DEMOS NEED JOBS FOR CHRISTMAS

Santa Fe—Dear Santa: Please, two more U. S. Indian Commissioner jobs for the state's No. 1 and No. 2 lame ducks, Gov. John Burroughs and Land Commissioner Murray Morgan.

And for Johnny Walker, the new land commissioner, at least 300 more jobs to take care of the crippled ducklings left by the November storm.

Democrats who can't seem to make a living on anything but the state payroll are storming Walker for jobs whose payroll of 100 is the biggest the Demos have left in the capitol.

MECHANIC TO RETAIN DEMO IN OIL POST

Burroughs and Morgan have been mentioned for the Indian post but but have no chance for the appointment.

Morgan was supposed to get the \$12,000 oil and gas records job that was created by the last legislature but that went by the boards in the November election.

Ed Mechem, it appears, will keep another Democrat in the position, Carol Lee, a non-politico who is trained for the work.

Morgan is also one of several in consideration for chief clerk of the senate.

SHIFT INSURANCE TO JEFF'S BROTHER

Purchasing Agent Dante Volo has shifted a \$250,000 fire policy from the Fat Campbell Jr. agency of Las Cruces to the Del Miera agency of Santa Fe on the recommendation of Ruben Miera of the state bureau of revenue who is Sandoval County Demo chairman and brother of Del Miera. The policy premium is \$450 a year for five years.

BOUGHT TO BE A LAW FOR PRESS AGENTS

A Democratic legislator from over near the Texas border is going to try for a law to prohibit the spending of public money for press agents.

That would be in relation to the current employment of Robert Wistrand of Santa Fe at \$1,000 a month for part of his time, who has been taking his fee from the bureau of revenue and the department of development.

The same legislator called on a lawyer here about the possibility of recovering the \$24,000 that has been paid Wistrand but was discouraged from taking such a case to court.

A second press agent, Ernie Mills, gets \$300 a month from the public service commission.

Both worked extensively in the 1960 political campaign.

LEGISLATORS PLAN POCKETBOOK PLAN

Some legislators, disgusted with the horse play and malicious filings in the corporation commission, are seriously considering cutting off the commission's gravy.

The commission is a constitutional agency and the legislature must give it a reasonable sum of money for operation.

But the same constitution sets the three commissioners' salaries at \$3,000 a year each. They receive \$10,000 by the device of paying themselves \$7,000 a year for serving as members of the state insurance board.

The \$7,000 is not constitutional and the legislature could knock it out, or it could take the insurance office out of the corporation commission.

That kind of pocketbook pain could bring the capricious commissioners to serious business.

First it was Commissioners Seven-Foot Pickett and G. Y. Falls going to fire employees, then Commissioner Johnny Block complained and denounced them.

Then, the other day, Falls decided he didn't like Alex Pacheco, head of the corporations division and long on the outs with Block, so he teamed with Block to fire him.

The job will go to Ruben Miera, Demo chairman of Sandoval.

MORE OF THE SAME IN REVENUE OFFICE

Appointment of Tony Vigil of Albuquerque and formerly of Raton as bureau of revenue commissioner indicates more of the same kind of operation of the bureau with which the public has suffered ever since it was created back in the 1830's.

Specs to be drawn for swimming pool

At a meeting Tuesday evening the Carrizozo Town Board of Trustees employed Ashley G. Classen, El Paso engineer, to prepare plans and specifications for a municipal swimming pool.

It is expected that bids for the pool can be called for in approximately 90 days.

The town board is studying several suggested locations for the swimming pool. They are taking into consideration a number of factors, including its convenience for children, townpeople and tourists, all of whom will be taking advantage of the only swimming pool of this kind within a 60-mile radius of Carrizozo.

The next regular meeting of the town board will be Tuesday, Jan. 3, at 7:30 p.m.

Fire damages Carrizozo residence

The Carrizozo Fire Department fought a stubborn attic fire Monday afternoon in the home of Staff Sgt. and Mrs. Walter Stonecipher, known as the Fay Harley residence.

The fire started when a gas heating stove exploded in the living room. Fire followed a flue into the attic and extended to a closet. Considerable damage was done to the living room, clothes in the closet and personal effects in the attic. One estimate placed the damage to the residents at \$2,000.

Socorro helps out on highway sign

J. S. Stearns, secretary, Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, said this week that the Carrizozo C of C is in receipt of \$100 from the Socorro Chamber of Commerce to help pay for the electric lighting on the Highway 330/60 road sign located at Huerfano.

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce has been footing this bill of \$7.50 a month for four years.

Stearns added that any other donations from groups along these two highways would be appreciated, as this is a large and attractive sign, well located, and "no doubt responsible for a part of the tourist travel on 330 and 60 highways."

State Farm Bureau won four awards for outstanding activities

A wheel-barrowful of awards were presented at the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau at the national Farm Bureau convention in Denver, December 12-15.

The state agricultural organization has won top national honors for its outstanding programs in four areas of activity: information, farm community, national legislative activity, and red meat promotion.

National competition for these awards was open to all fifty state Farm Bureaus in the nation. Only the Wisconsin Farm Bureau with five wins won more awards than New Mexico among all the state Farm Bureaus.

"We're especially proud to win these awards for the year 1959, our 40th year of service to New Mexico agriculture," said John L. Augustine Jr., executive secretary.

Club asks study of traffic hazard at Carrizozo postoffice

At their luncheon meeting Tuesday the Carrizozo Lions Club authorized a letter be written to the Postmaster General at Washington, D. C., calling attention to the traffic hazard existing at the present location of the U. S. Post Office in Carrizozo.

Because of a recent traffic fatality at the highway 54 crossing near the postoffice, the letter asks the feasibility of relocating the postoffice off the highway.

In a discussion regarding the prevention of future possible accidents at the crossing, it was brought out that the installation of traffic signals on the highway at this point might not be a solution to the traffic safety problem.

Supt. J. T. Clegg said that he does not favor a school traffic patrol, as the law does not protect the children or the school engaged in traffic safety patrol work.

Reports were given on results of the broom sale in cooperation with the Alamo School for the Visually Handicapped. The club's profits from the sale were over \$100 which will be used for Christmas food certificates to needy families and also leave a balance for the fund to buy eye glasses for needy children.

Truck driver injured after stopping to aid stranded motorist

Two were injured last Wednesday morning in a two-car accident on Chaparral Hill on Highway 330, 2 miles east of the White Store.

Involved were Hollis Glass, 33, of Artesia, driver of a Whitfield tank truck; Juan B. Ramirez, 27, of Batesville, Tex., and his wife in their '57 Mercury car, and a third car.

According to State Patrolman James Clayton who investigated the accident, the highway was in good shape on one side of the hill but the other side was icy and treacherous.

Clayton said that Earl Duncan who was driving a '60 Ford had slid off the road and got stuck. Glass stopped his truck on the highway and got out with a shovel to help Duncan.

Ramirez then approached, but was unable to stop when he applied the brakes. His car slid off and struck Glass, knocking him under the truck; then proceeded on and collided with the rear end of the truck.

The Mercury was a total wreck. The motor was jammed to the dashboard and the dashboard was chipped to within about 6 inches of the front seat on the driver's side.

Mrs. William Wrye, who drives the school bus for that area, was the first to appear on the scene following the accident and notified Stallion Army authorities.

She then drove back to the scene and took Mrs. Ramirez to the Carrizozo Hospital. The Show ambulance picked up Mr. Glass. Ramirez was not injured.

His wife received lacerations about the nose and severe bruises. Glass was treated for severe contusions of the left elbow and a contusion of the spine. Both Mrs. Ramirez and Glass were treated at the hospital and released.

Students, officers to join in "coffee block" on highway

The Carrizozo Teen-age Traffic Club is planning to operate a "coffee-block" on Highway 54 north of Carrizozo Thursday and Friday afternoon and evening.

State Patrolman James Clayton with the assistance of personnel from the Lincoln County Sheriff's office, will stop travelers on this highway and direct them to the roadside stand where teenagers will serve free coffee and wish the motorists a safe and pleasant journey.

The club is under the sponsorship of John L. McCollum, driver education instructor at Carrizozo High School.

The students will make coffee on camp stoves and while it is being served officers will make a routine check of driver's licenses. This is another accident-prevention measure to reduce New Mexico's holiday traffic toll.

Students who will serve courtesy coffee will be Judy Stearns, Charles Darmann, Tom O'Neil, Virginia Barola, Eddie Montano, Deb Crutshaw, Brenda Kilpatrick and Martha Najjar.

LIQUIDATION CANCELED IN HIGHWAY DEATH

A motion to dismiss and discharge was granted in the case of Guadalupe C. Baca, administrator of the estate of Hino Baca, deceased, vs. Robert Raymond Garrett and Ann Bowen Garrett, his wife. The suit was the outgrowth of the death of Hino Baca in a Highway 70 accident west of Roswell on August 27.

ANSWER FILED IN JACINTO FLORES CASE

An answer has been filed in the case of Jacinto Flores, administrator of the estate of Jacinto Flores, deceased, vs. Al Edwards, Joe Matthews, Mico Corp., et al, arising from the death of Flores while working at an Atlas missile site.

The answer alleges that negligence on the part of the employee was a contributing cause to the accident and that plaintiff knew of the risks involved in his job.

The plaintiff has requested a trial by jury.

ELECT TO SERVE OUT FINES

Two itinerants were lodged in the county jail, last Friday, after being picked up on a drunk and disorderly charge. They are Edward Jutson of California and Henry Stacey of Colorado.

The two appeared before Justice of the Peace R. L. Sherrill and were fined \$5 and \$3 court costs. They were elected to serve it out at \$1 a day or two for one if they work off.

Economist predicts price stability in farm and ranch income in year ahead

The overall New Mexico price outlook for 1961 does not point to much of a change in farm and ranch incomes. In view of the supply, demand and price support outlook, cash receipts from farm and ranch marketing and realized income of farm and ranch operators in 1961 are expected to change little from the 1960 levels.

It now appears that realized net farm and ranch income in 1960 for our state may equal or possibly exceed that of 1959. The improvements this year, above prospects indicated earlier, stem from a larger output of crops and livestock, as well as from a smaller than expected increase in production expenditures.

The rise in total farm and ranch production expenses for the United States leveled off in 1960 and little change is expected in 1961. Production expenses for goods and services of non-farm origin, generally were about the same or slightly higher in 1960 than in 1959.

Interest payments and taxes rose. But expenditures for feed and livestock, obtained largely from other farmers, were lower in 1960 than in 1959. Land values have been trending moderately downward since March of this year.

LIVESTOCK PRODUCTION EXPECTED TO RISE IN 1961

Rising livestock production is expected in 1961. Cattle numbers now in their third year of expansion probably will rise further. Marketing of cattle and calves, in spite of the build-up in breeding herds, also will increase again in 1961, possibly by 5 to 10%. Cattle prices therefore can be expected to average \$2 to \$3 lower than this year.

Prices of dairy products in 1960 are averaging above 1959 and will continue higher than year-ago levels in coming months. Milk production, up slightly this year, may rise further in 1961.

Egg prices, which have been running well above a year ago, probably will continue favorable in the early months of next year. Increases in prices of poultry products this year will likely be followed by higher production in '61.

Demand for food and farm products is expected to be well maintained in 1961 in spite of the weakness which has developed in the general economic situation. After a period of advance from the brief recession of 1957-59, the U. S. economy has once again leveled off.

Still time to enter lighting contest

There's still time to enter the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce Christmas home lighting contest. Judging of displays will not be made until Christmas eve and homeowners can set up outdoor lighting anytime before then and be eligible to win one of the three prizes to be awarded.

Among those officially entered in the contest early this week were Mike Petty, T. B. Smoot, Elizabeth MacVeigh and Fred English.

The town itself took the lead in giving Carrizozo the "holiday look" by putting up colored lights at street intersections.

John Harley brought in two large yucca plants and suggested they would look right in style if given a coat of aluminum paint.

Town Clerk Stearns thought the idea was a good one. The yuccas were duly painted, planted in front of the city hall and decorated for night lighting with blue burl.

Donations being made to buy Grizzly insignia

The Carrizozo Fire Department is currently receiving donations to buy insignia for Grizzly athletes to wear on their jackets, reading "Class C Football Champions."

The Fire Department has had donation tickets printed to raise the necessary funds.

Authorize start on courtroom remodeling

At a special meeting Monday in Carrizozo the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners accepted the bid of the Dan D. Swearingen agency in Ruidoso for a blanket bond for county officials.

The commissioners also hired Dan Gutierrez to remodel the courtroom.

The first meeting of the new board of commissioners will be January 3.

Courtroom offices will be closed December 20 and January 2.

Judgment creditor highest bidder for N. M. Copper Corp.

Judgment creditor I. Reuben Goodman was the highest bidder, in amount \$35,403.63, for the New Mexico Copper Corporation properties sold Tuesday morning on the courthouse steps in Carrizozo at a sheriff's sale.

James L. Meiff, represented by his attorney, Mr. Screeze, made a bid of \$1. Goodman was represented at the sale by Attorney John W. Thompson.

The sale is one of the largest that has ever gone through the sheriff's office in Lincoln County.

SUIT FILED TO RESTRAIN SALE ON JUDGMENT

A suit to restrain sale on judgment (New Mexico Copper Corp.) has been filed in district court James L. Meiff to the plaintiff and I. Reuben Goodman the defendant. The plaintiff asks:

1. For an order restraining the defendant and his agents from commencing a sale of the real estate under levy of execution previously issued.

2. For judgment against the defendant in the sum of \$13,500.00 together with costs and attorneys' fees, or in the alternative for an order of the court impressing a trust in favor of plaintiff on said real estate, should the defendant buy said real estate under the levy of execution said referred to above, as the said \$13,500.00 plus interest and costs bears to \$33,403.63, together with interest and costs from December 9, 1959.

3. For an order restraining the defendant and his agents from entering the premises described hereinafter, including the mill thereon, from engaging in any activity thereon, or from removing anything therefrom.

4. For an order requiring the defendant to hand over to the plaintiff the mortgage reconveyance referred to in the alternative in the alternative to appoint a Special Master to execute said instrument.

Officers looking for Texas escape artist

David W. Leach, 33, an ex-convict from State Police officers at Alamogordo on Monday was being sought Wednesday Leach was being questioned about a burglary. He was a slippery customer having escaped four times from Texas officers.

The fugitive is described as white, male, 5 feet, 7 inches tall, blue eyes, sandy hair and weighing 160 pounds. He has a tattoo on both arms. When last seen he was wearing a machine-wash coat.

Officers said Leach once served time for shooting a policeman in Colorado City, Texas. They said he was armed with a knife and should be considered dangerous.

Motorists were warned to be especially careful of picking up any hitchhiker.

Leach jumped out of a window in Alamogordo when he was left alone a few minutes after being picked up for questioning in connection with a burglary at Artesia.

His escapes included one from Taylor County Jail in Abilene, Texas, September 23, 1960, after being convicted of simple assault. In February 1960, he escaped from authorities in Colorado City. In 1952 he escaped from the Mitchell County Jail and in 1954 he made a break from the Big Spring Jail.





Carrizozo grade school had Xmas program



Kennecott to appeal compensation case to supreme court

Hurley, N. M.—The Chino Mines Division of Kennecott Copper Corporation has announced it would appeal to the New Mexico Supreme Court a decision handed down November 11 by District Judge Paul Tackett of Albuquerque, reversing an earlier finding in favor of the company by the State Employment Security Commission.

A Kennecott spokesman said the company was appealing to the higher court because it felt the decision of the Employment Security Commission was "correct."

Referring to the fact that no part of state unemployment compensation is paid for by the employee, either by deduction or by contribution, the spokesman said the company "does not believe the law is intended to place an employer in the position of subsidizing a strike against himself."

"The company is of the opinion that the decision as to whether an employee joins, or participates in a strike rests with the employee, but the employee must be prepared to risk the financial loss resulting from his action and not receive benefits which are ultimate-

Santa Fe to open 44-mile line change in northern Arizona

Santa Fe Railway's 44-mile line change through the rugged mountains of northern Arizona has been completed and was opened to traffic Monday, Dec. 19.

The \$20 million project was designed for speeds of 90 miles an hour for passenger trains and 60 miles for freight and will effect a saving of more than an hour on transcontinental freight schedules. The route being replaced was opened in 1882, with a second track being added in 1913.

More than 12 million cubic yds. of rock and earth were moved in blasting the new line from Williams, Ariz., on the east to a point near Crookton, Ariz., on the west.

Wool schools at Picacho and Corona were called off last week due to the snow in the area. These schools will be held at a later date.

Important to turn in lamb sale receipts

Turn in lamb sale receipts as soon as you get them to the County ASC office in Carrizozo. The sales of wool and lamb for the 1960-61 marketing year must be filed by the end of April in order to receive an incentive payment. The sales receipts should include the name of buyer, number and weight of lambs sold, plus the description unshorn.

Fruit growers short course Jan. 19 at New Mexico State U.

The fruit growers short course will be held January 19 at New Mexico State University. Fertilizer, weed control, insect control and marketing will be discussed. See your neighbors and plan to take a car load when you attend.

A Merry Christmas and a safe one, too!

A gaily decorated Christmas tree lights up the heart, as well as the home during the holiday season, but don't let this year's fun turn into tragedy by neglecting a few simple pointers.

Leave the tree outside, not in the garage, until you're ready to put it up. This will prevent it from drying out. When you bring it inside, make a fresh diagonal cut at the base of the tree to allow more surface to be exposed to the moisture in the container.

Fill the container with water or wet sand. Dry Christmas tree needles are a fire hazard and water helps keep needles moist. Moist needles stay on the tree longer, but two weeks is about the maximum time a tree should be up.

Be sure tree light cords, sockets and plug are in good condition. Place the tree near an outlet fused for 15 amperes. This means the fuse will blow easily if the load is too heavy, or if a short circuit develops. You'll also keep from tripping over extension cords.

For safety's sake, be sure the Underwriter's Laboratory label is on any string of lights you buy. Look for parallel-wired strings of lights having a fiber washer pressed against the bulb socket. The washer helps keep burnable material out of the socket and lessens chance of shock. If you touch the metal part of the bulb when the lights are on, Parallel wiring means that all of the properly working lights stay on if one bulb should burn out.

Be sure to turn off the tree lights when you leave the house or go to bed.

Oct. cattle shipments up over last year

A total of 285,281 head of cattle were shipped out of New Mexico during October this year, compared with 224,148 head in October 1959, exclusive of shipment to and from the Clovis auctions.

During October 1960, permits were issued for 17,565 head of cattle to be shipped into the state, compared with 22,862 during the same month a year earlier.

Shipments to the Clovis auction during October this year totaled 19,317 head compared with 21,338 head in October 1959. The ten-month total this year is 134,787 head, compared with 135,144 during the same period last year.

Cattle and calves continue in good and above average condition, showing only the normal seasonal decline. Fall movement is slowing down but demand for stocker and feeder livestock remains active.

Ranchers indicate about 88% of the expected total fall sales had been sold or contracted before December 1, compared with 85% a year ago and 93% in 1958.

Sheep and lambs are in good and above average condition, showing only about the normal seasonal decline. Most sheep movement has been completed.

It pays to shelter farm machinery

Farm economists have a hard time justifying the expense of shelter for farm machinery. In fact, a decade ago, a machinery shed could pay its way only under unusual circumstances. The situation has changed somewhat with the advent of more costly and complex machinery and the availability of plans for pole-type storage sheds.

These sheds not only shelter a machine from the ravages of weather, but can serve as a shelter in which to repair machinery during the winter months.

Besides this, a study showed an average increase of almost one year in the life of 100 tractors, and an increased life of 1 1/2 years for 100 combines when the machines were sheltered.

Suitable storage pole-type buildings for machinery can be built for around 75c per square foot. Plans for constructing a machinery storage and chop can be secured without cost from the Coun-

NEED NEW LAWS FOR OLD CUSTOM

It will probably require legislation breaking up the bureau of revenue to get rid of the hundreds of incompetent and loafers on jobs under political patronage.

The only effort ever made to get the bureau out of politics was in 1951 when Ed Mechem put Gen. Pete Corlett in as commissioner and Corlett gave up three months later.

The job traditionally goes to a Spanish American of high political repute.

The political operation of the bureau is so firmly established that a break up of the bureau, which is being considered, or a stiff merit system law, which is being considered, mean up the only prospect of getting the Republican and Democratic parties out of the agency.

Newspapers that carried the state election advertising were tossed to the mercy of the legislature for payment of some \$10,000 due. The state board of finance refused State Secretary Doty Florida's request for money to pay the bills and told her to go to the legislature. The legislature will probably put up the dough, but doesn't have to.

Most every paper in the state is due some ranging from \$350 to \$750 for the election advertising which the constitution requires the secretary of state to place in the papers.
