



**Ford Sheep Efficiency Award**




Raymond Anchordoguy, 41, has turned sheep-raising into a highly efficient business.

**MACARONI TUNA LOAF**  
(Makes about 8 servings)

Add 1 tablespoon salt to 3 quarts rapidly boiling water. Gradually add 2 cups elbow macaroni (8-ounces) so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender. Drain in colander. Combine egg mixture, macaroni, 2 1/2 cups 3-Minute Cheese Sauce and 1/2 cup melted butter. Line bottom of 9x5x3-inch loaf pan with aluminum foil. Butter foil well. Turn macaroni mixture into pan. Bake in moderate oven (350°) 1 hour, 15 minutes. May be served warm or cold.

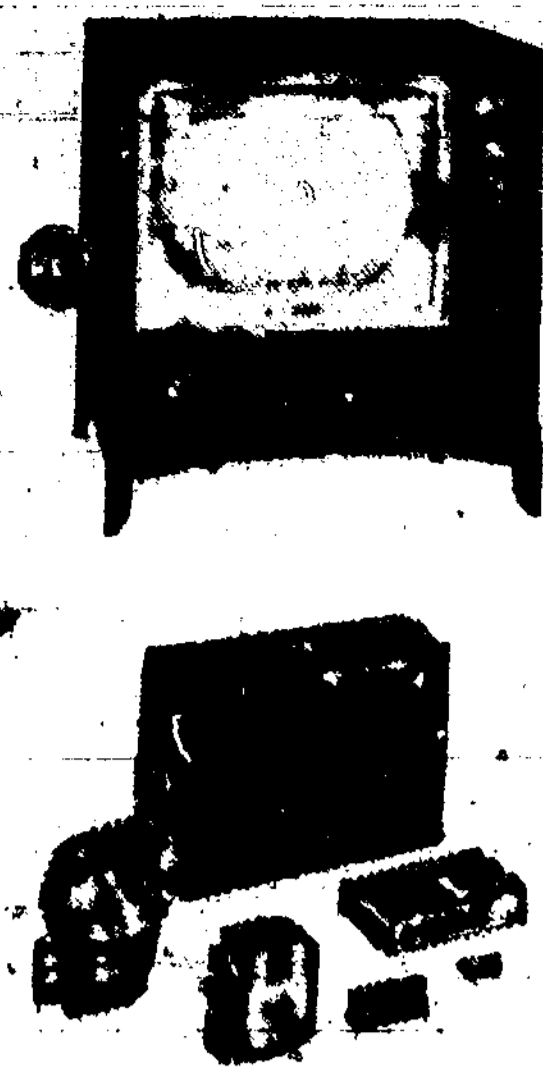
\*Use 2 1/2 cups 3-Minute Cheese Sauce; Simmer 1 1/2 cups (8-ounce can) condensed evaporated milk with 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon dry mustard and 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish to just below boiling (about 2 minutes). Add 2 cups (about 8 ounces) grated processed American cheese. Stir over low heat until cheese melts about 2 minutes longer.
