

# Move made to re-inter 'The Kid' in Lincoln County

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners this week addressed a resolution to the Board of Commissioners of DeBaca County, asking their assistance in re-intering the body of Billy the Kid in Lincoln County.

A number of reasons were given for this request. The resolution was acted upon by Commissioners Kenneth Nosker, Charles A. Jones and Ignacio Torrez, in regular session last Friday.

The resolution follows: To the Honorable Board of Commissioners of DeBaca County, Fort Sumner, N. M.: It has come to the attention of the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, at several times in the past, that the grave of William H. Bonney, alias Billy the Kid, is being unduly exploited by highway advertising signs in a manner that is offensive, and not in good taste.

Also, that the advertising and publicity refers to the Ft. Sumner area as being "The Home of Billy the Kid."

As you know, the Old Lincoln County Courthouse, at Lincoln, New Mexico, was where William Bonney was sentenced to hang for the murder of Sheriff Brady. The Courthouse, which is administered by the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, a state agency, has many mementos of Billy the Kid and the Lincoln County War, in which he took a leading part. Lincoln County was more the home of "The Kid" than anywhere else in the Southwest.

There is enacted each year at Lincoln, New Mexico, a pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid" and in its exciting scenes the good as well as the bad of "The Kid" is portrayed.

It is entirely fitting, therefore, that the body of the Southwest's foremost personality not be subject to exploitation for monetary purposes, but rather that it be re-intered in its rightful resting place, Lincoln County, enshrined as his family and friends would have wished.

To this end, we respectfully seek the cooperation of the Board of County Commissioners of DeBaca County.

## Let's settle this matter for all time

(An editorial by Paul Baker)

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners is to be commended for the action taken last Friday in passing a resolution calling for the removal of the remains of Billy the Kid to their rightful resting place at Lincoln town in Lincoln County.

The County Commissioners adopted the resolution directed to the Board of Commissioners of DeBaca County, after a conference with interested citizens, including Joe O. Sargent of Carrizozo.

Garish highway advertising signs directing the curious to the lonely grave of Billy the Kid on the outskirts of Fort Sumner, have long been a source of irritation to Lincoln County people; also the claim of that area as being "The Home of Billy the Kid."

William H. Bonney, alias Billy the Kid, was shot down at Fort Sumner by Sheriff Pat Garrett in July 1881, but Fort Sumner was by no means his home. The only home he had in the last years of his short life was at Lincoln, where he was the leader of the Tunstall-McSwain faction in the Lincoln County War.

Public interest grows constantly concerning this youth of 21 years, in whom there were qualities both good and bad and who was a leader of men, both good and bad. The fabric of fact and fiction about the Southwest's most notorious character, is interwoven with the legends and folklore of the West's last frontier.

The Old Lincoln County Courthouse Museum at Lincoln has a great deal of material, both visible and written, concerning the life of this young man who lived part of his life within the law and part of it outside. At Lincoln, students of history, writers of fiction and history, as well as interested tourists, can get first-hand information about Billy the Kid and all participants in the Lincoln County War. They can also view, in August, the thrilling pageant of events leading up to the Three-Day Battle. The Kid's arrest and his dramatic escape from the hangman's noose.

Future historians may discover, for example, that Billy the Kid would have accepted the pardon offered by Governor Lew Wallace had he not known for certainty that if he laid down his arms he would have been shot by his enemies before the next sun set. The kid, in the words of Governor Wallace in a Postscript, said, "The makings of a good man."

What could be more fitting than that The Kid's remains be returned to Lincoln, to be reinterred in a plot of ground, in a landscaped "Billy the Kid Park"? His grave would have a dignified setting, entirely away from outlandish advertising on highway signs; or such a spectacle as at Boot Hill in Tombstone, where the graves of the just and the unjust are alike exposed to public ridicule.

## State Sen. Joe Skeen outlines main points of Game Dept's lease of State lands

Joe Skeen, state senator for Lincoln county, made a trip to Santa Fe April 10, to attend a meeting of the State Game Department. The main purpose of the trip was to get specific information from Game Commission officials on the new state land hunting lease program and how the Department intends to put the program into effect.

Reporting on his trip, Skeen informed the News that there has been a great deal of speculation among ranchers who lease state lands and hunters as to how this new proposition will be administered. Information, he says, has been scant and in some cases "so vague as to be confusing."

Skeen interviewed Fred Thompson, State Game Department chief, who supplied him with copies of Attorney General Earl Hartley's opinion on whether or not the Land Commissioner has the right to make such a lease, and a copy of the easement agreement made between the Land Commissioner and the Game Commission.

According to Skeen, it is the Attorney General's opinion that the Land Commissioner has the right and duty to issue easements for the purpose of propagating and harvesting the game from public lands, in addition to the grazing and agricultural leases. The Commissioner, as trustee of the public lands, must administer these lands in such a manner as to return to the beneficiaries the maximum amount of revenue.

The opinion also states that the right to harvest game from state lands is valuable and is not granted to the grazing or agricultural lessee, and may be granted to other persons than such lessees, including the State Game Commission and its permittees.

The opinion further states that no one has the right to hunt or fish on land belonging to the State of New Mexico without the permission of the Land Commissioner and this right is not to be granted by him without payment of compensation.

The easement agreement mentions the following main points: The Land Commissioner will lease all of the state lands, which are now leased for grazing and agriculture, to the State Game Commission for 1/2 cent per acre per year and this lease will be for a period of 5 years.

The Game Commission, its agents and permittees shall have unrestricted right to enter upon these state lands for the purpose of managing, propagating and harvesting all wildlife and fish therefrom, and to use as much of the surface as may be reasonably necessary for such purposes.

Any permittee of the Game Commission, using these state lands, shall reimburse all other lessees for any damage to property of these lessees.

The Game Commission has the right to enter into agreements with other lessees or landowners for the purpose of establishing and maintaining the most beneficial game management units.

Mr. Thompson calls this last point of the easement agreement the "utilization agreement," which he hopes to transact with ranchers who have mixed private and state lands. This agreement would allow the rancher and the Game Commission to get up hunting areas in blocks and thus prevent hunters from traveling over all of a rancher's private lands to reach small or isolated tracts of state lease lands.

Thompson said that the Game Commission will pay the Land Commissioner \$33,591.49 for the total hunting lease this year, and he hopes to pay this with Federal monies which are returned to New Mexico from taxes collected on the sales of firearms and ammunition. There will be no increase in hunting license fees, he said.

## Another trout planting in Otero county creeks

Charlie Bird, district game conservator, informed the News this week that Penasco and Tularosa creeks in Otero county were stocked Monday of this week.

Planting trout in the Ruidoso river is tentatively set for next week, he said.

Another planting of trout was put in Nogal lake last week.

The North Fork of the Donito and the Blue Hole will be planted when conditions permit, Bird said.

## SKETCHES of some lamentable events of bygone days

Several years ago in Carrizozo the invalid mother of the late A. H. Harvey was burned to death, at the Harvey ranch home, not far from the Charley Smith place on the Highlands. She had been left alone on that fateful day, and no one could determine how the fire started. There was no fire engine in those times and when people and the bucket brigade arrived on the scene the frame structure was a mass of flames.

Then someone saw a charred body in the yard, not far from the flaming house. She had made it that far as she fled from the burning house.

In the late forties, Robert W. Bowlin, salesman for the old Western Garage and deputy under Sheriff A. S. McCamant, drove his car a short distance south of Carrizozo and shot himself. Dependency over ill health was established as the motive.

In the late thirties, Mr. and Mrs. Refugio Nejar went for a walk in the cool of the evening, towards the stockyards on the outskirts of Carrizozo. Cuco took along his 22 rifle, in case he saw a cottontail or jackrabbit. The gun discharged accidentally and the bullet struck Mrs. Nejar in the small of the back. The wound was only skin deep and the fortunate lady was seen at the dance at the Community Hall the following night.

When the overpans was being built in Carrizozo in the early thirties, Guillermo Bartlett was hauling gravel from the crusher to the site. About six miles east of Carrizozo his heavily loaded truck went out of control, tore down a fence and turned over, pinning Bartlett and mangle both of his legs. His limbs were amputated, but he died on the operating table.

Kids will be kids wherever they congregate, but another boy and myself became living Judases the day we put a couple of domestic cats in a burlap bag and hung it on the wall of an outer house. We lit several pages from an old catalog and applied the torch to the bottom of the bag. These felices raised such a commotion as to arouse the entire neighborhood, and they ripped that sack asunder as if it was paper, and flew out into space in different directions.

We enjoyed a hearty laugh, but brief, for a woman had been watching the whole proceedings from her door and she went straight to our mothers to unfold that pitiful drama. We paid a dear price for what we thought was "only a little fun," but we justly deserved the punishment and more for our cruelty to these helpless cats.

## Cold snap injures fruit in the Hondo area

Fruit in the Hondo area has been hurt by cold weather during the last few days, according to County Agent Ralph B. Dunlop.

Temperatures as low as 20°F were recorded and a large majority of the Red Delicious apple trees were in full bloom.

"The full extent of the damage cannot be estimated until the late blooms on the trees open up," he said.

Insects are starting to cause trouble in the Hondo valley, the county agent added. Aphids were found in heavy infestations on alfalfa. In the heavily infested field, spraying with malathion is needed, unless sprayed, the first cutting will be very short.

Dunlop said clover mites have been found starting to move on apple trees in orchards where no delayed dormant spray was applied. These mites and aphids seem to prefer cool weather and multiply most rapidly then.

## Gerald Littleton improves in hospital

The condition of Gerald Littleton in Hotel Dieu Hospital in El Paso was reported to be slightly improved Wednesday morning of this week.

The 16-year-old youth was critically injured last Thursday in Carrizozo when the car under which he was working slipped off a bumper jack and the cross member in front of the transmission fell on his face. The car had no wheels on it at the time.

Gerald is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Littleton. He was removed from under the car by Albert Hernandez, a neighbor, and taken first to the Carrizozo hospital then to El Paso in the Hampton-Holland Funeral Home ambulance.

The accident occurred at his father's garage around 5 o'clock last Thursday afternoon.

Know Your Law

PLAIN AND CERTIFIED CHECKS

How would you describe a "certified check"? You'd be right if you said that a certified check is a check that is drawn against a depositor's account upon which the bank certified that there is sufficient money to pay the check when presented.

When is the holder of a check an "innocent, good faith or bona fide" holder? When anyone receives a check from a person other than the drawer of such check, for value and without knowledge of any defenses which such drawer may have against the payee named in the check, he is said to be an innocent, good faith or bona fide holder.

For instance, if the drawer should find, after delivering the check, that the consideration received by him had been misrepresented to him, this would be a good defense against payment of the check in the hands of the payee, but a third party receiving the check without knowledge of this defense would be an innocent, good faith or bona fide holder.

Barbara Funkhouser will start the evening activities with an illustrated talk on her trip as an International Farm Youth Exchange delegate to Belgium, Luxembourg. Other items on the program include plans for 4-H Contest, County Camp, 4-H Rodeo and Horro Show.

## What's a fair price for my wool?

This is the first question that you hear the woolgrowers ask, and it's a difficult question to answer. Here are a few things to consider in finding out if you are getting a fair price.

First, if you have a core test, use it to calculate the bid price on your wool. If you don't have a core test, another way to estimate is to get the income per fleece or per ewe.

Quite often the rancher receiving 30 cents per pound nets more per ewe than the one receiving 41 cents per pound for his wool. After all, it's the income per ewe that counts the most, not the biggest price per pound.

## Apply now for wool incentive

May 1 is the deadline to turn in for wool incentive payments, with the ASC office, in the courthouse in Carrizozo. This deadline only applies to the wool sold during the 1960 wool marketing year, which is from April 1, 1960 to March 31, 1961.

This also applies to any unshorn lambs sold by the pound during the past year.

## Insect problems discussed at meeting

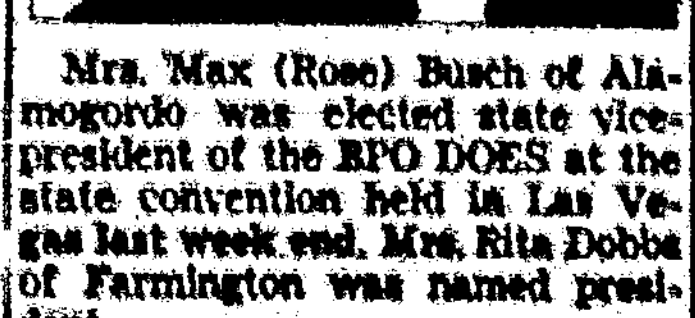
Last Friday I attended a meeting on insect problems. One of the major concerns is the insects that could possibly be brought in by tourists returning from other countries.

An insect in its native country often does little damage, but when introduced into a different country it can cause tremendous losses. A recent example is the alfalfa aphid, which causes little damage to the alfalfa plant, but caused damage in the millions of dollars each year since first noted in 1954 in the Pecos Valley.

If you travel abroad, be thankful for the inspection of plant material because this may prevent you from bringing some harmful insect into this country.

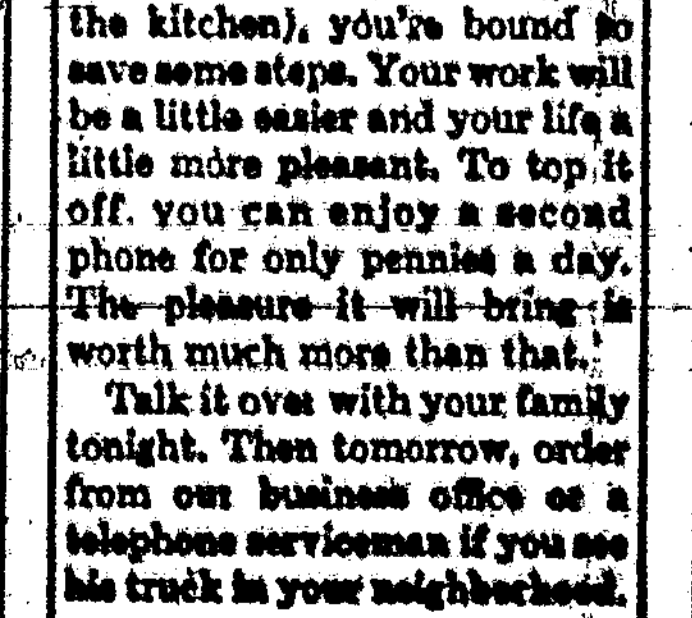

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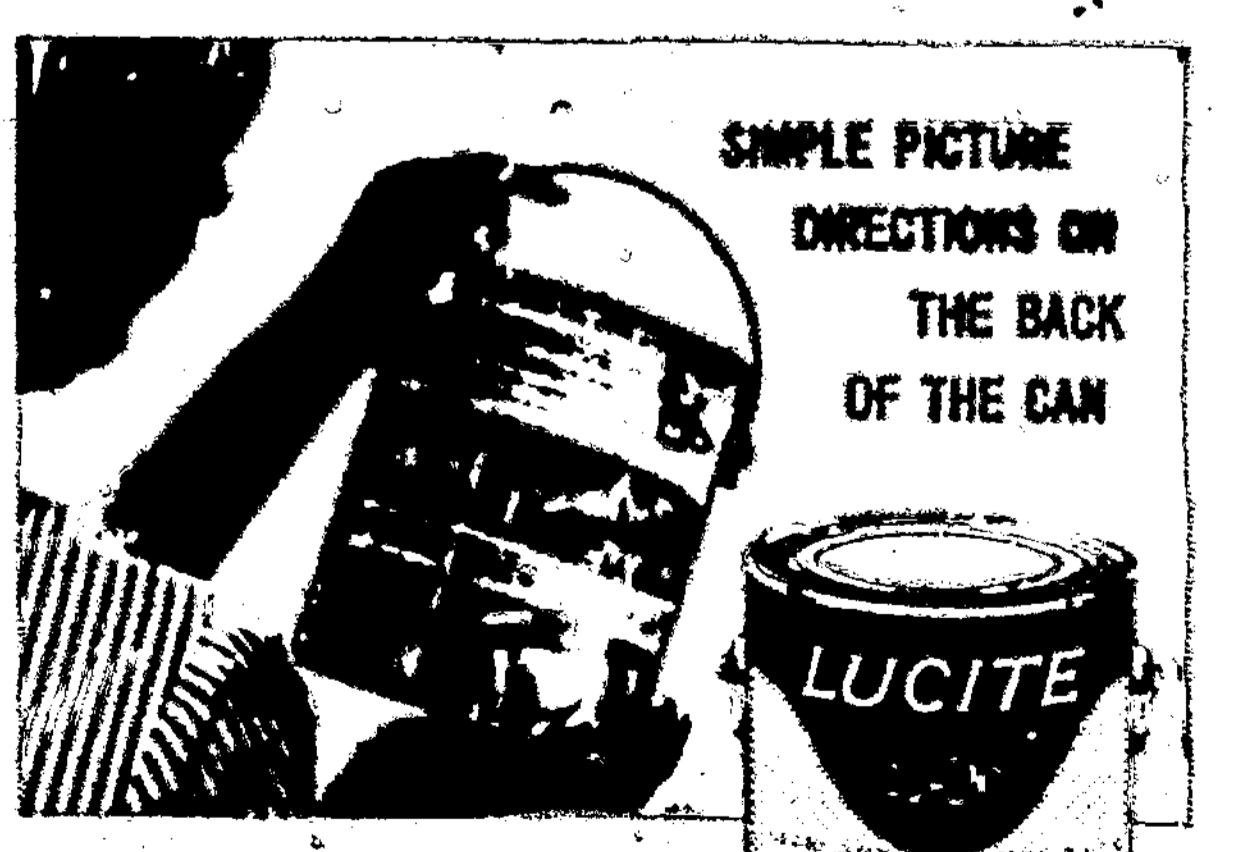
