The words of that touching old hymn drifted out from the open-hulled tabernacle on Nogal Mesa last week as hundreds of Lincoln County folks gathered for the annual Ranchmen's Camp Meeting.

Evening services started about 7 p.m., and from inside the tabernacle the crowd could look down on lightning storms over Carrizozo, 12 miles away on the prairie.

Services were held four times a day, with polished speakers Howard Hanson and Paul Gaston holding the attention of young and old alike. Preaching was punctuated with group and choir singing, led by Rev. Bill Lytle of Corona.



New judge sought for Kid hearing

Two new developments have evolved in the struggle to bring Billy the Kid's bones home to Lincoln—the judge that was to hold a hearing on the case has been disqualified, and De Baca county commissioners have answered the original petition seeking removal by saying "NO" and asking the petition be dismissed for a variety of reasons.

C. C. Chase, Alamogordo attorney for Miss Lois Telfer, Billy's nearest kin, and friends of Billy in Lincoln County, filed an affidavit of disqualification against district judge J. V. Gallegos of the tenth judicial district (which includes De Baca county), saying that he believes Judge Gallegos of Tucumcari cannot preside with impartiality.

Mrs. Judy Marshall, district court clerk at Ft. Sumner, said the move automatically disqualifies the judge. The opposing attorneys (Chase and John Humphrey, Jr., tenth judicial district assistant district attorney) must now agree on an impartial judge, or

City sales tax vote at Ft Sumner

The town of Ft. Sumner is having a vote July 25 on a one-cent city sales tax.

Ft. Sumner is probably the smallest of the 17 cities in New Mexico that now collect a city sales tax, but it's of interest here because Carrizozo may soon be faced with the same problem—either increase property taxes city high, or clam on a city sales tax.

Ft. Sumner city trustees said: "There is no other tax or revenue source available to the municipalities in New Mexico... the sales tax is the only stable and dependable source of revenue available... a defeat of the proposal will mean a decrease in essential municipal services... the one-cent tax will bring in around \$25,000 a year."

Investigation of Bonito Lake seeks cause of fish deaths

An investigation was being conducted at Bonito Lake last week, according to the Alamogordo Daily News, to find the cause of fish deaths that have been reported in the lake.

Ralph Little, fish biologist for the southeast area of the state, is making the investigation.

The Alamogordo city manager said the fish deaths apparently were due to a low water situation arising from lack of rain in the watershed and the subsequent treatment by the city with copper sulfate to kill resulting algae and vegetation.

The situation poses a sanitary problem for Alamogordo because the lake is one of its chief sources of water. Present level of the lake stands more than 40 feet below the spillway.

(Ed's note: Louise Runnels here gives a first-hand account of the dead fish problem from Bonito.)

By now my news telling about the dead fish at Bonito Lake has been headlines so there is little left to say. The Bonito Dam guards estimate between 3,000 and 3,500 dead fish have been carried away from the dam.

Trout started dying Wednesday evening after Bob Pender and Hugh Sutton from Alamogordo had put 700 to 800 pounds of Blue Stone (copper sulfate) in the lake when it was at the 30-foot level.

Only a week before the game department had brought three or four thousand pounds of nice-size trout for planting in Bonito Lake.

A great loss to the game department, yes, but what about the hundreds of tourists and natives, some with \$5 season permits for "recreation." Many had planned to spend the weekend of fishing at the lake. Their cost of a trip, fishing equipment and gearfishing their time that they could have spent somewhere else. Campers and fishermen are somewhere else today (Monday) and so are all the fish in Bonito Lake.

Insulation Makes It Possible

Room Air Conditioners Cool New Homes on Gulf Coast



This three-bedroom house in Town 'n Country Park, Tampa, Florida, is cool for the summer with efficiently-installed mineral wool insulation and white reflective roof help air conditioners work at top efficiency. Through-the-wall air conditioner is at left of housewife in living room below.

Can an entire house be cooled comfortably in summer with one or two room air conditioners? It's being done today in Florida where summer heat is a challenge for any kind of air conditioning.

In Tampa's Town 'n Country Park, houses ranging in price from \$12,500 to \$15,000 are cooled with one or two through-the-wall air conditioners.

Satisfaction with the air conditioning is very high among the development's builders, reports Charles La Monte, president of a Monte-Schmertz Associates, builder.

According to La Monte, a major reason the air conditioning units have been able to provide comfortable cooling at reasonable cost is the use of general amounts of mineral wool insulation in walls and ceilings.

White, heat-reflective roofing and careful attention to construction details also help air conditioner efficiency, La Monte said.

Insulation requirements for air-conditioning are specified in the building code. The All-Weather Comfort Standard developed by electric utility and manufacturers of air conditioning and heat treatment equipment.

White and blankets of mineral wool insulation are now available which conform to the standard. Those labeled R-10 are for ceilings, R-11 for walls, and R-13 for floors.

When Town 'n Country Park was on the drawing boards, the builder decided that many home buyers would choose to include air conditioning in their new homes either at time of purchase or at a later date.

So many immediate or future air conditioning units are being installed in the homes that the builder decided to include pre-cut concrete forms designed to receive through-the-wall air conditioning units built into every house.

When a room air conditioner is to be installed, a thin concrete shell is broken away, a metal sleeve fixed in place, and the new unit inserted.

According to La Monte, in all but a third of the 700 houses built so far, air conditioning was installed before the owners moved in. Other families have chosen to purchase and install through-the-wall units later.
