





















ORDINANCE 79

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR SPECIFIC EXEMPTIONS TO THE RETAIL SALES TAX AND AMENDING SECTION IT OF ORDINANCE NO.78 EN-TITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE RAISING OF REVENUES FOR GENERAL GOVERNMENTAL PURPOSES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO BY IMPOSING A RETAIL SALES TAX UPON THE EN-GAGING OF CONTINUING IN BUSINESS, PROFESSIONS, TRADES AND CALLINGS, FOR PROFIT, IN THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO: PROVIDING FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE TAXES SO CULLECTED: MAKE ING PROVISIONS FOR THE REFUND OF TAXES UNLAW-FULLY COLLECTED; PROVID-ING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVI-SIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE. SECTION 2. That Section 20 of Ordinance No. 78, passed, auopted and approved by the Lourd of trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico on August 21, 1901, be and the same is hereby amended as foliows:

SECTION 20, Effective date The tax to be collected under this Ordinance shall be imposed and collected on and after March 1st, 1962.

SECTION 3, Emergency, This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need. it is therefore to become effective upon its passage and publication as provided by law on above written.






