Bail denied in McKnight case

Mr. McKnight had called Sheriff Bradley out of a cafe one night in April of 1961, with the information that he had shot through the window of the house, and may have shot his wife. When he called Mrs. McKnight would not answer, and McKnight wanted the Sheriff to go to the house. A settlement was reached in this instance according to Bradley.

New Mexico and Mt. States Tel. Co. celebrate Anniversaries... Interesting commentary on New Mexico's current celebration of 50 years of statehood is furnished by the Mountain States Telephone Co., which points out that the state and that company marked their Golden Anniversaries within a few months of one another. New Mexico became a state January 6, 1912 and Mountain States began operations in the New Mexico territory just six months earlier, on July 19, 1911.

Statewide, in 1912 there were just 7,775 phones in all New Mexico, compared with 273,000 today, and 100 long distance calls were completed daily then as compared with 46,000 a day now. Looks like the telephone company will stay busy for a while.

Street Plan is part of city planning

One of the main sections of the Carrizozo City Plan deals with a plan for the city's streets and their future extensions. Once a street plan is laid out, it becomes a permanent part of the city. In spite of the fact that Carrizozo has not grown much in the last decade, its basic resources are such that a considerable growth is not only a possibility but a likelihood.

With this in mind, one of the main sections of the city plan deals with the city's streets and their future extension. These extensions will be made on virgin soil, provisions covering population increase and incorporating a new type of subdivision are all outlined in detail. Using the existing elementary school as the center of a 1/4 mile radius around the building insures walking distances for children.

TRAFFIC FREE BLOCKS... The school circle is bounded by a wide circular traffic line which leads into U shaped residential blocks. The provision is made for pedestrian walkways to the school. Children have no major traffic streets to cross with the exception of near the school building where supervision is possible. Similar school centers are proposed East and South of the city and main streets also circle around these.

HIGHWAY STREETS... A possible realignment of U. S. 54 highway utilizing two short lines is possible. The one most advantageous to the city is shown along the Southern Pacific railroad with a turn South of the city to a direct line to Tularosa. While there is as no plan as yet for reconstruction of the highway, it is well for the city to be prepared and foresighted and include this in the city plan.

TRUCK BYPASS... While it may be ten years before a change is made on U. S. 54, therefore recommends the use of 13th street as a truck bypass. This will not only relieve Central Avenue, but make it more serviceable for business purposes.

CENTRAL AVENUE... Central Avenue presently has stone curbs and a roadway of 48 feet. Since the width between property lines is only 60 feet, the sidewalks are 6 feet. A 10 to 12' wide sidewalk is essential for business blocks. Since widening of the street is costly, new buildings should be set back 5 to 10 feet.

MAIN STREET AND 8TH STREET... Both of these streets are part of the original town plat. They are 50 feet wide between property lines. A roadway of 36 feet will furnish space for two lanes of moving cars and two lanes of parked cars.

EIGHTH STREET - A MONUMENTAL STREET... In the street plan of Carrizozo, it was proposed to open 8th Street to Central Avenue. This was proposed for many reasons. The main one is that it will improve the circulation of traffic. It has, however, several other purposes. The street can be made into one of the monumental character. On it are the swimming pool and park, the hospital and city's school buildings. Another reason is that the street is wide enough to have boulevard trees on both sides. With the trees and the public buildings this would be an outstanding avenue in the state. For this new swimming pool park, it would create a setting of unusual beauty.

EAST SIDE... The plan of the city's East side is very similar to that of the West side. Aspen Street is the main business street and should have 12 feet wide sidewalk strips and a 36 feet wide pavement. (Continued on back page)

F&L Bureau starts membership drive

At a meeting Monday night in Carrizozo the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock set in motion a drive to fill the quota of 207 members for the county - 45 short at the time of meeting.

Walt Wilson of Ancho, county president, opened the meeting and introduced Bill Wells, organizational director for the southeast district; Ralph Bonnell, Glencoe, state board member; Melvin Sultemeier, Corona, county organizational director; N. E. Britton, Captain, Mid-County chairman; Albert Grathowald, Corona chairman; Lucio Zamora, Honda chairman; and Kap Kelley, insurance, of Honda.

Ralph Bonnell told of attending two meetings at Phoenix and Albuquerque. The big problem confronting Lincoln County is legislation which would allow grazing of "layout" land, which would put farmers of the nation in direct competition with ranchers.

Melvin Sultemeier said the quota was based on the previous year. The \$15 membership fee is split \$3 to the state, \$1 to the national, \$1 to the county - if the county makes its quota, otherwise the county receives \$4.

Competition is going on between county organizational directors this year with a three-day paid vacation going to the winner. For memberships to count in the contest they must be in by March 1.

The list of unpaid members was split up among the several locals and visits started the next day with good expectations of going over the quota.

Democratic Precinct Meeting

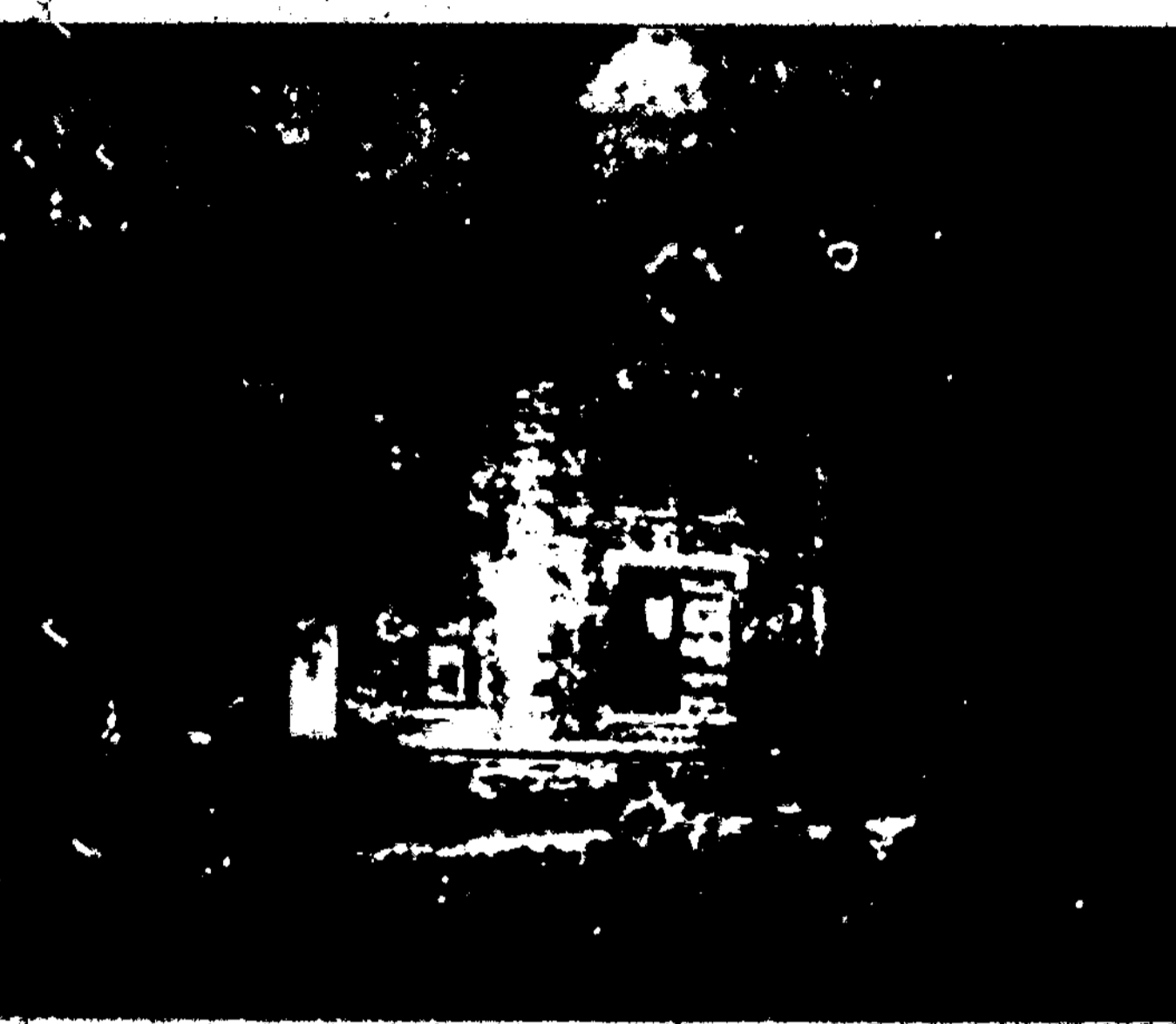

Shift from Town to Cooperative made this week as meters read out

The Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc., has completed its deal with the Town of Carrizozo and electric meters were read out by the Town as of February 19-20. These statements will go in the mail March 1. The next billing will be from the Cooperative. Edward Penfield, Town Clerk, said that electric service is the responsibility of the Cooperative, and revenues derived from now on are the property of the Cooperative.

Collection of the 1c sales tax, authorized by vote of the Town of Carrizozo, will become effective Thursday, March 1, 1962. Joy D. Lasater, manager of the Cooperative, and C. L. Brown, assistant manager, were in Carrizozo the first of the week working on the changeover.

In the near future an office will be established in Carrizozo. The location and personnel of this office is not established at present. Tuesday Lasater and Penfield appeared before the Public Service Commission in Santa Fe on the transfer, which was mostly routine. Sale of electric utilities leaves the Town in the water, garbage, sewer and ice business.

An advertisement on the back page of this issue gives added details of the changeover.

Bill Shreengost reported by phone to the Lincoln County News today that committee substitute for House Bill No. 15 was passed unanimously in yesterday's session, based on the Gott plan. It is a step in the right direction, most certainly not a positive solution, but is something to work on. Corrections, as needed, can be made in the next legislative session only six months away. Rep. Shreengost serves on the appropriations and finance committee which worked 80 to 80 hours studying the situation and comparing the Mert and Gott plans before compiling a committee substitute bill. It will help Lincoln County financially in my estimation, said Shreengost. We are going to consider the license plate problem tomorrow and for reasons of economy I sponsored a bill, after discussion with Gov. Ed. Mechem, through the appropriations and finance committee to extend the present law one year, which means using the old plates at a saving of \$210,000.00. It is an excellent session in my estimation. Very little playing around, seems to be non-partisan and everyone is working.

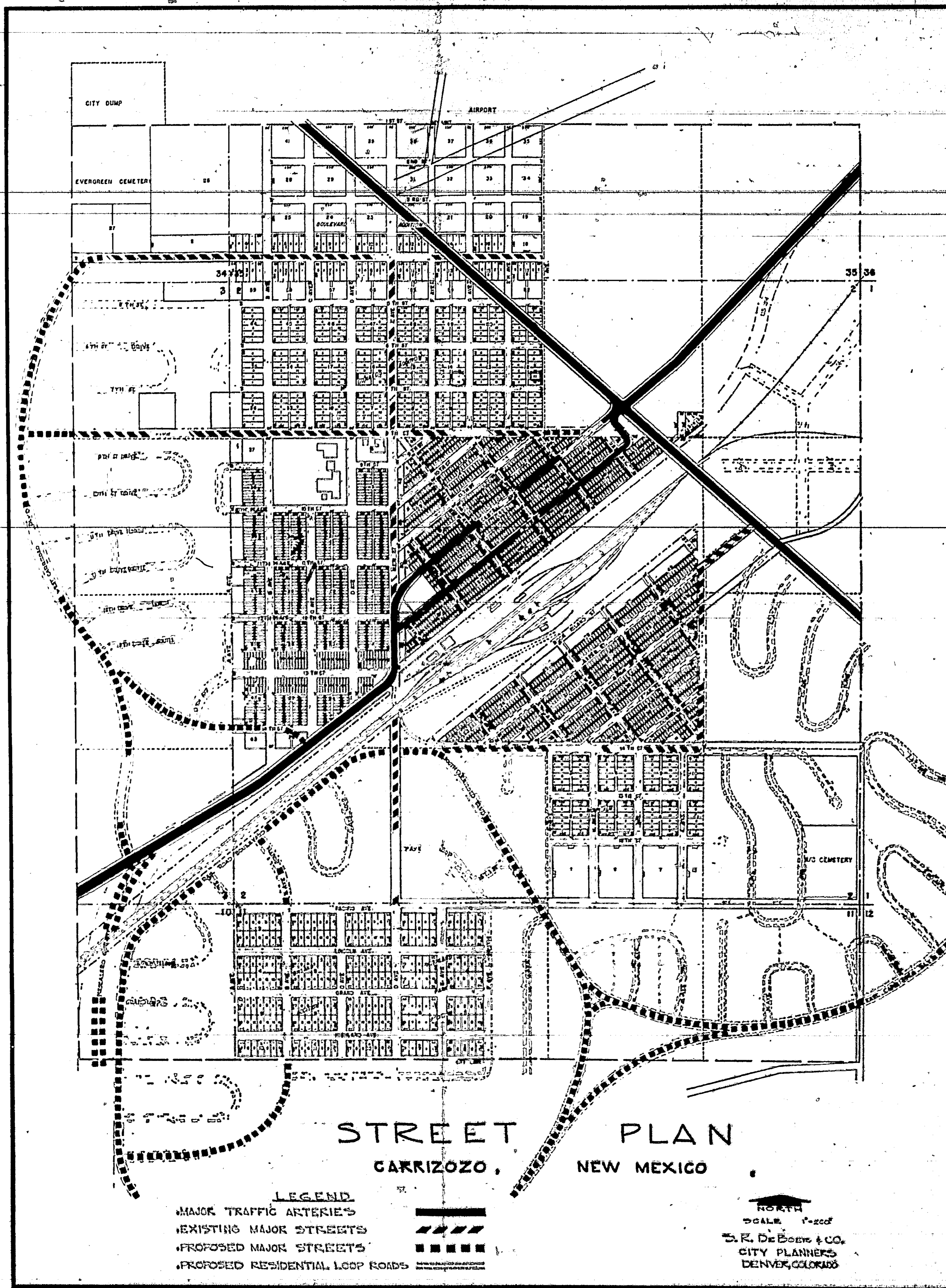

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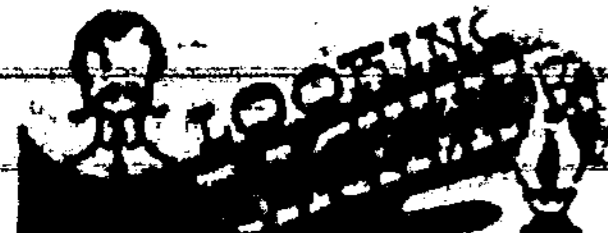
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50 YEARS AGO

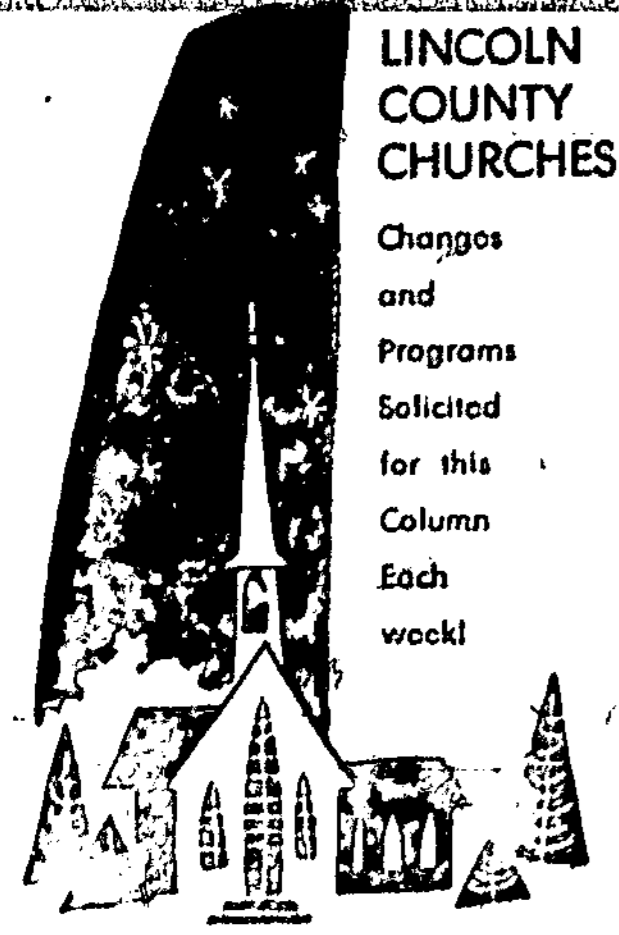

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS

The old Hoyle House is a rare antiquity of ghost towns, the history of which possibly marks it as one of the most bizarre of the entire Old West. It is located in White Oaks, once a rip-roaring, gold-mining town that gained prominence during its heyday as the greatest in New Mexico.

Springing into activity on the lower skirts of Carrizo Mountain, in the 1880's, when gold was discovered, White Oaks was marked on the map as a booming town. Gold to the tune of several million dollars was dug from the bowels of the earth and the town rapidly grew to be one of the most prosperous of the Southwest in its day and age. It is a few miles north of Carrizozo, county-seat of Lincoln County.

However, today, only one landmark stands, stunted and serene, undecayed and undeteriorated, to mark the site of the once progressive mining town. All other structures of the era have tumbled down, and the ravages of time have erased them from the mountain sides.

Yet, the Hoyle House stands almost as though it were constructed only yesterday. It has a background historically and romantically strange. And, this year it became domestically occupied for the first time since its erection during the booming days of the gold-mining town. During all the previous years, treasure hunters, curiously-zealous, vandals and vandals have prowled the premises, and no one seemed exactly ready to make it their domicile.

This year Lloyd Kirkpatrick purchased the property and moved his family into it, and they called it home. They rehabilitated the interior and it is as beautiful as the day it was first constructed—and that's saying a lot. The magnificent structure had, since its day of erection, never been called "home" before.

His history started many years ago when a young Englishman by the name of Watson Hoyle landed in White Oaks during its first booming days. He had come West to seek his fortune, and he came by it rather hurriedly. Upon his entry into White Oaks gold fields, he became associated with the Old Abe Mining Company, and rapidly gained recognition in the financial circles of the booming town. He was young and had a definite aim for attaining financial supremacy.

When he left New York for the West to seek his fortune, he left his betrothed there, to await his success. Then, through their mutual agreement, he would return to the East to claim her and they would return together to enjoy the success he had gained in the gold fields.

His dreams came true as he had planned. He built a magnificent structure at the base of Carrizo Mountain overlooking the booming town. He built it of the best material that could be obtained, much of it hand-carved by craftsmen far overseas. It cost somewhere in the neighborhood of forty thousand dollars.

Expert stone masons were imported from St. Louis to erect the building. They cut stones for a cold year before the structure commenced to take shape. After much work and careful planning the building was completed. It was furnished with the most elaborate furnishings of the day and age. The best of plumbing was installed and the entire structure took on the aspects that would mark it as being fit for a king of any land.

Hoyle, upon completion of his magnificent home, departed for New York to claim his betrothed. But, alas! she had deserted him and gone with another!

Hoyle, disappointed and heart-broken, returned to White Oaks to continue his pursuit of mining fortunes. He never enjoyed living in the great mansion which he had so elaborately constructed and planned.

The Hoyle House, through all the years following, has remained, still in excellent constructive shape, as a landmark of the once booming, gold-mining town of White Oaks—and the pranks which Cupid sometimes plays upon the romantic participants of those realms.

D. L. Jackson, long-time resident of White Oaks, 91 years of age, recalls most of the circumstances and history of the old Hoyle House. He remembers its builder, Watson Hoyle, and the events which have transpired about the old building through the years; for he has lived in its shadow almost since the day it was built. Jackson was part owner of the North and South Homesteads Mining Company during the booming days of White Oaks.

Today, Lloyd Kirkpatrick owns the old Hoyle House. It is in splendid condition, a very comfortable home, and has an intriguing attraction to motorists and tourists who like to delve into history of those colorful days around White Oaks.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS: A tour through the old Hoyle House will remind one of the strong will and determination for their desires that was characteristic of the early-day settlers of Lincoln County and the Old West.

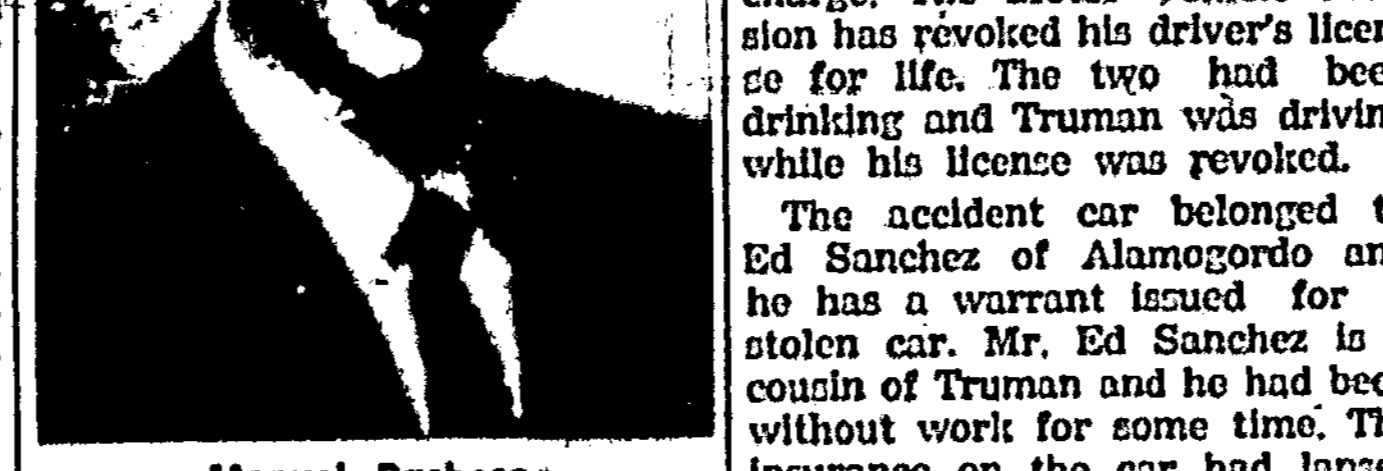

The boundary streets of this part of the city are 14th Street and J Avenue. Both have wide rights of way for part of the distance but need to be opened up if the territory develops.
An elementary school should be located on the corner of the two streets in a similar location as the present elementary school. The school should cooperate with the nearby parochial school in regard to recreational facilities.
The proposed street plan of Carrizozo is such that the city will gain a very definite and unusual character. This again will materially increase its business and employment strength.
PAVEMENT
The exposed pavement on Central Avenue is approximately 36 feet in width and gravel strips are left on both sides. A lot of dust and difficult driving are by-products of these strips. This is part of the highway system and it is recommended that this department be asked to improve the street.
The plan recommends that the city set up a 10 year program of paving all the streets of the city. Such a program must be based on narrow roadways with grass coming up to the pavement in order that dust problems be fully removed from each block. Curbs and gutters will not be needed if the streets are carefully graded for drainage. Sidewalks will be needed in the business district but not in the residential areas.

Dog owners reminded about strays

Under city ordinance dogs are not allowed to run at large, especially at night, or on other people's property at any time.
Carrizozo city officials have received numerous complaints and immediate action will be taken on the dog situation.

JUSTICES WORK AT ALAMOGORDO

The supreme court is conducting the work of District Judge Allan Walker's court in Alamogordo. So far Justices David Carmody, Irwin Melso and Zig Noble have been assigned to one week stints on the Alamogordo bench and Justice David Chavez is next in line. Chief Justice Cleve Compton apparently will not participate in the round-robin operation.
