

Voters asked to approve school bonds at election next Tuesday, Feb. 21

A school bond election to vote for additional room for the Carrizozo High School will be held next Tuesday.

Voting place is the Junior High School building at 8 o'clock and close at 7.

If approved by a majority of the voters in the school district, work will start in June on a new building to give the school an adequate science room, home economics room, Junior high school classrooms and dressing rooms and shower rooms to relieve the woefully inadequate physical education facilities.

The funds will also make possible an enlarged shop department, music department and cafeteria in the Junior High School building.

Who May Vote

AT THE BOND ELECTION FEBRUARY 21

All qualified electors of School District No. 7 who are owners of real estate within such school district may have the right to vote, regardless of veteran tax exemption.

When a husband and wife own community property, both are entitled to vote upon any question submitted by this section. (1933-34, P. 108.)

In school bond elections, electors to be qualified must be residents of and own real estate within the district under this section, and non-resident taxpayers cannot vote therein. (1933-40, P. 189.)

Constitution, Art. IX, Sec. 11 does not require that the elector shall have paid his property tax during the preceding year before he may vote.

The registration books and the tax rolls will be used at the school bond election to verify eligibility of the voter.

Classes will be dismissed so that the pupils may attend, and the buses will run directly after the close of the ceremonies.

Several different bills are before the state legislature that could facilitate car-marking different funds for school use.

Urgently needed by New Mexico's schools is an additional \$14,500,000, and unless the additional funds are made available, the situation may become severe next year. It is believed that letters from parents and teachers will be most effective.

The meeting will be held Friday evening, Feb. 17, beginning at 7:30 p.m. in the high school library. It will be an informal get-together for the purpose of discussing school finances and writing letters. All interested persons are urged to attend.

Noted accordionist to give concert at Carrizozo Jr. High

Don Comfort, accordionist, will present a program February 17 at 2:45 p.m. in the Junior High School Auditorium. Admission is 20 cents for children and 25 cents for adults. The public is invited.

School head asks patrons to vote for bonds

Citizens of Carrizozo will be presented next Tuesday, Feb. 21, with an opportunity to continue their progress in modernizing and bettering their school when they vote upon the proposed school bond issue.

A large number of you, by signing the petition calling for a bond election, have indicated your desire to give our children better school facilities in the form of an addition to the high school to house the expanded equipment and resources necessary to prepare our students to compete adequately with pupils in other school systems in the state.

Responding to the petition, the local board of education has called for a bond election in the amount of \$165,000, which would be repaid in a period of 20 years. For this amount, which will cost you, the taxpayer, approximately \$5.24 per \$1000 of assessed valuation per year, an adequate building housing the science, home economics and Junior-high classrooms, and adequate physical education dressing and shower rooms.

These are departments which, if properly housed, equipped and staffed, will return to the people of Carrizozo visible dividends in well-prepared youngsters, able to keep up with those who have been educated elsewhere, competent to participate more easily in advanced fields of education or training.

May I ask you: Are you really satisfied with your schools as they are today? Do you want the children of Carrizozo, your children, to have at least an equal opportunity with the children in other localities and in other states?

Home economics can be a vital influence in the lives of our children, a fact recognized and provided for across the nation. Here we crowd 15 or 16 youngsters into a room which, in our present department, should take care of only eight or ten. This deprives your child of an educational opportunity.

A modern chop department, especially needed in our town, calls for all types of offerings: welding, sheet metal, mechanics, electricity, woodworking. We can offer only woodworking in that a room is not much larger than your garage.

Today's youngster going to college is required to have good grounding in laboratory sciences. To conduct such a class demands sufficient space and equipment to set up at least three laboratory experiments weekly. Your youngster at the present time can have only one per week: 33 1/3% of minimum preparation!

From the President of the U. S. down, it is acknowledged that our youth needs better training in physical education. School programs across the nation have made provision for this. We are trying our best to build a real physical education program (not merely in our school, yet we have only five showers in each of the shower rooms to provide for 100 Junior high youngsters; ten showers for 400 students! What kind of program does this permit?

New Mexico and Carrizozo have always given their children an opportunity for a full, adequate education. It is my belief that you good people of Carrizozo will continue to do this; that you will vote for this bond issue which will make such a course possible, and that you will encourage others to do so.

Many of you may be wondering what is to become of the old building. Your school board has no intention of tearing this down. True, it is obsolete as a good classroom space to meet modern demands; but it provides us with an excellent auxiliary building. Envision with me a large, modern shop department, sufficient to meet requirements to prepare your boy to begin a trade which he can follow for his life.

See, if you will, an enlarged cafeteria, comfortable, restful, happy. Along with these two much needed improvements, listen to a growing, lively music department housed so that the best can be coaxing from your boy or girl.

Indeed, the old Junior High Building, with its fine auditorium, would be refurbished and redecorated to restore it to its old dignity and importance.

I know your interest lies in your youth. His educational interests in these fast moving times cannot be placed in cold storage. A defeat of the bond issue would prevent another being considered for another two years. This is a time of transition. Your present Junior High Building is already on the fringe of inadequacy; what about two years from now? Your courage and foresight are called upon today.

Will you please, for the sake of your youth of Carrizozo, vote YES on the bond issue on Tuesday, February 21?

Town board asks for bids on swimming pool

Following two special meetings this week the Carrizozo Town Board set the wheels in motion to build a swimming pool in Carrizozo.

Bonds to build the pool will be financed solely through receipts coming in to the recreation fund from the cigarette tax.

Approved by the trustees was a form calling for bids on the pool and adoption of a resolution pledging an allocation from the cigarette tax receipts to meet payments on bonds that will be sold to finance the pool.

Final approval came after two meetings by the trustees. Two of them, Leandro Vega and A. T. Roberts, questioned the wisdom of building the pool, as proposed, giving as their main reasons:

It was costing too much; lack of agreement by planning commission members on size of the pool to be built; lack of enthusiasm for the pool by some members of the recreation commission; tying up a major portion of the town's recreation funds from this tax over a period of a number of years and doubt that receipts from the pool would pay for its operation.

The trustees at first were divided on the issue, Voss and Duff for, Vega and Roberts against. Mayor Ball cast the deciding vote for, to give a majority in favor of the pool, but a three-fourths vote of the trustees was required to pass the resolution calling for bids to be legal.

At the final meeting both Vega and Roberts agreed to go along on the swimming pool with the other two trustees and the mayor.

A notice calling for bids is advertised in this issue of the News. The board reserves the right to accept or reject any or all bids.

Warm weather melts deep snow pack on county ranch lands

Two ranchmen from different parts of the county, in Carrizozo this week, said recent warm days had caused rapid melting of the snowpack at their ranches.

Kennan Fuller from the Corona area said some snow still remained on the ground in places, but it was rapidly disappearing.

Orris Smith, whose ranch is located on the north side of Carrizozo, said snow in early December by a three-foot snowfall. For eight days he could not get to his cattle to feed them and at least five head perished.

"But, I'm used to paying a good price for moisture," he says optimistically, "and the calves will fatten it back when they get on that good grass this summer."

A rancher in another direction says he isn't troubled with mud on his boots and that he is looking for moisture to get the pasture lands off to a good start.

Ervin Crockett whose land borders the Mal Pais reports only a light snowfall in his area. "We'll be needing a couple of good rains this spring," he says.

School finance picture reviewed at PTA meeting

At the regular meeting of the Carrizozo PTA, held Monday night, Feb. 13, in the Junior High Auditorium, J. T. Clegg, superintendent of schools, reviewed the school finance situation as it appears at this time.

"We have good reason to be optimistic," he said as he told of the transfer of \$1.5 million into school funds, which is thought to be sufficient to carry the education systems through the remainder of the school year.

He further reported the continuing efforts in Santa Fe to place school finances on a strong basis for subsequent years. "We in Carrizozo are in good shape in comparison to many other schools in the state," he said.

Clegg then appealed to the audience to support the school bond issue at the election on February 21. He summarized the needs for and advantages of a new building, and invited those present to view drawings of proposed plans of a building which were placed on exhibition in the school cafeteria.

"Such a building will place Carrizozo schools in position to attract and maintain scholastic leadership and better prepare graduates to compete successfully in collegiate work," he remarked.

The program was opened by an invocational tableau presented by the Future Homemakers of America. While Dolores Zamora portrayed a young woman at prayer, a quartette, accompanied by Judy Sully of the piano, sang an arrangement of Mallete's popular "Lord's Prayer." The singers were Terri Portillo, Terri Precupes, Virginia Barala and Rosa Torres.

Immediately following the business meeting, Howard Smith's sixth grade youngsters presented a skit to honor PTA Founders' Day. Performing with poise and good stage presence were John Banks, Dean McCollum, Randy Kilpatrick, Arlene Hill, Deaky Barham and Susan Welsh.

BATTLE IMPENDING ON WHO IS TAXED

Santa Fe—At the half-way point in the legislature one thing was sure: Money will be provided for the schools this year and next.

How, is the question that stands to occupy the legislature from now until the end.

While all concerned want to raise whatever the schools must have there is an intense political struggle between the Republican governor and the Democratic legislature on which is to shoulder the blame for the higher taxes.

MECHEM PROPOSAL TROUBLES DEMOS

Gov. Ed Mechem knocked the Demos off balance with the proposition to raise the sales tax from two to three per cent for a year while the Democratic legislators worked out a permanent taxation program to supply the money. Any such program would make a lot of people unhappy with the Democrats who proposed the new and higher taxes.

At the opposite end are a group of Democrats in the legislature who would raise maybe \$7 million, about half the amount the schools insist they need, by such devices as taxing state agencies, counties and towns, pledging up money from municipal and co-op utilities which they are already willing to pay, taking a little more from state land users which they are willing to pay, and other non-painful sources.

Such a deal would force the Mechem administration to make school budgets for next year with extremely short money and take the political consequences.

OTHER DEMOCRATS ALSO HAVE PLAN

Another Democratic group in the legislature would raise the full \$14 million to \$16 million that seems to be needed by the schools by jumping the income tax, uranium tax, horse bottling tax, land rentals and closing off sales tax exemptions now in effect.

This probably wouldn't benefit the Democrats politically but is regarded by many as better than Mechem's sales tax increase.

SALES TAX JUMP HARD TO DROP

That three per cent sales tax, even though enacted for only a year, could go on forever.

The present two per cent tax was enacted in 1933 in a school money crisis similar to the present one and was called "Emergency School Tax."

REPUBS PUNISH FOUR DEMOCRATS

The new Republican highway commissioner has four Democrats in consideration for highway engineer. They are:

Robert De La Rue, presently an officer in the department T. D. White, long-timer in the department until fired last year by the Democratic commissioner, Larry Wilson, chief engineer fired in 1959 by the Demo commissioner Burton Dwyer, chief engineer for ten years until let out by a Republican commissioner in 1952.

WORKING WIVES LOSE THEIR JOBS

The new Republican major vehicle commissioner has a list of fired three Democratic female employees the other day when the buses were also on the state payroll. He said it was the glory of his office not to employ women or others who had state jobs but was quick to point out that this was only his policy and that he was not speaking for the administration.

That recalled that Chief State Tax Commissioner Jack Holmes \$10,000 a year and one of the big figures in the administration is the husband of Beverly Holmes, \$3,100 in the education department.

Fired by Padilla Mrs. Ray Rodriguez \$275, wife of the former Demo state chairman, state school superintendent, land commissioner, state treasurer, who is working for the welfare department at \$403 a month;

Mrs. John Hoyer, \$275, whose husband is head of the public employees retirement office at \$10,000 a year;

Mrs. Aud Darr, \$353 a month whose husband is in the education office at \$3,000 a year.

HIGHWAY FATALITIES HELPING WINSTON

The continuing extremely low rate in highway killing is making it more difficult for Governor Mechem to go through with his plan to fire State Police Chief Penn Winston in favor of Capt. John Bradford of Albuquerque.

At the first of the week there had been 27 killed since the first of the year compared with 40 at the same date a year before, and even more in preceding years, such as 47 in 1958.

Automobile traffic is the first responsibility of the state police and Chief Winston is a specialist in traffic which might help him overcome personal difficulties he has with the governor.

MURPHY MOUNTING AS A CANDIDATE

There is increasing speculation here that Santa Fe's high mayor, Leo Murphy, will be going for the Demo nomination for governor next year. Rep. Helen Wells of Torrance blasted the Republican governor the other day and there was immediate conjecture about

Two state Lodges have new fiscal policy

Fred M. Toler, executive director of the State Commission on Alcoholism, has announced a new fiscal policy for the commission regarding patient collections.

"Due to the tremendous burden of uncollected patient accounts, it will hereafter be necessary for persons who already owe the commission for past hospitalization, to pay in advance for future treatment, plus a reasonable payment on their old account."

POLITICS AND GOVERNMENT

We often say we are getting tired of political haranguing and baldersdash, and the pulling and hauling of political campaigns. Don't you know that it's part and parcel of government that has kept us a free people?

The "Bill of Rights" in the Constitution of the United States spells out specific freedoms for all Americans—religion, speech, press, and petition for redress of grievances—and many other rights. Just the guarantee of these rights isn't enough. Who stands back of the guarantee?

To keep one person or group from taking away these rights, or assuming more power, the federal government was divided into three branches; and state governments were designed along the same lines. Even Congress was divided into two houses so that one could watch the other.

Members of Congress are elected by the people; the President is elected by the people, even though the electoral college appears to be a roundabout way to some persons; and although the federal court judges are chosen by the president, their appointments must be approved by the Senate. What's more, these federal judges cannot be removed from office as long as they are alive and competent.

There you have the legislative, executive and judicial branches of the government all responsible to the people—to us.

The ultimate protector is the court system, for the courts can declare legislation passed by Congress to be worthless if adjudged contrary to the constitution, and no manner of threat from either Congress or the executive branch can be effective.

All we need to do is to stop and think about how important our part is in making our government run, and that it is our vote, and our opinions, and our actions that count in keeping our freedoms, and we won't snicker at patriotic orations and political speeches from those who have gumption enough to run for a public office.

Then we won't have to be coaxed to accept jury duty, or pushed into a voting booth.

We will continue to "secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity" by doing our part in choosing the men who run our government, by voting even in what we may call obscure elections, speaking out at meetings where opinions of others are formed, and by writing to our congressmen who want and need our help.

N. M. January sheep overshipments less

A total of 21,287 head of sheep were shipped out of New Mexico during January, 1961, compared with 27,587 head in January, 1960. The bulk of the overshipments were lambs, comprising almost 94% of the total during January, 1961, and 90% of the total for the same month a year earlier.

The sparser movement of lambs out of the state during January, 1961, compared with a year earlier was due largely to the much smaller number on feed this year. The heaviest movement of fed lambs to market usually occurs during January.

Sheep and lambs on feed January 1, 1961, totaled 43,000 head compared with 58,000 head a year earlier, according to the office of the agricultural statistician, Agricultural Marketing Service, Las Cruces.

Inshipments of sheep during January, 1961, totaled 1,594 head compared with 4,475 head for the same month a year earlier.
