"There is gold in them thar hills"

"There is gold in them thar hills!" In those early days known romantically now as "the winning of the west," this vague and more hopeful than scientific utterance by the gold prospectors of the 1800s was the chief object of his search; and with so much virgin and unexplored territory many rich deposits were visible to the light of day awaiting discovery and to be claimed by the first who chanced upon them.

Today, however, there are very few, if any, areas in the United States where man has not been. The rich, virgin places which could be worked by simple equipment with a "clean-up" of values each day, or perhaps a week, are gone. In their place has come gold, or perhaps, silver, or the mining of the source material — as the more permanent type of mining; and today successful mining is an organized business requiring the combined services of the trained geologist, mining engineer and metallurgist, along with good management and marketing.

This does not necessarily imply that there can be no step by step logical development from a small beginning to a big business carrying out all the phases, but it does mean that the grounds for its inception must be real, and that the conduct of the several different phases of the enterprise must each be practical, scientific and sound in policy and procedure, just as in any other business venture.

For example, a businessman before establishing himself in a new locality, makes a business survey. Then, with all the facts and figures assembled, he can decide wisely whether or not the conditions and circumstances and the prospects ahead warrant his contemplated action of establishing his business in the given area.

In the business of mining, the starting point is geological knowledge. The U. S. Geological Survey, as well as states, have geological data maps showing the nature of exposed rock minerals and their geological age. If there are other mines in the area, often such workings afford some general evidence for study. The geologist gathers all the available information already known, and then begins his own specific studies of the proposed or intended program. To study a mine is not enough; there must be study that would show whether the mining and marketing are economical, or can be made economical, under recommended procedures that may be inaugurated. He is trained to know rocks, rock formations, types of deposits, faults, structural and control features, mineral and mineral associations, structural and mineral features, and many other things including surface indications such as residual stains, box-works (cup-holes) and their mineral-void patterns and types of the chemical attack and erosion effects.

The mine workings, open cuts, shaft headings, cross-cuts, etc., as well as core-drilling, sampling, thin-section work with microscope and other laboratory testing and measurements should include the

County Agent Report

REGISTER FOR HOMEMAKERS COURSE AT EXTENSION OFFICE

Women who wish to attend Homemakers College at N. M. State University only have two weeks in which to pre-enroll at their county extension service office. The 6th annual Homemakers College is scheduled for June 5-8. The county agent has copies of the program and the enrollment blanks. Homemakers may enroll at the county office before June 1.

Short courses in seven major topics will be offered. They are: Foods and Nutrition, Clothing and Home Furnishings, Money Management, Family Life Education, Public Affairs, Civil Defense, and Landscape Gardening. Classes in each of these courses will be presented at 10:30 a.m. and repeated at 1:30 p.m. on June 6, 7, and 8. Homemakers may choose the classes that meet their needs and interests.

APPLES STILL DROPPING FROM FROST FREEZE

Apples are still dripping in some orchards from the recent freeze. The slow drop is due to the seed being killed by the freeze and its requiring this long to have the fruit drop. Poor pollination will also account for a small percent of the drop. All of the blossoms in the orchards opened at once and the bees and other insects did not get enough cross-pollination.

Flea beetles eat small pinhead holes in the leaves of early vegetable plants. There may be several different species on many types of vegetable plants. When flea beetles are abundant, much of the leaf surface may be eaten on young plants. Such injury can retard growth and may cause young plants to die.

I noticed for Amarillo area an October contract for choice, 425-475 pound calves at 23.00 for steers and 26.00 for heifers. I do not know of any fall contracts yet, but the prices seem stable now with last year's prices.

At a wool sale in Roswell recently, J. P. McKnight and John Cooper both got 61¢ per pound for their wool. Prices are strong on wool with the last sale a little higher than the March sales. I have noticed that the better clips have been averaging better than 60.00 gross per head for the two

D. L. Jackson, White Oaks pioneer, celebrated his 62nd birthday with a 20-mile hike. He recalled many interesting things about Lincoln County (which are even more interesting in 1962). In 1878, gold was discovered in the Jicarilla Mountains and later the town of White Oaks was founded. It was a substantial settlement of two-story brick and stone buildings. The lure of gold drew desperadoes and adventurers, as well as conscientious cattlemen, to try their fortunes in the fabulous mountains of the southwest. Some of the mines in the area yielded fortunes for the hardy prospectors.

Jackson came from Texas in El Paso when he heard about the boom at White Oaks. He traveled up the Rio Grande to San Antonio and from there by stage across the Tularosa Basin to the mining town. Before the turn of the century, he worked a 12-hour day for \$2.00 as fireman in the Old Abe mine. The slow road to wealth did not discourage him even though drinking water sold for 40 cents a barrel. The White Oaks pioneer, who married sometime after moving to the prosperous settlement, became a trusted figure in many business enterprises.

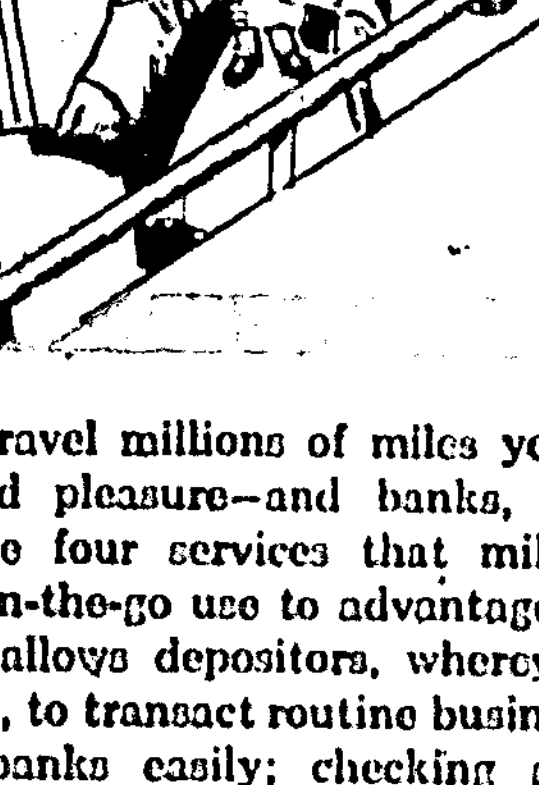
