SANTA FE - A delegation of New Mexico ranchers have met with State Land commissioner E. S. Johnny Walker with proposals to hold down speculative buying of - state-owned grazing land.

"Speculative prices, and their reflection in higher lease prices, are threatening a very detrimental effect upon the entire livestock industry," Lon Merchant, spokesman for the group, said.

Two proposals made by the group, Merchant said, were supported in principle by cattlemen > . and school people, beneficiaries of the land sales

Merchant said support was given by James Rodgers, president of the New Mexico Education tie New Mexico School Board Assn., and other educators.

"Me proposals made by the delegation at a meeting with Walker were aimed at cutting down speculative buying by outside parties.

One of the proposals would provide that state land would be placed on county tax rolls as of the date of its original purchase, instead of at the end of the 30-year period allowed to make final pay-

The other would be to increase the down payment from the present 5 per cent, plus 4 per cent interest in advance, to 10 per cent plus interest. Buyers also would be required to post bond to marantee that the total payment would be made.

"It was a pitiful thing to see this man slumping out of the sale after having his rench bid in at \$76 an acre - knowing that he was out of business." Merchant said

"No one is quarreling with obtaining additional revenue from state land -- as long as it doesn't destroy the livestock economy." The delegation asked Walker to

consider a sharp surtailment of land sales. Walker told the delegation the livestock industry had for years

used its influence to retain use of state land at low lease rates. He said they also resisted his

efforts to inventory land holdings; "I was told by several ranchers that they were afraid I was making the inventory to furnish a list of their improvements to the tox commission. I hadn't thought of it at the time, but that's just what I did," Walker said,

He said the livestock industry. also violently opposed the present grazing fee rates, raised during the last legislature, which it now admits are fair.

The land commissioner said the

accelerated land sales "were not a very nice thing to do from the viewpoint of the ranchers - but they are very beneficial for the schools, And, I wanted to shake up the livestock industry."

"You made a tremendous suc-cess in that respect," Merchant said, "You have us shook up."

"You will find a bunch of ranchers with a different attitude from now on. Lane Lineberry, a Kermit, Tex., rancher, said. Lineberry also operates a cattle ranch in New

The meeting upparently ended

with Walker inclined to favor two of the delegations proposals,

They apparently differed considerably concerning whether administration of state lands should be purely aimed at providing the maximum revenue for schools and institutions or whether the interests of the livestock industry also should be considered.

Walker told the delegation as he interprets the law, his duty is clearly and simply to administer the lands left in his trust to obtain the maximum revenues for the schools and institutions

Lincoln County Hospital Board of Trustees: Vernon Petty, Lewis Cummins, Dimitt Bond, Lon Merchant, and Dr. J. P. Turner held a meeting January 23 to discuss the plight of the Carrizozo Hospital.

The Hospital has been operating in the red for two years and unless sound of the staggering amount of unpaid accounts. \$45,000 or closer to \$50,000, are paid immediately the hospital will be forced to close its doors to the sick and niling people of Lincoln County,

A gift of \$5,000 by a friend has helped to keep the Hospital operating this year. The only source of income other than patients is about \$5,000 received from the County. Part of this aid is from a Special Tax levy voted to help Carrizozo

The hospital has managed to meet its payroll for the loyal staff, now working on a salary that is 20 per cent less than salaries paid in other hospitals — other bills have not been

The main reason for the present and financial state is the \$50,00 in unpaid bills and the unexpected expense of frezen and broken pipes which resulted in much damage to the ceiling of the hospital building.

CARRILLO WORKIES HOUSE LEADERS

SANTA FE - Rep. Rudolfo Carrillo of Las Cruces who was convicted of getting away with several thousand dollars of courthouse money has shown no indication of resigning from the legislature and has house leaders worried about what to do with him if he shows up for the Feb. 12 special session.

The constitution says felons may not hold public office but Atty, Gen. Earl Hartley wouldn't be guided by anything as simple as that and labored out an opinion to the effect that only the legislature could remove a legislator.

"Carrillo's Democratic colleague Sen. Jim Patton of Las Cruces has had a bill drawn which would automatically throw out legislators convicted of felonies but nothing can be done with it in time to take care of Carrillo.

JACK CAMPBELL UNDER THE GUN

If Carrillo shows up Feb. 12 the heat will be focused on the house in general and in particular on Speaker Jack Campbell, the candidate for governor.

If past practices continues the representatives of the people will hear the chaplain's prayer and go on with their work with the pretense that they have no knowe ledge of one of their members being convicted of embezzlement and sentenced to prison (suspended).

This was the course of the state senate in 1939 when a felon was uncovered in that august body and of the house in 1953 when one of the members was disclosed to have been convicted of postoffice steal--- INCC

In the latter case there was no official recognition of the questioned status of the member but the leadership if the house exploited his guilt to intimidate him in legislative matters. For instance, he wan't allowed to vote on choosing the house officers.

IT'S NO TIME. FOR PRETENSE

The legislature is too hot this time to risk that kind of makebelieve. The seriousness of the school financing before the special seision and the general bad repute that the lawmakers carned in the fumbling regular session of 1961 do not allow any leeway for pretending that one of the lawmakers want convicted of a felony, If Carrillo shows up the respon-

sibility will fall directly on the governor-running Campbell to get him out or produce a satisfactory reason for retaining ben ab wlawmaker for the state. -Riowever it goes, it will be pain-

ful for the candidate Campbell. Al. ready it has been heard up in this part of the state that treatment of Carrillo shouldn't be too harsh because he did restore the money that he was caught taking. That's the code of many in politics; If you get caught stealing you have to put it back and nothing more should be said.

And it has also been noted here that Carrillo has not been removed as secretary of the Democratic central committee of Doria Ana county. Perhaps that means the people down there want Carrillo as their representative and they should be best to judge.

HOBBS CHAIRMAN EYES DEM TICKET

The entry of Rep. Mack Easley, Demo chairman of Lea county, as a prospective candidate for lieutenant governor was a shock to some north-siders who had hoped to ease Rep. W. O. Culbertson of San Miguel into the lost guy nomination.

Jack Flynn of Santa Fe, an energetic newcomer in Democratic politics, has been running for the nomination for four months, and don't forget Albuquerque Joe Montoya, the 1960 winner. Montoya who is still contesting

the election of Republican Tom Bolack said a couple of meaths ago that he would be a candidate for "re-election." With maybe half a dozen run-
