
C. E. Degner and family of Carrizozo stopped for a visit last Tuesday.

**Trip suggested to the "End of the Trail" at picturesque old Santa Fe city**

**SANTA FE—The City Different**—The Ancient Capital, "End of the Santa Fe Trail"—All these names are justifiably applied to Santa Fe, the Capital City of New Mexico.

Santa Fe is unique among cities in the Southwest, not for that matter among cities anywhere in the country. There is something here to appeal to almost any taste and interest, whether that interest be in historical sites, beautiful mountain scenery, or simply in browsing through the city's winding streets and fascinating shops.

The Capital City lies in the serene shadow of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains 65 miles north of Albuquerque on Highway 65. Some 34,000 residents make up Santa Fe's population, and that population is perhaps the most cosmopolitan to be found anywhere in the country. Visiting Europeans find Santa Fe reminiscent of their homelands in its Old World charm. Painters and writers have traditionally found Santa Fe a refuge and an inspiration and their presence adds much to the particular feeling that Santa Fe has to offer.

Even in the early days, Santa Fe was known throughout the world. Probably no wilderness roadway became as famous as the Santa Fe Trail and there are few cities in America which have so successfully preserved the charm of these earlier days.

The annual Fiesta held over Labor Day weekend is one of the many special events held in the Ancient City. There is summer opera held under the stars just to the north of town, which has become recognized as one of the finest small operas in the country. This, as well as numerous musical and dramatic events offered year-round, is one of the reasons for Santa Fe's wide appeal.

A tour of the town includes a great number of "musts." The Plaza itself, which is the real center of Santa Fe, was one time the market place for Santa Fe where bargaining was carried on at the end of the Santa Fe Trail. On the southeast corner of the Plaza stands a marker indicating the end of the famous trail, and the Soldiers Monument as well as the Kearney Proclamation Market is located there.

Dominating the Plaza on the north is the Palace of the Governors, the oldest public building in the United States which now houses the Museum of New Mexico and contains geological & historical exhibits, as well as an exten-

sive research library.

Just off the Plaza stands the New Mexico Museum of Art, which primarily contains work of in-state artists although traveling shows of particular interest are also to be seen.

The Hall of Ethnology on the Plaza is devoted to various aspects of contemporary Indian life.

The Museum of International Folk Art, the Laboratory of Anthropology and the Museum of Navajo Ceremonial Art are well worth seeing while touring Santa Fe.

The city is full of old buildings which have been witnesses to history, some of them for centuries. The "Oldest House" across from San Miguel Mission is an example of these, and is believed to date from pre-Spanish times. The Mission of San Miguel, which claims to be the oldest mission church in the United States, was standing during the Pueblo revolt in 1680, and was partly destroyed at that time. It was restored later and has since been kept in good repair. The Mission welcomes visitors and a guided tour is conducted at no charge.

Within Santa Fe itself half the fun of visiting lies in exploring the many delightful shaded streets, the curio and art stores, and the artist galleries open to the public. Canyon Road, one of the oldest streets in the city, is especially noted for its many private galleries and studios exhibiting the work of artists, both well known and those still in the struggling stage.

Sena Plaza, a block east of the Governor's Palace and just off the main Plaza, is rich in tradition. Once the home of Major Jose de Sena, the block of buildings now contains offices and stores, but the flower and tree filled patio in the center is open to the passerby and is a spot of restful beauty.

Within a short distance from Santa Fe a number of Indian Pueblos stand as they have for generations. Tesuque Pueblo, only eight miles north of the City Different on U. S. 64, is the nearest. Others within easy driving range are Nambe, San Ildefonso (home of Maria Martinez, the famous pottery maker), Santa Clara, San Juan, Cochiti Santo Domingo and San Felipe.

In a sense Santa Fe is more than just the capital of New Mexico. It is the capital of the entire American southwest, bringing together all the color, the tradition and culture of the region.

Groups up to four persons may apply on a single blank for elk, antelope and Barbary sheep. Application for bighorn sheep license must be made singly, and only New Mexico residents are eligible for bighorn sheep license.

Application must be made on the 1961 application form, available from license vendors and game department offices in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Raton, Las Cruces and Roswell.

Landowners' guests who are scheduled to receive reserved licenses must also submit proper application forms to the Santa Fe office by the August 21 deadline.

Certified check or money order (not personal check) must accompany the application. Resident license fee is \$10 for antelope, \$15 for elk, \$20 for sheep. Nonresident fee is \$40 for antelope, \$50 for elk, \$100 for Barbary sheep.

Antelope seasons are September 16 and 17 in the northeast, October 7 and 8 in the south. Elk seasons range between September 16 opening date and December 3, the last closing date, depending on area. Bighorn sheep season is November 10-28; Barbary is December 1-10.

# WOULD KILL OFF CORPORATION COMMISSION

That would be abolishment of the elective corporation commission, cutting down the power of the senate to reject highway commission nominees submitted by the governor, and the setting up of four-year terms for state and county elective officials.

The one amendment proposal that is practically sure to get a majority vote but not enough to pass is the absentee ballot proposal. It alone among the proposals requires two thirds in each county and three fourths in the state. It has been offered four times and always got a majority but never enough to pass. The other amendments require a mere majority.
