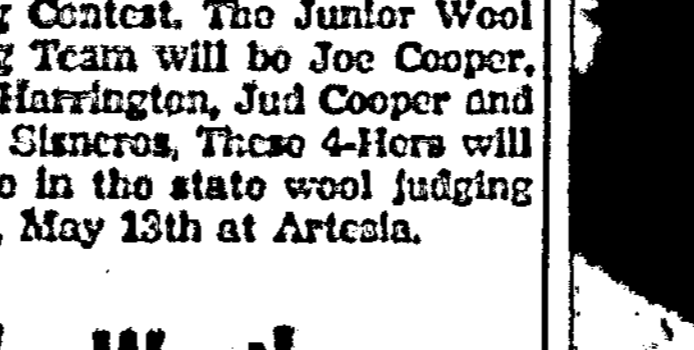

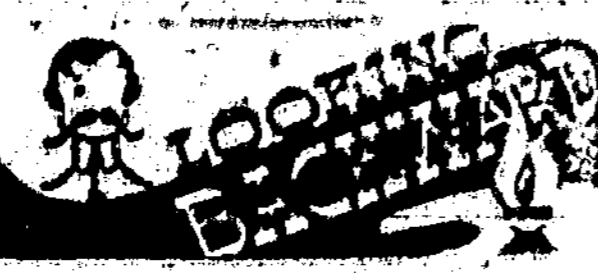
### Newlyweds honored by welcome home luncheon

### Know Your Law

(Published as a public service by the State Bar of New Mexico)

#### YOU BUY ON TIME

You buy on time. But, do you know just what is the effect of signing a contract?

Usually when goods are bought on time, they are purchased under conditional sales contract. The law holds that under such a contract the seller of the goods remains the owner. He retains what is known as "title" to the merchandise. It's true that the buyer gets possession and uses them, but the seller still is the owner.

The principal misunderstanding among us is that some believe the goods can be returned by the buyer whenever he wishes, and the debt is legally cancelled. This is not true. Sometimes the seller will back his merchandise and cancel the debt, but he is not required to do so.

When a buyer signs a conditional sales contract he agrees to pay for whatever he buys. If he falls, there are provisions under the New Mexico law for selling the goods at public auction and holding the one who signed the contract liable for the difference between that which is due on the contract and the amount brought at the public auction.

You may expect to pay those contracts you sign.

Many of the rocks, shaped centuries ago, have fallen in some past year.

## THE SPIRIT OF AMERICA

### "The Vanishing American"

Our founding fathers were men of principle; men who based their decisions not on what was politically expedient, but on what was right. They were dedicated to a new concept of citizenship—"Freedom of the individual from domination by government." This philosophy can be summed up in the phrase: The American Way of Life. This unique way of life has given us the highest standard of living that mankind has ever known.

It behooves each American to understand the importance of history. History is not merely "past politics." In its broadest sense, it is the whole record of human experience; all that has ever been thought and said and done. It recalls the past and includes economic and political data.

We must study history if we wish to understand the present and plan for the future. History serves to explain the present and how things came about. History does not repeat itself (in precise detail), but the present is a result of the past, and without the knowledge of the past, it would be most difficult to interpret the present and plan for the future.

History reveals that we have received a priceless heritage. It took three centuries to create this continent; and as a result of the rebirth of civilization from time to time, we have produced a "unique nation under a unique government, headed by a unique people."

The pioneer's sterling character traits were so vital and necessary in building a nation "under God."

They were men of strong determination. Their concept of "rugged individualism" enabled them to carve a nation out of a wilderness. The pioneers resented any interference by government or society. They rebelled at the thought of a collectivized society or the "thought-control" process.

As we review the past, we are made aware of the fact that American stands as a symbol of individualism and personal responsibility. But what about the present? Have we witnessed a decline in the realms of personal responsibility? Have we reached the conclusion that "George ought to do it"? Are we adjusting to the world tensions to the point that we feel that it no longer disturbs us? Are we concerned about the high rate of crime and divorces in this country? Or have you reached a point where you are able to say, "What will be, will be. There isn't anything anybody can do."

Survival depends upon the willingness of Americans to assume personal responsibility in building a better home, a stronger community, and a nation dedicated to leading the free world. Maybe the "vanishing American" can reappear in the form of a "modern pioneer"—a pioneer devoted to the cause of freedom. Someone has said "the road to freedom is paved with disappointment, suffering, wounds of battle, desperate struggle, and ceaseless search for truth."

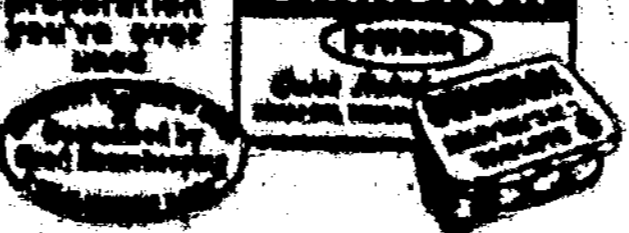

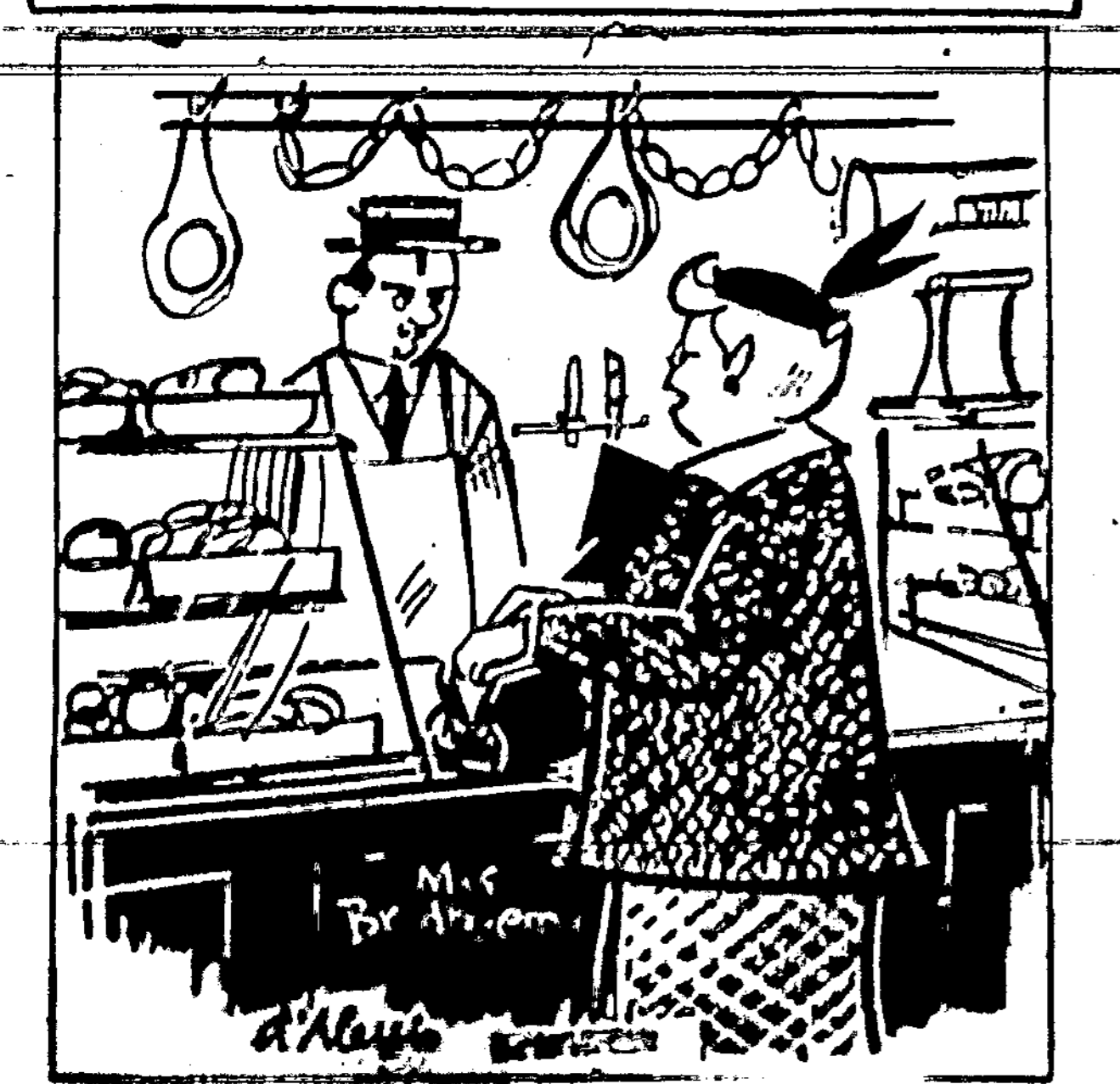
