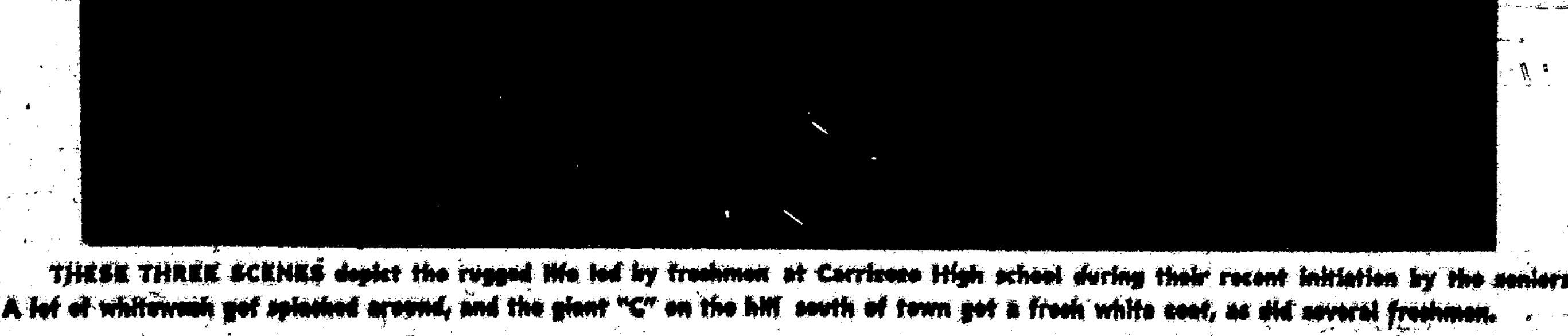

Market Report

RANGE CONDITIONS
 Continued favorable weather conditions prevail over most of the west this month. Grass has continued to grow and ripen normally. Field crops have seen one of the best years for favorable yields. There are some dry spots in the wheat areas in western Kansas, but not enough to cause any concern as yet. Feed conditions in general are shaping up to be one of the best in history.

CATTLE FIGURE
 Abundant feed prospects in the west and midwest along with a fairly steady fat cattle market have caused stocker and feeder quotations to remain steady to spots higher over most of the trade territory. Many market forecasters who earlier predicted lower prices in October on calves and yearlings are now saying prices are likely to remain strong through the balance of the season. Many cornbelt feeders are puzzled by this strong trend in view of lower fat cattle prices a year ago.
 Higher feed costs under government control and the large number of cattle in the country. Probably we have never seen cattle in stronger hands. Very few ranchers have to sell cattle under distress conditions. Some dry areas in the west moved cattle early which has spread marketing in a more orderly fashion. These factors along with a continued demand for beef by the American public have helped stabilize the entire beef industry.

YEARLINGS
 Steer yearlings look to be the best buy in the market picture. There has probably been less demand for this class of cattle all fall than any other group. These cattle go mostly to cornbelt areas and orders there have been slow up till the past two weeks. Choice steers weighing 700-750 are bringing 23½c to 24c in the west. Some fancy light weights 625-650 as high as 25c. Good to choice at 22½c to 23c. Plains kinds 21c to 22c.
 Heavier weights 750-850 scarce and bringing 22c to 23c for the best quality kinds.
 Heifers are mostly all sold at this time. Western and Plains feedlots have been very good buyers on better feeder heifers. Prices on these cattle have been very close to steers. Dotted quality kinds weighing 625-650 at 23½c to 23½c for immediate delivery. Plain heifers at 21c to 22c, not many heavier offered. 700 pounds about top weight. Quite a few of the better kinds of heifers have been held for herd replacement.

CALVES
 The calf market remains very strong. Feed and wheat prospects have helped this class of cattle tremendously, particularly the lighter weight calves.
 Choice calves under 400 pounds are bringing 23c to 24c for heifers and steers. Some fancy kinds up to 22c. Demand is very good from the wheat belt country. Heavier calves are selling better than earlier and steady to stronger prices. 400-450 pound calves in choice quality at 20c to 22c. Some 500 pound kinds at 23c to 27c. More cornbelt interest in these heavier calves at this time. It appears that the calf crop in general will find new homes without any difficulty.
 Next month will see a good percentage of the range cattle move into winter feed countries. Conditions point to a good movement and to continued firm prices at this writing.

Wall Units Newest Idea In Cooling

Families who visit model homes during this year's National Home Week will find that more and more builders are installing through-the-wall room air conditioners.
 This type of air conditioner is similar to a window unit but is installed permanently in a special mount built into the wall of a house.
 In addition to dehumidifying, cooling, circulating and filtering the air, through-the-wall room air conditioners offer other advantages:
 1. Wide choice of location. Although one may be installed below a window, practically any spot in the wall is satisfactory. Facing the unit high often is preferred because this permits a more efficient distribution of air.
 2. Quality units are designed to fit flush, or nearly flush, with inside or outside walls. They look like what they are—permanent elements of a room.
 3. They permit selective filtering. Temperature control in individual rooms because each unit is equipped with its own thermostat.
 4. Units can be removed for servicing without cutting off cooling in the rest of the house.
 A recent trend among developers is to install these room air conditioners in the installation of total scores of units in new homes. This is possible because of individual room installation of individual units.
 Many owners of small homes report that one or two through-the-wall units have cooled their entire living areas in the hottest weather.

Capitan cracks crippled Corona 12-0 in hard-fought battle last Friday

Playing under a canopy of clear cold sky, the Orange-clad Capitan Tigers backed out a hard-earned 12 to 0 victory over the Corona Cardinals Friday night.

The red-shirted Cardinals played their best game since the Melrose encounter. Showing the Orange men a hard-hitting, fast charging line, the Redbirds chewed out sharp line gains all through the game but were unable to control the ball at crucial moments.

Both teams moved splendidly during the first quarter. Capitan moving off of a T-formation and running plays off of a punt formation moved at times with incredible ease, but the hungry Redbirds contained them. The Cardinals mixed a hard-running ground game with a flurry of fancy pass patterns—they chased, the Tigers into their own territory, but a pass interception ended the threat.

The action-filled third quarter found the Capitan squad digging deep again into Cardinal territory. Capitan's hard-driving fullback, Leo Lujan, slashe off tackle for their second touchdown. This time the Tigers tried to run the extra point, but were smothered by the enraged Corona team.

The fourth quarter was all Corona's. The Redbirds put on a fine show of sharp shots up the middle and had the Capitan eleven staggering, but again Corona lost the ball in scoring territory.

Both teams played quite well. Leather popped, both teams charged into each other with vicious determination. Corona lost Rex Robinson, who suffered a painful knee injury. At one time, a ferocious Capitan tackle took Corona's dapper little quarterback, "Dittie" Lightfoot, out of the game, but he later limped back onto the field to keep the fired-up Redbirds on the move.

Capitan had a fine combination in their quarterback and their big, fast fullback. Corona's entire squad played inspired football with the Roper twins and James Alkin leading the attack.

Next week it's the rugged, smooth-running Tatum team that faces the harassed Cardinals. This is a team that could run the Redbirds clear off the field, but coaches Clark and Randolph work best

under such odds. Given another clear cold night, and the right proportions of negative ions floating around, the battered Cardinals could give the Tatum squad a few anxious moments this Friday evening.







FARM NEWS

Plan now to have your heifer calves vaccinated for brucellosis. Lifetime protection is given if the calves are vaccinated between four and 12 months of age, for beef cattle, and four to eight months for dairy cattle.
Vaccination has been added to the brucellosis eradication program, and the rancher can have his calves vaccinated at no cost to him. Either the private veterinarian or federal veterinarian can do your vaccinating for you. Or if you want to have calves vaccinated, let the county agent in Carrizozo know and I will try to help locate a vet.

Did you ever think of what you would do in case of an emergency and no food was brought into the area? According to a recent survey there is only food enough for 10 days in the local stores. You might plan to store a few extra cans of food at home in case of emergency.

The meals we eat are just one facet of our dependence on fertile soil. Others include the 10 million farm people who look to agriculture for their paychecks and the millions engaged in agri-business. These include processors, manufacturers, distributors, transporters and many others who work in industries using products from or indispensable to agriculture.

Small wonder there is concern over "the interrelation between prosperity on the farm and economic health of the city" referred to by President Kennedy. A strong healthy nation requires productive soil used, maintained and appreciated by enlightened citizens.
