SAN MIGUEL IN UPROAR
Santa Fe — San Miguel Republicans are in a bitter uproar over the selection of J. D. Maes for the \$9,600 financial director post in the state mental hospital at Las Vegas.

STUPID AND VERNAL SAYS RADIO MAN
Ernie Thwaites, Las Vegas radio operator, 1960 Republican candidate for the legislature, and a member of the Republican state central committee, accused the Republicans of "stupidity and vernalness" in choosing Maes for the position in which he will have jurisdiction over hiring and firing some 400 employees. Thwaites quit the party committee.

Junio Lopez, mayor of West Las Vegas, school board member, county Republican chairman and rejected applicant for the hospital post, said the party had committed "harsh" in choosing Maes. He is giving up the chairmanship.

A group calling themselves "San Miguel County Citizens" wrote this reporter:

"The Republican party has today been washed up in San Miguel county by the ignorance and poor judgment of the hospital board."

CHARLES MAES WITH 1960 DEAL
A Republican San Miguel precinct official who asked that his name not be disclosed accused Maes of negotiating with Paul Robinson who ran against Mechem in the Republican primary last year, on a proposition for the Maes giving him the hospital job in the event Robinson were elected. Robinson reportedly declined.

Dick Montoya, Republican candidate for lieutenant governor and Robinson's running mate, said when questioned that Maes had negotiated for such a deal and had offered to use his influence to get his nephew, Joe Roybal of Las Vegas, to withdraw from the lieutenant governor race. Montoya said that Robinson turned down the proposition and then Maes went with Mechem.

GOV BIG RESULTS AS VEGAS MAYOR
Gov. Ed Mechem and his new hospital board members operating under the chairmanship of Phil Hubbell of Albuquerque apparently had their reasons for choosing Maes over Junio Lopez or half a dozen other prospects but haven't seen fit to reveal their thinking.

Lopez is something new in northern political leadership. The youthful mayor was responsible for having West Las Vegas, of all places, designated as an All-American City last year.

He led a successful movement for a \$1 million low-income housing development in which a hundred \$10,000 homes will be constructed for purchase at \$40 a month under federal financing.

Lopez' business partner, George Arellano, going for sheriff, was the only Republican to win in San Miguel last November.

STATEHOUSE IN A HURRY
The Texas election of a Republican senator is commonly regarded by politicians here as Southern displeasure with the New Frontier. . . . The Freedom Riders and U. S. marshals were holding forth in Alabama on election day. . . . Booz, Allen and Hamilton consultants of San Francisco who did a \$50,000 study of the highway department which the department did not see fit to use, will be brought in for part of \$30,000 study of taxes and revenues being undertaken by the legislature. . . . Republicans mislabeled the name of their national chairman twice on the \$100 dinner tickets at which Thurston Morton, the national chairman, was the speaker. . . . It was a beautiful big dinner but plagued with a speaker system that would perform, bouillabaisse food and well-done rib roast beef. . . . The sore Republicans of San Miguel boycotted the affair, the county being represented by only J. D. Maes, who got the mental health hospital job that set off the fight, his two sons, one bureau of revenue employe and Joe Armijo, appointed a few days before to the state game commission.

CHAVEZ SURGERY STIRS GUESSING
Sen. Dennis Chavez' throat surgery set the ghouls speculating on who would get his place in the event he is not able to go back to Washington.

Such an appointee would be selected by Gov. Mechem to serve until after the 1962 election in November.

At the top of the guessing list is Mechem himself, then Lt. Gov. Delack, William Colmes, Republican nominee for senator in 1960, Robert O. Anderson of Roswell, Helen O. Bursum, son of a New Mexico U. S. senator and 1960 candidate for treasurer, Robert Betts, Albuquerque lawyer, National Republican committeeman and 1960 candidate for senator, Albert Mitchell of Harding county.

Bids let for Capitan school building

Work is to start any day now on the four-room classroom building at Capitan, which will be constructed on the school grounds southeast of the present high school.

Eight bids were opened on May 19, and low bidder was Arrington Construction Co. Roswell, with a \$37,497 offer.

The new building will be about the size of the grade school. The additional building won't call for more teachers, but will relieve overcrowded conditions at the school.

Efforts recalled to locate judgment in death of 'Kid'

(Part II of a letter from William V. Morrison on matters regarding the exhumation of the body of Billy the Kid.)

Any interested persons are welcome to the original letter I received from Mr. Ben Dalgin, Director of Art and Reproduction for the New York Times, under date of July 14, 1950, wherein it states, Quote: "We have gone through the issue in question and can not find any birth announcements. Our research claims that there are announcements of marriages and deaths but none of births."

After conferring with the late Colonel Maurice Garland Fulton, Curator, and insisting on meeting with the Historical Society Commissioners, in order to prove their display announcement was a fraudulent document, it was removed from display to the public at that time without further question. I am interested in knowing if this fraudulent display document is back on display to the public.

It appears that the next step will be to prove that the Kid was killed as claimed. In the absence of an adjudication that he was, it is my belief that exhumation and re-interment of all three cadavers would not settle this matter for all time, to which I believe you will agree.

Of course, the burden of proof of death of Kid and proof of heirship of Miss Telfer falls on the moving party—in this case it is the Lincoln County Commissioners.

However, after the establishment of these issues through court proceedings, I may be willing to enter into negotiations with them to defray all costs of proving heirship of O'Follard and Bowdre, obtaining permission from their nearest of kin to exhume and re-inter all three in a location to be designated by them.

Provided, however, that permission be granted to me to continue my scientific investigation as previously outlined herein.

In this manner, and this only, can the matter be settled for all time, as advocated in your editorial.

To indicate I am anxious as anyone in New Mexico to see that future historians have access to the truth, I want to correct the mistaken contention of your Lincoln County Commissioners in their resolution that Kid "was sentenced to hang for the murder of Sheriff Brady in the Old Lincoln County Court House."

My investigation should have settled this issue for all time. I furnished the record of Sentence from Page 406, District Court minutes, Dona Ana County, New Mexico, on April 13, 1881, in my book "Alias Billy the Kid." Apparently, this little book did not receive wide distribution in your State. However, armchair researchers of other States, including Frazier Hunt in his Kid book, have used my information without hinting their source. None of them prior to my appearance here, including your historian, Mr. William A. Kelleher, attorney, were able to find it. Oh yes, I failed to say that Judge Bristol imposed the Sentence on Kid in Old Dona Ana County Court House at Old Mesilla, many miles from the place designated by your County Commissioners.

Now I believe it is my duty as a historian to disprove of the various contentions made in your editorial above referred to.

I have disposed of the contention in paragraph four, wherein you claim Kid was, Quote: "shot down at Ft. Sumner by Sheriff Pat Garrett in July 1881," and quote, with my preceding statements.

Recently, we have been considering filing a petition for pardon posthumously, wherein evidence would be interpreted to prove beyond doubt, among other things, that Kid performed his contractual obligations to the letter; and that Governor Wallace refused and failed to perform his, especially to pardon Kid if completed.

This petition will dispose of the issues raised in paragraph seven, wherein you contend, Quote: "Kid would have accepted the pardon offered by Governor Lew Wallace had he not known for certainty

After a stormy life, they rest peacefully now, says Roswell letter writer

In a little cemetery a ways out the Kid and carried away by the New Mexico—rest came of the most publicized characters of our kind, the world has known—Billy the Kid and his two lifetime companions, Tom O'Follard and Charlie Bowdre; and Lucien B. Maxwell, who at one time possessed the largest single, individually owned tract of land in the United States.

They all rest there now—together and near each other—in the small, remote, ill-kept cemetery of the Peecos River Valley, a short ways out of Ft. Sumner. Thousands of followers and enthusiasts of the subjects direct their footsteps in that direction annually to pay homage and respects to those entombed there. Some of the seekers and vandals also find their way in that direction to ply their trade work. Many have been knocked off the monument of Billy

the Kid and carried away by the vast number that have visited the grave site. In fact, it became necessary to erect a protective fence about the site to preserve the headstones.

Now a move is underway to pluck one of them, the Kid, from that burial plot and re-inter the remains in that portion of the Country where he was, in his short lifetime, most active—Lincoln County.

We wrote, the four of whom we wrote, out of that entombment and up and about and as ACTIVE as they were in their lifetime, what would be their decision in the issue?

But they are NOT! And only the people of today, in the best interest of those who have gone before, can weigh the situation and vote out the proper decision!

With Miss Lois Telfer of New York, the only known surviving relative of Billy the Kid, as honored guest, a meeting of people whose names are outstanding in the long and frequently bloody history of Lincoln County was held in the courtroom of the old (restored) Lincoln County courthouse in Lincoln, New Mexico on May 30, Memorial Day. It was a day to be remembered.

The surroundings were peaceful, quiet and a spirit of fellowship pervaded the high mountain air as the group gathered on the Wortley Hotel porch starting at 10 a.m. Old friendships were renewed, people who see each other only once a year or less frequently were catching up on happenings and the health of mutual friends.

The "spell" of New Mexico history began to cast itself on the group shortly after gathering in the courtroom. This was the exact place where the book on Billy the Kid's apparently charmed life seemed ready to close. He had been taken by Pat Garrett and sentenced at Las Cruces to hang on May 13, 1874 (?) and was taken back to Lincoln by Deputies Ollinger and Woods. The trip was a rough one on Billy because neither of the deputies had any love for him.

His chance to escape came when Charlie Bell, his guard, reached down to pick up a card during a monte game. Billy drew Bell's revolver, Bell moved to escape and one bullet rolled him down the stairs, dead. The Kid went to the window and spoke to Bob Ollinger outside who looked up only to get a charge of buckshot. Billy got loose of his irons and galloped up Lincoln main street out of town. (Other accounts of this incident include a gun smuggled to Billy)

There was much more to the "spell" than just the deadly game that was the Lincoln County War. There were good times aplenty and these were recounted so that the people in the courtroom were living in 1901 but thinking in the 1870's.

Sergeant Arranged Meeting
Joe Sergeant, owner of the Yucca Bar in Carrizozo and Chamber of Commerce member instrumental in setting up the meeting, had the "judges chair" and brought the courtroom to order with a sound rap of the gavel. Joe may have found the bottom of this chair bar, but he filled it ably and the meeting went off in good order.

Sergeant first asked for a showing of hands of those people in favor of removing the bones of Billy the Kid from Ft. Sumner to their rightful home in Lincoln. The vote was unanimous in favor of the move. Sheriff W. G. Bradley noted that he had a gun and was willing to use it on any "nay" voters—luckily for peace and harmony in Lincoln County this statement was made after the vote was cast. The crowd liked this remark.

Chase Represents Lincoln County
C. C. Chase Jr., of Alamogordo, a grandson of the late Senator Albert B. Fall, was introduced as legal counsel for Lois Telfer. Chase stated that a request by Miss Telfer for disinterment of her relative, Billy the Kid, would be filed in De Baca County, which request was legal though the case could easily go clear to the state supreme court because DeBaca county officials have already made known their opposition to the removal. Chase said that the action can be successful—but may take time.

Rhodes Drives 1,978 Miles For Meet
Mr. and Mrs. Alan Rhodes had driven 1,900 miles from Apalachin, N. Y., to attend this meeting. Mr. Rhodes is the son of Eugene Monroe Rhodes, the New Mexico cowboy who became one of America's best-known western writers. He had become interested through correspondence with Miss Telfer. Rhodes stated it was a high pleasure and privilege to be here. The motion made by the group was a good one and should be carried to completion. Billy was buried in Ft. Sumner simply because that cemetery was handy.

Mrs. L. G. Perry, daughter of George Coe, who wrote one of the best books on the Lincoln County War, said she appreciated a comment from Allan Rhodes that his father considered the George Coe book one of the most authentic ever written on the subject. The book is out of print but may be revived.

Lets Of Joy During War Years
Paul A. Blazer, a retired rancher from Tularosa and son of Dr. Almer A. Blazer, who owned the famous mill where Buckshot Roberts "got his," spoke highly in favor of removing Billy's body to Lincoln. Blazer said that "my people" used to have a lot of good times, lots of joy and happiness. The troubles of the times were just incidental.


Margaret Salazar, Bernardo, daughter of Ygenio Salazar who was one of the few escaping from the battle of McGween's house, told some first hand information. She said that Billy told Ygenio, "You go first". The house was on fire, bullets storming the walls, and that was what confronted those inside. Ygenio was shot thru and thru and in great pain. He played dead even when kicked several times by Old Andy Boyle to make sure he was dead. Salazar hung on and crawled to his sister-in-law's home where he got well in about six months to live 50 peaceful years longer.

Both Sides Meet In Peace
A chuckle came from the crowd during a talk in Spanish from Mrs. Rafino Mies, daughter of Ramon Montoya who fought with the Murphy-Dolan faction against the Kid. Mrs. Mies is 80 years old, walked from her home to the meeting and said she wouldn't have missed it for anything.

Sheriff W. G. Bradley extended an official welcome to Miss Telfer. He said that Billy the Kid was a

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

(Continued from Page 1) that if he laid down his arms he would have been shot by his enemies before the next sun set," and quote.
Immediately following his public show in Santa Fe, Governor Thomas J. Mabry promised to grant us a hearing on the law and evidence in our first petition. However, after a private conference with Garrett faction led by Patrick J. Hurley, he changed his mind in an open announcement to the press. Consequently, Roberts had his day in Santa Fe, but none of you, including the Governor, examined our evidence, nor offered any to disprove Roberts' claim.

Certified copies of legal records would be included in this petition, the same as before. To prove, among other things, that:
Kid submitted to arrest, was placed in jail by Lincoln County Sheriff, George Kitzbuhl, who produced him in Court where he testified before the Grand Jury, as promised, that verdict indeterminate on April 23, 1879, against enemies, including, among others, J. J. Dolan and William Campbell for the murder of Houston L. Chapman, and Dolan was acquitted by Grand Jury on charges of venue without ever attempting to shoot the Kid for offering testimony against him.

I agree with the remainder of your paragraphs. And I especially agree with paragraph three where in it is contended that Ft Sumner is claimed to be the home of Kid.

My aunt Mrs. Fred La May sent me a couple of the papers and one had a picture of old Church at ABO State Monument. Picture enclosed for you will know what I'm referring to.

Now, my husband and myself are stamp collectors and we thought that should be put on a stamp. Maybe if you wrote to your Senators, Congressmen and Representatives and have them talk to the Post Office Department in Washington, maybe it would be put on a stamp. Such history should be preserved on stamps we think. It might even bring more tourists into New Mexico now that they don't have tourists now, but anyway can always use more money.
