## Man dies during train ride to coast

Robert Eugene Field of 109 Slavens Manor, Bettendorf, Iowa, who had been given three months to live because of cancer, died on the westbound Golden State Limited Friday morning between Corona and Carrizozo.

Mr. Field, age 52, who had had a recent gall bladder operation, was advised by his doctor not to make a trip at this time. But Mr. Field was trying to get to California to see his brother, Richard, of Temple City.

Mr. Field was accompanied on this trip by Mrs. Dorothy Snyder, a registered nurse from Moline, Ill.

A coroner's inquest was held Friday afternoon at the Hampton-Holland funeral home with Justice of the Peace R. L. Sherrill presiding. Cause of death was contributed to post-operative complications.

The body of Mr. Field was shipped to Alhambra, Calif., Sunday afternoon.

New Mexico Boys Ranch for homeless boys, 17 miles south of Belen, will entertain cattlemen from all over the southwest on Oct. 20, according to W. C. Hubbard, superintendent.

A barbecue dinner will be served the guests.

Cattlemen's Day at New Mexico Boys Ranch is an annual event, during which leading cattlemen inspect the facilities at the ranch and give expert advice to the boys about raising and caring for cattle.

Superintendent Hubbard thanks all the cattlemen who have contributed animals to the ranch in the past, and hopes similar generous contributions of cattle and other livestock will be made on Oct. 20.

New Mexico Boys Ranch is a free, non-sectarian home for boys who have no other home. Because the ranch has no state aid and no financial grants, the entire cost of caring for these homeless boys must come from contributions.

**Return address aids postal department**

"An extremely valuable part of our service to the public depends on the sender furnishing a complete and correct return address on all mail matter," Lincoln County postmasters stressed recently.

The following rules must be followed if your return address is to provide the maximum service benefits to you:

1. The proper location is in the upper left corner on envelopes, cards, labels, tags and wrappers. On second, third and fourth class mail of no obvious value, the sender must write "return requested" below the return address or it will not be returned if undeliverable.
2. The return address should be complete and legible, including the name of the sender, the street address or box number, the city and the state. In the case of multiple dwelling units, the apartment or unit number should be shown. In the case of hotels and office buildings, the room number should be indicated.

If you habitually follow the above simple rules, that important letter or valuable parcel will be returned to you endorsed to show why it is undeliverable. You will then know with certainty when your mail has not reached the addressee and will be able to take whatever corrective action you think essential. In the overwhelming majority of cases, when your letter or parcel is undeliverable, your friend, business associate or other correspondent will appreciate your courtesy and thoughtfulness in providing the return address in the upper left corner where it is readily accessible. The consistent use of a return address on your mail is the best method of insuring that your correspondents are aware of your correct, current address.

Lincoln County postmasters caution mailers not to place the return address in any position other than the upper left corner of the mailing piece or label. Postal employees are required to process large volumes of mail rapidly; so it is quite possible for them to overlook return addresses placed in unauthorized positions. Mailers may assure prompt, accurate return of undeliverable mail by compliance with these instructions.

**FARM NEWS**

Check cattle for lice and ear ticks when you round up this fall. A lousy cow will go dry this winter. A little time spent treating will get rid of the lice. Use Lindane, Corral, or Methoxychlor on beef cattle. To get rid of ear ticks, use a pump oil can and douse each ear with an oil solution of Lindane.

Bill McVeigh had the first place Jersey junior heifer calf at the New Mexico State Fair, in heavy

competition. Lois Dunlap had the champion fine wool ewe, along with six firsts and two second places in the junior sheep show.

Shipping time is here and for the sheep raiser dipping time. Every lamb going out of Lincoln County must be dipped either before it leaves the ranch or before it is taken off the feed lot.

Acceptable dips are Lindane, 25 per cent wettable powder and Toxaphene emulsion. The two Toxaphene acceptable are Coopertox and Lintox-X. Other brands do not contain the proper emulsifier to make them usable as a sheep dip. The waiting period before slaughter for Lindane is 60 days and Toxaphene is 28 days.

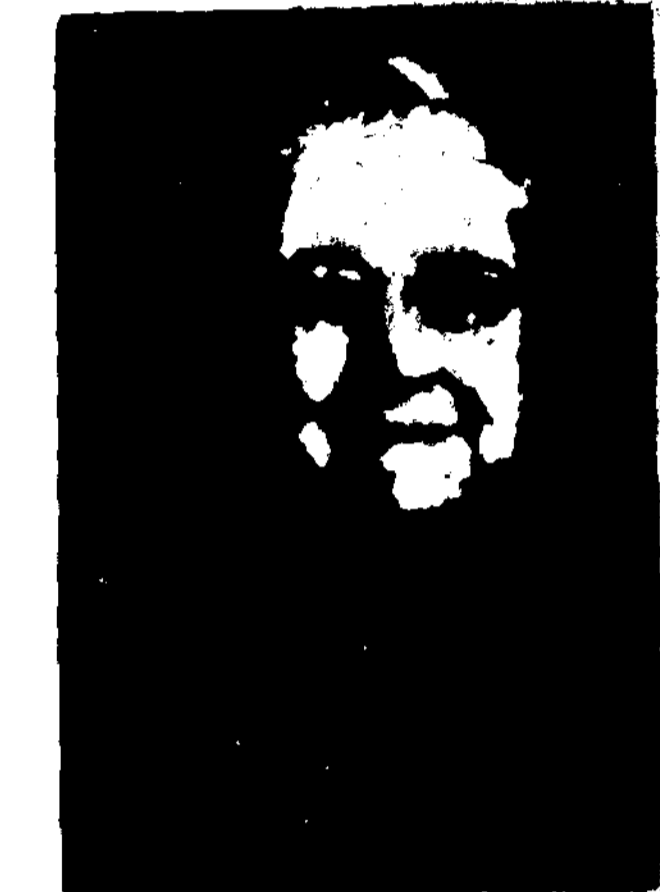

**RUMBLE GROWING ON TAX REPORT**

SANTA FE — Showing signs of growing into a serious rumble is the withholding from the people a new taxation program until after the election by the legislature's revenue structure sub-committee. The committee has a deal worked up for some unrevealed millions of new taxation to be raised by un-

revealed methods but won't let the people see it until after the voting, this to keep it from becoming involved in campaign politics.

The decision to keep the proposals secret has stirred private grumbling by some members of the Legislative Finance Committee, parent body of the sub-committee, and not so private criticism by many others on the state scene.

**ALL DEMOCRATS ON COMMITTEE**

The issue is sharpened by the circumstance that the sub-committee consists of five Democrats and no Republicans, and that it is withholding its tax recommendations until the voting is past after the Republicans openly endorsed a sales tax increase to meet the \$14 million to \$10 million deficit this year.

Some non-political critics of not letting the voters know what the legislature is going to do to them contend that the tax program is exactly the kind of subject that should be debated in the campaign and should be passed on by the public.

**PAYING ONE MAN \$25,000 A YEAR**

Members of the committee holding back the program from the voters are Reps. Bobby Mayfield of Dona Ana, chairman; Austin Roberts of Farmington and Charles Harris of Carlsbad, and Sens. Tibo Chavez of Belen and Fincher Neal of Carlsbad.

The committee has LeRoy Harlow of San Francisco employed on a one-man contract for \$25,000 a year, which will run to a total of about \$40,000.

**STATE BOARD REJECTS BABY SITTING CENTERS**

The state board of public welfare is preparing to turn down a federal program for child care centers that would take care of pre-school age children of working mothers without cost. The program is available with the federal paying 70 per cent of the cost but the board wants none of it.

The state school lunch office spends \$52,724 a year for administration of the program and \$14,000 for equipment for school cafeterias.

The lunch programs are not generally charged with the utilities they use, their equipment or for rent on the space they use.

The state program has \$1,250,000 federal credit for certain food items.

The fact that most all schools are meeting the bare operation cost is heartening to taxpayers.

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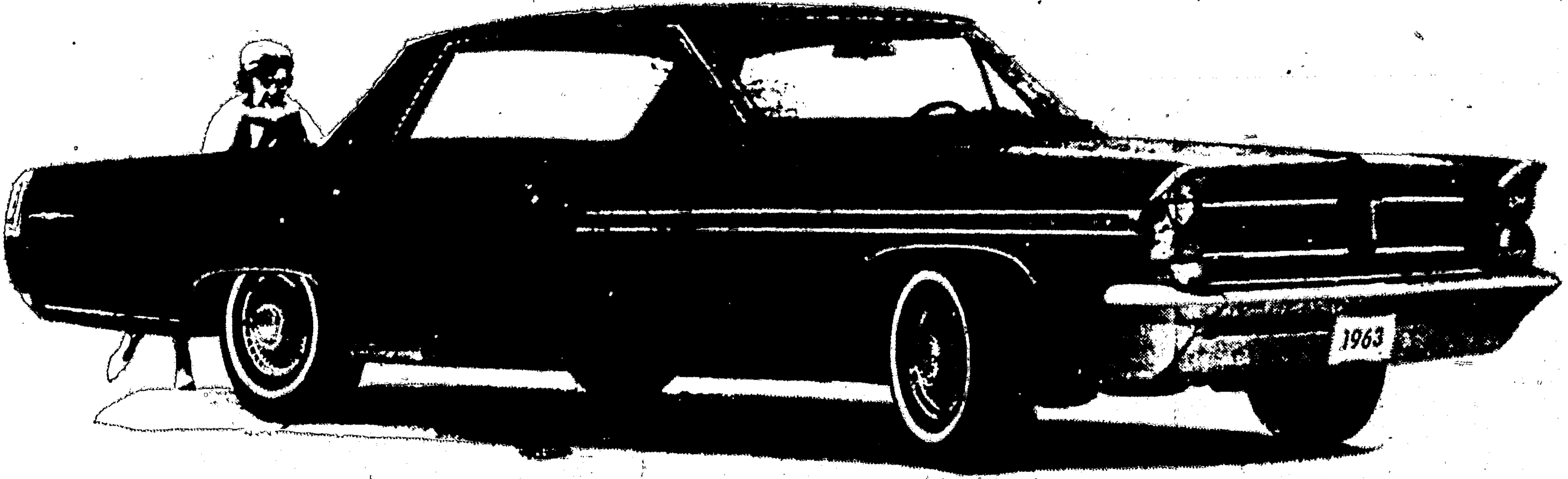

Campbell was introduced by Mack Easley, candidate for lieutenant governor. Easley cited Campbell's public service in the legislature, his war record and his eagerness to serve as a team with other Democrats for development of the state's future. He noted that New Mexico could expect a population growth of 50 per cent in the next few years—and that planning was necessary in schools, roads, utilities, government and other areas to cope with the increase in newcomers.

State Land Commissioner Murray Morgan, a candidate in the election this fall for state corporation commissioner, served as master of ceremonies. He introduced party candidates on the county and state level and party workers from many areas who came from a distance to break bread with the Lincoln countians.

"Looking over this great crowd, and feeling the great enthusiasm here tonight makes me predict we will see an overwhelming victory in November for our party," he declared at one point in the meeting.

"We have the strongest county and state ticket the Lincoln County ballot has ever seen," he said.

Among people he introduced during the evening were Mrs. U. D. Sawyer, Crossroads, national committeewoman from New Mexico; Tom Brown, Artesia, national committeeman from this state; State Representative Jeff Good of Ft. Sumner; Mrs. May Eickelberger, Albuquerque, state chairman; Mrs. Ballro, Farmington, a central committee member; Lena May Tiver, Tatum, and district attorney of the Third Judicial District, Don Sosa, Las Cruces. When Brown was introduced, he announced the state-wide tribute dinner planned in Albuquerque Oct. 5 to honor the state's two U. S. senators, Dennis Chavez and Clinton Anderson. He added that principal speaker will be Vice-President Lyndon Johnson.

Morgan paid tribute to Wayne Estes, Mrs. Jimmy Dunn and former County Chairman Hollie Commins, and the present county chairman, Kaman Fuller, for their fine work with the successful dinner Friday evening. He also cited "the women in the party" for their efforts in making the event the rousing success it was. He indicated the Democratic party in Lincoln County, apparently had

FHA reveals record loan total in 1962 The Farmers Home Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture loaned farm families and other rural people in Chaves and Lincoln counties a record total of \$426,140 during the 1962 fiscal year which ended June 30, according to FHA County Supervisor Richard T. Floyd. The volume of loans in this area, largest during any 12-month period in the local office's history, was 24 per cent larger than the 1961 total of \$342,190 and 13 per cent above the \$376,590 loaned in 1960. Nearly one-third of the total loaned during fiscal 1962 went for farm operating expenses; over one-fourth for the purchase, development or enlargement of family farms; and about one-fourth for the construction and improvement of houses, well-drilling and pump installations on farms and in rural communities. Approximately 90 local families were using FHA credit for these and other purposes at the end of the fiscal year.

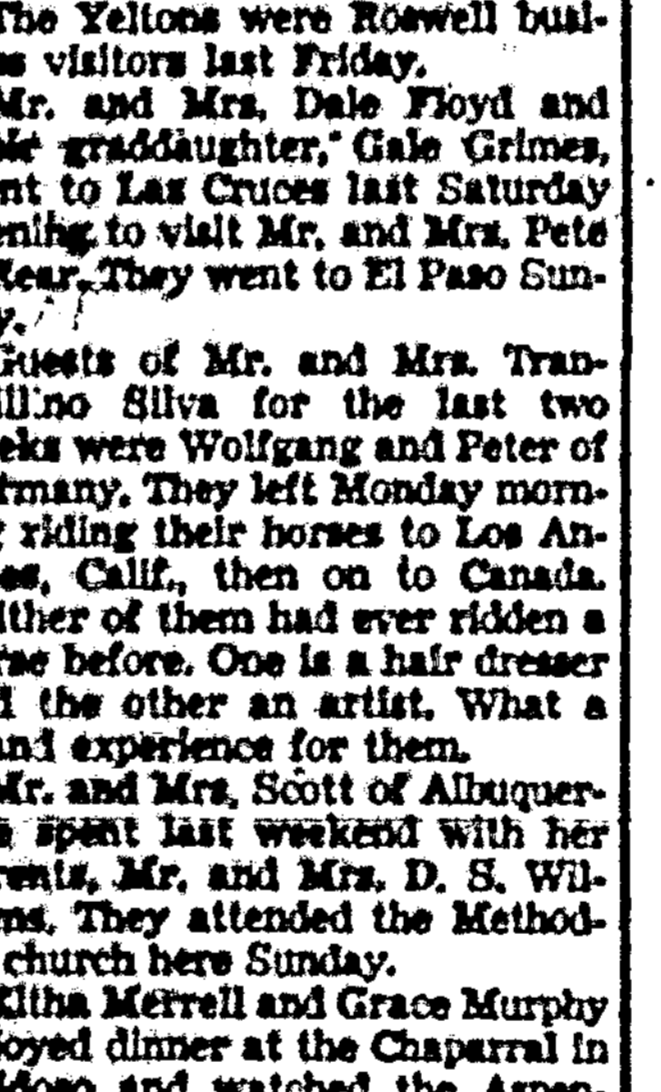

Three recent improvements more adequately equipped the Farmers Home Administration to meet farm credit needs in 1962, according to Floyd: a positive, vigorous policy toward the promotion and preservation of the family farm; broad expansion of the agency's programs by the Agricultural and Housing Acts of 1961; and an increase in the supply of appropriated and insured funds. "Farmers are requiring larger amounts of credit each year," Mr. Floyd said. "For example, three years ago FHA operating loans made in this area averaged \$4198, while this past year the same type of loan averaged \$5388. The upward trend in farmers' credit needs stems from the continuing rise in farm costs and the pressing need to make adjustments and improvements in farming methods to stay in business. I believe it is especially worthwhile to also note that our borrowers spend most of their money locally to acquire the resources they need. This spending in turn stimulates business activity in neighboring towns; helps the farm and other rural families, and the communities of which they are a part, make an important contribution to the strength of the national economy." Farmers Home Administration loans are accompanied by technical

farm and financial management advice to the extent necessary, and are made only to applicants unable to obtain the credit they need from private and cooperative lenders. County Supervisor Floyd estimated that he made 192 farm visits during the year, held 26 county committee meetings during which time 63 applications for farm loans were reviewed and 43 individuals received credit counseling assistance other than applicants who signed applications and borrowed. 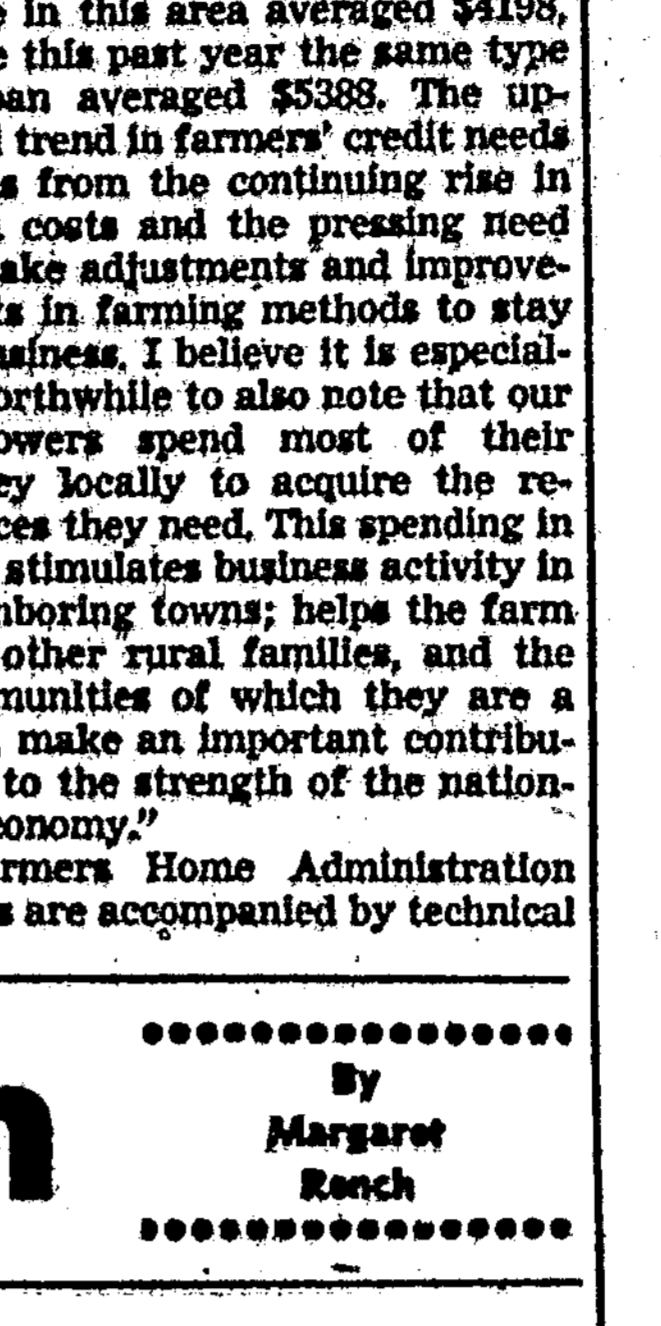

But he is out on the prairies again, roaming the range, as lord of his herd. The Pride of the Prairies, a phantom of reality of the llanos estacados!

He's the envy of every big game hunter in the Southwest, and hordes of photo-minded tourists and travelers, and lots of just common, ordinary folks! There's not a trophy den anywhere that hal-lucinations of daring sportsmen have not placed his gigantic, shiny, black horns on its walls!

He has been known to stall im-petative work on major national warheads, as workers who grasped the fate of the Nation in their hands, laid down their tools and paused to admire the beautiful creature.

He has grown to be a local mascot, if not a national figure! And you can imagine, with his prestige, what a social stepper he must be!

Lots have been cast, haunting nightmares followed by shrewd schemes, loss of fitful sleep as snares of every description have been carefully laid by nimrods of the entire country in a contemplative plan for the capture of the Pride of the Prairies!

Dry runs have been made, and a cinch seemed positive by many a wanton hunter before drawing lots, as they dreamed of the day when the best trophy to ever stalk the Plains of the Great Southwest would add prestige to their sports-man's display! The sleek, beloved, plains creature did not have a chance in their vision! Death for him was destined many a time to be a reality!

But that will never be! It's a relevant fact: "Ashes to ashes; dust to dust!" And to dust of the earth he'll return, in the haunts from which he sprang! The Reigning Gods of Prairie Animals have a strong, protecting arm wrapped about him!

Because he's the favored antelope of the Plains Country, the coveted pronghorn that stalks a region (unperturbed), unmolested, and completely surrounded by never-falling fortifications to insure him a long, eventful, life span, one of much recognition and publicity!

About 25 miles east of Roswell, on Route 390, is a great plain

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country, the llanos estacado, which is the home of the Pride of the Prairies. He lives there today, in a semineering sort of manner, just as countless numbers of his ancestors have done through the ages. Yet, he is far outstanding in the annals of pronghorn heritage. He has attracted untold thousands as the sleekish, most beautiful individual of the species.

His home is on the LE Ranch, formerly owned by J. P. White of Roswell, and ramrodded for over 80 years by the able, competent Rue Roberts, now of the same city. The Spool Cattle Company of Amarillo acquired the plains country landmark in April of last year. The spread is under the new management of Ray Sneed. The Pride of the Prairies was considered in the legal transaction, and remained on the range undisturbed with his great harem, just as he has done for the last seven or eight years, to prowls the region in a possessive sort of attitude.

Nothing seems to bother the prominent antelope. Recently millions of dollars of activity was performed on his range, construction of some of the world's largest missile launching pads. Yet, he never seemed to worry. At times he approached the hustle and bustle of human activity and the road of heavy equipment, to investigate with an eye of surveillance and an air of wisdom - never giving an inch for his domain nor showing any signs of disturbance. He always licked his chops, planted his feet a little deeper in the goosly soil, and made a staunch stand. The writer knows of nine months that he did this very thing, and others can account for much more time than that.

His beauty and wisdom as an outstanding characteristic is talked of in cafes, in the bars, over the phones, offices, and everywhere - but always in whispered versions around the Game Wardens! There is no accounting for the amount of rubber that has been burned from tires as motorists pulled to a screeching halt, along the Route, to stare amazingly at the beautiful creature. Cameras would be pulled and shots made; and the old scogger seemed all the time to swell with pride and take on the attributes of a most graceful pose. Even hunters have been known to, in form of dry runs, line him in their rifle sights and reluctantly count the days when he would be theirs. But it never happened.

The protecting gods of antelope kingdom constantly hold a protecting arm over the pronghorn. At a certain time of the year, he disappears - conveniently during the hunting season - and is not seen again for weeks. Then again he appears as predominately as ever, if not more antagonizingly than before, to the nimrods.

It is whispered, and even talked with sincerity, that the cowboys of the range assist the Pride of the Prairies in finding a place of seclusion during the rampage of the hunters. They say that he goes to the corrals of the home ranch, of his own accord, and takes fortification in a stable until all is quiet on the Western Front! Queen sabe? about this!

It's possible; for he is of a rare nature, intelligently far above the average of his race - with a possible IQ unparalleled in animal kingdom - and has outwitted some of the best and most wanton hunters of the big game conquistadores!

And even with the short life span attributed to the antelope family - the shortest of all big game animals - "Old Noah" seems that he will, as another outstanding characteristic, long surpass that of his ancestors. And when he has wrapped up his business on the prairies, people will continue to see him, if not in reality, in visions of the days when he was the Pride of the Prairies.

THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS . . . This beloved pronghorn will acquire attention far above that of any other big game animal, if he hasn't already reached those heights - unparalleled only by that of Smokey the Bear that had his origin in Lincoln County, and became universally famous and finally settled in the limits of the Nation's Capitol!

To kill him now is something that no one would want to be guilty of.

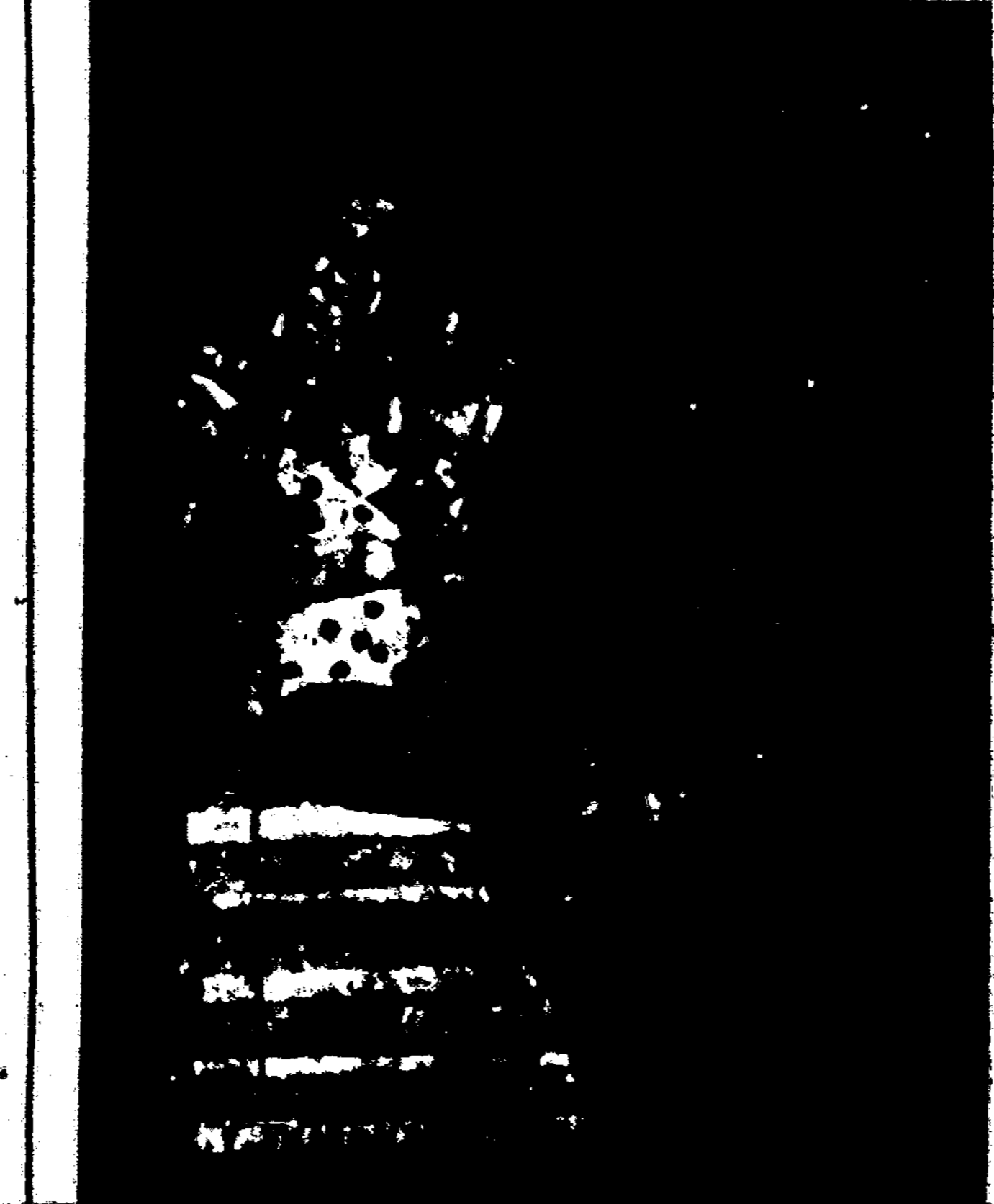
The states are New Mexico, Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi and Arkansas.

The application asks permission for 17 routes including service between Houston and El Paso, Houston and Santa Fe, and Dallas and El Paso.

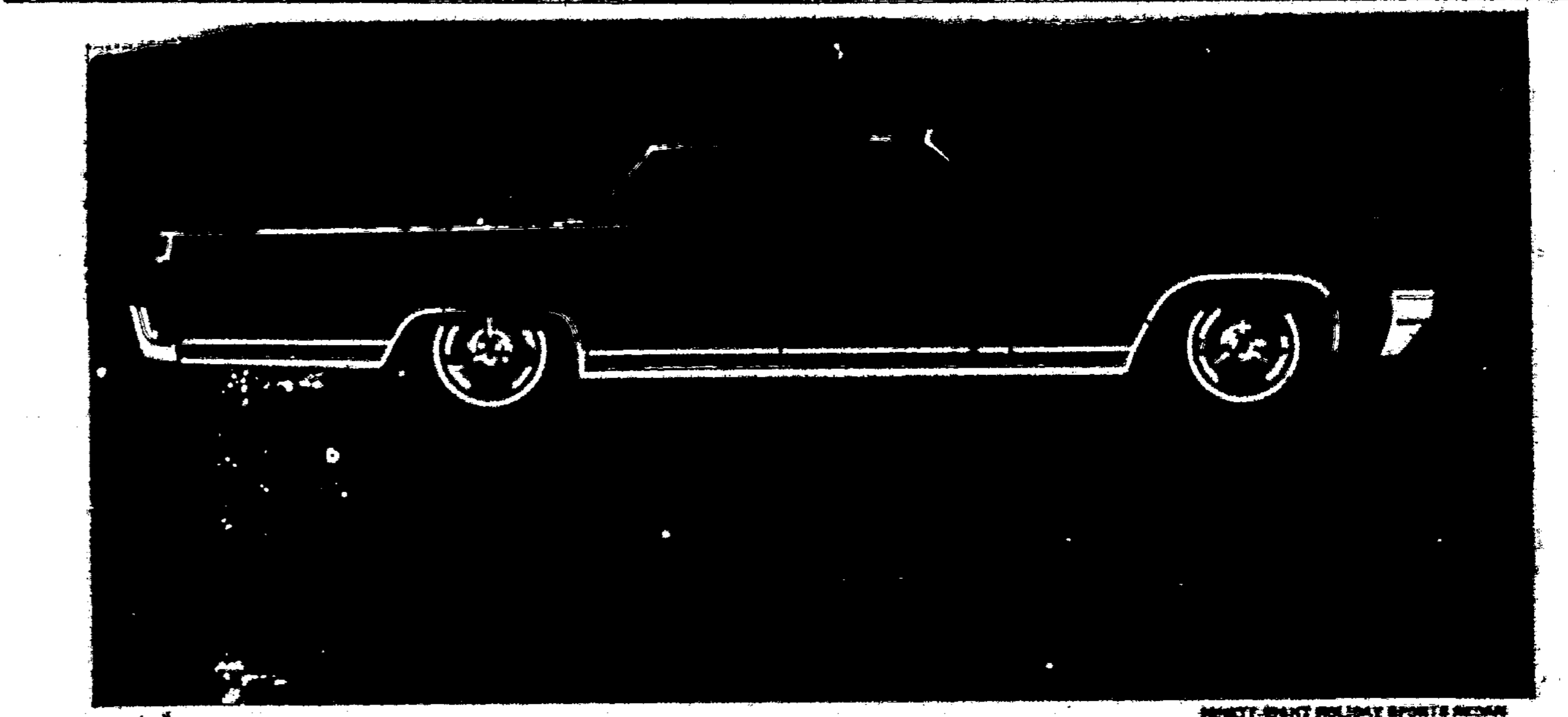

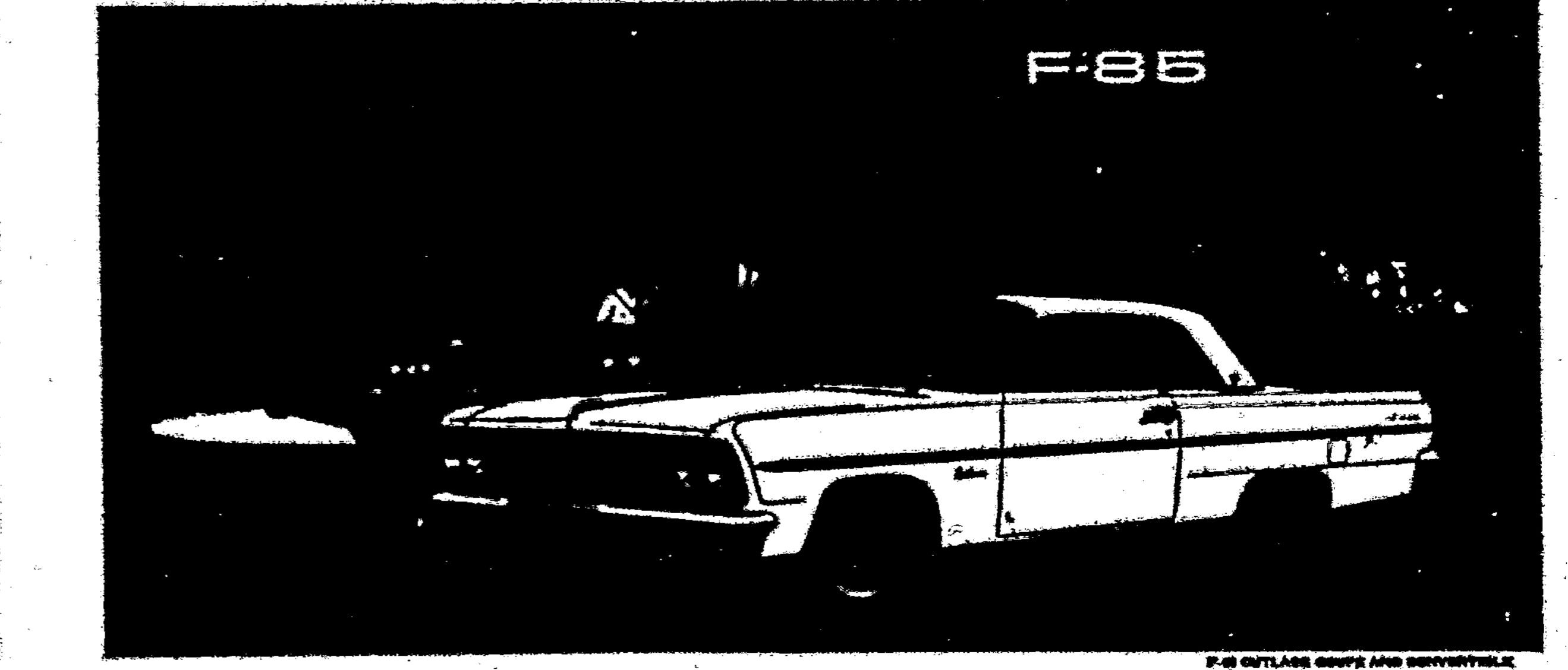

**Woman's club asks help from town council on sanitation education project**

The Carrizozo town council meeting in regular session Tuesday night listened to Mrs. Bryco Dugger and Mrs. Weloom Armstrong, representing the Carrizozo Women's Club, outline a program of sanitation education projected over a three-month period which is expected to help in eradication of outdoor plumbing facilities in Carrizozo.

It was pointed out to the council members by Mrs. Dugger that an indirect approach to better sanitation in Carrizozo will be a spraying program in the proper season and on a continuous basis. That a more direct approach to the problem would be the construction of facilities which would serve an entire block, particularly the area near the new park, then go ahead with enforcement of existing ordinances which would in time remove the outdoor plumbing.

Fred English commented that plenty of financing is available for construction of indoor plumbing.

Mrs. Armstrong said the club's initial purpose is education; that club members were contacting people personally to help with the education program. She stated that the local bank, welfare department and government agencies are willing to do all they can in helping to finance the plumbing projects.

The club is making a survey which when complete is expected to show that more outdoor plumbing facilities are not being used than is now estimated. Mrs. Armstrong suggested that the council start by zones and keep going until the town has modern plumbing.

The two women told of progress toward a park in the Mal Pais area. The federal government is not interested at this time. The movement now is to form a state park with a road up through the Mal Pais to the crater with trails branching off to interesting spots.

The council was congratulated by the ladies for the appearance of Carrizozo parks—they are looking fine.

Jete Voss commented, after the ladies had left, that the women have a good project and need the help of the council. Fred English stated that their approach to the problem is fine and will help. Wayne Withers told the council members that the town would have to get ready to run some more sewer lines areas where none exist.

Clerk Edward Penfield read a letter from the Las Cruces police chief telling of their experience with a gun to shoot knock-out pellets at dogs. Their results were not so good.

Contract for purchase of a fire truck was authorized with instructions for Clerk Penfield to inquire into a clause about the truck not being taken out of town.

**WELFARE DEPARTMENT CAN HELP WITH HOME REPAIRS**

In some instances the welfare department is able to help clients plan for major repairs on their homes. They are always guided by the agency policy which is summarized as follows:

When it is necessary for the health and safety of Department of Public Welfare clients to incur an expense for major repair to the home which is owned by the client, these expenses may be recognized. Necessary cost connected with installation of water and sewage disposal may be considered as a major repair if the total cost is more than \$50.

Moderately priced and minimum necessary bathroom fixtures are considered a part of the installation cost for water and sewage disposal. Major repairs for which payments are budgeted in assistance grants must have prior approval by the county office and the client is responsible for making the plans and the necessary payments.
