Grizzly win over Chama touches off big celebration

Carrizozo trounced District C champion Chama Friday, Nov. 4 by a score of 34 to 0 to win the State Class C championship for the first time in the history of the school.

The win ran Carrizozo's winning streak to nine straight games for the season and kept their undefeated and untied record intact.

The Chama Wildcats wound up their season with a 6-2 record after having let the Grizzlies break their three-game winning streak.

The day was a perfect one for the big game, with an overcast sky and a gentle warm breeze coming in from the southwest.

Rev. Thomas A. Banks spoke a prayer over the loudspeaker and the Grizzly band played the "Star Spangled Banner" just before the kick-off.

A crowd estimated at 1100, somewhat under the number expected, sat in the bleachers on both sides of the field.

The season's successful conclusion touched off a celebration by students and fans which was continued downtown. An automobile parade through the streets was joined by the fire truck and sirens on police cars.

Carrizozo started its scoring spree without wasting any time, taking the ball over on their first play from scrimmage and gathering two more touchdowns in the last stanza, while hapless Chama held several desperate efforts which got them inside the Carrizozo 15-yd. line in the last quarter.

The game was held to 8 first downs and 72 yards rushing, while their total offense amounted to 145 yards.

Coach Bernie Laabs' hard-running backs had 234 yards rushing and finished the game with 352 yards total offense, the bulk of the total coming from the runs by fullback Jerry Beltran, halfback Bob Crenshaw, and quarterback John Vigil.

The passers of the northern New Mexico team had a busy afternoon as they engaged in their passing game all through the contest, although the last quarter saw them intensify their efforts in a last ditch attempt to keep from being shut out. They completed 7 of 22 pass attempts for 73 yards.

GRIZZLIES STRIKE QUICKLY

Carrizozo tallied first on their initial scrimmage play after Chama had been held on down and punted. Crenshaw returned Jim Reeves' boot to Chama's 18-yard line and on the next play Beltran scored on an end sweep. Crenshaw split the uprights for the PAT and the big halfback's kick made the score 7-0 before three minutes of the game had elapsed.

Eddie Nowell kicked off and the Wildcats' fullback Eddy Gonzalez returned it to his own 35-yd. line. Three plays later QB Reeves completed a 60-yard aerial to his left end, Tommy Rivas, only to have the play nullified by a penalty.


Another pass by Reeves after he had carried to the 25-yard line fell incomplete and he was forced to punt. Beltran returned it from the Chama 42-yard line to the 27, but a clipping penalty moved the pigskin back to the 35. Clipping penalties plagued the Grizzlies all afternoon.

Two plays later Crenshaw fumbled and Chama took over, only to again be forced to punt. Once more Beltran returned the ball from his own 25 to the midfield stripe. Lynn Stoneman, Vigil and Beltran combined their talents and moved the ball to the Chama 27-yd. line. Two plays later, on a second and one situation, Crenshaw went into the end zone standing up from 15 yards out.

From a kicking formation, Crenshaw's pass to Stoneman was good for the point after touchdown and the score was raised to 14-0.

Nowell kicked off to the Wildcats and Reeves returned it to his own 35-yard line. On the next play Beltran intercepted a Reeves aerial to start another Carrizozo touchdown drive. Each of the zone backs took a turn as they hugged the ball to the Chama 42-yard line after penalties had


GRIZZLIES' STARTING LINEUP

forced them back from the 24. Then Crenshaw lobbed a 31-yarder to end Dan Orlis and two plays later Vigil cracked over from one foot out. Crenshaw sent a perfect strike through the goal post for the PAT to make the score 21 to 0.

Beltran electrified the crowd a few seconds before the half ended when he intercepted a Gonzalez pass on his own 35-yard line and displayed his broken field running ability as he scampered 65 yards to a touchdown. The run was nullified on an "illegal use of hands" penalty as time ran out in the first half.

THIRD QUARTER SCORELESS

Carrizozo scored twice more in the fourth quarter after a scoreless third quarter. Following the Grizzlies' first and only punt, Chama took over but lost the ball on downs five plays later. The Grizzlies' forward wall was largely responsible for this, as the line-men were rushing and harassing the Chama passers.

The victor's right halfback, Eddie Nowell, then took a handoff from Vigil and raced 57 yards around right end for a six-pointer. Crenshaw's kicking arm again was true to the mark.

Carrizozo's secondary then showed that it was also playing heads-up ball as Vigil snagged a Reeves pass on the 31-yard line and scooted into the end zone. Crenshaw's try for extra point was wide and the game's scoring ended with that final tally, 34 to 0.

"The boys played a very good game," stated Coach Laabs after he and his assistant Darrell Bode had been carried off the field by their players.

"All the boys in the offensive team were carrying out their assignments and the defense was rushing and tackling the way they were supposed to," he added. "Our linemen deserve a lot of the praise for today's victory. They did a wonderful job."

The Carrizozo Grizzlies trophy

Contests attract record number of voters to polls

Lincoln County Republicans took all but two of the county's major political offices in Tuesday's elections. The two exceptions were Charles A. Jones for county commissioner, second district, and Lewis E. Cummins, unopposed, for county treasurer.

W. G. Bradley, former county sheriff, led his party ticket, with 2253 votes, a margin of 1035 over his Democratic opponent, Frank Barajas. All returns are unofficial.

Second high on the ticket was Kenneth Nosker of Glenoco, who in his race with Jasper D. DiPaolo of Ruidoso, for commissioner, third district, polled 2135 votes—a majority of 864 votes over his Democratic opponent. Nosker carried 13 of the county's 14 precincts, the exception being precinct 15A in Ruidoso.

The closest county race was the one between W. G. Shreevogest of Hondo and W. A. Hart of Ruidoso for state representative. Shreevogest's winning margin was 72 votes, according to the unofficial returns.

Nationally, it was John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson, Democrats, over Richard M. Nixon and his Republican running mate Henry Cabot Lodge, with 272 electoral votes to 177. It took 269 to win.

When final returns come in, Kennedy's total could go up to 338. New Mexico's four electoral votes went to the Kennedy-Johnson ticket, maintaining the state's record of having been on the winning side in presidential elections for 48 years.

State voting in the two top offices, governor and lieutenant governor, has been very close, with the results still in doubt Wednesday night.

A late afternoon tabulation gave Edwin L. Mechem (R) a slender lead of 150,593 to 149,742 for incumbent John Burroughs (D).

A later broadcast over KOD-TV Wednesday night, listed the total vote as Mechem 147,823 to 143,533 for Burroughs. The same tabulation gave Tom Bolack (R) for lieutenant governor 143,333 to 129,673 for Democratic Joe A. Montoya.

County voters approved the Nixon-Lodge ticket and gave Edwin L. Mechem and Tom Bolack substantial margins.

Democratic congressional candidates fared well in the voting, as did most of the Democratic candidates for state offices.

Incumbent Dan Sosa Jr. was re-elected district attorney of the Third-Judicial District, an complete but unofficial returns gave him 5,043 votes to 3,943 for Chas. W. Durrett, Alamogordo attorney.

Voter turnout was good, especially during the early part of the day, with 77% of the county's voters casting their ballots.

In Carrizozo the Woman's Club pinned a purple and gold ribbon on each voter, entitling him or her to a free cup of coffee and doughnut at a snack bar set up in the City Hall.

The Trinity Methodist Church WSCS served hamburgers, beans and coffee in the Fire Hall.

Ancho was the first precinct to report, bringing in their ballot box at 10:52. Ruidoso precincts 10A and 10B were the last to report, at 7:30 Wednesday morning.

Both political parties kept their campaign offices open in Carrizozo and each had a good crowd most of the night, listening to the national returns and waiting for the county returns to come in.

PRECINCT OFFICIALS

Santiago Herrera (R) was elected justice of the peace in Precinct 2, Hondo, polling 170 votes to 103 for incumbent Leo Jozes (D).

A. Huey was elected justice of the peace in Precinct 9, Capitlan, 247 votes, without opposition.

Alton Green was elected justice of the peace, Precinct 10, Green Tree, 277 votes, without opposition. Bert T. Judia was elected constable, receiving 233 votes.

Incumbent R. L. Sherrill (D) was elected justice of the peace in Precinct 14, Carrizozo, receiving 236 votes to 221 for his opponent, H. L. McDaniel (R).

L. M. Mirabal, unopposed, was elected constable with 201 votes. Harold Graham, unopposed, was elected justice of the peace in Precinct 19, Ruidoso, with a total of 557 votes. Fred Riley was elected constable, with a total of 182 votes.

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
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Let's show appreciation

Giant power shovels, huge dump trucks, gigantic hauling systems, plus the daily processing of thousands of tons of low grade copper ore, could offer many threats to safety. Yet employees at Kennecott's Chino Mines Division are three times safer on the job than the average person is at home.

If you are undecided about keeping some cows, yearlings, or calves, plan to sell them if the price is right, County Agent Ralph Dunlap advises.

"When you start shaping up the herd for the coming year," he said, "you should consider selling any old cows you have. Also do not keep heifer calves or yearlings for a large buildup of the breeding herd."

The outlook for the beef cattle price drop depends upon how many breeding cows are kept for the coming year.

"Cattle numbers are at an all-time high. If you build up too much, there is likely to be another price drop."

"The grass not used this year will help next year's grass grow better; so do not plan to stock the grass to keep it from going to waste. By letting the grass grow, the roots become deeper and more drought resistant."




