Discussion at the meeting will cover the effort now being made by the Lincoln County Commissioners to reinstate the body of Billy the Kid in Old Lincoln.

Program in Tularosa on Dead Sea Scrolls

District Court

Judge W. T. Scoggin presided over a session of district court in Carrizozo Monday, May 15. In the case of State of New Mexico vs. Phillip Chavez, charged with driving without a license, a plea of nolo contendere was entered. He was placed on probation for a year and assessed \$100 court costs.

In case State of New Mexico vs. Felix Herrera, charged with violation of driver's license revocation, the defendant entered a plea of guilty and was placed on one year's probation and assessed \$100 costs. In case State of New Mexico vs. Ernest Marten, charged with forgery on one count and of escaping custody on another count, plea of guilty to both counts was entered. He was assessed \$150 costs and placed on probation for a year.

A suit for divorce has been filed, Frutoso Herrera vs. Amelita Montes Herrera. Five juveniles were processed in district court, Carrizozo, on May 8, Judge W. T. Scoggin presiding. One, from Carrizozo was charged with permitting himself to be served alcoholic beverages. He was placed on probation and assessed \$25 costs.

Another juvenile from Carrizozo was charged with failure to yield right of way and was assessed \$10 costs. Juvenile from Carrizozo was assessed \$5 for contempt of court. He was charged with loud mufflers.

A juvenile from Claunch was charged with speeding and assessed \$10. Another from Capitan was charged with operating an automobile without a license, and was charged \$10 costs.

Cape Canaveral (FHTNC)—Participating in recovery operations for Navy Commander Alan Shepard, first U. S. astronaut, was the aircraft carrier USS Lake Champlain. Serving aboard the carrier was Lee H. Ward, boilerman 3/c, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Ward of Ruidoso. The Navy recovery force, composed of both surface and air units, was deployed down the flight path from Cape Canaveral and was prepared to recover the spacecraft wherever it landed. Actual recovery was made by a Marine helicopter which lifted Ch. Shepard out of the water in less than five minutes and transported him to the deck of the aircraft carrier USS Lake Champlain, flagship of the down range recovery force.

In 1925 she campaigned successfully for the county school superintendency and served in that capacity from 1925 to 1928. During that time she was instrumental in starting a high school at Picacho. Also during that time she met and was married to Peter Johnson.

In 1929 Mrs. Johnson started teaching in the grade school at Carrizozo. She taught in the old grade school building, which stood behind the present high school. She taught there until 1933 when she quit teaching to be at home with her baby girl—Emily Ann.

In 1942 she then resumed her teaching career by completing a year's work at White Oaks when the regular teacher became ill. In 1943 she became a part-time secretary in the superintendent's office in Carrizozo where she also did substitute teaching. As the years passed, and the school grew larger, her secretarial work grew to full time work which she continued until the spring of 1951.

Mrs. Johnson has become affectionately known by the school children, faculty, and community as just plain "Mary", and her calm and friendly manner is an inspiration to all who know her.

DEMOCRATS PULL MONEY MIRACLE

Santa Fe—Democrats touched off a money mystery in revealing that a \$75,000 note held by an Albuquerque bank had been paid off.

The party held only one money-raising function since existence of the note was acknowledged in a November report filed with the secretary of state. That was a \$25 March dinner that was far short of expectation.

Last week's Roswell affair, \$12.50 a plate, was for the national party organization. Assistant State Demo Chairman Fred Standley said "we had some important help" but wouldn't go further when asked how the money was raised.

NEEDED \$53,000 TO CLEAR NOTE

The Demos' election spending report to the secretary of state listed the \$75,000 note and also cash of some \$22,000. It indicated that some \$53,000 had been raised since the November report was filed.

The note, signed by 36 well-to-do Democrats, was too hot to leave alone. It's against the law for banks to make loans for political campaigns. The law provides heavy penalties for both borrowers and bankers.

PARTY LEADERS NOT YET SURE

Major news out of the gathering of Democrats at Roswell was that they have no common choice for governor and no enthusiasm, at this time anyway, for any of those who have lined up for the top.

The windy Roswell meeting produced no favorite for Demo candidate for governor next year, but Rep. Jack Campbell of Roswell and recent Gov. John Burroughs of Portales were the most often mentioned by those interested enough to talk.

NO COMPLAINT ABOUT SEABORN

The lack of interest was not unusual for this period. The elections aren't until next year. Chairman Seaborn Collins of Lea County, who hasn't been much in evidence since the Demos lost the governor and lieutenant governor places in November, appeared to be secure although Fred Standley of Santa Fe had become the party spokesman.

NOT MUCH FAVOR FOR AMENDMENTS

There was one thing the Roswell crowd favored, defeat of the dozen constitutional amendments coming up in the Sept. 10 election. Only legislators who proposed the amendments seemed to favor them and they were kind of choosy on which were good and bad.

If the amendment for four-year terms for state officials, which would permit incumbent officers, even if they are in their second two-year term, to run again, is defeated it would open the \$10,000-a-year treasurer and secretary of state posts for new officers.

GALS ARE EAGER FOR PRIMARY RUN

The Roswell crowd heard that Nellie Floyd, Chavez county assessor, wanted to run for the female place in the government, and also Jennie Calvan of Albuquerque and Carlada.

Earlier, Betty Deak, a long-timer in the statehouse, had said that she would be a candidate. Joe Darcy who has tried twice for the Demo nomination for treasurer, is regarded as a prospect for the Demo nomination for treasurer.

Burey, incidentally, has made it known that he would try for governor again only if John Burroughs is a candidate. He doesn't like Burroughs.

ANDERSON GIRLS FORECAST TROUBLE

Three of the five daughters of the late Russ Anderson predicted "bloodshed" and "serious trouble" if they lose the state land in the Russ Anderson ranch which land commissioner Johnny Walker has ordered be put up for auction.

Mrs. R. W. Duncan of Tatum, spokesman for the three who attended the Demo meeting at Roswell, said there would be bloodshed if the ranch is sold from under the heirs and added that there would be "serious trouble if any of the neighbors bid on the property."

WALKER TO SELL IN LATE SUMMER

FT. STANTON Know Your Law

WRIT OF MANDAMUS

The term "writ of mandamus" sounds like the first cousin of the duck-billed platypus, or it may until you learn that it is another way by which we maintain our liberty.

When we elect public officers to work for us we place a great deal of authority in their hands. Sometimes they fail to do their lawful duty.

One way to make a government official to do his job is to ask the court for a writ of mandamus. This is a court order—if granted, forces the public officer to do his duty. Mandamus simply means "we command" and such a writ has the weight of the law behind it. One who fails to obey the command may be removed from office or be jailed for contempt.

Suppose you applied for a permit to build a house under a city building code. You submit your plans which meet all requirements of the code, but the proper official won't give you the permit and you can't get one elsewhere. You can then ask the court for a writ of mandamus and, if you are right and the building official has no grounds for refusal, the court will order him to issue the permit.

Mandamus is a special remedy used to right wrongs by a public officer, and is not used if other legal action will solve the problem. Before the court will issue such a strong command as this, the officer must have refused to do his clear-cut legal duty. Only a citizen personally involved in the matter or a public official seeking action from another public official can use this remedy.

Clara and Otho Low from Capitan were out driving through the Bonito country Sunday.

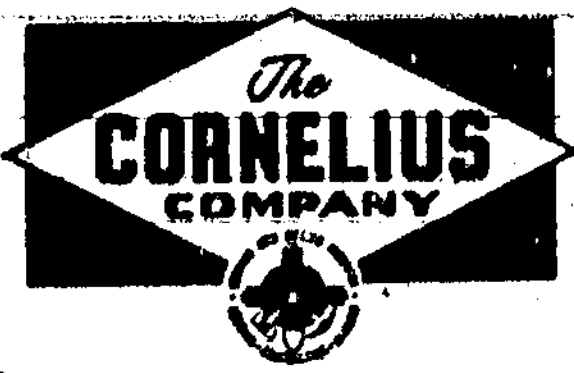
Shortie Scroggins was visiting Herman Philpott in Kraut Canyon on Sunday.

School bus was utility vehicle in former days

When Uncle Bill Copeland carried school children from Alfo to Capitan, at the same time he carried the mail between the two towns and also did other jobs. He brought welfare supplies to families, hauled wood and feed for livestock.

His school bus had been hand-made and on Saturdays he took out the long wooden seats so he could use the bus for other duties; with Aunt Mollie always at his side.

One real muddy, snowy Saturday as the couple were coming from Capitan to Alto with the mail on Henley Hill they found Mr. and Mrs. Bob Boyce from Ruidoso stuck with a truckload of calves they had gotten at the V Ranch and were taking to Ruidoso.

Uncle Bill backed his school bus up to Bob Boyce's truck and the Uncle Bill not only took them up Henley Hill, but plowed through the mud to the top of Gavilan Hill, the calves bawling all the way. Gavilan Hill was a mean one in those days.

Recently, Edith Boyce Rigby, hearing of the 50th wedding anniversary of Aunt Mollie and Uncle Bill, wrote them a note on an anniversary card, telling them she'd never forget that deed, which to her was one of the kindest things ever done for them.

EFFORTS RECALLED

definitely establish that Pat had not killed anyone that time, as well as establishing the true identity of the man killed with testimony of a number of kin, now deceased, no action was filed against Brushy Bill Roberts.

From the recent publicity you have given the subject, it is apparent that the Chairman of the Board of Lincoln County Commissioners has established the heirship of kid from Thomas Bonney, a common ancestor of Miss Lois H. Telfer, who came to America in 1634; or that Miss Telfer can establish the fact that she is the nearest of kin of the kid. However, I hope that they have not resorted to that fraudulent full page photographic copy of the New York Times November 29, 1959.
