight in New Mexico politics when he tried to beat Santa Fe Joe M. Montoya for Congress with Gene Lust last May and also made a futile swing at defeating Gov. Burroughs.

BROTHER ON TICKET CHANGES THINGS

The Chavez people also list their fight against Burroughs in 1958 and their influence in opposing Democratic candidates was further weakened last December when David Chavez, brother of the senator, accepted a Burroughs appointment to the supreme court.

Judge Chavez is on the ticket this time.

In the early 1950's Chavez support was enough to make the real difference in a state election but not this year.

Senator Chavez, secure in his job through 1964, is having fun this time herding Baptist Tom Brown, the Demo national committeeman from Artesia and Governor Burroughs from Baptist Portales, on why they don't speak up at home for the Catholic John Kennedy for president.

MONEY SITUATION AND POLITICIANS

My wife Evelyn and I have been two weeks on the road trying to find out why people are like they are in this election campaign.

Some observations:

The major consideration in the Burroughs-Mechem run for governor is the state money situation. No. 2, the presence of notorious political figures in the Burroughs administration.

Some local considerations:

Hobbs—The firing of Liquor Director Fern Aldridge, a popular local figure, under circumstances that make him look like the goat in Clovis and Farmington liquor license shenanigans.

Portales—the widely held belief, perhaps erroneous, that Burroughs has damaged Eastern New Mexico University.

Carlsbad—County Demo Chairman Lon Watkins' \$500 a month place on the state payroll which many locals feel has him hantied in representing the county in Santa Fe.

Las Cruces—Still smarting about losing Mike Apodaca on the highway commission to make room for Harold Leonard of Albuquerque.


Roswell—No state road work in Chavez county for the past two years.

Three of the four concrete piers on which stood the 100-foot tower holding the first atomic bomb are still visible, though torn and weathered. The fourth pier of the 27-foot square base of the steel tower is level with the ground. Small instrumentation bunkers (see inset) are spotted triangularly at the perimeter of cyclone fence, which rings Ground-Zero.

"Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico: Section 1. There is appropriated from the state general fund forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to be used for reconstruction, rehabilitation, furnishing and equipment of Wortley Hotel in Old Lincoln County, an historic property owned by the state, so that the hotel may resemble insofar as possible its appearance in 1878, the facilities of which shall be available to the general public under rules and regulations promulgated by the Old Lincoln County memorial commission and approved by the attorney general.
"Section 2. Warrants for money appropriated hereunder, payable to the Old Lincoln County memorial commission, shall be issued upon request of the commission, which is authorized and directed to expend such moneys as may be required for the specific purposes described in section 1. No part of the funds appropriated shall be used for any purpose other than as provided herein."


Heavy snows made it rough for elk hunters in Colorado
