Chama, Ghost Ranch Museum visit Trip of the Week suggests scenic

CHAMA, N. M. — If it's really rugged mountain scenery you're interested in, Chama is a good place to go.

Chama is nine miles below the Colorado border on U. S. Highway 84. The nearest town of any size in New Mexico is Espanola, 50 miles to the south. The Chama country is primitive, remote and beautiful.

The trip to Chama from Espanola via U. S. 84 is equally as interesting as the Chama country itself. Twenty-two miles north of Espanola you pass the hilltop village of Abiquiu, one of the oldest and least-changed settlements in northern New Mexico.

There was an Indian pueblo at Abiquiu (pronounced Ab-i-keew when the Spanish arrived in New Mexico). In the mid-1700's Spanish colonists began moving to the spot and managed to take root despite frequent raids by Ute, Navajo and Apache Indians.

The highway misses the plaza of Abiquiu which retains the quiet charm of an old New Mexican village. Beyond Abiquiu the highway leaves the Chama River which it has followed from Espanola and strikes out into higher country.

Some of the most breathtaking scenery in New Mexico unfolds as you approach the famous Ghost Ranch, which is now a training center for Presbyterian ministers. It is also the site of the newest museum in New Mexico.

The Ghost Ranch Museum, which opened during the past summer, is a "nature" museum and its exhibits include a dinosaur skeleton, a unique survey of geology using telescopes trained on distant cliffs, and samples of the animal and plant life flourishing in the Ghost Ranch area.

Echo Amphitheater lies a few miles further on. By walking a few hundred feet from a parking area you can try out an echo chamber consisting of a yawning cavity in a high sandstone cliff. There are picnic tables here, too.

The highway climbs through winding Navajo Canyon to higher country and a colorful side-trip can be made by turning east on State Road 111 into the Carson National Forest. Such isolated villages as Canjilon and Vallecitos are connected by unpaved roads in this area. The roads might be difficult to travel after the first snow flies.

Further on U. S. 84 is Tierra Amarilla, perhaps the least-populated and most isolated county seat in New Mexico. A marker near "T. A." points the way over a paved road to El Vado Dam and its lake which usually offers good fishing.

Chama itself, a town relying mainly on the lumber industry, is the point of departure for many fishing trips into high rugged country especially up the Brazos River

and its tributaries. At Chama you also can take a look at one of America's last narrow-gauge railroads. The Denver & Rio Grande's narrow gauge freight trains stop at Chama on their meandering course crossing and re-crossing the Colorado-New Mexico state line. There is no longer passenger service available from Chama, however.

For some more impressive scenery it is only 25 miles from Chama via State Road 117 to Cumbres Pass, a 10,000-foot gateway between New Mexico and Colorado. From time to time you can spot the tracks of the D&RGV hugging steep mountainsides. If you are in this neighborhood very late in fall, be sure and check at Chama whether Cumbres Pass is open. Snow closes the road during most of the winter.

West from Chama, U. S. 84 and State Road 17 lead into the Jicarilla Apache reservation. The Jicarilla

Apaches are not very great in number (about 200 families) and they make their living mainly through livestock and farming. In recent years, the U. S. Government on their reservation has put the tribe on a better financial footing and the way of life these once-wild people is becoming more modern every day.

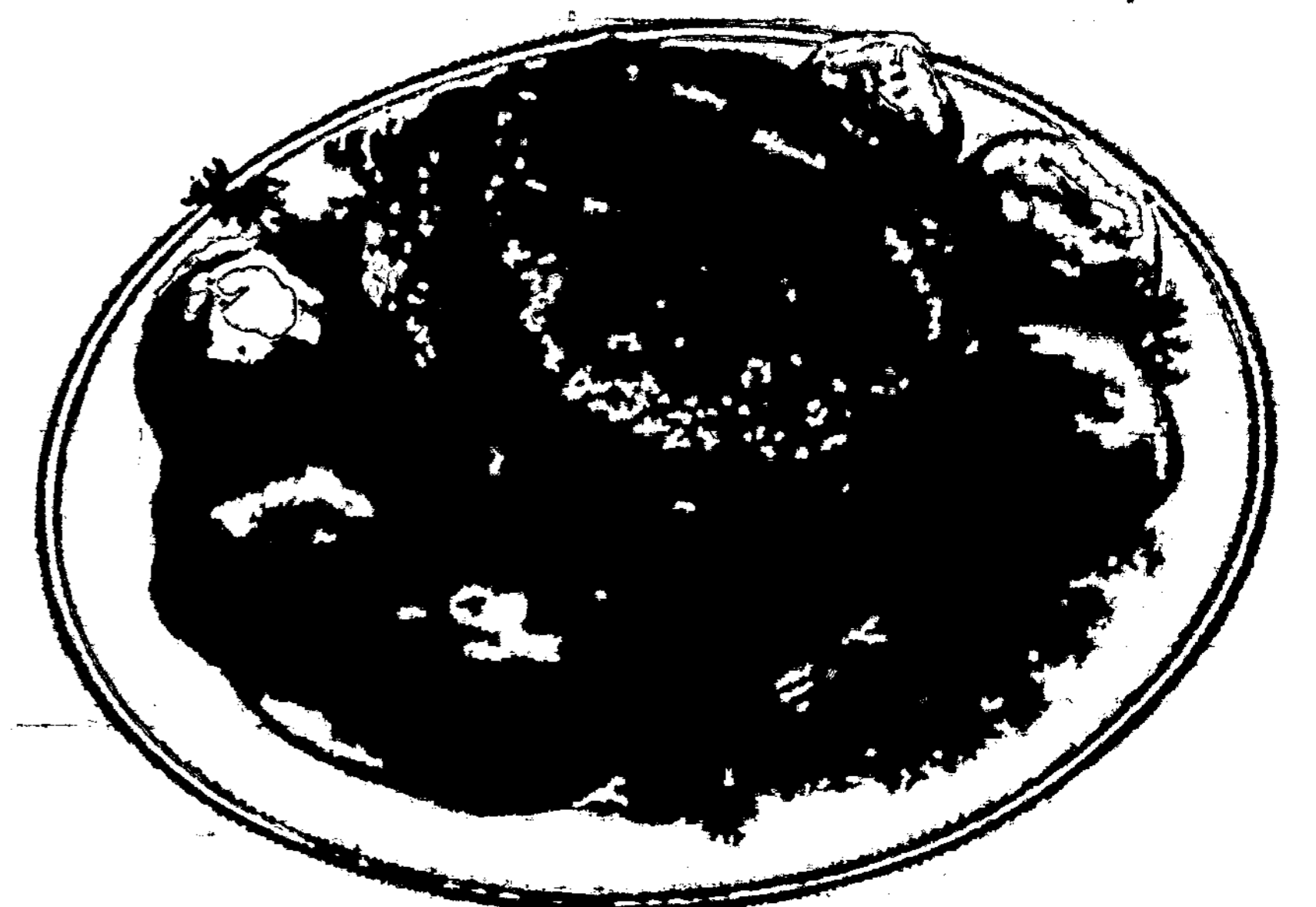

New Mexico Wool Show Judges Named

University Park, N. M.—Judges for the annual New Mexico Wool Show have been named, according to Jack E. Ruttle, extension wool marketing specialist at New Mexico State University and Wool Show manager.

The wool is held in conjunction with the New Mexico Wool Growers annual convention. The 1962 meeting will be held in Albuquerque, February 4-8, at the Coito Hotel. Judges for the wool show are selected from three segments of the wool industry: production, marketing, and technology.

Representing the producing side of the sheep industry will be wool grower Charles Fuller of Picocho. Fuller is a leading producer in the New Mexico sheep and wool improvement program and has won many awards at state and national wool shows.

Al Innes, field man for the Mid-West Wool Marketing Cooperative in Kansas City, Mo., will represent the marketing phase of the sheep industry. Innes is a native of Scotland and studied wool at the University of Wyoming before joining Mid-West. The research and technology aspect of the sheep and wool field will be represented by Prof. P. E. Neale, noted sheep authority of the New Mexico State University teaching and research staff. Neale is the originator of the sheep and wool program now used by the majority of New Mexico sheep ranchers and has judged at almost every major wool show in the United States.

"The three man judging committee has helped make New Mexico Wool Show one of the most educational shows held," Ruttle says. "The flocks are viewed by the committee who represent different phases of wool work, but have one common goal of high quality and production per animal in mind. The wool will be on exhibit during the entire convention and the public is welcome to stop by and see examples of New Mexico wool in its raw form," Ruttle adds.

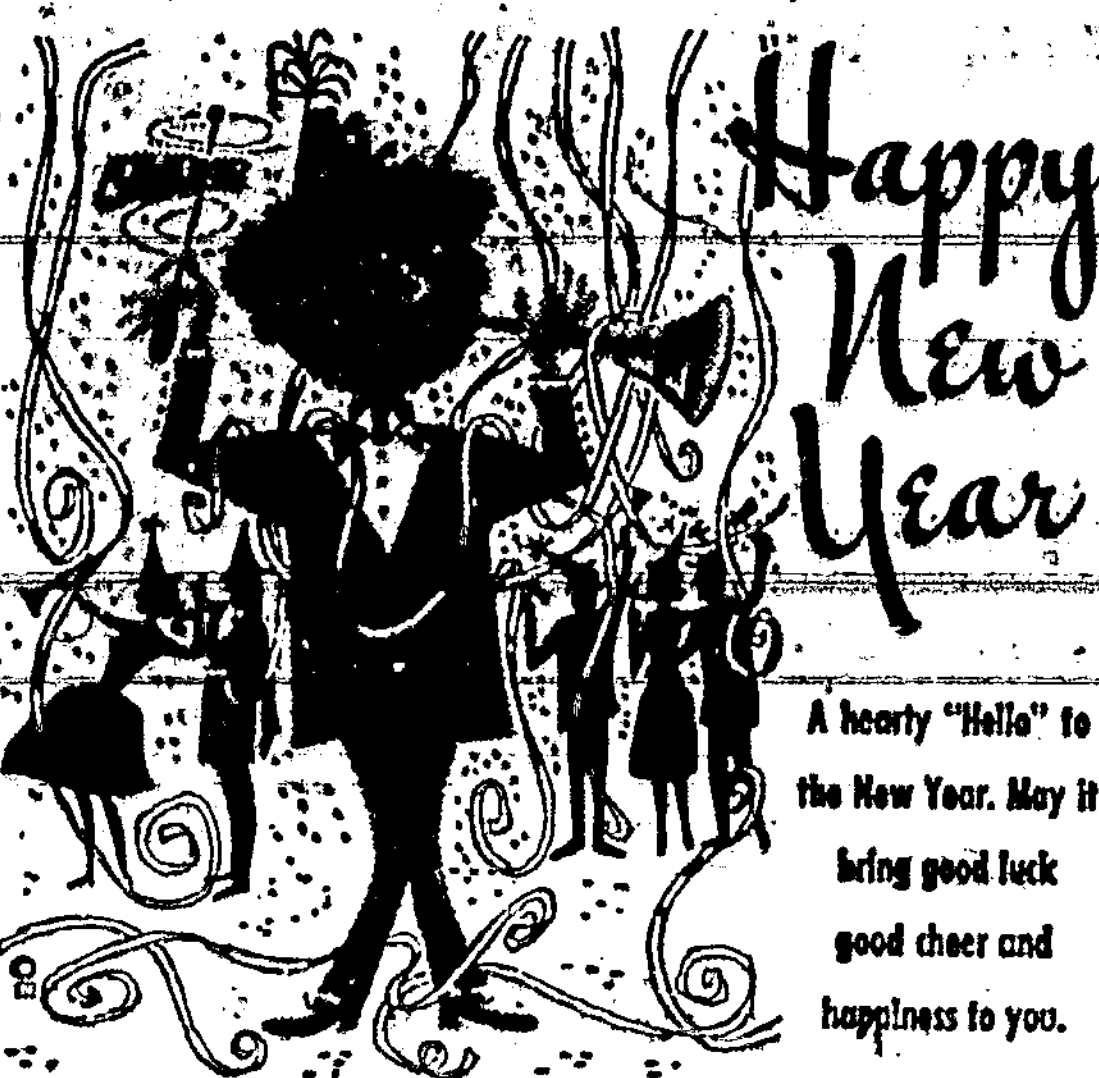

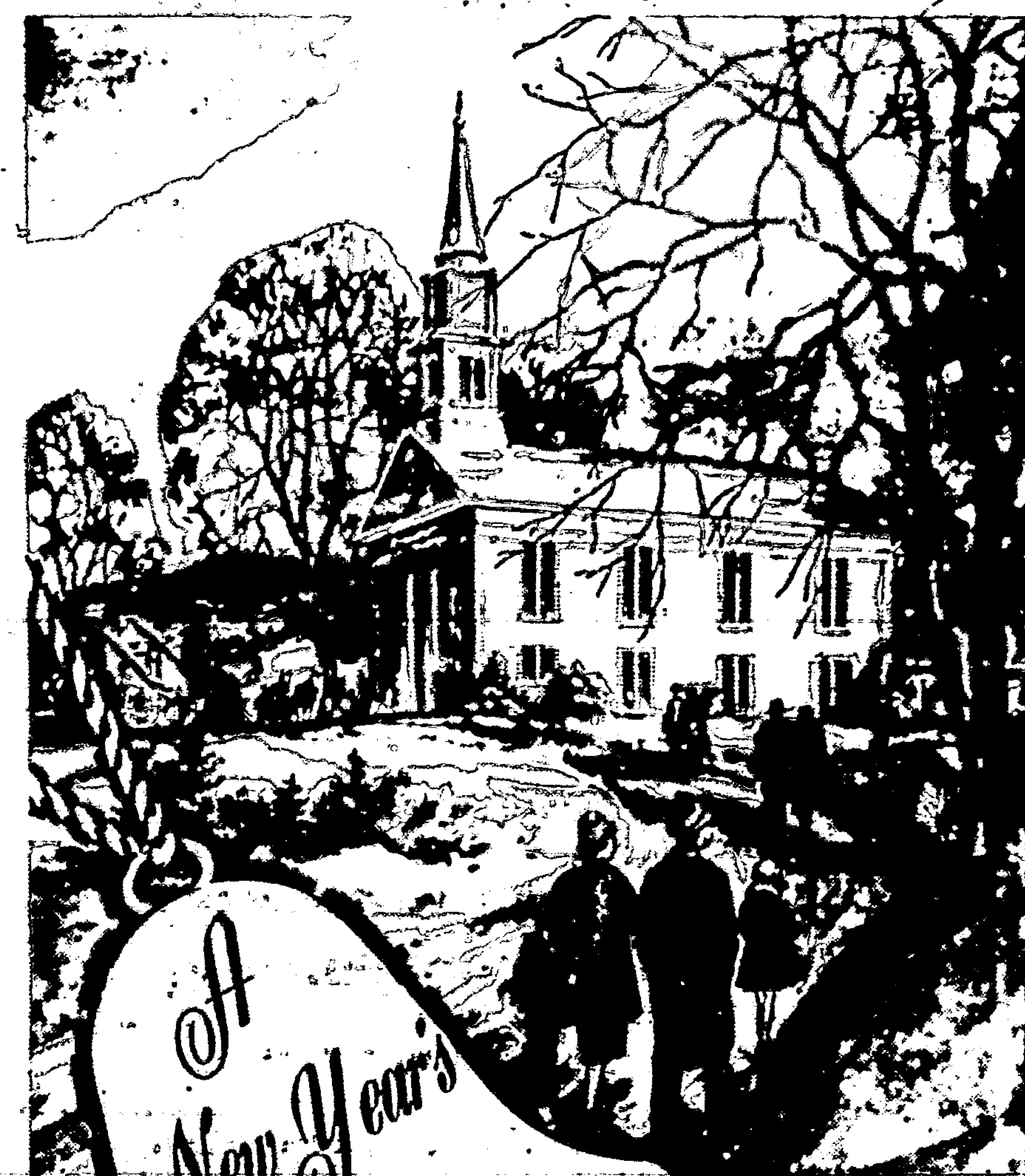

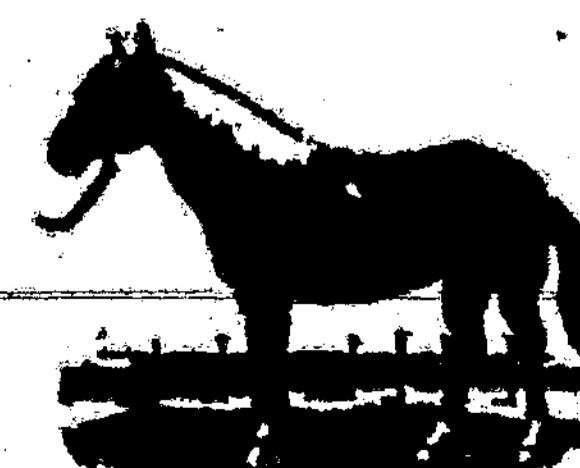

'Taxpayer' says special session should come later in the year

(The following release is from The Voice of the New Mexico Taxpayer.)

One of the most popular subjects of discussion among public officials, educators and political leaders concerns the necessity of a special session of the Legislature to deal with problems of school finances for next year.

There has been a lot of talk about having a session in January or February, and the State Board of Education has made a statement that they will start studying cuts in school programs the middle of January if plans for a special session are not under way.

The people that are talking a special session in January or February believe that it is necessary before school budgets can be made for next year. School budget hearings are held during April and May.

We believe a special session in January or February would be premature. The last Legislature made changes in our tax laws, increased some rates and then advanced money for the current school fund to "buy time" while we determined the results of these tax changes in terms of increased revenue for the public schools. Most of these laws have been in effect only a few months and some funds are still tied up in law suits.

A reasonable determination of the results of the last Legislature's changes cannot be made until at least May or June. Having a session before then would be "pushing the panic button," and we can't see how it would be advantageous to anyone. It would seem that a more logical plan would be to go ahead and make school budgets on the basis of a reasonable estimated increase in enrollment and a regular increase in the salaries of teachers and other school employees.

If sufficient revenue to meet the school budgets does not come in, then the Legislature could meet with adequate information on school needs and revenue available. This procedure is anticipated in the laws which provide that a temporary operating budget shall be approved by July 1st, pending the certification of a final budget by the first Monday in September.

If this procedure is followed, school budgets would be made on

the basis of need as reflected by enrollment increases and salary schedules rather than on the basis of anticipated revenue, a practice that put school finances in the condition that they are in now.

The choice seems to be whether the next session of the Legislature meets on an emergency basis without adequate facts or preparation, or meets in an atmosphere of deliberation based on facts.

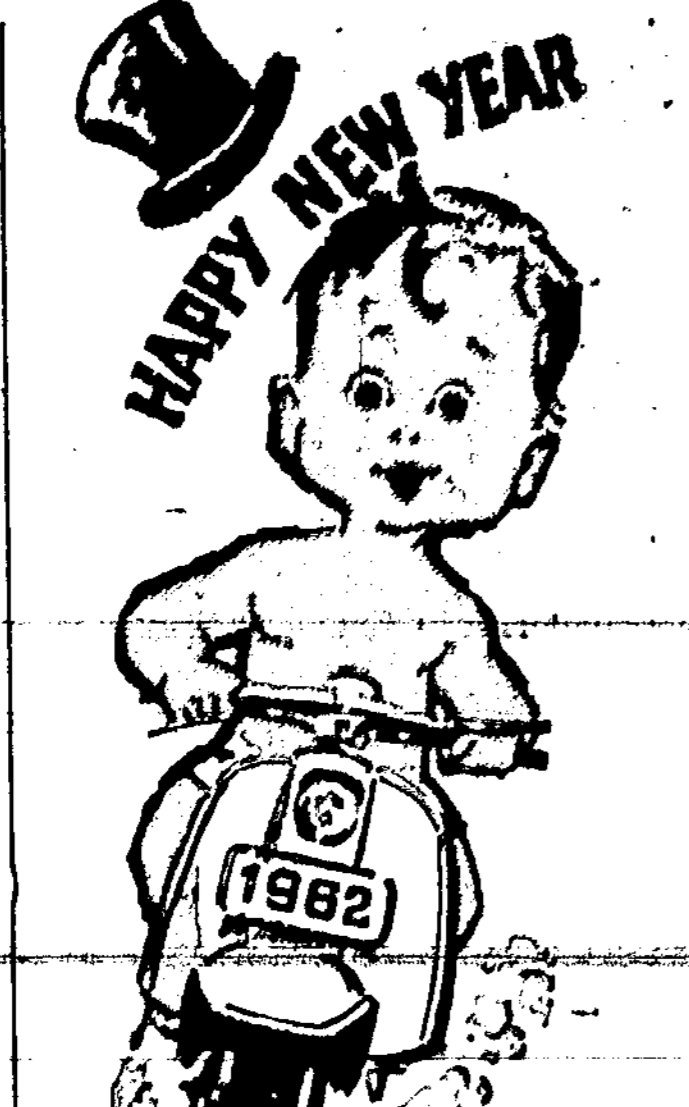

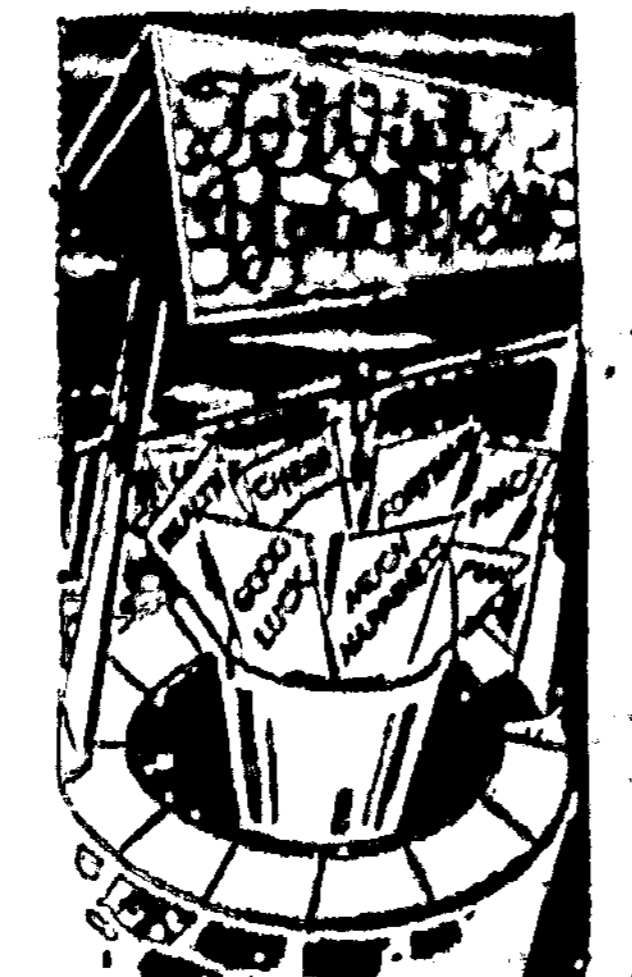

Pick Fair slogan, Win free trip

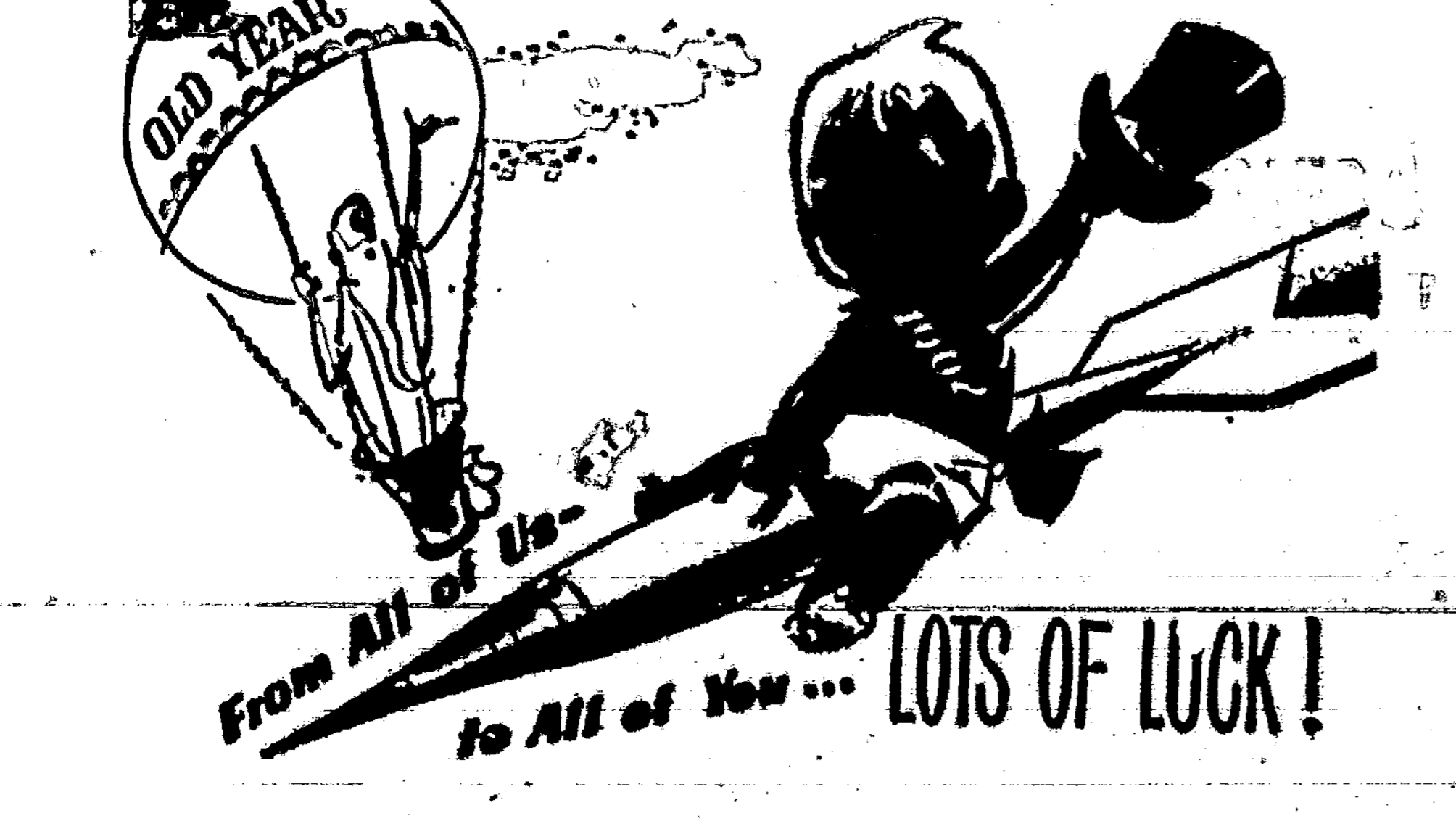

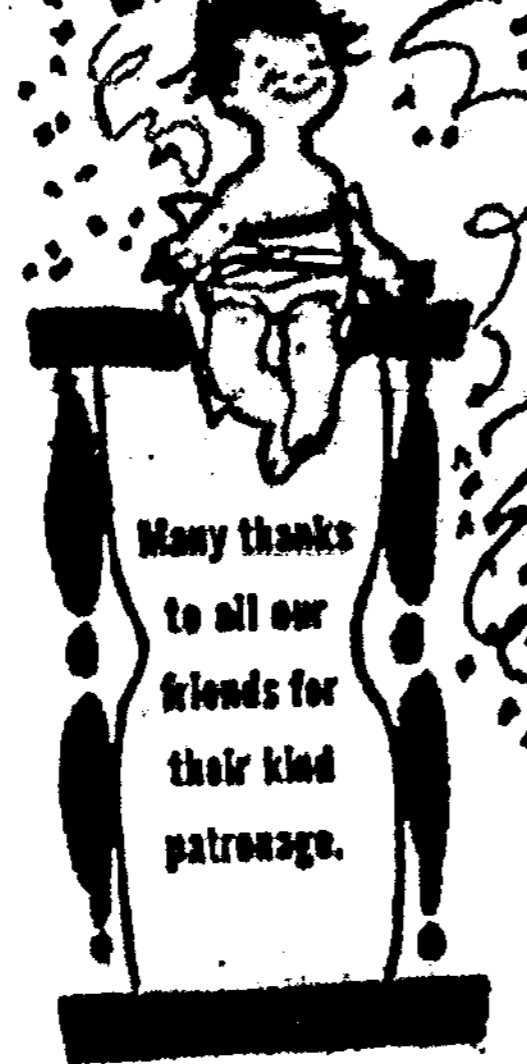

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

(This letter comes from Enid Hoff, a member of the Dutch family that is living and working at the Price Miller dairy farm at Ancho. The Hoff's came in America with the help of the World Council of Churches. They were a refugee family from Indonesia before they returned to Holland. There are nine children in the family, and those of school age attend classes in Corona.)

DAG AMERIKANEN OR HALLO AMERICANO AS YOU SAY

M. Enid Gloff, who arrived in America from Amsterdam, Holland, with my family consisting of my father, Alfred; my mother, Pauline; five sisters, Astrid, 15; Peggy, 11; Eugenia, 9; Kinny, 8; Grace, 3; three brothers, Frank, 13; Koonraad, 6; Andrew, 5.

We flew from Amsterdam to New York. It took about eight hours. New York is quite different from Amsterdam. I was amazed to find the streets so broad, long and clean. The buildings are much higher than they are in Holland.

Then we took the Pennsylvania railroad from New York to Chicago, where we changed to the Rock Island line to Carrizozo.

Because Holland is so flat it took me much time before I got accustomed to the high mountains.

Now I'm going to tell you something about life in Holland. My younger brothers and sisters went to grade school. My 15-year-old sister went to high school and I was at training college. The grade school started at nine. The morning was divided in five periods.

At twelve the children go home for lunch. They had school in the afternoon from two to four. Only the fifth and sixth grades got home work. Grade school was from the first to the sixth.

High school started at 8:30 and let out for lunch at 12:15. Beginning in the afternoon at 1:30 and running until four. We had about ten subjects which were divided over the whole week.

They are: Dutch, English, French, German, geography, history, geometry, algebra, biology, botany, zoology, physics, chemistry, physical education, drawing and music.

For the boys, manual training and for the girls needlework. At the end of the last grade you have to pass an examination. If you pass you have finished high school. If you don't pass you have to do the last grade all over.

The main difference between the American high school and the Dutch is, you cannot take the subjects you like, you have to take them all. At school the girls are

not allowed to wear as much make up as they do here.

The country has a lot of water. Many people are drowned while they are swimming. Formerly there were a lot of windmills but now they are only curiosities for the foreigners. They now use electric pumps to pump the water into the ocean.

In Holland most people ride on bicycles or motorbikes instead of in cars. When we tell someone how far it is to a place we will tell them how long it takes them by bicycle. Instead of telling them how many miles it is.

The weather in Holland is not very agreeable. In summer we have lots of rain. We do not have more than 30 days of sunshine per year. The wind is terrible, when it comes from the west it often brings rain, but when it is east, it spoons, only the south wind is warm.

Although there is much difference I think I will like this country. So when you are dissatisfied with New Mexico you should try Holland and you will be very happy with New Mexico.

Top cowboys ride in Dallas

Leavey, Dec. 28—World championship, and a glittering pile of \$37,500 prize money, at stake, the third annual National Finals Rodeo explodes into action next week in Dallas.

North America's top cowboys and tucking stock clash there in the state fairgrounds coliseum, for eight go-rounds, Dec. 27 - Dec. 31, in what has been termed the classic contest of the rodeo year.

In the cowboy world, Finals qualification is an accolade of achievement. Only the season's fifteen high winners in the five standard rodeo events—saddle bronc, bareback bronc and bull riding, calf roping and steer wrestling—reach the title playoffs.

This year, nineteen states and two Canadian provinces are represented by the Finals roster of seventy-five contestants. To combat their competitive efforts are 28 rank broncs and bulls, screened from over 3,000 head in North America, the stars of the twenty-seven rodeo bucking strings.

Title races, which are based on winnings may be the hardest fought in the Finals history with only the calf roping crown already safe, in the hands of Idaho's Dean Oliver.

Oliver, for his fourth such world championship, has amassed \$26,351 with his lariet loops, an over \$11,000 bulgo on his nearest rival, Glen Franklin of House, N. M., before the Finals begin.

Some evidence of the upcoming title tussels can be seen in bull-riding standings where 1961's discom could be topped by any of three cowboys, all of whom are less than \$750 apart in pre-Finals count.

A husky 24 year old Montanan, Ron Rossen, of Broadus, leads with \$12,770, while Bob Wegner, Ponca City, Okla., is runner-up \$12,131 and the inestructable Freddie Brown, of Lawton, Okla., third with \$12,023.

Brown, a jaunty 40 year old, is having the best season in a twenty year career, having picked up an additional \$3,902 in the other events he enters.

A glance at statistics reveal only two 1960 champions, other than Oliver, in close-up contention for this year's titles. Defending saddle bronc titlist, Enoch Walker, Cody, Wyo., is in runner-up spot and Jack Bushchitz, Mohrigo, S. D., is third in bareback bronc riding standings, for the crown he has worn three other seasons.

Seven Finalists qualified in two events, the remainder in one. One-third the '61 roster are newcomers to the playoffs while thirty-one contestants are back for the third consecutive year.

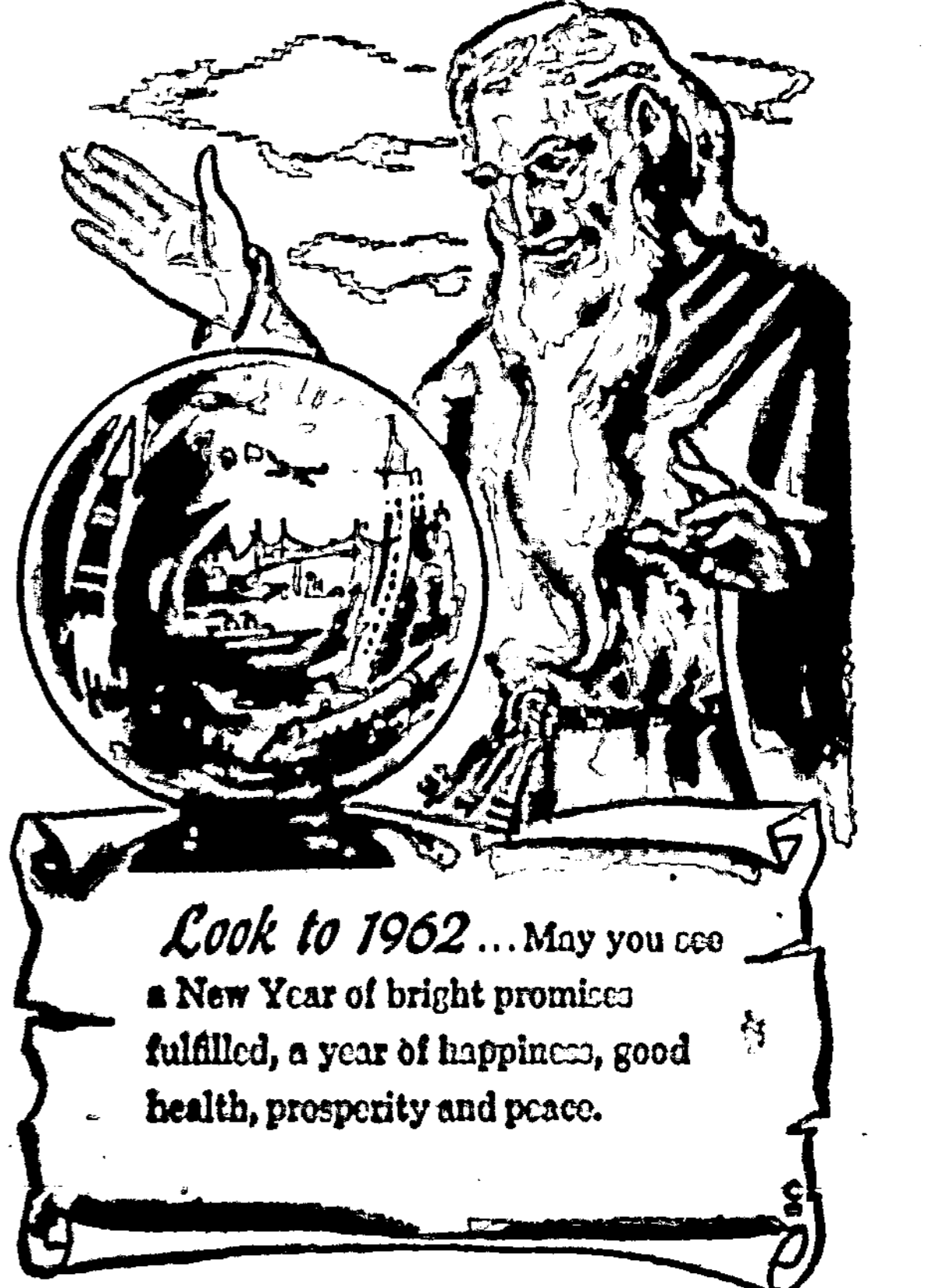
