Sheep scab spreads to eight counties, situation worsens; meetings called

Infection of sheep scab, first noted in Lincoln County two weeks ago, has now resulted in outbreaks as far north as Colfax county. Officials of the State Sheep Sanitary Board and the U.S. Disease Eradication Service of U.S.D.A. are in the county trying to find diseased herds.

A special meeting of the board of directors of the New Mexico Wool Growers Assn. will take place in the future at 9:30 a.m. A state quarantine has been slapped on the eight counties with known scab outbreaks.

More than 1,200 Lincoln County sheep were dipped for the first time in the last four days, according to county agent Itajna Dunlap. They'll have to be dipped in two weeks, then quarantined for 90 days or until it's proved they're free from scab.

The scab business isn't over by a long shot, the county agent pointed out. There will be inspection of every herd in Lincoln County at shearing time next spring whether there is one sheep or 1,000 in the herd.

Actual source of the first infected sheep to come into the county hasn't been planned down yet. I saw my first scab mite this week. It looked like a very small grain of rice. You could put six on the head of a pin. Under a

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More phones, fewer meters than 1950

A comparison of statistics for city electrical meters and phones in Carrizozo shows very little growth—or drop—in the last year. In 1950, there were 450 residential electric users and 79 commercial users.

Telephone connections in Carrizozo, however, reached an all-time high at the turn of this year. Total telephones in town now number 493, compared with 481 a year ago.

Telephone connections have shown a fairly steady growth over the years. In 1950, there were 459, in 1951, 467; in 1952, 472. The figure drops steadily from that to 218 phones in 1947, the last year for which records are available.

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Phoebe Taylor files for county treasurer position

Phoebe Taylor of Lincoln has announced her intention to file for the job of county treasurer in the May elections on the Democratic ticket.

She's the first candidate to announce in county contests. The treasurer's job, now held by Lewis Cummins, who will retire this year, is the only important county office held by a Democrat with the exception of one county commissioner's seat.

Miss Taylor will be 22 in March. She is currently the assistant treasurer, and has worked with Mr. Cummins for the past two years. She attended school in Ruidoso and was graduated from Capital high school. Her home is in Lincoln, where she lives with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Taylor.

Republicans haven't found a candidate for the job yet—but a meeting in Ruidoso next week is being held to find one.

PTA draws large crowd in discussion of school's financial problems. About 50 parents, teachers and interested taxpayers showed up at a PTA meeting Monday night called to discuss school money problems.

Senator Joe Sheen and Representative Bill Shreeve were on the panel of teachers and school board members that outlined changes and problems of New Mexico's school financing.

A good deal of discussion was given by Supt. J. T. Clegg and teacher Bernice Laubs about teacher's salaries in Lincoln County. Starting salaries here, said Laubs, are the lowest in the state except for one county. He noted that beginning teachers with a BA degree here would receive \$4,223 a year, as compared with up to \$5,200 in more wealthy counties such as Bernalillo or Los Alamos.

Clegg said average Lincoln County teacher salaries were \$5,053 a year this year, a drop from last year since younger teachers with less teaching experience are being hired.

Senator Sheen said the emergency measure taken by the state legislature last session to raise operating money for the schools were "very shabby done" and that no permanent solution to school financing had been found.

He pointed out that in state re-distribution of the 2 per cent sales tax money, the distribution formula is an average daily attendance, which is harmful to such

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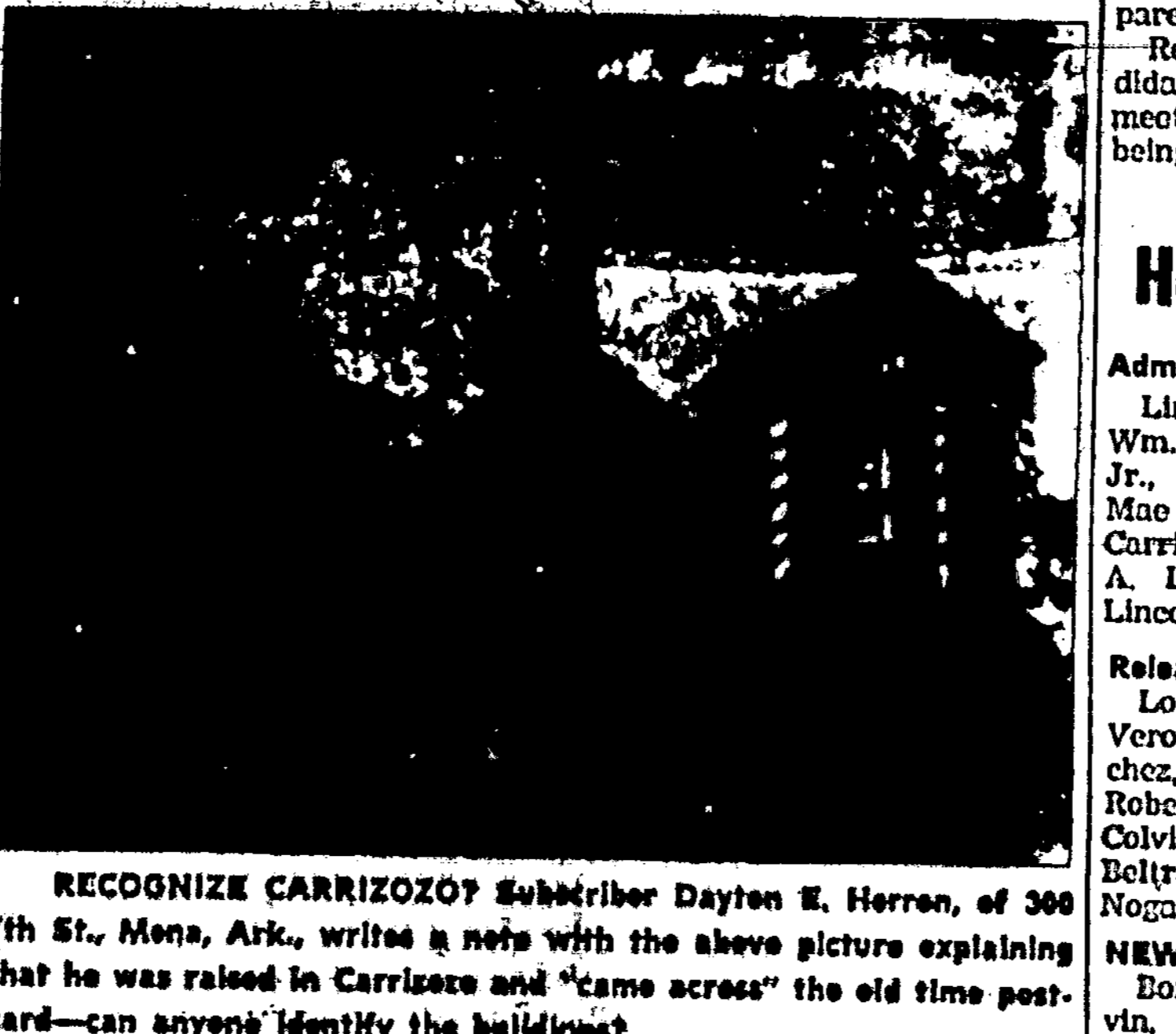

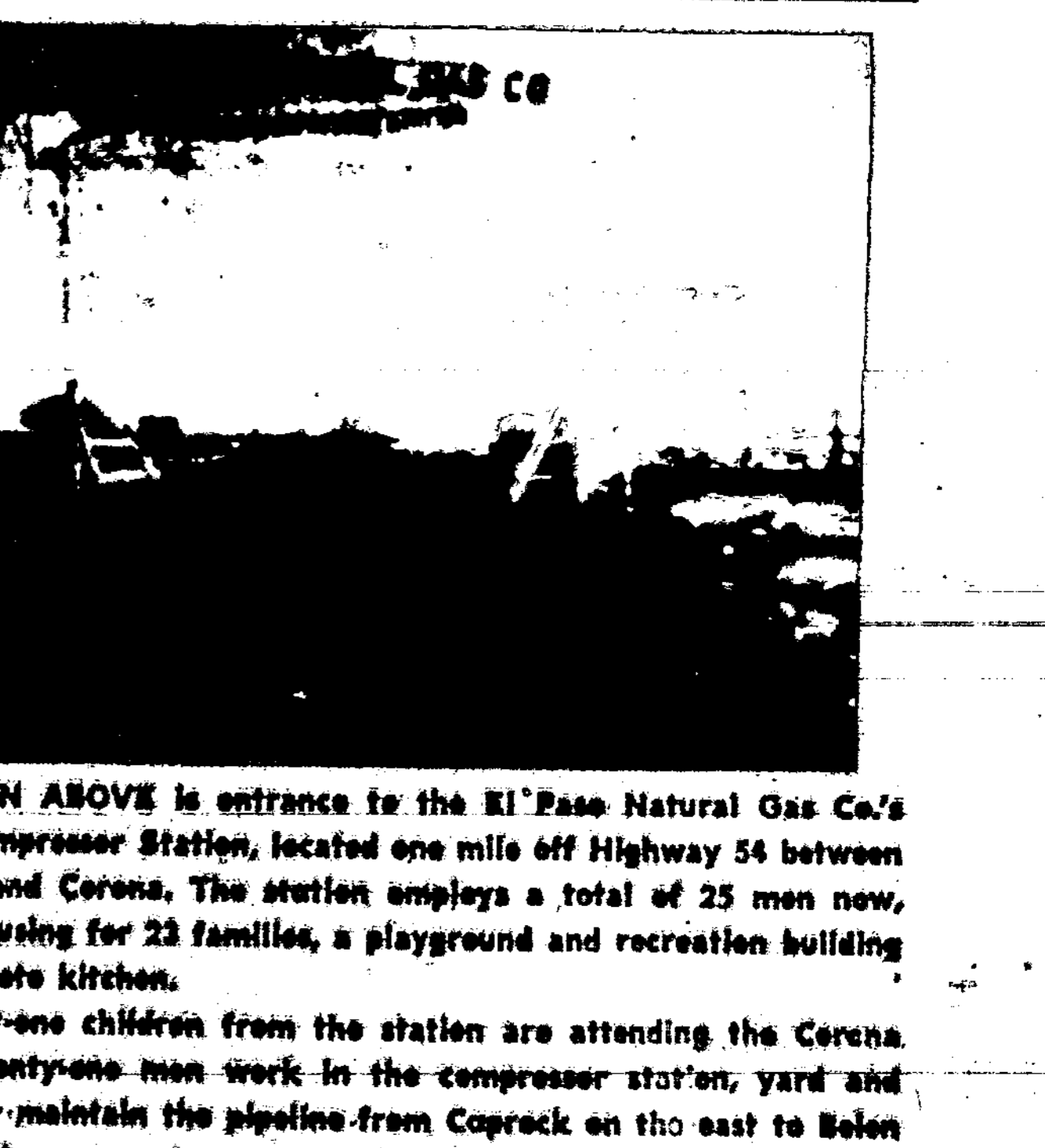

The Capitol City, at the end of the state, blew wide open Saturday in the celebration of the golden anniversary of New Mexico's statehood.

President William Howard Taft at 1:35 p.m. on January 6, 1912, scribbled a few words on a piece of paper that made the Territory the 47th state in the U.S. flag. As he finished he said, "Well, it is all over. I am glad to give you my life. I hope you will be healthy!"

Santa Fe threw open all the gates for the jubilee—something similar to the frontier days of the Old West when the wagon trains pulled onto the Plaza, loaded to the gills with wares from the east, and "trading" was the order of the day—gala events took place at night!

ORDINANCE 79

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR SPECIFIC EXEMPTIONS TO THE RETAIL SALES TAX AND AMENDING SECTION 11 OF ORDINANCE NO. 78 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE RAISING OF REVENUES FOR THE GENERAL GOVERNMENTAL PURPOSES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO BY IMPOSING A RETAIL SALES TAX UPON THE EN-CASING OF CONTINUING IN BUSI-NESSES, PROFESSIONS, TRADES AND CALLERS, FOR PHORIT, IN THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, PROVIDING FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE TAXES SO COLLECTED; MAKING PROVISIONS FOR THE REFUND OF TAXES UNLAW-FULLY COLLECTED; PROV-IDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY", BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. That Section 11 of Ordinance No. 78, passed, adopted and approved by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico on August 21, 1961, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 11. Specific Exemptions.

There are exempted from the taxes imposed by this Ordinance the following:

(a) All sales or services made or performed by societies and other organizations not organized or operated for gain or profit.

(b) The sale of live poultry, the sale of live stock on the hoof and the unprocessed products of the farm, ranch, grove, or garden when made by the owner or producer thereof, and only organized nonprofit cooperative market associations, the members of which are bona fide growers or producers, shall, for the purpose of this Ordinance, be considered to be growers, producer, feeder or by any person engaged in the business of bartering, buying or selling live stock on the hoof, the sales of mohair and wool and the hides and pelts of domestic and wild animals when made by the grower or producer or trapper thereof, and persons engaged in the sole business of buying and selling wool or mohair shall for the purpose of this Ordinance, be considered to be growers or producers. This Ordinance is not to be construed to include the business of commercial dairying selling its products at retail.

(c) Premiums collected by insurance companies.

(d) Income received in the form of ordinary wages or salaries.

(e) The proceeds of the sale of school books where the price is fixed by the state.

(f) Gross receipts of hospitals, infirmaries or sanatoriums.

(g) Income received in the form of interest on money loaned, or in the form of dividends from stocks, bonds, securities, or from real estate rentals, and the proceeds from the sale of stocks, bonds, and other securities.

(h) Proceeds from the sale and circulation of newspapers and magazines, provided, however, that his exemption shall not apply to the sale of advertising space in such publications.

(i) Proceeds from the sale of gasoline or motor fuel on which a tax for sale or use thereof is imposed by the laws of this state, provided, however, that this exemption is extended only to the tax imposed by paragraphs A and H of Section 3, provided, further, that this exemption shall not apply to the proceeds of the sale of gasoline or motor fuel on which a refund is claimed under the provisions of Chapter 101, of the Session Laws of New Mexico 1935, or any act amendatory thereto.

(j) Building and Loan associations, State and National Banks.

(k) The sale of water for irrigation, domestic, commercial and industrial purposes.

(l) Gross receipts from dormitories and dining halls of state educational institutions.

(m) Wholesale services, meaning thereby those services performed by a wholesaler of services in this Ordinance on such services.

(n) Sales of commodities in which the following conditions are met: (1) That the sale is made to a purchaser for principal use outside the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo; and (2) That delivery is made by the retailer or his agent to a point outside the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo. The presumption shall be that all sales at retail are made for delivery to a point within the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo. The presumption may be rebutted by the presentation of a delivery receipt, or its equivalent, in such form as may be prescribed by the Bureau of Revenue accompanied by sales tickets.

(o) Services rendered wholly without the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo. This exemption shall apply only to those services described in Section 3C of this Ordinance.

(p) Proceeds from the sale of cigarettes, cigars, and tobacco in all forms on which a tax or

use thereof is imposed by the law of this state or the Town of Carrizozo.

(q) Each and every paragraph of this section is hereby declared separable from all the other portions of this Ordinance and shall not be deemed as the consideration of inducement for the enactment of the whole or any part of this Ordinance. Should any paragraph of this section for any reason be declared invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect as though such paragraph had not been included in this Ordinance.

(r) Sales of meals, food and drinks on common carriers operating through the Town of Carrizozo.

(s) Gross receipts arising from messages transmitted by wire or other means, transporting for hire persons or property by railroad, motor bus, truck, or air transportation between a point within the municipality and a point outside the municipality.

SECTION 2. That Section 20 of Ordinance No. 78, passed, adopted and approved by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico on August 21, 1961, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 20. Effective date. The tax to be collected under this Ordinance shall be imposed and collected on and after March 1st, 1962.

SECTION 3. Emergency. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need. It is therefore to become effective upon its passage and publication as provided by law on the date set forth in Section 20 above written.

FARM NEWS

BRA-A-A-A-CH
Belching is not only socially acceptable, but a real necessity among the blue-blooded aristocrats of the cattle herd. Gas formation is a constant by-product of micro-organisms which live in the cow's paunch and help her digest feed. Bloat occurs only when that gas is trapped in the paunch and is not relieved by belching.
Many factors related to belching may not yet be understood, but nutrition scientists agree that feeding a coarse roughage with sharp edges "tickles" the lining of the paunch and stimulates belching. Dangerous, acute bloat does not occur as long as cattle are belching freely. This is why it is always a good management practice to be sure that cattle are filled well on dry roughage before starting legume grazing, and to feed at least small amounts of dry roughage as long as the legumes are soft and fast growing.
Any palatable dry roughage available is usually quite satisfactory. Most feeders in cotton-growing areas prefer cottonseed hulls because they are easy to feed without waste and appear to be especially well adapted to preventing bloat because of their many sharp irregular edges and their capacity for water absorption. Also, hulls are easily mixed with cottonseed meal, molasses, or other ingredients which add sufficient palatability to insure the cattle eating enough roughage.
Special attention is needed the first day the cattle are turned on young legume pasture. Be sure the cattle are well-filled on roughage or more mature pasture forage. See that plenty of water is available before the cattle start grazing. Mid-day or early afternoon is a better time to start grazing than early morning. Always avoid starting grazing when the young legumes are covered with dew or wet from rain. It is sometimes best to let the cattle graze only a short time the first day if they appear to be eating heavily. If cattle are removed from the young legume grazing, the same precautions must be observed in starting them back on the legumes.

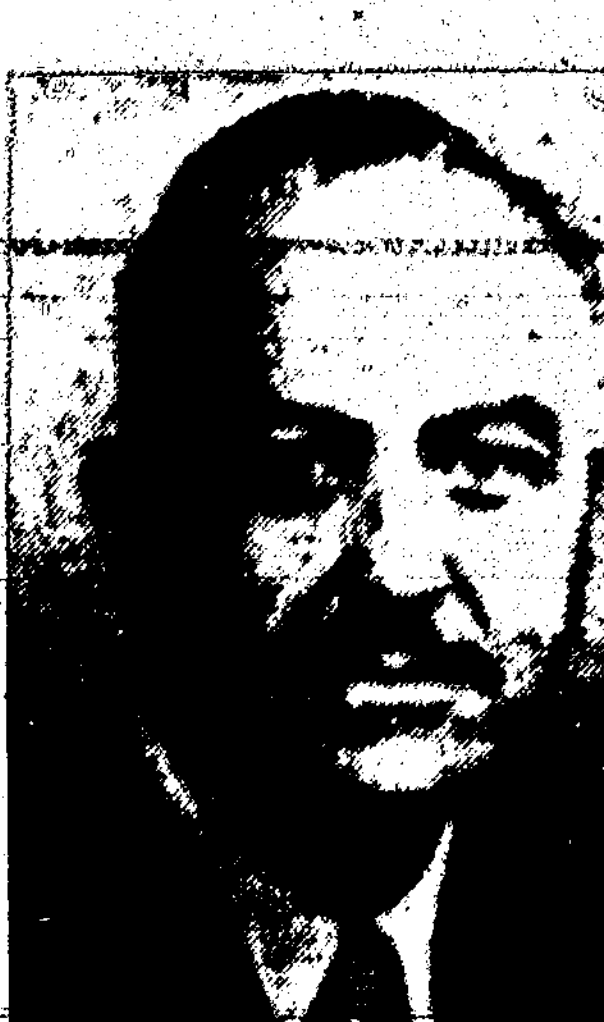

Project Gnome progress report

Following are two statements issued Friday, December 22, regarding exploration at the Project Gnome site. The first, issued at approximately 12:30 p.m. MST, follows:

Ernest Wynkoop, Manager of the Atomic Energy Commission's Project Gnome Office in Carlsbad, N. M., reported late this morning that the 12-inch drill hole had penetrated a cavity formed by the Dec. 10 detonation.

His report follows: "At 6:40 a.m., MST, today (Friday), drilling in the 12-inch hole was resumed at 955 feet. There was some trouble through loss of drilling water into the salt.

"At 10:32 a.m. the drill penetrated into a cavity at 1089 feet. At 11:30 a.m. the drill had been moved on into the cavity without reaching the lower side. (The device was detonated at 1200-foot depth).

"There was no steam and no pressure recorded. A radiation reading of 20 millirentgens per hour was obtained through the pipe. This has little meaning as radiation within the cavity undoubtedly is much higher but there was no pressure, flow to bring it into the drill hole. No good measurement of temperature has been obtained.

"The nine and seven-eighths inch drill hole is being held back at 1030 feet.

"Lawrence Radiation Laboratory technical people expect to obtain later today a measurement of the cavity and measurements as to temperature. We will probably continue into the cavity with the smaller hole. We may introduce water to try to build up steam."

Industrial development group spurs Clovis to fantastic growth record

Clovis, New Mexico's principal cattle feeding and marketing and grain milling center, is adding new industries at a pace that is pushing it out front.

The city's newest acquisition is a \$2 million meat packing plant to be in operation by Swift & Co. next summer.

The same day's news that carried this announcement had another one—that Safeway Stores, Inc., will build a \$500,000 fluid milk processing plant in Clovis immediately to provide its fifty stores in New Mexico and Texas with Lucerne Dairy products.

Safeway expects to buy \$300,000 worth of milk annually from dairymen in the surrounding area. A good deal of it will no doubt come from Roosevelt County, just to the south of Clovis, New Mexico's number one dairying county.

Hitherto, milk produced there has gone to market via El Paso. **2,500 HEAD A WEEK** The pack plant will be designed to process 2,500 head of livestock a week. It is being built by the city to lease to Swift under terms of the New Mexico Industrial Revenue Bond Law, which permits municipalities to issue revenue bonds to finance new industries.

Swift is no stranger to Clovis, having carried on cattle feeding and buying operations there for years, along with Armour, Schwartzman and other packers.

In average years a half-million head of livestock changes hands at the Clovis stockyards. An additional large operation is that of feeding, watering and servicing thousands of cattle passing through in rail shipments. Clovis was founded by the Santa Fe railroad as a division point. Yard operations there are still among the largest on its lines. A recently developed function of the yards is to recondition freight cars.

Clovis' location in the heart of the high plains grain producing area, which straddles the New Mexico-Texas border, together with aggressive business policies,

has enabled Clovis to dominate the commercial trade of four counties in New Mexico and three in Texas. Much of the 60 million bushels of wheat and grain sorghums produced in the high plains annually are milled at Clovis.

One of the next things on the Clovis industrial development calendar is a sugar beet processing plant. This will require the commitment of certain acreages to raising the beets.

It is no wonder that, with all of this progress, Clovis has become New Mexico's seventh largest city. Building permits are running at \$5 million a year.

A delight on the Swift deal is that the whole thing started with an inquiry from the commercial research department of Swift & Co. Swift's research people had learned of efforts by the New Mexico Department of Development to locate a meat packing plant in eastern New Mexico. A number of other southwestern cities tried strenuously for the plant allocation but Clovis won.
