**Capitan wins 12-7 over Melrose Buffaloes**

Capitan scored a 12-7 victory over Melrose at Capitan Friday night. The loss temporarily eliminated the Buffaloes from the District 2-C race and left the Capitan Tigers with a 4-3 season mark. Melrose scored first in the early part of the second period, after both teams had put up a substantial drive in the first quarter but only to have them nullified by

penalties or pass interceptions. Melrose started the second quarter on the Tiger's 45. From there the Melrose fullback, Bradley, who evidently runs like a wild buffalo, moved the ball to the Tiger's 38. On the next play Capitan was penalized 15 yards for defensive holding and the penalty put the ball up to the Tiger's 23. From there Bradley and Company moved the ball and scored in five line plunges with Bradley going over left guard for the tally. Goncer followed the same path used by Bradley, to

make the extra point. Melrose kicked off to Capitan. Leo Lujan took the ball on the 10 and returned it to the 35. From there Leo Lujan, with his Jack Rabbit running that was to plague the Buffaloes throughout the night, moved the ball to the 50. Pete Carabajal playing tailback for the injured Ronnie Eldridge ran a left tackle hole to the Melrose 38,

Quarterback David Silva ran around left end for another first down to the Melrose 28. On the next play Capitan was assessed a 15 yard penalty and the ball was returned to the Tiger 43. Once again Lujan ran over right guard for a four yard gain. Then Silva attempted a pass to right end, Lionel Griego, but the pass fell incomplete. On the next play Silva using the same pattern passed 31 yards to Kenny Cozzens who ran into the end zone unmolested. The try for point was no good. The

half ended with Melrose ahead 7-6. Capitan kicked off to Melrose to open the 3rd quarter. The Buffaloes were held down for a series of downs on their own 34. From there they were forced to punt. Silva returned the punt back to his own 35. From there the Tigers were also held to no gain. On 3rd down end 10, Capitan attempted a pass but was intercepted by Melrose who then had the ball back on the Tiger's 49. From the 49 the Buffaloes, with Bradley providing most of the running, moved to the

Tiger 35. A 5 yard penalty against Melrose set the ball back on the Tiger 40. Bradley attempted to run around left end but was thrown for a 15 yard loss by tackle Roland Zamora. Once again Melrose attempted the same play and this time they lost 12 yards when right end, Johnny Walker, tackled the runner for another loss. Finally, on 4th down and 46 to go Melrose punted to the Tiger 35. The 4th quarter started with Capitan's ball on their own 40. Capitan did not relinquish the ball until they

scored half way in the last quarter. The Tigers marched 60 yards in seven plays with Lujan going over for the last five. The try for the point was no good. Capitan led by 12-7 with 3 minutes left in the game. Capitan kicked off out of bounds and Melrose took over on their own 40. They were able to move to the 50. In the closing minutes, Melrose was trying desperation passes. Silva intercepted one of these on his own ten. With a minute and a half, Silva managed to keep the ball on the ground and

## Counties get funds from forest receipts

A total of \$16,041.23 is being paid to four New Mexico counties as their share of the fiscal year 1962 receipts of the Lincoln National Forest. It has been announced by R. E. Rea, forest supervisor. This amount is paid under the 1959 law which provides that 25 per cent of the national forest income will go to the states for distribution to counties in which the national forests are located. The money is for public schools and roads within the counties.

County shares, based on national forest acreage within the counties, are as follows:

Chavez, \$2,261.12; Eddy, \$2,161.23; Lincoln, \$3,733.13; Otero, \$3,885.74. Lincoln County's \$3,733.13 payment on the Lincoln National Forest is increased to \$6,331.23 by payment from the Cibola National Forest.

In announcing the payment, Rea said that timber sales and grazing fees provide the bulk of national forest income, and small amounts are provided by recreational concessions and land use and power permits.

Fees for mineral and gas and oil leases on national forests, reserved from public domain, are not included; these are collected by the Bureau of Land Management and that agency makes its payments to the state.

Rea pointed out that an additional 10 per cent of the national forest revenue is spent on public roads and trails within the national forest. The remaining receipts are turned into the federal treas-

ure. In addition to payments to local governments, the Lincoln National Forest contributes to the local economy in many tangible ways. Rea stated. Money invested in permanent improvements and salaries are among these. Rea declared that the Lincoln National Forest also provides substantial benefits under multiple-use management that are not readily evaluated in terms of money.

He mentioned that outdoor recreational opportunities, such as are provided at the newly developed Sierra Blanca winter sports area and at the numerous campgrounds, plus hunting and fishing opportunities and wilderness and scenic beauty, are examples. Water for domestic use as well as agriculture and industry is a Lincoln National Forest product of key importance, Rea said.

**UNION ACTIVE AT POOR TIME**  
**SANTA FE** — An impressive spread of unionism among New Mexico school teachers is going forward at the same time that the state is torn in a struggle for additional millions for school operation.

Tito Martinez, Treasurer of the state board of education, is president of a new chapter of the American Federation of Teachers Union at Taos and Joe A. Gallegos Jr., officer in the teachers union at Albuquerque, is the Demo candidate for the state board of education from that district with lively prospects of winning in November.

The spread of unionism in the schools is likely to hamper the drive for more school money in New Mexico's conservative legislature.

**NEW MEXICO PAY 17TH IN NATION**  
New Mexico's school teachers aren't among the oppressed in the money they are paid which makes the extreme political and union activity here for more money somewhat inconsistent with local conditions.

New Mexico classroom teachers' pay for the year that closed June 30 was 17th among the 50 states according to the National Education Assn.

The average for classroom teachers was \$3,050 for 150 days work.

The average in Colorado was \$3,425, in Utah \$3,000, Texas \$3,205, Oklahoma \$4,975. Only Arizona in the immediate area was higher, \$3,905.

**MISSISSIPPI PAY AVERAGES \$3,540**  
The four highest averages listed were Alaska \$7,500, California \$7,925, New York \$6,750 and Michigan \$6,162.

Mississippi had average teacher pay of \$3,560, Arkansas \$3,614, South Dakota \$3,850, Tennessee \$4,613, at the bottom of the list.

**LAW PROTECTS TEACHER JOBS**

Another condition that makes New Mexico something less than ideal territory for union organization of teachers is the legal job protection teachers enjoy here.

After three years in a school system it is almost impossible to

fire a teacher in New Mexico if she gets to work on time and stays out of jail.

It is difficult to even transfer such a teacher in the district in which she is employed if she objects.

**WELFARE OBSERVES USUAL INCREASE**

The usual pre-election increase in welfare payments came through from the state welfare department this month with the average age assistance grant for October going to \$39.79 from \$35.46 in September; aid to the needy blind advanced from \$58.79 in September

to \$62.67 in October and aid to the disabled from \$57.48 to \$62.24 this month.

You can give political credit either to the Democratic Congress which increased the federal share of welfare payments or the local Republican welfare office which saved up enough last year to participate in the new rates.

Higher aid to dependent children and general assistance cases will come along later. There are not so many voters in those groups.

**DEMOCRAT AGENCIES LEFT OUT OF PROBE**

The legislature's Revenue Struc-

ture Study sub-committee which has been under a barrage of criticism for secret operation and suspected political motives made a thorough investigation of the operation of the Republican bureau of revenue, motor vehicle division, tax commission and oil and gas accounting commission, but did not look into the operation of the weird corporation commission, an all-Democratic agency, or the Democratic state land office which handles \$26,600,000 a year in collections.

The corporation commission, where tumult is the normal situation, is responsible for \$5 million a year in collections, and possibly a lot more if the agency operation were carefully examined.

The Revenue Structure Committee has five Democrat members, no Republicans. Extensive criticism of the committee's refusal to reveal its recommendations for a new tax program before the election were answered last week by Chairman Bobby Mayfield, Dona Ana representative, with the statement that the program would not be ready until 11 days after the election, Nov. 19, when the sub-committee is scheduled to report to the parent Legislative Finance Committee.

**CAMPBELL'S PALE ARE LEGISLATORS**

With Demo Jack Campbell a 50-50 prospect for governor there is mounting talk about who he would bring in to help him run the statehouse if he is elected.

Most of Campbell's political buddies are legislators who cannot take state jobs even upon resigning from the legislature. The law prohibits legislators from going on the payroll during the period for which they were elected.

So far Campbell has shunned most of the old pros who held top state jobs in past Democratic administrations.

The major appointments for a governor are director of the Bureau of revenue, director of finance and administration, and chief state tax commissioner. Performance in these positions can make or break a governor's administration.

Also important: State purchasing agent, welfare director, state police chief who must be chosen from the police force, and of course the highway commissioners.

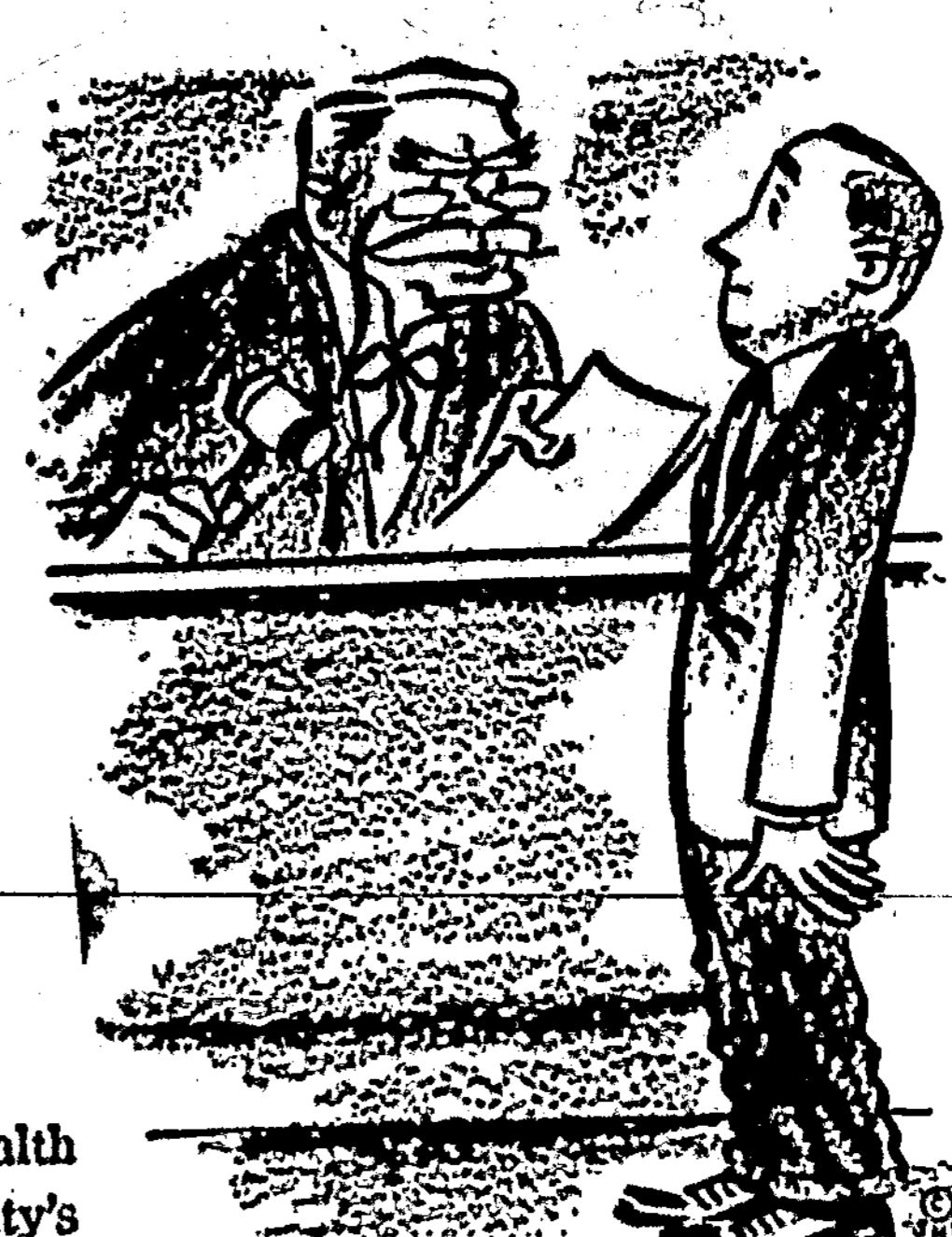
