De Baca County asks why now?

The letter from Robert J. Colter, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners of De Baca County, to the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, follows:

"Your letter of April 11 regarding Billy the Kid has been read and carefully considered. Our first thought was that your interest in your late citizen is somewhat delayed. After all, Billy the Kid was shot in 1881; now, after 80 years, you become concerned about him. Some deliberation is in order before a public body, such as the County Commissioners, can take any action, but to wait 80 years ...

"Your letter also manifests concern about 'exploitation' of Billy the Kid for monetary purposes. We certainly deplore any such mercenary approach to our history. Lincoln County has been able and successful in preventing commercial exploitation of its history; we would be very glad to learn the methods used by you in preventing such sordid practices.

"History records that Billy the Kid was shot here—while saved Lincoln County the trouble and expense of trying and hanging him. Surely this favors the part of De Baca County that demands that his body be exhumed and sent back to Lincoln County. For shame, after offering the body of William H. Bonney refuge here for 80 years, we are not about to surrender it to his 'Friends and Relatives' who have waited this long time to come forward and identify themselves.

"In brief, gentlemen, your request is denied; and any other outlaws or criminals from your county who would seek refuge here can take warning from the fate of William H. Bonney, alias Billy the Kid."

Historian interested in uncovering facts

The News has received a letter from William V. Morrison, writer and historian of El Paso, requesting that interested parties meet with him for a full discussion on issues raised by the request of Lincoln County for the re-interment of Billy the Kid in a Memorial park to the Lincoln County War in El Paso, N. M.

Mr. Morrison reminds that the problems are numerous and that he attempted several years ago to resolve for all time conflicting stories of the death and burial of Billy the Kid.

"It was our intention," he wrote, "to exhume the three (Bonney, Bonney and O'Fallon) and obtain anthropological reports to determine, if any, actually represented the cadaver of Kid. Also, we hoped to obtain ballistic reports in case of Kid to determine whether pistol-fired the fatal shot to accomplish the act."

Lincoln County argues facts

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners, stung by the curt letter and refusal of a request that they considered reasonable and fair, on May 8, again wrote the Board of Commissioners of De Baca, asking them to reconsider "or we shall be forced to take more positive action."

The latest letter from the Commissioners of Lincoln County to the Commissioners of De Baca County follows:

"The attitude you people have displayed concerning the re-interment of 'Billy the Kid' is a little disappointing to us, in as much as you refer to him as a criminal and an outlaw. You seem to have some monetary reason for wanting him to remain in De Baca County; certainly there is evidence of no other motive, judging by the type of highway advertising, as well as the condition of his grave.

"You have mentioned the time element as a factor in your refusal to exhume the body. May we remind you that in certain cases, time is the only redeeming feature. In spite of our great democratic system, history is cluttered with cases of injustice. And we in Lincoln County feel that William H. Bonney is a prime example.

"The fact that the President of the United States, through his territorial Governor, Law Wallace, offered amnesty to 'The Kid,' indicates that he had his good points. His refusal of amnesty of which 'laying down his arms' was a condition, is clearly understandable because of his fear 'that he would never see the next sun.' Perhaps you people in De Baca County can think of a better reason.

"As to your request about successful methods used by Lincoln County to have you examine one of the finest systems in New Mexico. 'You state that De Baca County saved Lincoln County the trouble and expense of hanging and burying Billy the Kid. We in Lincoln County are grateful for anything that De Baca County ever did for us and we would be happy to refund any money that De Baca was in shooting and burying our 'late citizen.' Our records show that Fort Sumner was a part of Lincoln County at that time. Could your records indicate otherwise?"

"May we also take this opportunity to place you on notice that the fate of Billy the Kid has not been entirely settled; especially in regard to his final resting place.

"This movement has reached County-wide proportions and we have found it necessary to create a special committee. The Chambers of Commerce in Carrizozo, Ruidoso and Capitan, as well as the Lincoln County Historical Society and the Lincoln County Commissioners, have appointed Joe O. Sargent to represent them. And any future correspondence you may have on the subject, please direct it to him.

"May we ask you again to reconsider our request or we shall be forced to take more positive action."

The letter was signed by Kenneth Noaker, Joe O. Sargent and Will Ed Harris, the latter two being directors of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce.

Reception planned for Kid's relative

A reception is being planned for Miss Lola Telfor of New York City when she comes to Lincoln County the latter part of this month.

Joe O. Sargent, who heads the committee of citizens seeking the re-interment of Billy the Kid in Lincoln, N. M., said this week that old-timers in the area whose age is close to the generation of Billy the Kid will be invited to the reception to meet Miss Telfor, who like Billy the Kid, is a direct descendant of Thomas Bonney.

Removal attempt made in 1925

Wilbur F. Coe of Glencoe, president of the Lincoln County Historical Society, wrote in a letter to the News this week that he favored re-interring the body of Billy the Kid in historic Lincoln Town, and "by this move great benefit will come to De Baca County, as well as Lincoln County and the entire State of New Mexico."

The letter follows:

"I have read in the Lincoln County News several articles concerning the matter of removing the last remains of Billy the Kid from the Old Military Burial Ground, near Fort Sumner, to Old Lincoln Town.

"It is true that the Kid was killed near Fort Sumner in 1881. He was buried in the Military Cemetery there because no other burial grounds were available in the vicinity at that time. The distance was too great to bury the Kid in Lincoln at that time.

"According to my father, Frank Coe, with whom Billy the Kid spent the fall and winter of 1877, in and around Lincoln, the only home Billy the Kid knew was in this area.

"Just because he was killed near Fort Sumner is no reason why some one of his relatives, or descendant of his best friend could not remove his body to his home ground—Lincoln, New Mexico.

"It is fitting that Billy the Kid should be buried along side John Tunstall and McGowan in Lincoln. Court Records show that my father, Frank Coe, was a member of the Coroners Jury when Tunstall was killed and he helped bury Tunstall in Lincoln, in the Spring of 1878.

"About 1925 my father made a special trip to Fort Sumner to see about moving Billy the Kid's body to Lincoln, where he considered it belonged. Due to expense of the operation and poor transportation facilities he was unable to carry out his plans. My father died in 1931 still believing that Billy the Kid should be buried in Lincoln.

"Since the removal of Billy the Kid's body to Lincoln is an issue at this time, I intend to exert every effort to this end. . . because I feel the same as my father did—that Billy the Kid should rest in peace in Historical Lincoln Town."

Gunmen try to break out of jail

Two young gunmen being held in the Lincoln County jail, made an attempt to escape Sunday night, but daylight came before they could complete their work and the attempted breakout was discovered.

Making the rounds Monday morning, Deputy Sheriff Leandro Vega Jr., noticed loose plaster on the floor of the men's cell. Examination revealed that the men had removed the plaster and cement holding a steel plate in position on the north side of the cell and had partially bent the steel plate loose from supporting steel rods.

Given another night of work, it is believed they would have been able to escape from their cell into the jail corridor which would have given them access to a window.

Sheriff Harry Nackerud of Worthington County, Miss., was in Carrizozo Sunday to question the youthful gunmen—Dwayne Doeden and Anthony Reeves. They are said to have admitted to two more safe cracking jobs and two additional safe holdups out of this state. A Federal detainer has been issued against them.

Sheriff Nackerud said a gang of five has been implicated in the wave of crime, including the two being held in Carrizozo and a third who had been captured in California and who was being picked up for return to Minnesota by Sheriff Nackerud. Two are still at large.

SCS to assist in tree planting at parks

The Soil Conservation Service will assist the Carrizozo Woman's Club in setting out Chinese elm saplings at the three roadside parks being planned.

These trees were selected because of their rapid growth and adaptability to this climate.

The Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce held its regular meeting on Thursday evening, May 4, at the Lincoln County Agency.

Lt. Col. Jim Snow from Stallion Site was one of the visitors and explained to the group concerning General Shinkle's invitation for a Chamber of Commerce visit to the White Sands Proving Ground.

Date for this trip will be Wednesday, May 24, with an Army bus leaving from the bank building in Carrizozo at 7 a.m. There will be accommodations for 37 members of the Chamber of Commerce and their wives and it is requested that those who wish to make the trip notify J. S. Stearns, secretary, a week in advance and give any cancellations where reservations are requested and cannot be used.

If there will be additional transportation required, Col. Snow said it would be provided. It is hoped that as many members as they wish as possible will make the trip, which will be life-enriching and worthwhile all the way.

The Chamber had a letter from the firm of Dow & Hoyt at Roswell, requesting a permit for the Highway 200/50 sign at Honda. Mechem raps Demo tax measures

Ruidoso—The state's tax structure was thrown out of kilter by the Democratic leadership of the New Mexico Legislature, Gov. Edwin L. Mecham said Saturday before a Republican leadership meeting here.

The governor lashed out at the Democrats in a strong speech. He said it was up to the Republicans to tell the people of New Mexico about the conduct of the leadership of the Democratic party.

The fighting speech was made to party leaders before a barbecue and rally at which 100 persons attended including many of the department heads in the state administration.

The two-hour meeting, which was closed, was preceded by an executive committee meeting, also closed.

The committee authorized F. P. (Tony) Llewellyn of Alamogordo to hire a paid executive secretary for the party.

The new official will aid Llewellyn in party organization.

Work starts on swimming pool

Work on Carrizozo's municipal swimming pool began Monday. According to Guy Dovenberger, engineer, prospects are good for completion of the pool prior to the 90-day period called for in the contract.

Initial work was on the foundation for the bathroom, which will have a center office, with men's and women's shower rooms on each side, with entrances from these to the pool.

Ground is expected to be cleared Monday for the pool area. It will measure 42 x 92 feet, with heating facilities and underwater lighting for night swimming. A four-foot concrete walk will surround the pool.

Construction is by G. A. and S. L. Jones of Ruidoso.

Many ask about apple crop prospects

How is the apple crop? This is one of the questions I hear most often in recent weeks, and yet it is a question that cannot quickly be answered; there are too many things that affect the apple crop.

Last week I made a survey of the orchards in the Hondo area and found several conflicting factors. Any prediction of an apple crop at the present date can only be a guess.

Generally, the Red Delicious crop will be less than 50% of normal, but the Golden Delicious, Jonathan and Stamen Winesap apples still have possibilities of nearly a full crop. The Rome trees were in full bloom.

In the Limacher orchards Jonathan trees with a few apples a quarter inch in diameter also had blossoms in full bloom. The effect of the winds of recent weeks on the fruit set will not fully show up for two weeks.

Specifically, the Red Delicious crop will be short and the other varieties possibly of commercial quantities.

I have noted that orchards that have been properly cared for this year before have a tendency to bloom more and over a longer period of time.

It might be noted also that the orchards that have been fertilized for the past three years, irrigated properly and pruned each year will more often set a crop than the orchard that is "just irrigated."

Next year's fruit is formed in the buds this August; so you must plan for next year's crop now.

ROAD PAYROLL IS DOWN 33%

Santa Fe—The state highway department has cut its payroll from 2,578 last November, the election month, to a current list of 2,240. More reduction is in prospect.

The 2578 of last November was the highest figure in the history of the department. The budget was almost entirely in rural maintenance workers hired during the fall through the state.

REPUBLICANS WANT THEIR OWN LAWYER

Republicans who had a statewide war party at Ruidoso last week in preparation for next year's battles and have another big one slated May 27 at the \$100-a-plate dinner in Albuquerque, want to elect an attorney general to add to the governor and lieutenant governor offices now held by the party.

The four-time Gov.-Ed Mecham has many times complained of the difficulty of operating without a sympathetic lawyer. The candidate has not been revealed.

TOM BOLACK EYES GAME DEPARTMENT

Tom Bolack, the lieutenant governor who wears an elephant hair bracelet and a hunter's cowboy hat, is expected to dictate to the reorganization of the state game commission and fish department.

Bolack is reportedly displeased with the squeeze out of the trappers and woodmen of the game department and the rise of the college trained biologists.

The game commission is operating with all five members on identical five-year terms when the law says one term shall expire each year.

There are four Democrats and one Republican when the law says no more than three shall be of the same party.

State Sen. Buddy Wamel of Hidalgo is a member contrary to an attorney general's ruling that legislators are not eligible for such places.

The situation offers a wide range of activity for Bolack if he gets the assignment.

MECHEM RETAINS JUDGE ON BOARD

Gov. Ed Mecham in his address to the legislature last January expressed disfavor for legislators and judges on state boards and commissions.

As this was written several legislators continued on boards under the governor but it might be that he hasn't gotten around to making changes.

One big important board that has been reorganized, however, is that of the public welfare department and District Judge Fred Fiedler of Raton continues a member.

PICK LABOR LAWYERS FOR DEMO POST

The Republican governor's penchant for Democrats loomed big the other day as he chose Gordon Shermack of Santa Fe, a Demo candidate for attorney general last year, for state labor commissioner, \$10,200.

Shermack, brother-in-law of 'Demo District Judge George Reese of Carlsbad, took a place beside Mrs. Grace McAfee Evans among the Demos getting important places in the Republican administration.

Mrs. Evans was secretary to Seven Foot Pickett the Corporation Commissioner, personal officer under Gov. John Simms, chief of the Democratic senate, before coming up to the capitol this year as secretary to Lt. Gov. Tom Bolack and as now an officer in the motor vehicle department at \$700 a month.

FOUR YEAR TERM SLOWS POLITICOS

The fact of the four-year term for state and county officials being offered as a constitutional amendment Sept. 19 is of major importance to State Secretary Betty Florina and State Treasurer Joe Callaway.

Both must get out at the end of next year, conclusion of their second two-year terms, unless the four-year deal is approved. Then they would be eligible to run again and for four years.

The four-year proposition has slowed up politicking until after it is up for vote in September.

DEMO LINE-UP FAVORS MECHEM

State Sen. Ed Mead of Albuquerque who has been up and down longer than most anybody else in the state as a prospect for a run for Demo nomination for governor, has been hinting that he will try in 1962.

He rates more than ordinary consideration because he is from Albuquerque which contributes a quartet of the vote. While Mead hasn't had the help of the Albuquerque press he has enjoyed top-drawer support in three Albuquerque Democratic primary races.

TOWER OF OLD CHURCH AT ABO STATE MONUMENT

One of the pueblo ruins you can visit if you feel like taking a little longer route to Albuquerque is Abo State Monument off U. S. 60 shortly before you get to Mountain View.

Abo pueblo is among those that Don Juan de Onate, who colonized New Mexico, sent his captains to explore. Now, at the monument, you can see the ruins of the Piro Pueblo of Abo and of the Franciscan Mission of San Gregorio de Abo which was founded about 1629.

Like so many other pueblos, it was abandoned because of the such as Pueblo Bonito, which sits on a high mesa between 1871 and 1880.

Abo was the site of the killing of two members of Onate's party when settlers were deserting and returning to Mexico. As a result, Vicente Zaldivar led a punitive expedition against the pueblo, but the Indians had left because they had learned of the pending attack. This was about 1598-1600.

By 1622, Fray Alonso Peralta, who came with the mission supply service to New Mexico in 1609-10, wrote that Abo was among the pueblos which had been reduced to faith and obedience.

The church there, which is said to have had a good convent and choir and organ, was built in 1629 by Fray Francisco de Acevedo.

There is no formal picnic area at Abo, but there is a roadside table further on down the highway.

Ruin here are a rich red stone compared with the tan adobe colors of the northern pueblos.



5. The Farm Bureau provides a means of disseminating valuable information on farm and ranch problems and methods, as well as on many, many other subjects in a collective way, which is both less expensive and more beneficial because of the discussions that follow the giving of information by audio-visual, visual or vocal means.

6. The Farm Bureau serves as a clearing house for the various local organizations which are concerned with the agricultural community is concerned: such as the Tularosa Community Ditch Corp., the Tularosa Dairy Association, the Tularosa Pure Seed Co-op, the Tularosa Co-op Gin Association, and the committees working on sugar-beet development, and marketing agreements.

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
