Lackland AFB, Texas — Airman Fred B. Vega, son of Mrs. Natalia M. Vega of Carrizozo, has completed his initial course of Air Force basic military training here. He has been selected to attend the technical training course for Morse Intercept Operator, at Keeler AFB, Mississippi. Airman Vega is a graduate of Carrizozo High School. Basic airman at Lackland are selected for specialized training at technical schools on the basis of their interests and aptitudes. They are reassigned to the school after five weeks of basic training. At the technical schools they are given additional military training, along with technical instructions. Upon completion of special technical training at an Air Force Technical Training Center, airman are assigned to operational units of the USAF Aerospace Force.

Relative of Wm. Bonney supports move to re-inter remains of "The Kid" in Lincoln County Park

The Friends of Billy the Kid organization in Lincoln County received a tremendous assist this week in a promise of support for their objectives by the only known living relative of William H. Bonney. She is Miss Lois H. Telfor of 378 West End Ave., New York, N. Y. Miss Telfor wrote that she would help in any way she could to achieve the goal of the Friends of Billy the Kid—to re-inter his body in a proper shrine at Lincoln, New Mexico.

Miss Telfor wrote Noster that she had received copies of the Lincoln County News of April 14 from several interested parties. "As a blood relative of Wm. H. Bonney (Billy the Kid), both being in direct descent from Thomas Bonney who came to America in 1634," she wrote, "may I offer my assistance to your request to have Billy's remains re-interred in Lincoln County."

Miss Telfor wrote that she will be in El Paso about May 25 at the Hilton; also in Las Cruces and Lincoln on Memorial Day. She added that two prominent Americans, Alan H. Rhodes, son of Eugene Manlove Rhodes, and Mrs. Rosalio Rader, great-granddaughter of Col. Albert J. Fountain, formerly of Mesilla, but now living in New York City, had offered their assistance to Miss Telfor in any way to help the movement to re-inter the Kid's remains at Old Lincolntown, where he was the leading participant in the Lincoln County War. "Many other wonderful people agreed on this," Miss Telfor concluded in her letter to the county commissioner, "and if there is any way I can be of help to you, do let me know."

GOES DEBACA COUNTY WILL GO TO COURT IF NECESSARY

An Associated Press dispatch quotes State Sen. M. P. Carr of DeBaca County as saying that his county will fight any attempt to move the body of New Mexico's famed Billy the Kid to Lincoln County. "If they start something like that we will take it to court," Carr was quoted as saying. "I don't blame them for trying, but we can't look at it that way." He said that DeBaca County intended to see that the body of Billy the Kid remained in DeBaca County.

"FRIENDS OF KID" HAD ASKED MISS TELFOR'S HELP

Before Miss Telfor's sympathetic stand in the matter became known, "The Friends of Billy the Kid" had written Miss Telfor, asking her assistance. The letter, signed by Joe O. Sargent of Carrizozo and Lloyd Davis of Ruidoso, follows: "Dear Miss Telfor: "A group of people in Lincoln County have been considering the feasibility of re-intering the remains of Billy the Kid at Lincoln, which we consider his rightful resting place. Enclosed you will find a copy of a letter to that effect written by the chairman of the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners to the board of DeBaca County Commissioners. Their answer to this request is "No."

"Since this action has been taken, we have learned that you are his only known living relative. We respectfully seek your permission in accomplishing this aim, or perhaps your direct assistance, if needed. "As you know, Lincoln County is one of the most historical sections of the Southwest, and Billy the Kid, without doubt, is the most famous personality that ever plucked the West. There are many people living in Lincoln County yet who know of "The Kid," and the general feeling about him is more sympathetic than that of even Mr. Garrett. Therefore, we think that he should be re-interred at Lincoln. "All expenses of this procedure will be paid by those of us who are interested in this project. Also, if this aim is accomplished, we have plans to create a park in Old Lincoln, memorializing the Lincoln County War, of which Billy was the principal participant, and his shrine would be a part thereof, according to your wishes. "We anxiously await your reply (Signed.)"

W. F. Ball is proprietor of the restaurant and Frank Phillips is the lessee. He has been in the restaurant business for about twelve years, including New York and Miami.

An elaborate neon sign, costing in excess of \$2,000, is being erected on ground in front of the restaurant. The sign will be visible from four directions at the intersection.

The eating establishment, which represents an investment of approximately \$50,000, will have a lunch counter and booths in the main dining room, with a separate banquet room seating 32.

All fixtures and the kitchen equipment are of the latest design. Mr. Phillips is married. The couple have two sons, John 18 and Gordon 17. Both are attending school in Lubbock.

Highway Dep't. offers to build 3 picnic areas

The New Mexico State Highway Department has offered to build picnic tables at three different locations on highways entering Carrizozo.

One park would be located on Highway 54, two miles north of town; another on Highway 54, two miles south of town and the third on Highway 389, two miles east of Carrizozo.

Mountains hit by forest fires

Several forest fires were reported in the mountains early this week, with the largest one being on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation near the Summit.

Six hundred acres were covered by the fire which had 150 men with fire bulldozers and five pumps fighting it when it was contained Monday, according to a call from the Indian Agency to the local Forest Service office. The fire had jumped U. S. 70 in the vicinity of Apache Summit.

W. E. Mouser, reservation forester, was in charge of the fire-fighting. No houses or personal property was damaged, although the blaze came within approximately 500 yards of Apache Summit.

The source of the fire was not known. One fire on the Lincoln National Forest, caused by a tree falling on a power line and breaking it, was contained almost immediately by the eight men dispatched to the scene. Only one-quarter of an acre was burned.

Latest fire by press time was reported about noon Tuesday as being near Cherry Springs by Hornbuckle Hill. It was contained immediately. Forest officials ask the cooperation of the public in using care when smoking or using fire, as the area has received only one-third the usual moisture.

Capitan services for Clarence E. Gehring

Funeral services were held Monday, April 24, in the Nazarene Church at Capitan for Clarence E. Gehring, 40, of Capitan.

Mr. Gehring died early Sunday morning in the Ruidoso Hospital after a short illness.

The deceased was born in Dexter and came to Capitan while very young. He lived there until time of death. He was a mechanic by trade.

The funeral was under the direction of the Hampton-Holland Funeral Home.

Services in Las Cruces for Matthew J. Price

Town Clerk Edward Penfield attended funeral services for Matthew J. Price, held Wednesday in Las Cruces.

Funeral services were held Wednesday, April 26, at 11 a.m., for Matthew J. Price, Fort Stanton postmaster, who died Monday in the Las Cruces hospital. He had been ill for some time, a victim of cancer.

Services were at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Las Cruces, with the Rev. Bancroft Smith of Las Cruces and the Rev. William Brown of Fort Stanton officiating. The remains were taken to Albuquerque for cremation.

He is survived by his widow, Zoe, of Fort Stanton. Matthew Price was born in Chicago and came to New Mexico about 1925 to go into business in Las Cruces. He came to Fort Stanton about 1934 and was employed in the post office. Later he was appointed postmaster.

Mr. Price had a distinguished record of service with the Red Cross in World War I, during which he served in Belgium, Holland and other countries.

Mrs. Montoya dies in Tularosa at age 86

An 84-year resident of Tularosa, Mrs. Basilia Dtran Montoya, died Monday at the age of 86. She was born June 14, 1874, in La Asencion, Mexico.

Know Your Law

RIGHT TO BAIL

You have read in your newspaper that "bail was set for such and such a person at \$10,000," and you may have wondered how bail was determined.
First of all, the right to bail in most criminal cases is guaranteed by the constitution of the State of New Mexico. For instance, Article II, Section 13 reads that "all persons shall be bailable by sufficient sureties, except for capital offenses when the proof is evident, or the presumption great."
And, there is a good reason for the principle of bail. The reason is that in these United States, a defendant in a criminal action is presumed to be innocent until his guilt is established beyond a reasonable doubt. That guilt or innocence is established at his trial—not when he is arrested.

In some countries, when a person is arrested, he is presumed to be guilty until he proves himself innocent, but that's not the case in this country.
It is up to the judge to fix the bail at a sum which will make sure that the accused appears at his trial. However, the amount of bail cannot be excessive, but must be reasonable in the light of the particular case. Obviously, the larger the amount, the less likely is the defendant to slip out on the court.

It is an old system and a pretty good one. It permits the accused to prepare his defense properly. He can help gather evidence, secure witnesses, work with his attorney. In some instances, that help has made the difference in the outcome of the case.

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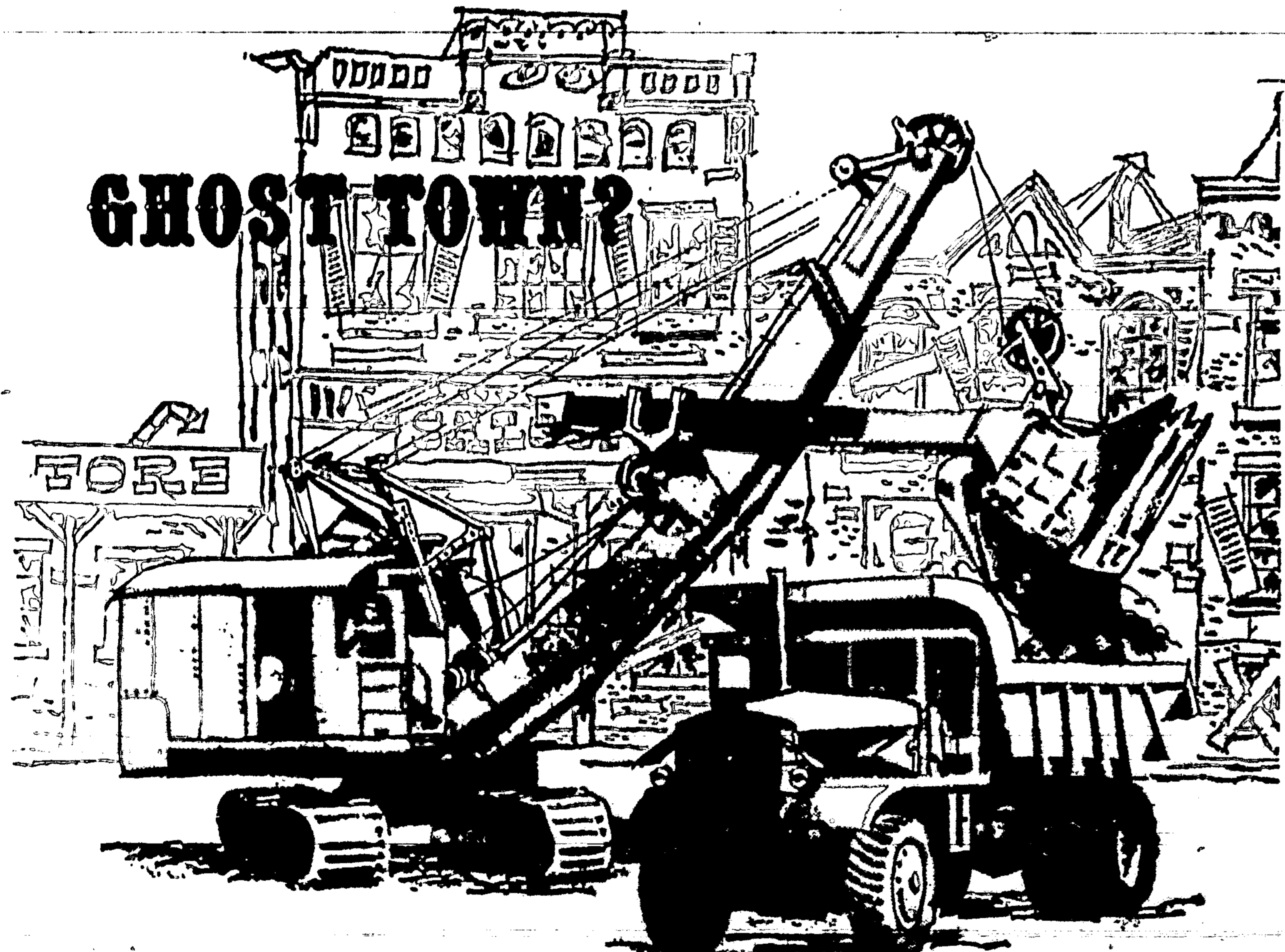
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New ideas, methods maintain payrolls

Ghost towns are not strangers to New Mexico. One can see remnants of them in many sections of the state. When modern copper mining was begun in the Santa Rita district in 1910, life of the Chino mine was estimated at 28 years.
The ore averaged 2.57% copper on reserves of about 19,000,000 tons. Near the end of the 28-year period, the copper content of the ore had dropped to 1.13%. In spite of this, approximately \$9,000,000 was allocated to rebuild and enlarge the property.

During this same time, many mines have been forced to close and ghost towns have sprung up. The mines closed, not necessarily because the ore played out, but because they were unable to produce successfully in the face of ever-increasing costs.

Sending regrets were Filo Sedillo of Valencia and Ernesto Peralta of Socorro.

Eloy Gonzalez of Torrance, the sheriff who had just been named chairman succeeding Elzie Brown, didn't make it either.

SET TRAPS FOR REPUBS

The group, meeting with Fred Standley, assistant Demo state chairman, made preparations to exploit the anticipated reduction of welfare payments.

The legislature left the welfare department with less than the money considered necessary for the next two years.

Welfare Director Murray Hinz, before he was replaced, said that a reduction will be necessary in payments to the old and for de-

pendent children.

REPUBLICANS PAY FOR DEMO ACTS

The legislature's cuts of the welfare money and also the reduction of the amount that the tax collecting bureau of revenue may spend were high level political moves.

Even though the Democratic legislature cut the money for the welfare program the Republicans who administer the program stand to suffer the blame.

It is the same with the bureau of revenue. The Demo legislature reduced the size of the operation but the Republicans will shoulder the blame if the money doesn't come in for the schools, roads, police, and other agencies.

LITTLE PEOPLE LOSING JOBS

The state public service commission has fired Mrs. Mike Pollock, \$305 a month, whose husband is on the education department payroll at \$600. . . . Land Commissioner Johnny Walker fired Dick Tager, Clovis, eight-year payroller at \$300. . . . The state highway department has let out Bob Stephens, \$400 a month investigator for the legal division who came to fame as representative of the liquor business before the legislature. . . .

The motor vehicle division has let out Andy Chitwood, \$635 a month former Demo legislator from Clovis in charge of setting up the truck license fees for trucks in interstate service, and shifted the job to Grace McAfee Evans, recently secretary of Lt. Gov. Tom Bolack, and earlier a prominent Democratic figure in the administration of Gov. John S. Simms. . . . The highwayers fired Gilbert Martinez, an old time Demo politician, and Cecilia Baca, who had been secretary for Ruben Miera, Demo chairman of Sandoval county, the office of the secretary of state and the bureau of revenue. All the latter is part of the Republican eradication of Demos.

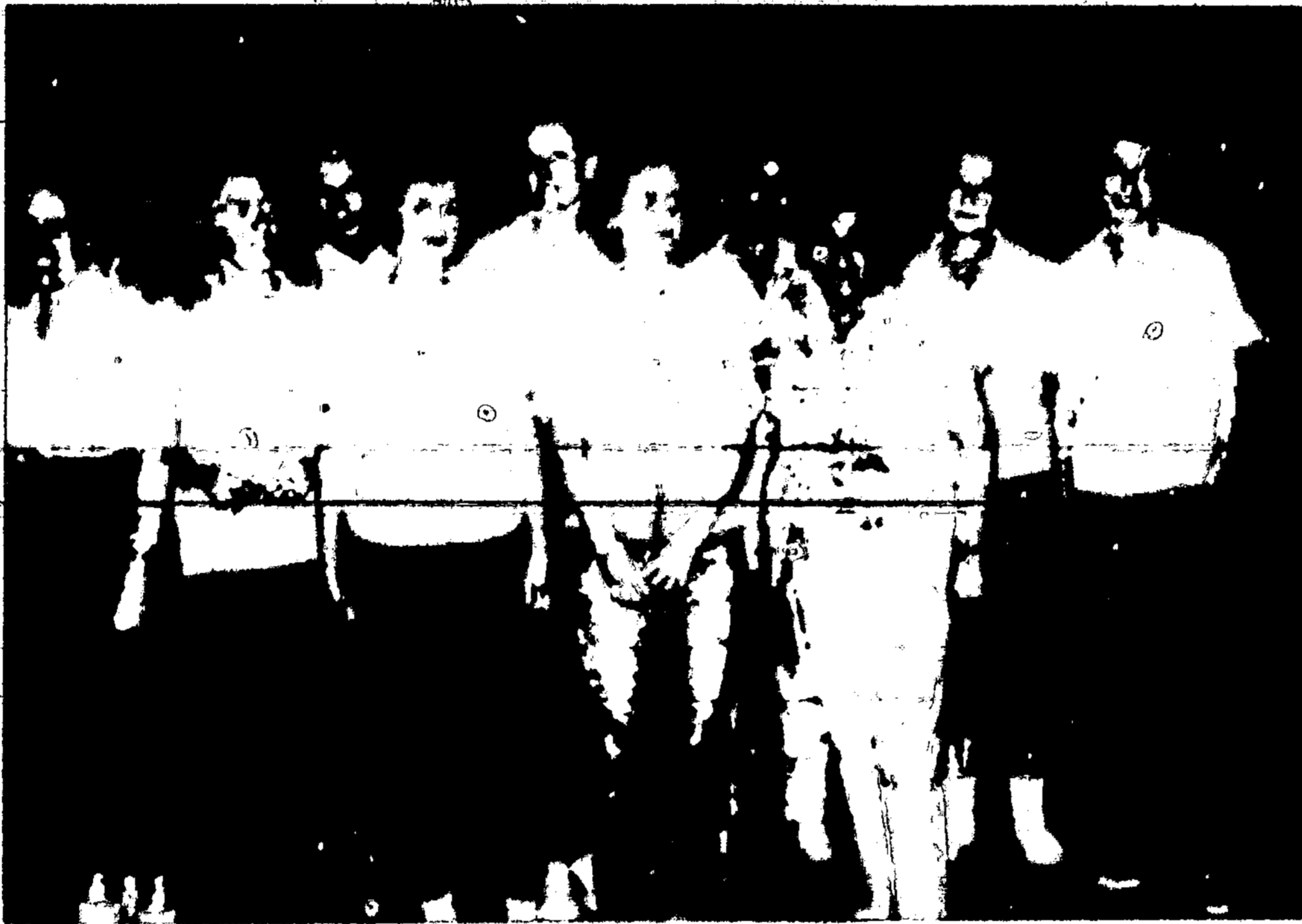

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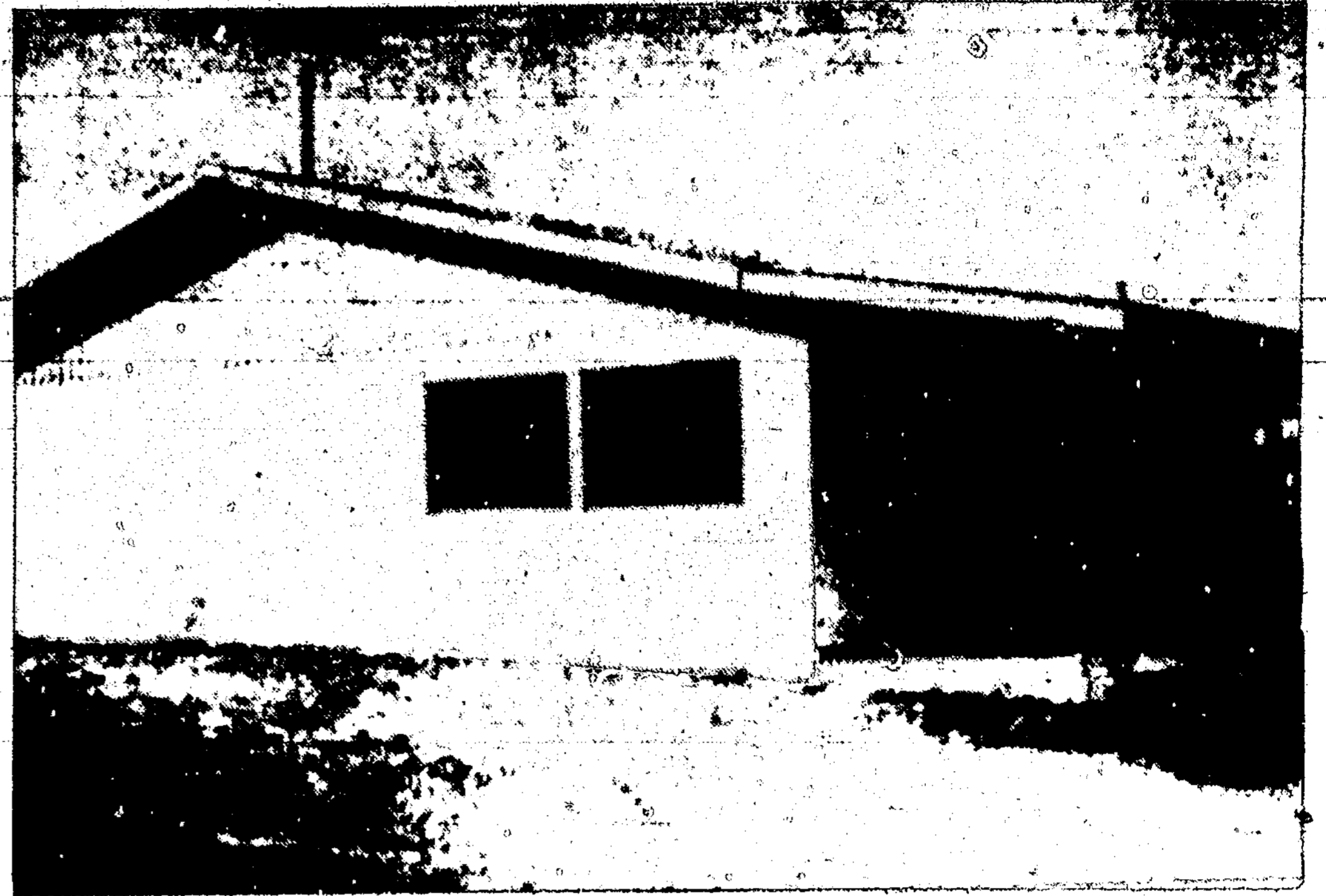

Proper Range Use

By HOWARD HARKEY Soil Conservationist

About this time of the year is the best time to evaluate the degree of use of range land during the past grazing season. An inventory of forage left on the ground in the spring is valuable because the next grazing season is just starting. That part of last season's growth not used should be observed to determine if soil protection is adequate.

For effective management of range resources a fence survey at least twice a year is necessary. An inspection in the fall will indicate how much forage will be available until the next grazing season. Adjustment of stocking rates is convenient at this time. A survey in the spring reveals if management is adequate and effective.

The appearance of rangeland properly used at the end of the grazing season will be rough with little ground showing. Over-used land will have a smooth, mowed appearance. Use should be judged on a key species such as blue grama or galletta in this area. Generally if not more than half of a season's growth by weight is removed by grazing, plants will maintain their vigor and provide soil protection. Some species should be used less than half and plants already in low vigor should be lightly used.

Adequate cover on the ground is essential in the spring. Without good cover the winter moisture is lost and early plant growth is hampered along with blowing and scouring of the soil. Continued close grazing of grass plants results in shallow root systems and weak plants which cannot compete with undesirable vegetation.

Proper use of range land is the least expensive and most effective soil conservation practice available. Other practices such as water development, fences, brush control, deferred grazing, etc., should be used to obtain better management and proper range use but will not by themselves provide adequate protection of the land.
