

Verdict of 'not guilty' returned by district court jury in White case

It took a jury of three women and nine men just 40 minutes to return a "not guilty" verdict in district court Tuesday in the case of State of New Mexico vs. Myrtle White, charged with first degree murder.

The jury retired for its deliberations at 4:10 Tuesday afternoon, following a trial that began with jury selection at 9 o'clock Monday morning, the 16th, continued into Monday night court session and resumed Tuesday.

Because the jury rooms are being remodeled, the jury was put up for the night at the Putty Motel.

The verdict clearing Mrs. White was announced by Mrs. Thomas M. Holbert, foreman.

The verdict was: "We, the jury, find the defendant, Myrtle White, not guilty."

MANY JURORS EXCUSED
Thirty-six jurors were on the original panel, but it was necessary to call a special venire and nine additional jury members were accepted.

The court was packed during the two days and night of the trial, between 150 and 200 persons being present.

It was an intensely interested crowd and they hung on every word of witnesses and attorneys.

The state's case was presented by District Attorney Dan Sosa Jr. and Richard Parsons, assistant district attorney.

The prosecution called to the stand S. M. Ortiz, ex-sheriff; Tim Pino, State Patrolman; Percy Diakely, Vernon Scarey, Mrs. Vernon Scarey, Lloyd Vigil and Dr. A. N. Spencer.

The defense was presented by Attorneys H. Elfred Jones and John E. Hall, called three witnesses to the stand: James Clayton, State Patrolman; Marvin H. Roberts and Myrtle White, the defendant.

Richard Parsons began the closing arguments for the state at 2:40 o'clock. He talked for ten minutes.

The case went to the jury at 10 minutes after 4 in the afternoon following summation arguments by the prosecution and defense.

DEFENSE DID NOT QUESTION SOURCE OF FATAL SHOT

The defense said there was no question but that Mrs. White fired the shot that killed Bobby White, but that she was "in mortal fear."

The defense mentioned the testimony of State Policeman James Clayton in its closing argument, saying the prosecution said his testimony was "tainted and not worthy of belief."

"Does the state want a conviction so bad," Hall asked the jurors, "that they will not stand up for the testimony of a state officer?"

In closing its summation, the defense insisted White alone was responsible for his death because "he was acting just like he did a previous time when he marched around the house at the point of a gun."

"This is not a case of self defense," he reminded the jury. "She stated to officers that he came to the window. Why would she say he came in the window if she didn't see him come to the window and shot at him?"

At one point the district attorney picked up the rifle and demonstrated how the lever was pumped to place a cartridge in the chamber.

Regarding the contention between attorneys over Officer Clayton's testimony, Sosa said "I feel Officer Clayton was derelict in his duty in not reporting the occurrence to me or to one of my assistants."

The prosecution argued that both Mrs. White and her husband were impetuous, but the fact that she was the weaker sex did not excuse her from her act.

"What odds did she give him on that night? She had the great equalizer, even though she was the weaker sex."

The court has told you that you can find Myrtle White guilty in any degree and make known any recommendation," the district attorney concluded.

Former Carrizozo mayor dies in Calif.

Word has been received of the death of David E. Saunders, in Long Beach, Calif.

Mr. Saunders was mayor of Carrizozo in the 1920's and he was a past mayor of Carrizozo Mountain Lodge. He had formerly lived in El Paso.

Before his retirement he was a dispatcher with the Southern Pacific Railway. He is survived by his widow Alice and a daughter.

Sugar beets to be topic at Portales meeting

A meeting of farmers interested in the production of sugar beets in New Mexico will be held in Portales on January 24 at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

It is hoped to develop the sugar beet industry in the state and attract a sugar beet refinery, with the help of Government funds, to be located in the southern or eastern part of New Mexico.

Bids called for on Ruidoso paving project

The State Highway Department has called for bids on January 27, 1961, for Federal Aid Project No. S-1226 (4), located in Lincoln County, junction US-70, northwest through the Village of Ruidoso.

The proposed construction consists of 2- and 4-lane, grade, drain, cement treated base course, 4-inch plant mix surfacing, 3 major concrete box culverts, curb and gutter, parallel parking, utility adjustments and miscellaneous construction.

The contract must be completed in 150 working days.

Census lists 334 farms in Lincoln County

The 1959 Census of Agriculture counted 334 farms in Lincoln County, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

Total land in farms was 1,018,729 acres. The average size of farm was 6,039.1 acres. The average value of farms (land and buildings) in the county was \$20,445.

Of the county's farm operators, 175 owned their farms, 145 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 12 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 52.7 years. There were 63 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 334 farms in the county, 205 were commercial farms. Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1954.

Ask establishment of elk herd in White mountains

The project of the Ruidoso Lions Club to establish a herd of elk in the White Mountain country was further discussed last Friday night in Ruidoso at a meeting attended by 35 interested persons.

Present were representatives from the Lions Club, Forest Service, Game Department, Ruidoso, Capitan landowners and the Mesquero Apache reservation.

The Lions Club has been working on the elk project for two years in the belief that in time annual elk hunts in the White Mountains could be added to the calendar of Lincoln County events to attract the sportsman.

The advantages pro and con of establishing elk in the White Mountains were outlined by the Forest Service.

The Game Department was represented at the meeting by Fred Thompson, director. They have been cooperative toward the project as have tribal officials of the Mesqueros, who have offered to contribute toward any expense of establishing the herd.

Consent of landowners contacted has been practically unanimously favorable, it is said.

Forest Service officials attending the meeting included Bud Starkey, Phil Smith and Mr. McDermott.

Thompson said another meeting would be scheduled between the Game Department, Forest Service and others interested.

RUIDOSO LIONS VISIT CARRIZOZO CLUB

Annual report of Carrizozo SCS

Following is the annual report of the Carrizozo Soil Conservation District for the year 1960, as submitted by I. V. Withers, chairman of the Board of Supervisors.

The Carrizozo SCS was organized October 11, 1945, and now comprises 802,820 acres. At present there are 65 operating units in the district. Of these, 43 are district cooperators and 22 are basic plans.

The district board meets the second Tuesday of each month at the SCS office. Twelve meetings were held in 1960 with about 60% attendance. The present board of supervisors is composed of I. V. Withers, chairman, Lee Straley, secretary-treasurer, H. O. Smith, vice chairman and members R. M. Shafer and E. I. Hartley.

During the year the board observed Soil Stewardship Sunday, Soil Conservation month and participated in the county fair. One member attended the N. M. A. SCS convention. The annual report, election results and appropriate articles were published in the county paper.

The district has a memorandum of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service for technical assistance and with the Bureau of Land Management. They also have an agreement with the BLM for use of district equipment on BLM lands. An annual plan of operations was developed and about 65% completed during the year.

The district operates earth moving equipment for the benefit of the landowners. It is managed by the Board of Supervisors who hire one full-time operator at present. Two machines are operated when needed.

There are ten active Great Plains contracts in the district, which cover about one-fourth of the land area. The Great Plains Program and the ACP are encouraged by the board.

Petitions call for school bond issue

The necessary signatures calling for a school bond election having been secured, the Carrizozo Municipal Board of Education will meet this Thursday evening at 7:30 to officially approve the bond petitions.

The board will then adopt a resolution calling for the bond election on February 21, 1961. The board meeting will be held in the office of the superintendent. The meetings are open to anyone desiring to attend.

ONE CANDIDATE HAS FILED FOR SCHOOL BOARD

Mrs. Ella Sidwell filed this week for one of the two vacancies on the Carrizozo Municipal School Board. Two positions, each for a six-year term, are to be filled in the election on February 7.

The school board election is on February 7 and the school bond election will be two weeks later. The law does not permit both elections to be on the same date.

Candidates for the school board may file at the office of J. T. Clegg until 4 p.m., January 26, closing date for filing.

Names will appear on the ballot in the order of filing.

Board shown steel building construction

Mark Sloan, a former resident of Lincoln County, met with the Carrizozo School Board and superintendent of schools in the superintendent's office on January 12 at 7:30 p.m., to discuss with the group the use of materials sold by his firm in the construction of a proposed addition to the Carrizozo school plant.

Sloan represents the Banes Construction Company of Albuquerque, dealer for Butler pre-fabricated steel buildings.

The company has had several plans drawn to fit specifications for the new addition.

No decision can be made until after the bond election.

School men attend planning conference

J. T. Clegg and Bernard Labba of the Carrizozo schools attended an NMEA planning conference in Albuquerque last Saturday and Sunday.

Finances were the main topic of discussion and it was brought out that unless additional funds were made available for school use the situation will become very acute next year.

All superintendents of Lincoln County's schools met Wednesday morning in Superintendent Clegg's office in Carrizozo to determine the exact amount of savings that can be made in current school budgets.

MORGAN EXPOSES FIGHT ON COLLINS

Santa Fe - The drive to block the governor from naming a member to the State Highway Commission was flushed into the open this week as the senate refused the governor's request for early consideration of Wayne Collins of Santa Fe for the post, and as Sen. Ilee Morgan of Portales told pressures on senators to vote against the nominee.

If the senate fails to approve Collins by a three-fifths vote the road board would continue in control of Democrats John Sudderth of Hobbs, Fats Leonard of Albuquerque and George Lavender of Santa Fe.

JOHN SUDDERTH WANTS NO CHANGE

Sen. Ilee Morgan said that Gov. Ed Mechem informed senate leaders the day before the legislature opened that he would nominate Collins for the highway commission and asked that the senate pass on him within the five-day period in which the governor could submit an alternate proposal in the event of Collins' rejection.

The senate let the five-day period pass without action and Sudderth was urging senators to vote against Collins.

It requires the vote of only 13 of the 32 senators to reject the nominee. Advocates of keeping Mechem out of the highway department are privately claiming that they have ten votes and are working on the others needed.

MECHEM BLOCKED BY 1957 SENATE

Mechem's two nominees for the highway commission were rejected by the senate in 1957 and when he attempted to submit second choices he was told by Atty. Gen. Fred Standley that he could not make nominations after the fifth day of the session.

After that Mechem went on the biggest voting spree ever seen at the capitol, killing a quarter of all the measures passed by the legislature.

Collins has been a member of the state prison and parole boards for ten years, is a conservative businessman who worked for the highway department briefly in his youth.

He was confirmed by the senate for the prison and parole boards without question but is likely to be scratched and voted before he gets on the \$70 million-a-year highway commission.

If the Burroughs Democrats can retain the highway department they will not have lost much in the November voting.

DAVID BRANCH SORE PROBLEM

A statehouse problem of no little concern is what to do with Democrat David Branch who helped the Republicans in the campaign and is getting impatient about a position in the statehouse.

Branch of Santa Fe and Las Vegas, a recent state chairman of the Young Democrats, gave the Republicans a lot of trouble in San Miguel county in 1958 and was a welcome volunteer when he offered to help last year. He had just been defeated in the Democratic primary for Congress by Joe M. Montoya.

He wants a good job in the Mechem administration and according to past practice will also need a job for his wife and perhaps others of the family. In earlier talks with the Democrats he often had trouble because of public criticism of his employers.

Governor Mechem doesn't want him but he has strong champions in court in the persons of Lt. Gov. Tom Dolack and Republican chief Holm Dursum.

HOLM DOESN'T WANT STATE TAX POST

Burcum of Socorro has turned reluctant about taking the chief state tax commissioner post (\$10,000 a year) which some Republicans had tried to urge on him, but might show up as an associate commissioner, \$3,000 a year and only once a month meetings.

SIX COUNTIES SAFE IN FIRST CHECK

The first list drawn at the statehouse on the condition of schools showed only six counties assured of getting through the current school year on the money available - Union, Sierra, Luna, San Juan, Chaves and Bernalillo.

Maybe twice that many more will be added to the safe list as more information on money resources is made known.

NO TAX JUMPS ARE LIKELY

The legislature will not raise the 2% sales tax to 3%, double the income tax or make any other major tax increase to meet the school money problem.

Extra dough will be provided from raising the state land rental fees, from bringing all RRA and municipally operated utilities under the sales tax and jumping the tax on horse race betting and uranium mining.

EL RITO BOARD TO BE CHANGED

The entire El Rito (Northern New Mexico School) board of regents is up for replacement. Gov. John Burroughs did not get senate confirmation of his appointees which would have entitled them to stay on for the terms of their appointments.

Judge Scoggin will return for district court January 23.

The Nogal Fire District will hold a meeting January 24, starting at 7 p.m., at the Nogal church. Business will include election of officers and a discussion about buying equipment.

The New Mexico Senate at its session Tuesday gave unanimous approval to a joint memorial in honor of the late Sen. J. G. Moore of Lincoln county, whose death occurred in June, 1959, shortly after the 34th Legislature adjourned.
