Third man theme played through long night

Armed robbers captured after long chase

PROCLAMATION
WHEREAS the United States is experiencing a national crisis and WHEREAS the State of New Mexico's Civil Defense Program has been increased, and WHEREAS it is the responsibility of the Town of Carrizozo to adopt its own Civil Defense Program, let it be known, THEREFORE, that the Mayor, W. F. Ball, has proclaimed a Civil Defense Program to begin immediately for the Town of Carrizozo, and it is requested, THEREFORE, that all of the people cooperate with Civil Defense committee members.

Boy Scouts have first meeting

The first meeting of the newly organized Boy Scouts will take place tonight at the fire hall.

All boys between the ages of 11 to 18, who are interested in scouting, should contact Wayland Hill, Jr., Scout Master or Tom Kearns, Asst. scout master.

Parents of interested boys are asked to attend the first meeting in order to obtain committee members to help the newly organized troop.

Scout meetings will be scheduled on Thursday of each week at 7:00 p.m.

The purpose of the Boy Scouts of America as stated in the Constitution of the Boy Scouts of America and the charter granted by Congress on June 15, 1901 so states, "That the purpose of this corporation shall be to promote, through organization and cooperation with other agencies, the ability of boys to do things for themselves and others, to train them in Scouting, and to teach them patriotism, courage, self-reliance, and hundred virtues, using the methods which are in common use by Boy Scouts by placing emphasis upon the Scout Oath or Promise and Law for character development, citizenship training, and physical fitness."

A band of terrifying, wearisome and fast moving events climaxed a three day manhunt on Thursday by approximately 175 lawmen and volunteers.

The terrifying part started when the Eddie O'Brien home was invaded by two armed robbers about 3:30 a.m. Monday morning. They awakened O'Brien, owner and operator of the Nike Bar and Service Station, on the pretense of being out of gas. When he responded to their call, they forced entry to the house using .38-pistols.

The robbers then tied the family of five and took \$400 and a car load of beer and liquor.

Mrs. O'Brien, the first to untie herself, immediately called the City Marshall, Choncho Morales about 4:00 a.m. Morales called Sheriff Glenn Bradley, who, in turn, notified all Lincoln County authorities, thus beginning one of the largest and most extensive manhunts in Lincoln County's history.

As far as police could determine from information given by O'Brien, there were just two robbers. But they kept in mind a description of a third man given by Eddie's nine year old son.

At 4:30 a.m. State Policeman, Ken Wilson answering the Sheriff's call was heading to a rendezvous point with Darrell Austin, state police, of Captain. Wilson, stopping all cars on his way to the meeting point, was checking one car when he saw headlights a short distance away. The approaching car made a quick u-turn and Wilson gave chase.

He found the abandoned white '55 Oldsmobile near Tinnie with both doors flung open. The car was filled with a hundred or more bottles of whiskey and beer. Two sets of prints in the dirt indicated the men fled to the south.

Some day light, lawmen on horseback, planes, jeeps and dogs were instrumental in the search. Sheriff Bradley, State Police Officer, Capt. Hoover Wimberly of Alamogordo and Lieut. A. J. Smith of Roswell were in charge of the hunt. They established their headquarters at Riverdale. Warnings were being issued to all residents of the Hondo Valley to keep their doors locked and remove all keys from vehicles on their property.

Tuesday morning about 4:00 a.m., Jimmy Oakley, 27, of 2300 Garfield, Amarillo, Texas "froze-out" of hiding and tried to hail a passing motorist. He was apprehended by State Policemen, Lieut. A. J. Smith and James Clayton of Carrizozo. Oakley, known by Clayton, tried to convince him he was hitch-hiking from El Paso after being there looking for work. But Oakley did not fit the description given by the O'Brien boy.

Oakley, a former resident of Carrizozo, was brought to the Lincoln County jail about 5:00 a.m. He confessed to police and named his accomplice. He further stated, that they had planned the robbery in Amarillo and when stopped by Wilson, he took to the north and his partners headed south. Oakley worked at the Nike Bar several years ago and was a former Tularosa policeman.

Three roadblocks, one at Roswell, Ruidoso and Carrizozo, manned by State Police Sgt. W. J. Kruse and members of the Mounted Patrol, were maintained during the three days.

Mrs. Glenn Bradley and Justice of Peace, "Friday" Sherrill took care of the Carrizozo radio.

When the bandits first started their hunt, they headed south for 7 miles but then they doubled back to U. S. 70-380. They stayed close to the highway, jumping from side to side and hiding in culverts. As police tracked the wanted men, they found imprints indicating where the bandits had stopped. At one point, they even found the imprint of one of the men's gun.

Wednesday at 8:00 p.m., the

second suspect, George Sisk, 34, of 307 E. Browning, Pampa, Texas was captured by Capt. Hoover Wimberly of Alamogordo and Jim Clayton. The officers were hiding in a culvert near Border hill on U. S. 380-70 when they heard the suspects approaching, carrying on a conversation. One suspect told the other, "There are cops all over that mountain but we have nothing to worry about." "You sure have a good hiding place."

The fugitives walked into the trap—but Edward M. Frazee, yanking off his shoes slipped into the darkness when one of officer's flash lights went out.

After 72 hours of search by bone-weary men, the third man was apprehended by the Roswell Sheriff, Howard Babcock, Jr. and Deputy, Armando Tavares at the Hank Woods ranch 15 miles from Sisk's capture.

Sisk and Frazee, experienced woodsmen, told police they lived on mesquite beans, raw corn and pricely peeps during their 75 mile futile chase. They further stated, that they traveled at night to keep warm and slept during the day.

When captured Sisk had \$158.35 in a Lincoln County Agency bank sack and Frazee had \$158.

The robbers were arraigned before Justice of Peace, R. L.

Sherrill. Oakley pleaded guilty while Sisk and Frazee entered a plea of no contest. They were charged with grand larceny and armed robbery. Bail was set at \$10,000 for each account for each man.

Lincoln County Sheriff, Glenn Bradley expressed his thanks and appreciation to all lawmen and volunteers who assisted in the long search. All of their names are too numerous to mention but with their help three fugitives were brought to justice. And Lincoln County's record of no armed bandits escaping in the County during Sheriff Bradley's terms in office still stands.

FARM NEWS

Caracas class placings for the Lincoln County Contest were announced at the meeting last week. The first place calf carcass was from an Angus hereford steer fed by Lois Dunlap of Nogal. The first place lamb carcass was a Dorset fine wool lamb fed by Dan Knight of Ancho.

The other placings in the calf carcass contest were Winky Bancroft, second; Cooper brothers, third; Pank Cooper, fourth and Chris Bancroft, fifth. The other placings in the lamb carcass contest were Lois Dunlap, second and fourth; Dan Knight, third and Pete Gnadlowald, fifth. The First National Bank of Roswell gave cash awards in the carcass contest. The calf carcass contest was the first one to be held in New Mexico.

The crowd was small but the interest was good at the lamb demonstration held at the Fuller Ranch last week. Professor P. E. Neale had four pens of lambs on exhibit. The light pen of lambs averaged 74 lbs., the medium weight pen averaged 83 lbs., and the heavy weight pen averaged 92 lbs. Also on exhibit was a pen of ram lambs.

When examined, the lambs had a good half inch of backbone that could be felt. A lamb from each group had been killed and the carcass was on exhibit. These carcasses looked good with all but the light weight carcasses grading choice according to Dr. Earl Ray. The heavy weight carcasses had too much fat for the best retail cuts.

Dr. Earl Ray gave a demonstration on cutting and packing lamb with emphasis on increasing lamb sales.

Last minute preparations for Billy Graham El Paso area crusade made

EL PASO — With the opening day for the Billy Graham Crusade in El Paso only a few days away, the crusade headquarters announced an unusual interest on the part of the area in the eight day series of meetings, scheduled to begin November 4, in Kidd Field on the Campus of Texas Western College at 3:00 p.m.

"Judging from the preliminary preparations, the El Paso crusade could easily become the largest per capita crusade we have had in the United States," Mr. Bill Brown, Crusade Director, said.

More than two thousand people have been engaged in training classes in the last four weeks to become counselors in the crusade meetings. One thousand people have registered to sing in the crusade choir and another five hundred have been enlisted to serve as ushers.

Advance reservations from churches of the area numbers in the thousands with more requests expected in the next few days.

A systematic house-to-house visitation program is being carried on at the moment throughout El Paso. Every home in the area will be extended a personal invitation to attend the crusade meetings.

On November 2, El Pasoans will be joining in an old-timey "Prayer Vigil" in behalf of the crusade. Three locations in the area have been selected for people to gather from 8:00 p.m. to 12:00 midnight and pray for a spiritual awakening in the area.

Silver City, Deming, Albuquerque, Las Cruces and several other cities in the area have planned to come to the crusade meeting "En Masse". For these delegations, the crusade provided free reserved seat tickets to assure the group of seats when they arrive at the meetings. Thousands of seats, however, are available at each meeting for the general public. Sunday services being at 3:00 p.m., and weeknight services at 7:30 p.m. There will be no meeting in El Paso on November 9.

DEMOCRAT NUMBERS FAVOR CAMPBELL

SANTA FE — Jack Campbell, 45-year-old Roswell Democrat, should win the Tuesday run for governor unless there is a serious double-cross in the party which was not apparent as this was written.

At the end of the campaign Campbell's advantage appeared to be the same as it was at the start: Simply that he is a Democrat with no furious leas against him.

Democrats have a five to two advantage in New Mexico. Democrat Governor John Simms and John Burroughs fell before Ed Mechem when suffering fierce Democrat opposition because of developments in their administration.

JACK REDMAN CAPTURES CAMPAIGN SPOTLIGHT

The most exciting figure in the 1962 campaign, however, is neither Campbell nor Mechem but the Republican Dr. Jack Redman who has mounted a spectacular challenge for Santa Fe Joe Montoya's place in the U. S. House.

There is not a knowledgeable person in public affairs who is predicting that Redman will win but there isn't a one who isn't talking about him.

Montoya who is preparing for the U. S. Senate won his 1953 and 1960 elections with margins in each of 52,000.

The only close run he ever had for Congress was his first in the special election of 1957 when he beat Tom Colachi by 8,000.

HURLEY, SHIPMAN GOOD REPUBLICANS

All the other Democrats on the state ticket look like shoelins.

There isn't a stand-out candidate among the Republicans going for the secondary offices although the party has a good, well qualified ticket.

Two of the strongest on the ticket happen to be matched against weak Democrats which should give them good showings.

They are Wilson Hurley, son of the famous Pat, going against Irwin Moise, the supreme court justice who isn't much of a vote getter, and Frances Shipman, widely respected Santa Fe woman, candidate for secretary of state against Alberta Miller who has suffered some lumps in the campaign.

MECHEM COUNTIES STRONG FOR JACK

The reason so many observers are guessing Campbell will make it for governor is not only the normal Democrat advantage in New Mexico but the favorable situation for Campbell in three counties that gave Mechem top sided leads in 1960 when he scratched through ahead of John Burroughs by 1,900.

They are Chavez, Campbell's home county, which gave Mechem 2,200 margin last time and this time may be expected to support the home-towner with at least a break-even result;

Las Alamos, which gave Mechem 700 majority in 1960, and San Juan which supported Mechem with a spectacular 2,600 lead, which appear to be strong for Campbell this time.

PERIL No. 1: THE OLD GUARD

Campbell's peril is in the possibility of a frame-up against him by leaders in the old crowd who would rather endure another two years of Mechem than see the party taken over by Campbell's new group.

It has been notable that Congressman Montoya's brothers have not been scrambling for Campbell as they did for Burroughs in 1953 and 1960.

Sen. Clint Anderson hasn't been able to do much because of his health, and Sen. Dennis Chavez has delegated his campaign duties to Dennis Chavez Jr. who is not a popular figure in New Mexico politics.

Many lesser figures in the old party group are not extending themselves for the Demo candidate, but altogether there isn't enough evidence to say that the old gang is not backing Jack.

PERIL No. 2: CHURCH ISSUE

Campbell's second peril is what effect his Catholic faith might have on eastern New Mexico voters who turned him down heavily in the primary when he was going against Baptist Ed Mead of Albuquerque.

There hasn't been much church talk in the main event campaign and there was a lot in the primary. Governor Mechem is a Methodist.

PERIL No. 3: GRASS ROOTERS

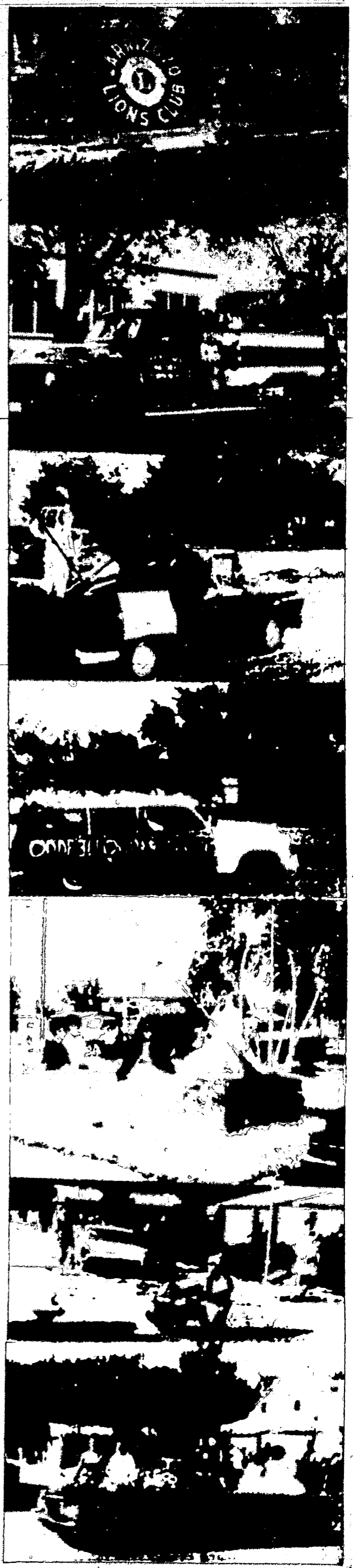
Peril No. 3 is not so serious. It lies in the danger of the Albuquerque reaction to Campbell's association with the Grass Roots Democrat group of Albuquerque which espouses big labor, big welfare, big spending government.

Albuquerque has been heavy against the Democrats in each of Mechem's five runs for Governor so Campbell isn't gambling seriously in associating with a new group in the city.

MANY STATE VOTERS HAVE MECHEM HABIT

These blocks could trip the Demo candidate and give Mechem an unprecedented fifth term after an unprecedented fourth term which came after an unprecedented third term as governor.

A whole lot of New Mexico people have a Mechem habit when they get behind the curtains of the voting machine.

Mahogany Cake

Cream together: 1 cup butter and 2 cups sugar. Blend with: 5 beaten egg yolks. Sift, measure and recast: 2 1/2 cups cake flour and 2 tsp. baking soda. Add the sifted flour mixture alternately with: 1 cup buttermilk, 3 squares melted chocolate and 1 tsp. vanilla. Beat until stiff enough to stand in peaks: 5 egg whites. Fold the beaten whites into cake batter immediately. Pour into 9-inch cake tin that have been greased and dusted with flour. Bake in a 350 degree oven for about 40 minutes. Cool and frost.





It was the wedding of Manuel Sisneros and Rebecca Salazar of Lincoln, on the 29 day of June, in the year of Our Lord 18—. The rest was obliterated and not readable with age. But it must have been in the early 1890's when Sisneros was Postmaster and District Court Interpreter at Lincoln. Old-timers who knew him well, a few of whom still live, claim that he was one of the most eloquent orators and interpreters in the Territory of New Mexico. And so was Bone Baca, oldest member of the family of Capt. and Mrs. Saturnino Baca.

Sisneros was an uncle of Billy and Harry Norman, he being a brother of their mother, and also of Mrs. Curry, the wife of Gov. George Curry, and later Mrs. Alfredo Gonzales.

Mrs. Sisneros, who was later Mrs. Syl Anderson, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Scipio Salazar. Those pioneers have been deceased for many years, but they and their ancestors made history in the Territory and Lincoln County, and their memory lingers from a historical stand point.

Liz Loera's Ft. Stanton school news appeared in the Capitán column by mistake in the issue of Oct. 18.

Speaking of eye-sores in old Carrizozo, some of those old buildings have a history and razing them to the ground, would be like disappearing the Mal Pais from the face of the earth. We do think that with appropriate repairs and paint, they could be transformed into a Shrine in Old Carrizozo, for the benefit of the old and new generations, as well as for newcomers and tourists going thru the town. We are also in favor, that when the Southern Pacific builds the new depot, the old machile chops should be given the works, because with their large shattered windows, and unkempt surroundings, they resemble a remnant of the Battle of the Bulge in the Normandy invasion.

Take in Fort Stanton for instance. We have buildings over 100 years old, and you only can tell that they are centenarians, because of the thick 'dobe and rock walls and old fireplaces, which are sealed from the inside.

The old railroad hotel and beanery in Carrizozo was restored, so why can't the other three or four buildings be restored also? The old dilapidated vacant sheds should be razed and the grounds cleared of unrightly reminiscences, but the old landmarks should be spared and preserved for posterity.

Take also the Courthouse and Wortley Hotel in Lincoln. The courthouse not only served its intended purpose when Lincoln was the county seat, but afterwards it served as a hall for political conventions, a school, store, dance hall, and even as a chicken roost and stable for stray livestock.

But since these landmarks have been restored and taken care of, they present a most wonderful sight when you approach Lincoln from the west. Appalling that the magnificent business edifices in old White Oaks where not taken care of and were left to deteriorate with the elements. Let's preserve our history in Lincoln County!

Again we say, that if these bits facing the railroad from one end of the street to the other, were cleaned of rubble and rubbish, it would be a noted improvement in town.

Soza said the affidavit contents that a \$216.92 short block motor purchased from the Valley Chevrolet Co. of Roswell, was paid for by the county. He said the affidavit showed the money was reimbursed to the county by the Roswell firm which said there had been a mistake and the bill should have gone to Nosker.

The affidavit, Soza said also stated tires were purchased from the Hondo Valley Tire Co. were paid for by the county when the affidavit said, the purchase price, \$204.95, was

reimbursed to the county with a statement saying the bill should have gone to Nosker. The affidavit said the motor and tires were used on Nosker's school bus.

The affidavit also stated "that the county was billed on August 1, 1961 and April 23, 1962 and paid for the following: 1 butcher and cook table, 1 butcher block, two bed side stands, 1 Hobart mixer, 2 cart cement-2 wheel, and 1 truck correspondent-three wheel push cart." It further stated, "that the above purchases by the county were in the possession of Kenneth Nosker until after investigation when they were delivered to the county warehouse by Nosker on October 19, 1962, and that chairman, Kenneth Nosker, has authorized payment of purchases made in excess of \$500 which purchases were made without bid all contrary to law."

The affidavit was signed by Billy Williams of Las Cruces, registered accountant, who also acted as special investigator for the District Attorney's office of the third judicial district. Billy Williams is also the former Republican county chairman of Dona Ana county.

It is recorded on the affidavit that Kenneth Nosker paid for the engine on October 6, 1962 and for the tires on October 19, 1962. The billing date for the engine is recorded as May 18, 1962, with payment authorized by county chairman, Nosker on July 10, 1962. There are two separate dates recorded for tires purchased; September 15 and 16, 1961 with payment authorized by county chairman, November 16, 1961; and April 26, 1962 with payment again authorized by county chairman on July 9, 1962.

Nosker was ordered to appear before the District Court at the court house in Carrizozo, before Judge W. T. Scoggin on the 5th day of November, at 10:00 a.m.

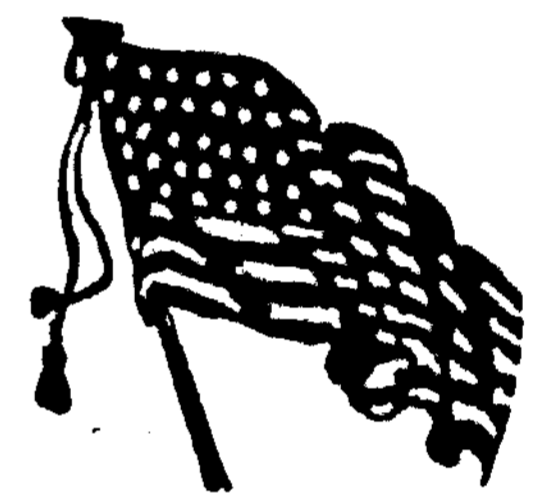

TWENTY-FIFTH LEGISLATURE
STATE OF NEW MEXICO
Senate Joint Resolution No. 3
Introduced by: Senators Ed V. Mead, Tibo J. Chavez and William H. Duckworth.

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 5, SECTIONS 1 and 2, and ARTICLE 7, SECTION 5 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE THAT THE GOVERNOR AND LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR SHALL BE ELECTED BY THE HIGHEST NUMBER OF VOTES CAST JOINTLY FOR BOTH OFFICES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 1 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:
"The executive department shall consist of a governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, state treasurer, attorney general and commissioner of public lands, who shall, unless otherwise provided in the constitution of New Mexico, be elected for the term of two years beginning on the first day of January next after their election. The governor and lieutenant governor shall be elected jointly by the casting by each voter of a single vote applicable to both offices."
"Such officers shall, after having served two consecutive terms be ineligible to hold any state office for two years thereafter."
"The officers of the executive department, except the lieutenant governor, shall, during their terms of office, reside and keep the public records, books, papers and seals of office at the seat of government."

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 5, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:
"The returns of every election for state officers shall be sealed up and transmitted to the secretary of state who, with the governor and chief justice, shall constitute the state canvassing board which shall canvass and declare the result of the election. The joint candidates having the highest number of votes cast for governor and lieutenant governor and the person having the highest number of votes for any other office, as shown by said returns, shall be declared duly elected. If two or more have an equal, and the highest, number of votes for the same office or offices, one of them, or any two for whom joint votes were cast for governor and lieutenant governor respectively, shall be chosen therefor by the legislature on joint ballot."
Section 3. It is proposed to amend Article 7, Section 5 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:
"All elections shall be by ballot, and the person who receives the highest number of votes for any office, except in the cases of the offices of governor and lieutenant governor, shall be declared elected thereto. The joint candidates receiving the highest number of votes for the offices of governor and lieutenant governor shall be declared elected to those offices."
Section 4. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election.

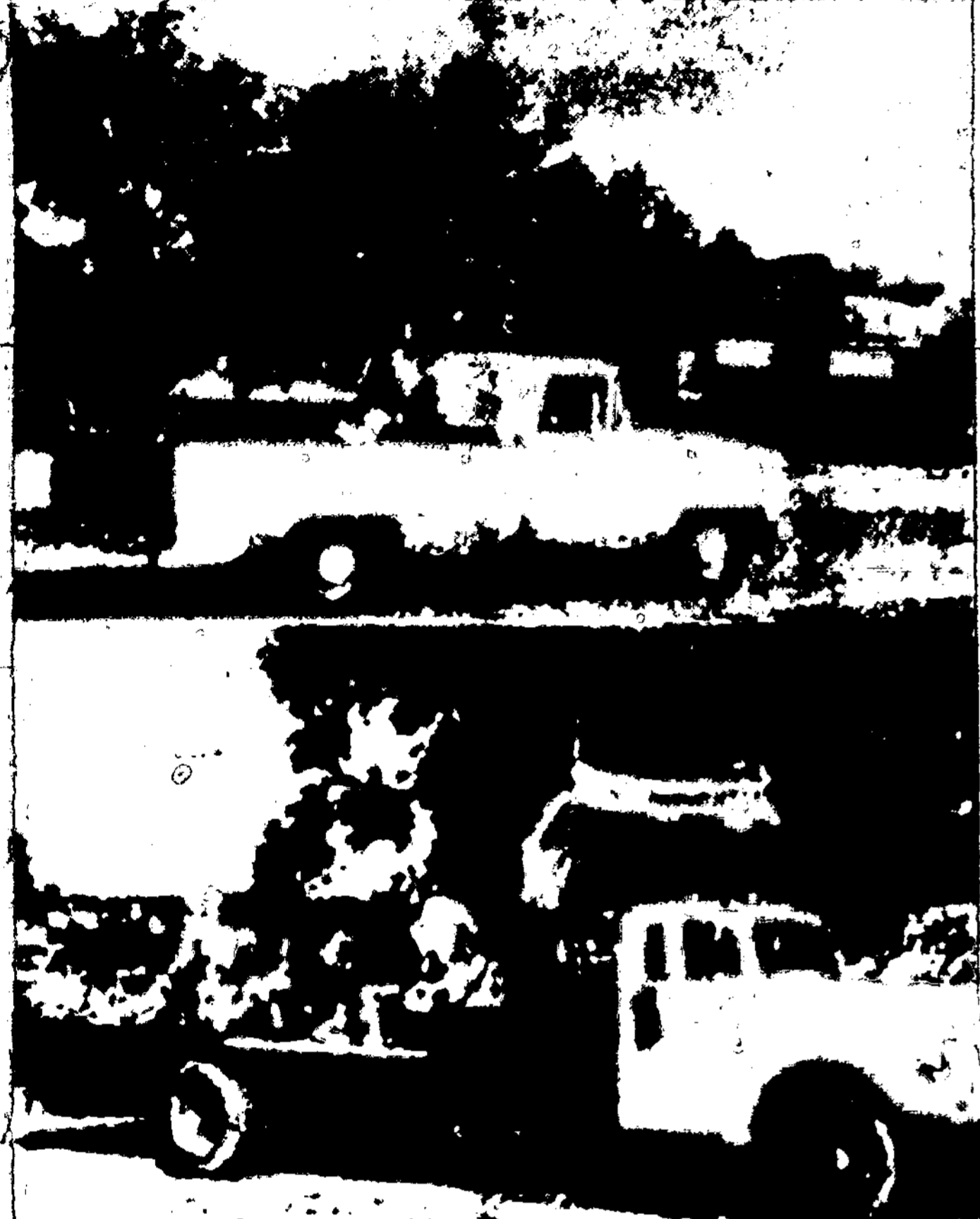

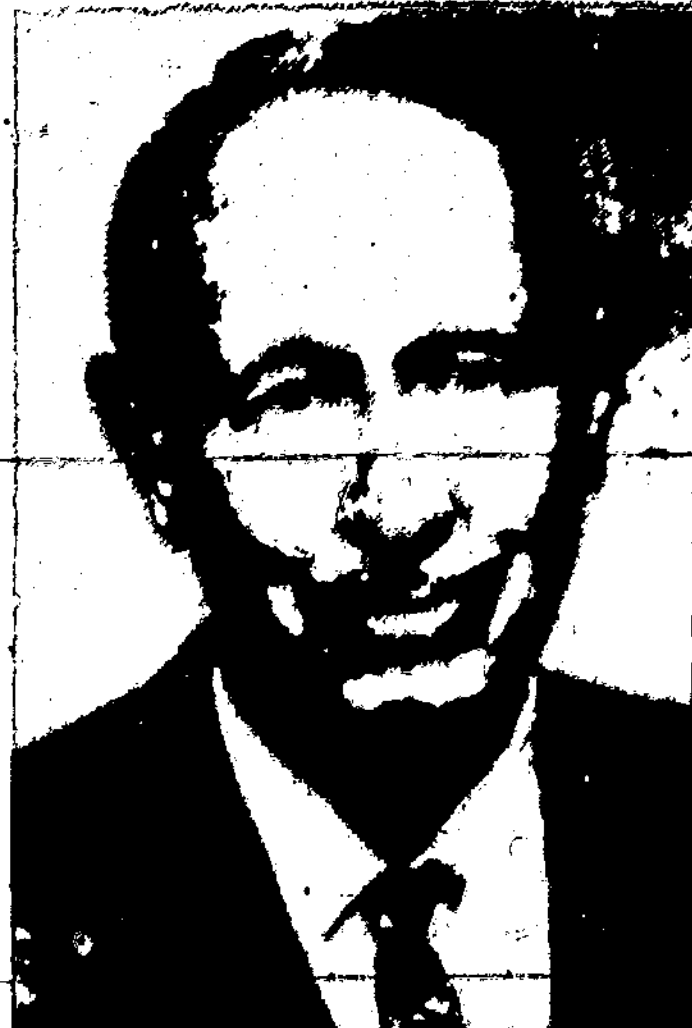
