Big game seasons set

As fall slowly comes to Lincoln County, hunters are starting to make predictions and pick their places for the up-coming big game seasons.

First to open will be bear in Lincoln National Forest, which may be hunted from September 21 to October 1 with dogs. Another season, coinciding with deer season, permits taking of bear without dogs from November 11 to November 26.

Next is the antelope season, and if you were lucky enough to draw a permit you can blaze away on October 7 and 8.

Bow hunters can search for a deer from September 30 to October 8 in some areas of Lincoln County—the Mal Pais, for instance—but not in the Capitan Mountains.

Turkey season in the county is November 11 to 26. Bag limit is one.

In the Corona area, November 11-13 for either sex; bucks only, November 14-26.

In the Capitan Mountains, either sex from November 11 to 26.

Most of the rest of the county: bucks only from November 11 to 26.

The Mal Pais and south area: bucks only, from November 11 to 26.

Record Number Of Runs At Holloman

AIR FORCE MISSILE DEVELOPMENT CENTER, Holloman Air Force Base, New Mexico — A record number of 41 sled runs was made during August 1961 on the Holloman 35,000-foot captive missile test track.

This exceeded the total for any month since the track was first built in 1949 and first extended to its present 35,000-foot length in 1957.

The 41 sled runs included many divergent types of track-testing projects such as impact testing for missile warhead systems, tests of target detecting devices, acceleration-deceleration-vibration studies for missiles and missile components, and telemetry system instrumentation checkouts.

Agencies making use of the track included the Army, Navy, National Aeronautics and Space Administration, and Government sponsored contractors.

Since January 1950 over 1,250 sled runs have been completed on this famous high-speed track, over 900 of which were accomplished since it attained its present length.

Currently the Holloman track is under the direction of Lt. Colonel Lawrence M. Bogard.

AUDITORS HERE

The Allman and Everson audit firm of Roswell were auditing the county books this week. A. F. Adams, Alamogordo auditor who handles the third judicial district, was working on the local district court's books Tuesday.

A light turnout of voters in Lincoln County (only 14 per cent of the registered voters made it to the polls) gave approval to five amendments to the state constitution Tuesday.

They turned thumbs down on another seven amendments.

The five approved amendments are: No. 3, which would let the legislature set qualifications for state mine inspectors; No. 4, to permit absentee voting; No. 5, to let JP court costs be paid from fines; No. 9, qualifications of state elective officers to be set by the legislature; No. 11, to let legislature set qualifications for JPs.

Refused were amendments that would: provide 4-year terms for state officers; let governor resubmit refused highway commission appointments to the senate; let legislature set own pay; let governor appoint corporation commissioners; annual legislative sessions; let members of legislature serve on state finance boards.

Items, shown below, are unofficial.

The state vote, not completely tabulated at presstime, indicates the state as a whole voted as did Lincoln County on the five approved amendments.

Women's club hears state president

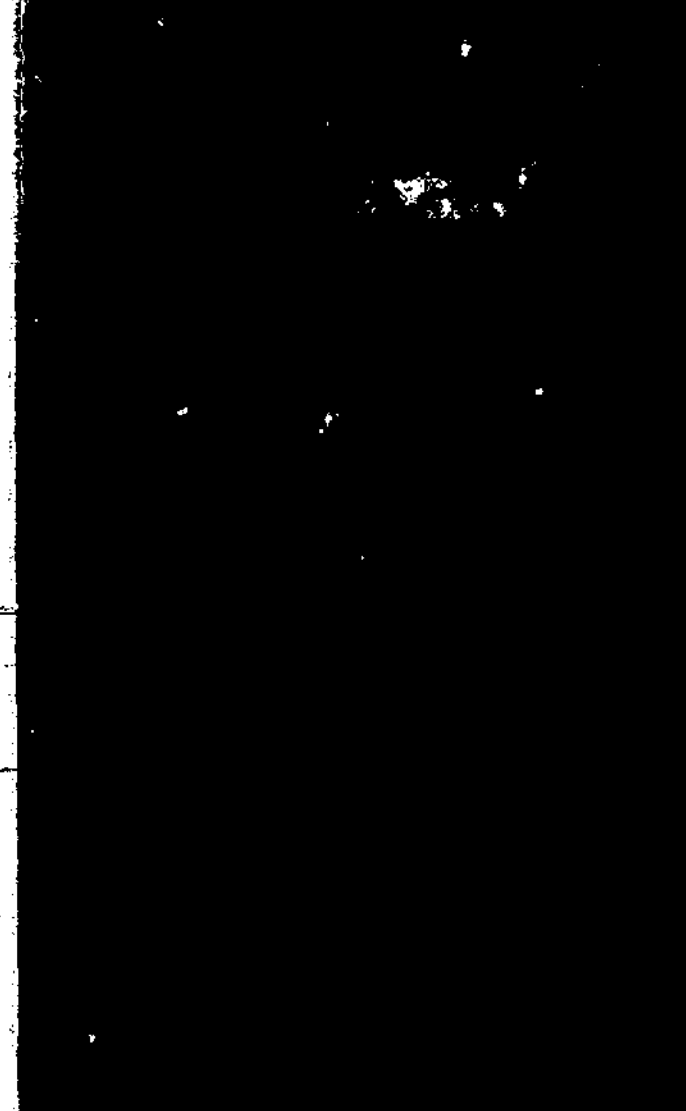
About 20 Carrizozo Women's Club members heard Mrs. J. B. Davis, president of the New Mexico federation of women's clubs, speak here September 8.

Grizzlies drop Capitan 45-18

The Carrizozo Grizzlies, defending Class C state champions, demolished the Capitan Tigers 45-18 for their second victory of the season Friday night behind the strong running power of Jerry Beltran and Bobby Dan Crenshaw.

Crenshaw played the scoring assault in the first quarter as he went around left end, was trapped, reversed his field and went 38 yards for pay dirt. Kick for extra point by Crenshaw failed. The tally climaxed a 60-yard march down the field.

Then the Tigers took the offensive only to lose the ball on downs. Again the Grizzlies took charge of the play on the opponents own 35-yard line.

On the second down Crenshaw made a 25-yard run to the Tiger's 17-yard line, to keep the drive going. On the next play Beltran scampered 17 yards and another touchdown for Carrizozo. Extra point kick by Crenshaw again failed.

Crenshaw kicked off for Carrizozo, Leo Lujan of Capitan returned the ball to his own 18 before being dropped by Beltran. Three plays later, and no gain, Capitan was forced to kick. Crenshaw fumbled the ball and Lujan recovered for the Tigers on their own 41.

On the first down Lujan carried for nine to the 50. Again Lujan carried for two and a first and 10. On the first play the pass attempt failed, but on the second Lujan eluded his defenders and went around left end for 45 yards and a score. The pass attempt, by quarterback David Silva, for the extra point failed.

Capitan kicked off and Stoneman returned the ball to his own 40-yard line before being downed by Silva. On the first down Ortiz carried for two just as the first quarter ended.

The next play saw Beltran make a splendid 52-yard run around left end and another score for the Grizzlies. Ortiz tossed to Ernest Herrera to connect for the extra point.

Lujan returned the Carrizozo kick to his own 21. Two plays later Capitan had another first and 10 on their 34-yard line. Three plays later the Tigers were forced to kick. Frank Gallegos returned the punt for 13 yards to the Grizzlies' 22. After two downs and four yards gained Crenshaw quick-kicked and Capitan took the ball over on their own 41-yard line.

The Tiger's first play saw Ortiz intercept a pass and return it to his own 30. After a 40-yard drive and then an 18-yard pass completion from Crenshaw to Ortiz

for a score was called back because of a holding penalty. On the next play Capitan was penalized 15 yards and the ball was moved to the Tiger's 20. Again on the fourth down Crenshaw tossed to Ortiz for 18 yards, ending up on Capitan's 2-yard line.

With 1 1/2 minutes remaining in the first half Capitan fumbled on the first down and Crenshaw recovered on the 3. On the first play Crenshaw found a hole in the line and scored. Kick failed.

The kickoff rolled out of the end zone and Capitan took it on the 20. The pass attempt for the first play failed. Once more the pass was used, but this time Ortiz intercepted and returned the ball to the 7-yard line. With less than one minute in the first half quarterback Ortiz called the reverse play and Stoneman went over for the score. Crenshaw threw to Stoneman for the extra point.

At the end of the first half Carrizozo led Capitan 32-12.

The final half began as Crenshaw kicked for Carrizozo. Three

downs later Capitan was forced to kick and Carrizozo took the ball on the Tiger's 44. Ten plays later and on Capitan's 7-yard line Crenshaw passed to Ortiz for another tally. Crenshaw's kick for the extra point failed.

Capitan took the kick on the 20 and marched 70 yards down the field and then Silva carried for one yard and a score for the Tigers.

Lineman Peter Aguilera received the ball on the kickoff and returned it to his own 47. Two plays later Crenshaw carried for 49 yards and another touchdown. Beltran drove for the point.

In the fourth quarter neither team could make any headway with the ball until the final four seconds of the game—when Crenshaw completed a pass to Beltran.

**"Voice of New Mexico Taxpayer"**  
blasts away at government spending

It used to be that it took one person out of five to grow the produce needed to feed the United States population.

But better farming and processing methods have over the years so cut this number that there are now fewer people working on farms than for the federal, state and local governments. In 1960 one out of 11 persons was working on a farm, and one out of eight was working for government.

Most recent comparable figures show more than eight and one-half million civilians working for some branch of the government, including those in education, as against over six million persons listed as working on farms.

According to the Tax Foundation, while attention has been focused on the large number of civilian employees in the federal government's executive branch, the number has not increased greatly in recent years.

Federal civilian employment fluctuated within a two million to 2.6 million range from October 1947 to October 1960. Meanwhile, state and local government employment climbed from about 3.8 million to more than six million.

On an annual per person basis, the cost of all government civilian payrolls climbed \$123, or from \$99 to \$222, from fiscal 1947 to 1961. The annual per person cost for all state and local payrolls grew \$99, from \$59 in fiscal 1947 to \$149 in fiscal 1961.

When you consider these figures, it's no wonder that on the average, Americans must work six days out of each working month of 22 days to meet their tax obligations, which is longer than the time needed to pay for their clothing, medical care, transportation and recreational needs combined.

After all these facts and figures, maybe you ought to end this commentary with a little story:

A Dutchman was explaining the red-white-and-blue Netherlands flag to an American.

"Our flag has a connection with our taxes," he said. "We get red when we talk about them, white when we get our tax bills, and we pay them till we're blue in the face."

"That's just how it is in the U. S. A.," said the American. "Only we see stars, too."

This meeting will be of benefit to all state land leasees. Be there. Refreshments will be served.

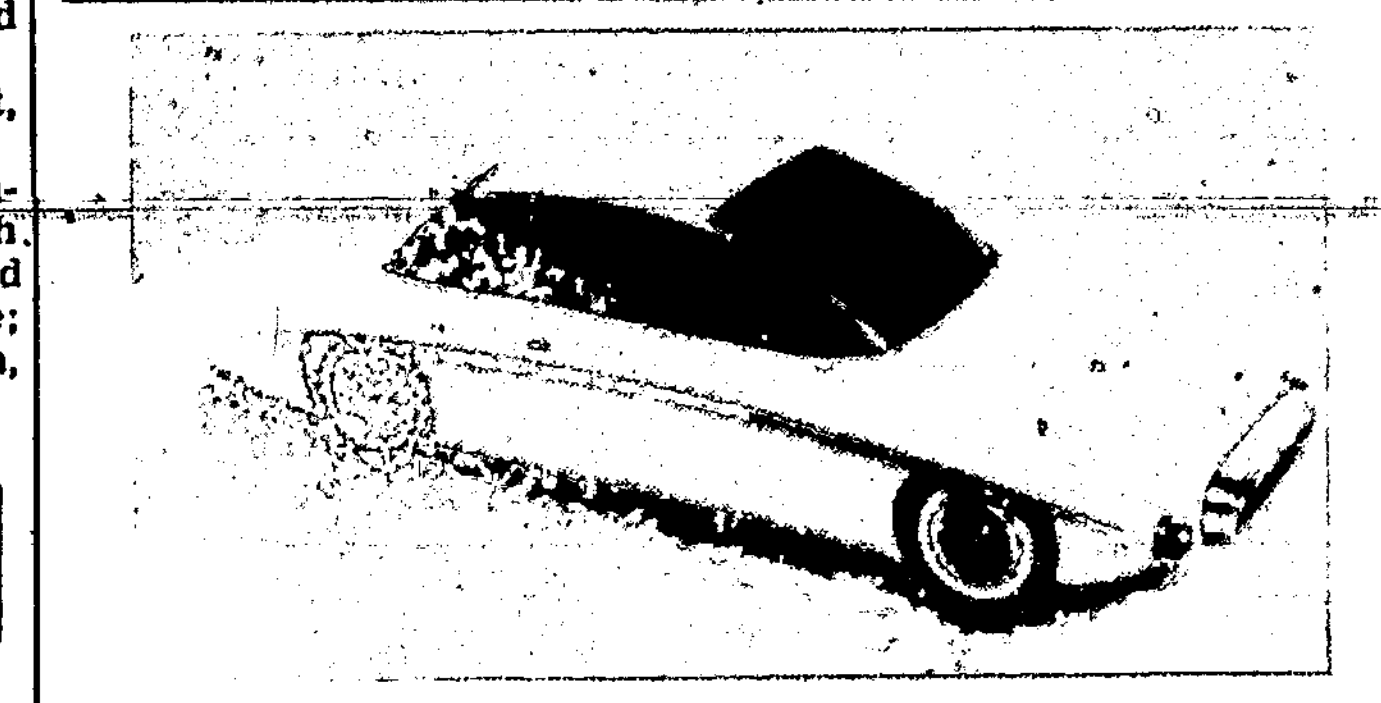


The largest farm exhibit at the New Mexico State Fair was that of the B-Square Ranch in the San Juan River valley, near Farmington, owned by Tom Bolack.

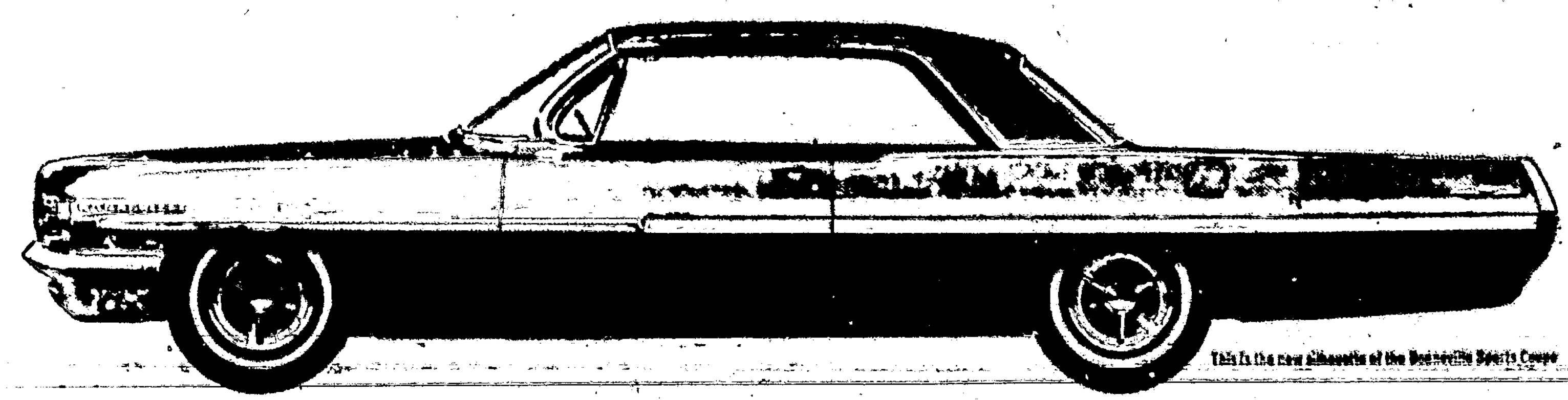

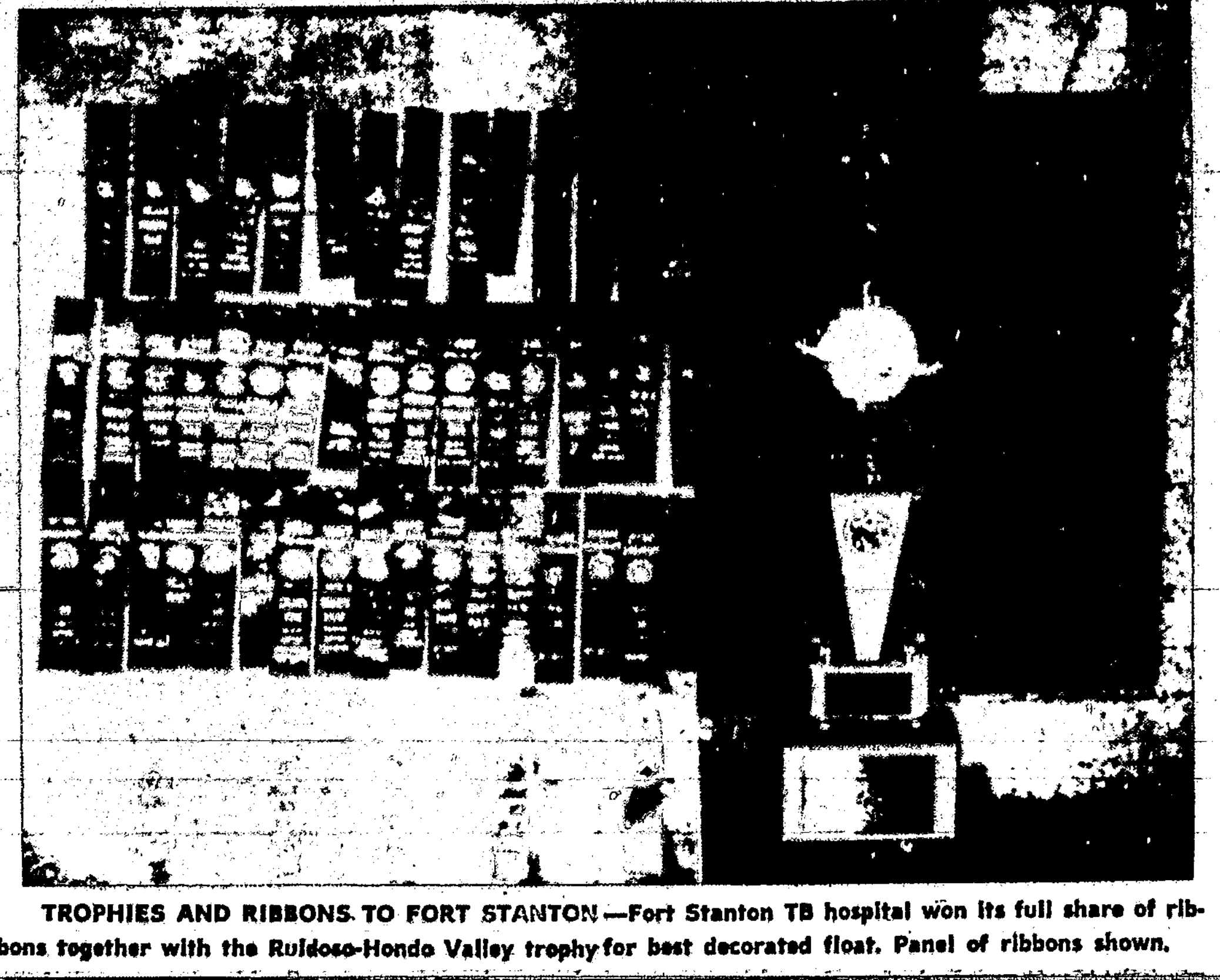

**FARM NEWS**

(Or, "You can't tell a lamb by its looks")

The lamb carcass show held in connection with the Lincoln County Fair provided a good chance to rate the carcasses on yield and quality. The show was the result of the dressing of the 23 top lambs that were sold to folks in the area. The information from this carcass show was an eye-opener.

The grand champion lamb placed fifth in all of the carcasses graded and the champion carcass was from the 17th place animal in its class. Of the three champions at the Fair not one placed among the top four carcasses, in the overall placings by Jack Ruttle, Extension lamb marketing specialist and J. R. Stauder, Extension sheep specialist.

Also, the yield varied from 41 to 69 per cent; this makes the lambs worth 16.50 and 23.60 cents a pound respectively, when the carcass is valued at 40 cents a pound. A difference of more than seven cents a pound in live value.

This is the first carcass show that I know of in New Mexico and I feel that it needs to be used more at county and state fairs, to get a more true value of the animal.

When we offered these lambs at 40 cents a pound dressed, I did not expect to use these for a carcass show. Yet while we were dressing the animals, the differ-

## New Tourist Trails Beckoning in Jordan

In the Hachemite Kingdom of Jordan particularly the West Bank (western side of the Jordan River) area is noted for its world famous sites. Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Jericho, Hebron, Nabulus and the "Dead Sea Scrolls" caves at Khirbet Qumran all add to the country's renown.

Across the Jordan is the East Bank. It too has a great number of historical attractions. The area as yet is really unspoiled territory for interested sightseers, but the recently improved Amman-Aqaba highway has opened the trails to the east. It has cut the time necessary for a trip to Petra in half, brought back areas which were once the haunts of Bedouin marauders and Frankish invaders.

Amman, the western jumping-off place of the desert highway, is today rich and busy as in its heyday as one of the proud Greco-Roman caravan cities. In its midst sits a large Roman amphitheater, and overlooking the town is the once well-fortified Acropolis, with the ruins of a magnificent temple in its courtyard. Jerash, a short drive north of Amman on a new spur road, is a real live to see place. It is one of the best preserved examples of the lush Greco-Roman civilization in the Eastern Provinces.

Twenty miles south of Amman on the new highway is the little Christian village of Madaba, with its fine old Greek Orthodox church with a 6th century mosaic floor representing the map of Biblical Palestine. Near Madaba is the ancient town of Nebo, from which Moses was shown the promised land. And, on a side road, is Qasr Mushatta—one of the finest of the 6th century Byzantine desert palaces.

Continuing south toward Aqaba the highway passes through ancient Dhiban, then climbs into the wild hills around Kerak. Here, on a high knoll, stands a sturdy old fortress whose fire signals were once seen nightly from King David's tower in Jerusalem, fifty miles away.

From here it is a short drive to Ma'an, unless travelers are attracted to make side trips to Wadi el Hasa, the site of the Nabatean temple, or Shobek, to see the Crusader castle Montsalvat, built by Baldwin I in 1115.

The traveler with Petra as his objective leaves the highway at Ma'an and takes a rougher road to Wadi Musa and the station where visitors equip for the last lap into the famous "rose-red city." Here horses or mules become necessary for transportation along the winding, twisting, colorful gorge which kept the Nabateans of Petra safe from invasion for centuries. The first magnificent rock-cut tomb of the city appears suddenly, in a burst of strong sunlight. It is but a forerunner of the splendid array of temples, palaces, churches, tombs, and the incomparable treasury to be explored in Petra. With the new highway, the round trip from Amman to Petra can, if one is pressed, be made in one day.

Continuing to Aqaba the road passes through some of the most wild and weird country imaginable, where Lawrence and his Arab troops harried the Turks. In Aqaba business is booming. But for those not on business, the town's real attraction is the warmth of its year-round sunshine, its palm-dotted beaches, its unspoiled cleanliness and beauty.

This is Jordan's East Bank. Fascinating sights are already many, and there are others yet undiscovered. The trail is open for all to follow.
