SCHOOL TAX COLLECTIONS HIGHER, INDICATE UPTURN

The director of the field forces of the state bureau of revenue has released the following school tax collection figures for Lincoln County. The tax collection for April, 1961, was \$14,255.91, compared to April, 1960 collections of \$10,941.91. This is an increase of \$3,314.00. The tax on business done in the county is considered a barometer of economic conditions and trade turnover.

Notice to All Parents and Guardians

Official notice is hereby given to all parents and guardians of school age children and your attention is called to the provisions of the Compulsory Attendance Law, as follows:
"Children who have passed their sixth birthday shall until they have reached their seventeenth birthday, attend public schools of the state for as many weeks as the public schools in the district in which such children reside shall be in session, except that children actually attending private or denominational school maintaining courses of instruction approved by the State Board of Education, those physically or mentally unfit or incompetent, and those residing more than three (3) miles from public schoolhouses and to whom no free public means of conveyance to and from school are furnished shall be exempt from the provisions of this act."
Attention of all parents and guardians is further directed to the provisions governing their responsibility for the attendance of school-age children under their control, as follows:
"Parents, guardians and persons having control of children subject to the provisions of this act are hereby made responsible for the public school attendance of such children, and any parent, guardian or person aforesaid who shall violate any of the provisions of this chapter (article), after any school authority shall have given public notice of the substance of the provisions of this act, upon conviction, shall be fined not less than five dollars (\$5.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100), or imprisoned in the county jail for not less than five (5) nor more than ninety (90) days, and in addition to the penalty aforesaid any parent, guardian or person having control of children subject to the provisions of this act who shall violate the provisions hereof shall be subject to the writ of mandamus issued out of the district court of the county, at the instance and in the name of county or municipal boards of education or county or city superintendents of schools, without consent of the attorney general."

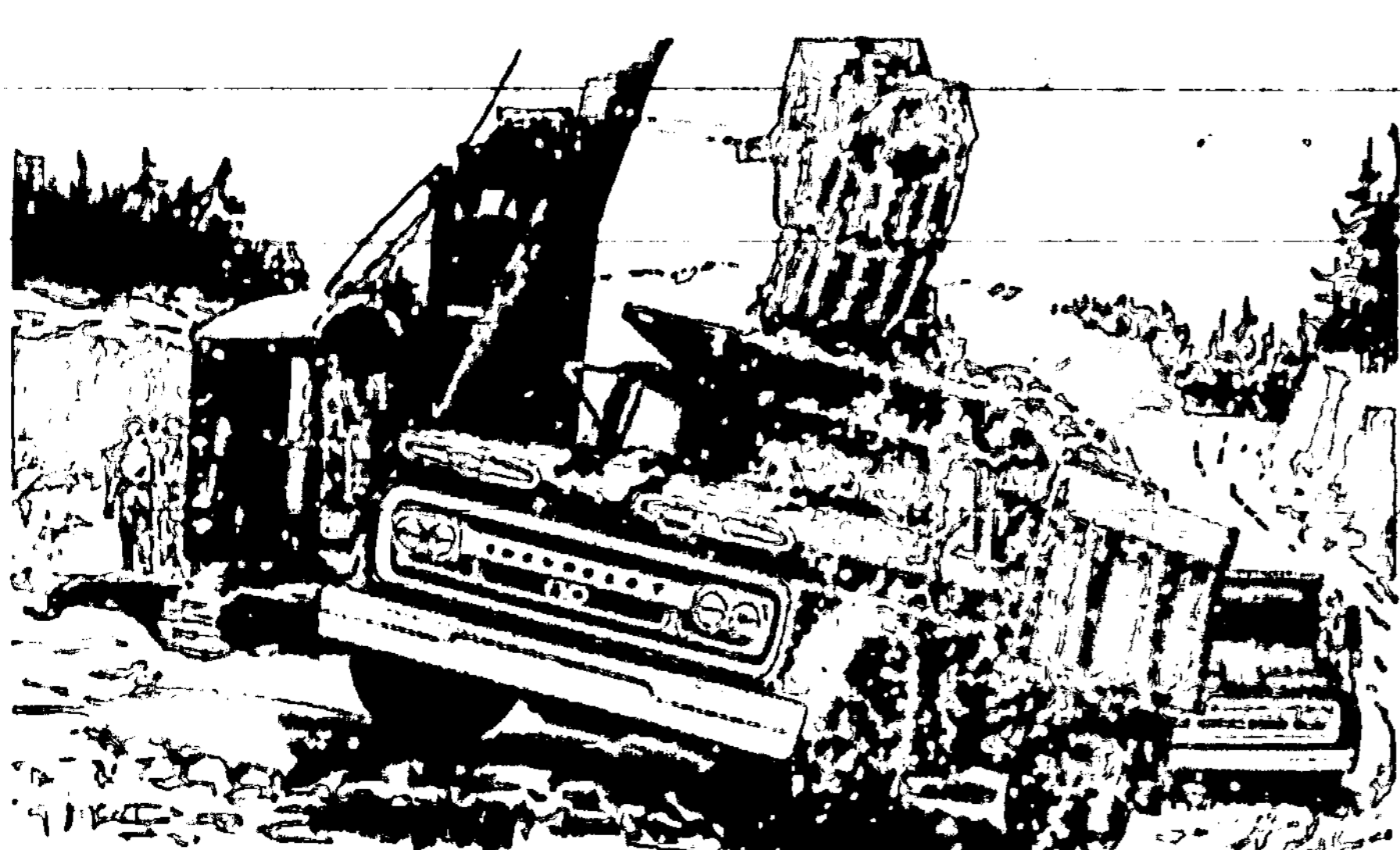
