Pipe-breaking weather leaves lots of damage in Lincoln County area

The Weather Bureau reports the coldest readings since records have been kept in Lincoln County. The lowest reading was January 11—a minus 12 degrees on that date.

Carrizozo businesses and homes were hard hit with frozen and burst water lines. This hospital suffered much damage from broken pipes which flooded the halls and rooms. The ceiling in the surgery room fell and in other parts of the hospital the ceiling was cut open to get at the pipes.

Fort Stanton was hard hit with nearly all of the hospital and living quarters water lines frozen and burst.

Nearly all of the city water mains and cells were frozen and an estimated loss of about 35 meters. The chlorination and filtration plants are frozen. As the thawing continues more leaky lines are showing up and there will be more loss.

Most Carrizozo homes were without water at one time or another and some business places were

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Sales tax referendum due in Ruidoso Downs

Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso Downs are preparing to call a referendum in answer to a "yechement" protest by 83 residents who oppose a one-cent sales tax, scheduled to become effective next month.

The protest group handed a petition to the trustees this week and demanded the right to vote on the proposed tax.

Under state law, village councils are permitted to levy such a tax, but must call for a vote if vocal opposition appears.

Trustees agreed to hold the referendum, but said they were undecided when.

Air base theft ring broken

Sheriff Glen Bradley and State Policeman Bill Kruse of Carrizozo along with other peace officers from Roswell, Ruidoso, Lincoln County and Walker Air Force Base worked for four days turning up evidence that more than a dozen airmen stationed at Walker AFB were involved in a theft ring which affects both Lincoln and Chaves Counties, and perhaps other areas.

Sheriff Bradley and State Policeman Kruse report the loot recovered from barracks which was searched on Walker AFB will total about \$15,000 and that more may be accounted for later.

There were at least nine burglaries in Lincoln County, most of them in the Ruidoso area. A breaking and entering report from Picacho store was the start of the investigation of the six soldiers who were apprehended in Roswell. The six had gotten through a road block that had been set up in Alamogordo, Ruidoso and Hondo. The car was searched by Sheriff Bradley and Sgt. Kruse and a pair of gloves was discovered that had been taken from the Picacho store.

Officers heard that liquor was being sold in one barracks at the Base at ridiculously low prices. From questioning men involved in the sales, evidence of other stolen goods was turned up. Some of the airmen confessed when confronted with the stolen goods and named others involved in the robberies. While the questioning was going on barracks were being searched and articles are being returned by airmen who had either purchased them or stolen them from the persons involved in the robberies.

David L. Mountain, part time Sears Roebuck employee, and living off-base in Roswell kept bringing in items one-by-one and finally he admitted he knew the items were stolen as he had been told by

Jimmy Herrera, Justice of Peace at Hondo, announced as a candidate for this office.

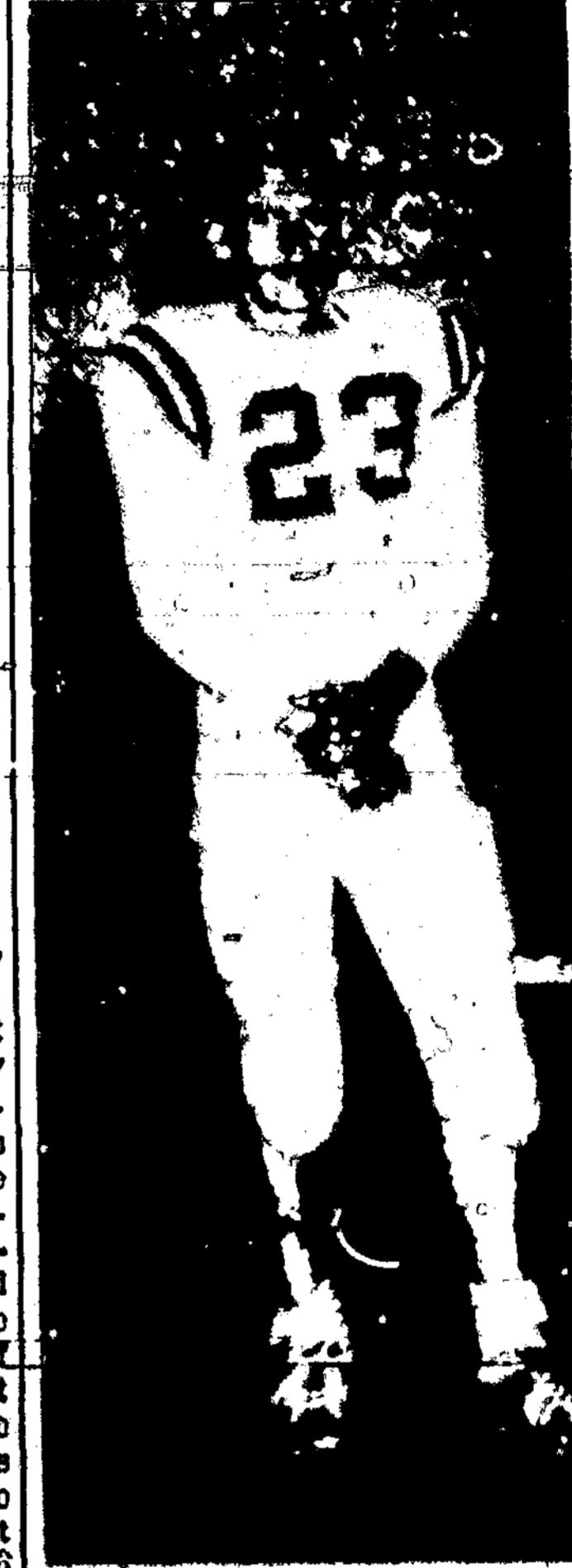

Will go along with compulsory dip if scabies conditions become severe

Sheep, rabbits and the quarantine of sheep, in Lincoln County, was the major item of discussion by 150 growers at the Lincoln County Wool-growers meeting, held Saturday in Carrizozo.

Dr. Lewis Bodenweiser, Phelps White and Reuben Evans, attended the meeting representing the New Mexico Sanitary Board.

Any sheep not consigned directly to slaughter must be dipped before they can be sold. Also the dip must be done under official supervision of the New Mexico inspectors or federal personnel.

The group went on record approving the actions of the Sheep Sanitary Board and if scabies conditions become severe, they would go along with a compulsory dip of all sheep in Lincoln County.

Dr. Bodenweiser explained the quarantine regulations and requested that a list of sheep dipping vats be compiled for Lincoln County so that if dipping has to be carried out it can be done as quickly as possible. He explained that if no new outbreaks are found that the quarantine will be lifted by fall.

Every sheep in the county must be inspected in the next few months to see if they have scabies.

Another complicating factor is the loss of strength of the lindane dip solution in warm weather. Research is now going on, but indications are that a small open celled animal, paramoecium, eats all the gamma isomer, the active part of lindane, in 96 hours during the hot summer weather. Tests will be made of all dip solutions in this area to see if this is the case. The possibility exists that the present outbreak may have resulted from loss of lindane strength, in dips or quarantines field last summer.

Bill Overton, president of the New Mexico Woolgrowers, said that drastic measures may need to be taken, if scabies is to be eradicated. Just because Do Dacca County does not have it does not mean that they will not get it. He is still greatly concerned if we are to control it.

Local officers capture escapees from Albuquerque-county jail

Local law enforcement officers set up a road block about midnight Sunday and captured two escapees from an Albuquerque jail. A report was received about midnight that 30 jail inmates had escaped from the Albuquerque jail. Four had been captured and nine were still at large.

Socorro reported that a '63 Chevrolet government car had been stolen and that the two occupants had robbed a filling station using a long bladed knife to hold the attendant at bay. After robbing the station the attendant was kidnapped, taken to San Antonio and then let out unharmed.

The stolen car was spotted west of Carrizozo and Sheriff Bradley gave pursuit. The road block was set up at the road in front of the Means Motor Supply. The car ran the road block at a high rate of speed. Officers pursued the car through town and on to the road that leads to Sally Ortiz's house. A rear tire was shot out at which time the two escapees were apprehended.

The two escapees are lodged in the Lincoln County jail. Socorro has outstanding warrants for these two for armed robbery and kidnaping.

Officers responsible for the capture are Sheriff Bradley, Sgt. Bill Kruse, Marvin Roberts and City Marshal Chascho Morales.

The two jail inmates were returned Tuesday to Socorro and Albuquerque by authorities.

across of public rangelands. On these lands last year, more than 45,000 western stockmen and ranchers paid fees for permission to graze about 14 million cattle and 35 million sheep plus several million calves and lambs.

Throughout the range country, more than 700 livestock raisers are cooperating in the Government study. Some 75 "model" ranch operations of different sizes and in different regions of the West will be identified by the study.

For each representative ranch, the economists will compare present ranch organization, income and costs with conditions which might result if changes were made in grazing fees or in the number of animals the ranchers were permitted to graze on public lands.

After analysis and evaluation, results of the economic study will be published by the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service.

The State Director for BIM in New Mexico, Chesley P. Seely, pointed out that the results of this study are of vital importance to the livestock raisers of New Mexico.

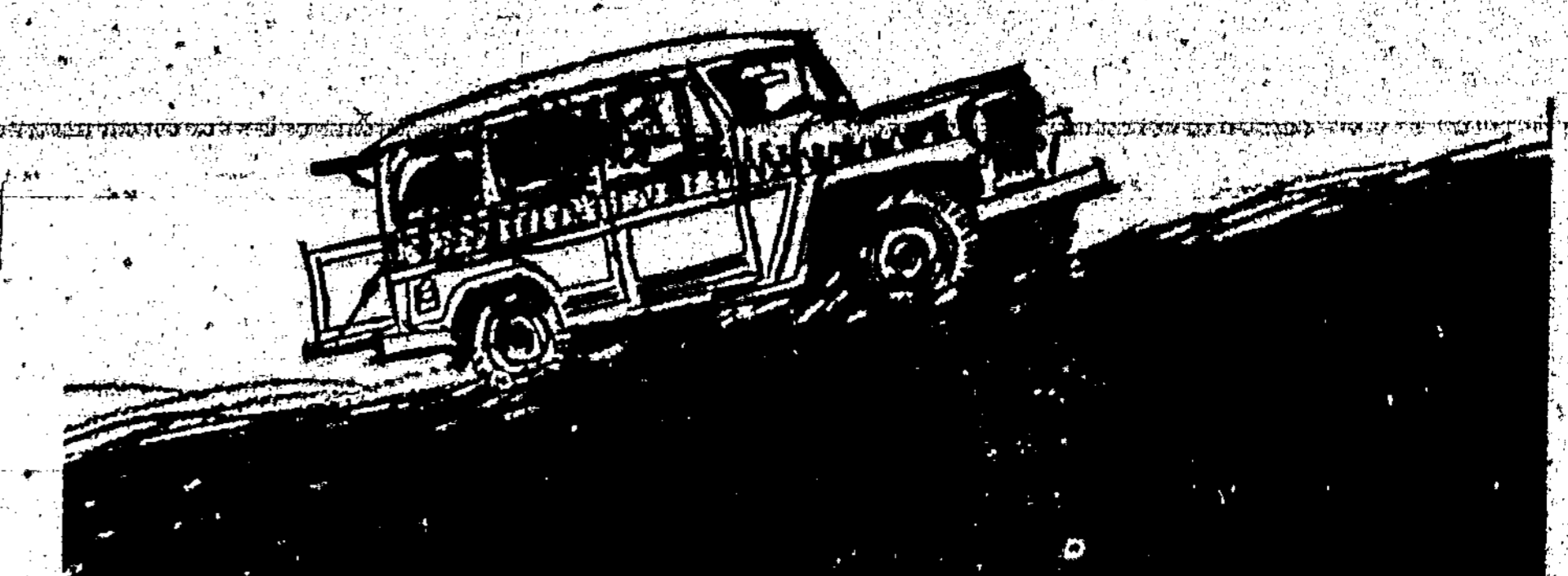

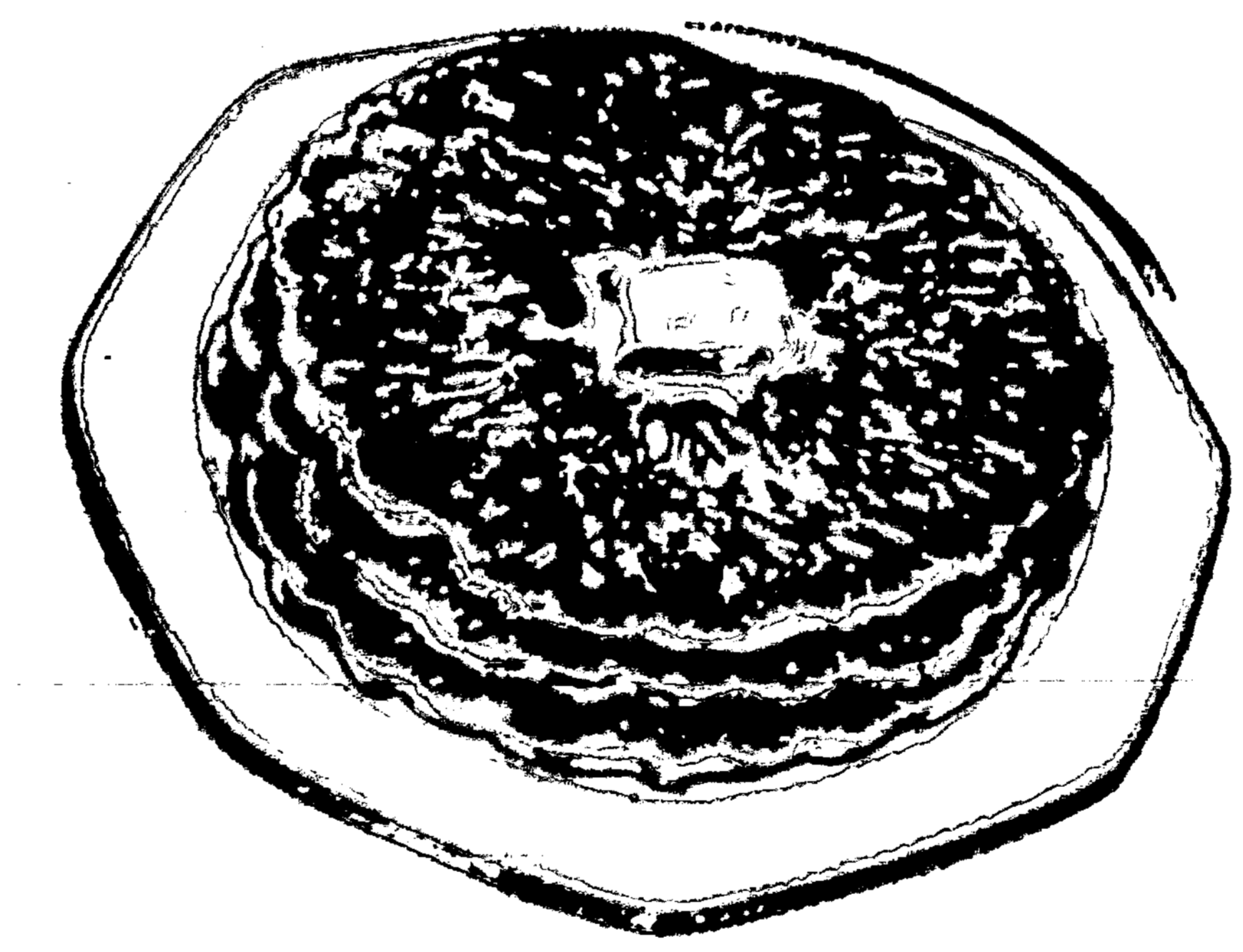

Carrizozo SCD annual report

The Carrizozo Soil Conservation District was organized October 11, 1945. It comprises 902,820 acres. All except about 200 acres is range land. At present there are 70 operating ranches in the District. Of these 52 are District Cooperators and 39 have basic conservation plans.

The District Board meets the first Wednesday of each month. Twelve regular meetings and one special meeting were held in 1961. Attendance was 70%. During the year E. J. Harkey resigned and J. S. Stearns was appointed to fulfill his term. T. A. Spencer was elected to the board in September. The present Board of supervisors is as follows:

T. A. Spencer, Chairman; R. M. Shafer, Vice Chairman; Lee Straley, Secretary-Treasurer; H. O. Smith, J. S. Stearns, Members.

The Board observed Soil Stewardship Sunday and participated in the County Fair. The annual report, election results and news items were published in the County paper. Conservation material was furnished the Carrizozo school. The 1961 annual plan of operations was essentially completed.

The District equipment was kept busy during the year. It is made available by the District Board of Supervisors for the benefit of district cooperators. One full time operator is employed. Since contractor equipment is seldom available here the Board feels this service is essential. A plastic pipe layer has been made available to district cooperators.

There are 12 Great Plains Contracts in the District. Three of them expired in 1961. The Board wishes to congratulate Sid Goodloe, Bryan and John Allen Hightower and Barney and Weldon Wilson on completion of their Great Plains Contracts. Use of the Great Plains program, ACP and Extension Service is encouraged by the Board of Supervisors.

Some of the conservation prac-

tices installed during the year are as follows:

Brush Control	5577 acres
Range Seeding	400 acres
Pipelines	9590 ft.
Croston Control Dams	160
Stockwater Ponds	6

The District encourages proper range use and good range management as basic to soil protection. Results obtained from conservation practices are very encouraging in

the District.

The Carrizozo District has a Memorandum of Understanding with the Soil Conservation Service for technical assistance and with the Bureau of Land Management. They also have a work agreement with BIM for use of District equipment. The Board of Supervisors wish to express their appreciation to these and other Agencies for their assistance. They also wish

to thank the Cooperators in the District for their support of the conservation program.

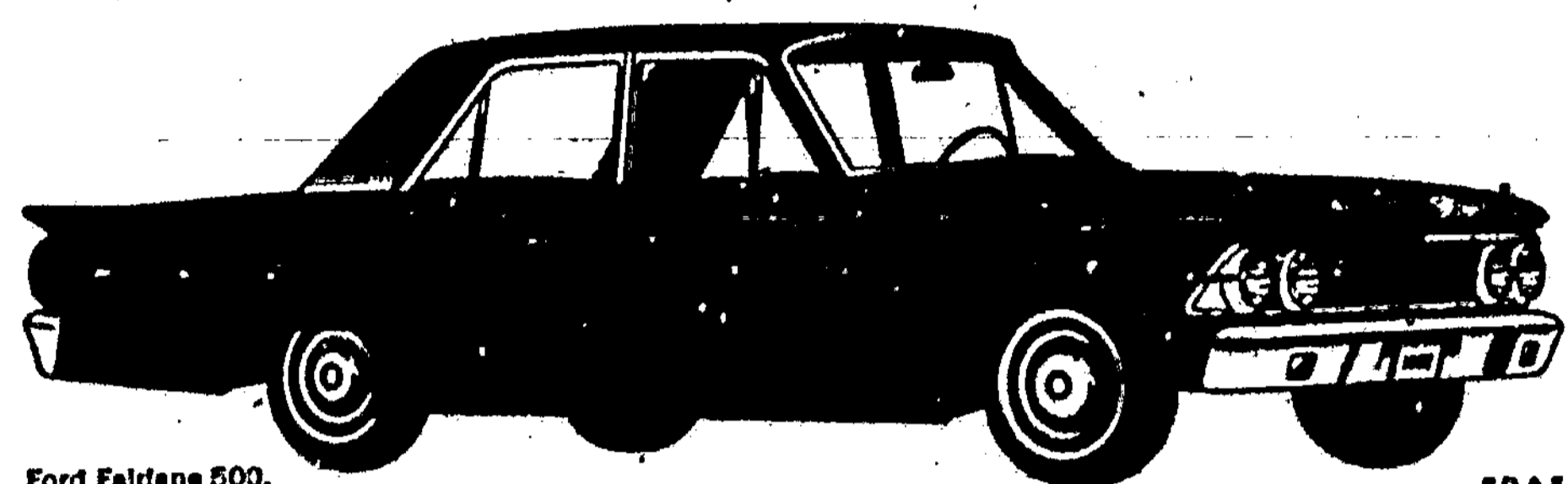

ORDINANCE 79
 AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR SPECIFIC EXEMPTIONS TO THE RETAIL SALES TAX AND AMENDING SECTION 11 OF ORDINANCE NO. 78 ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE RAISING OF REVENUES FOR GENERAL GOVERNMENTAL PURPOSES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO BY IMPOSING A RETAIL SALES TAX UPON THE ENGAGING OF CONTINUING IN BUSINESS, PROFESSIONS, TRADES AND CALLINGS, FOR PROFIT, IN THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO; PROVIDING FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE TAXES SO COLLECTED; MAKING PROVISIONS FOR THE REFUND OF TAXES UNLAWFULLY COLLECTED; PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY," BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. That Section 11 of Ordinance No. 78, passed, adopted and approved by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico on August 21, 1961, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 11. Specific exemptions.

There are exempted from the taxes imposed by this Ordinance the following:

(a) All sales of services made or performed by societies and other organizations for the benefit of or for the good of the public.

(b) The sale of live stock on the hoof and the unprocessed products of the farm, ranch, grove, or garden when made by the owner or producer thereof, and any organized nonprofit cooperative market associations, the members of which are bona fide growers or producers, shall, for the purpose of this Ordinance, be considered to be grower, producer, or recuser by any person engaged in the business of marketing, buying or selling live stock on the hoof, the sales of mohair and wool and the hides and pelts of domestic and wild animals when made by the grower or producer or trapper thereof, and persons engaged in the bona fide business of buying and selling wool or mohair shall, for the purpose of this Ordinance, be considered to be growers or producers. This Ordinance is not to be construed to include the business of commercial dairymen selling their products at retail.

(c) Premiums collected by insurance companies.

(d) Income received in the form of ordinary wages or salaries.

(e) The proceeds of the sale of school books where the price is fixed by the state.

(f) Gross receipts of hospitals, innumerate or sanatoriums.

(g) Income received in the form of interest on money loaned, or in the form of dividends from stocks, bonds, securities, or from real estate rentals and the proceeds from the sale of stocks, bonds, and other securities.

(h) Proceeds from the sale and circulation of newspapers and magazines, provided, however, that this exemption shall not apply to the sale of advertising space in such publications.

(i) Proceeds from the sale of gasoline or motor fuel on which a tax for sale or use thereof is imposed by the laws of this state; provided, however, that this exemption is extended only to the tax imposed by paragraphs A and B of Section 3; provided, further, that this exemption shall not apply to the proceeds of the sale of gasoline or motor fuel on which a refund is claimed under the provisions of Chapter 101, of the Session Laws of New Mexico 1953; or any act amendatory thereto.

(j) Building and loan associations, State and National Banks.

(k) The sale of water for irrigation, domestic, commercial and industrial purposes.

(l) Gross receipts from dormitories and dining halls of state educational institutions.

(m) Wholesale services, meaning thereby those services performed by a wholesaler of services for a retailer who is liable for retail sales tax as provided in this Ordinance on such services.

(n) Sales of commodities in which the following conditions are met: (1) That the sale is made to a purchaser for principal use outside the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo and (2) that delivery is made by the retailer or his agent to a point outside the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo. The presumption may be rebutted by the presentation of a delivery receipt, or its equivalent, in such form as may be prescribed by the Bureau of Revenue accompanied by sales tickets.

(o) Services rendered wholly without the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo. This exemption shall apply only to those services described in Section 3C of this Ordinance.

(p) Proceeds from the sale of cigarettes, cigars, and tobacco

In all forms on which a tax or use thereof is imposed by the law of this state or the Town of Carrizozo.

(g) Each and every paragraph of this section is hereby declared separable from all the other portions of this Ordinance and shall not be deemed as the consideration of inducement for the enactment of the whole or any part of this Ordinance. Should any paragraph of this section for any reason be declared invalid, the remainder of this Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect as though such paragraph had not been included in this Ordinance.

(r) Sales of meals, food and drinks on common carriers operating through the Town of Carrizozo.

(s) Gross receipts arising from messages transmitted by wire or other means, transporting or by air, persons or property by railroad, motor bus, truck, or air transportation between a point within the municipality and a point outside the municipality.

SECTION 2. That Section 20 of Ordinance No. 78, passed, adopted and approved by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico on August 21, 1961, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

SECTION 20. Effective date. The tax to be collected under this Ordinance shall be imposed and collected on and after March 1st, 1962.

SECTION 3. Emergency. This Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need. It is therefore to become effective upon its passage and publication as provided by law on the date set forth in Section 20 above written.

Pre-entrance exams set for Carrizozo Seniors
 Senior high school students in Carrizozo interested in becoming professional nurses can take the first step in that direction Saturday, January 27. Pre-entrance examinations for Hotel Dieu School of Nursing will be conducted that day in El Paso.

According to Miss Christine C. Bonds, Assistant Director of the school, Applications, both single and married, between ages 17 and 35, can take the exams by advance notification to the school, 1101 North Kansas, El Paso, and by paying the \$10 testing fee upon arrival at 9 a.m., January 27. The test concludes at 3 p.m.

The El Paso school, serving southern New Mexico, West Texas, and eastern Arizona, has just been accredited nationally by the National League for Nursing.

Successful applicants will enter nursing school as freshmen in September, 1962. The three-year course includes a full year of college work at Texas Western, a second year concentrating on the various facets of medical and surgical nursing, and a final year learning the fundamentals of obstetric, pediatric, and psychiatric nursing. The psychiatric portion is a three-month course at De Paul Hospital in New Orleans.

Total cost of the entire three years is \$1,400. This includes tuition, food, lodging, books, uniforms and student fees.

Immigration officials pleased with response
 Immigration officials are well pleased with the response of aliens in New Mexico and West Texas, area to address report requirements.

Mr. Richard C. Haberstroh of the Immigration and Naturalization Service stated that although the program has been underway only 15 days, the number reporting thus far is well ahead of the number reporting during the same period last year.

Aliens have until the end of January within which to submit their report of address to the Government. Forms for the purpose may be obtained at any Post Office or any office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

All aliens, with few exceptions, are required to report. Those excluded from this requirement include diplomats, persons accredited to certain international organizations and persons who were admitted temporarily as agricultural workers.

Aliens who are minors must also report, but the parent or legal guardian should submit the report for an alien child under fourteen years of age.

Don't forget to do this between now and March 1.

The staff at the Assessor's office at the Court House will be glad to assist you. You must come to the Court House and sign your tax schedule, or meet the Assessor at one of the places designated below; if you live away from the County Seat. Our office hours are:

9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. (we are open during noon hour) Mondays through Fridays.

Many people, each year, have to pay considerably more taxes because they do not take the small amount of time necessary to attend to this legal obligation. If no return is filed the law requires a 5% penalty and all exemptions are lost. Veterans must bring their Certificate of Eligibility for their exemption, for endorsement by the staff.

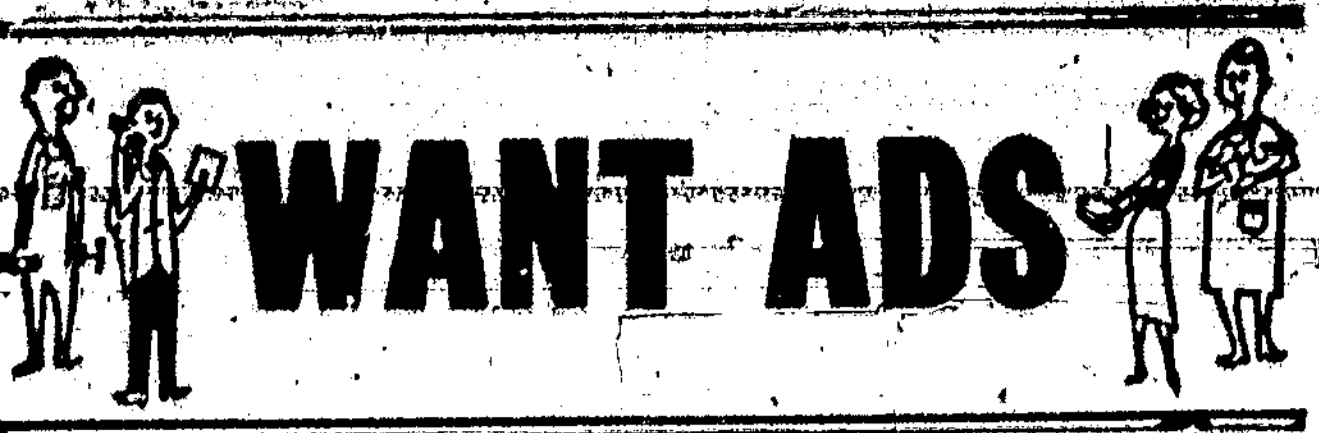
