Grizzlies win one of four games

Friday night at Ruidoso the Grizzlies ran into a good Ruidoso and came out on the short end of a nip and tuck battle 69-72. Both teams were shooting very good. The Grizzlies made more field goals, 29-26, but committed too many fouls and came out three points shy. For the Grizzlies Bobby Ortiz scored 39 pts, and Cosmo Gallegos collected 15. The Warriors' Bill Howard scored 33 and V. Reynolds hit for 13.

The Grizzly Cubs lost a close one also, 32-36.

Tuesday night the Capitan Tigers invaded the Grizzly Den and clawed out a 63-59 victory. This was another close ball game with Capitan maintaining a lead most of the game. Carrizozo went ahead 41-40 just before the third quarter ended but couldn't hold on. The Tigers roared back and built up a 10 pt. lead which the Grizzlies chewed down to four before the game ended. Bobby Ortiz scored 22 pts, and Pete Carabajal of Capitan got 23. The Grizzly Cubs beat Capitan 39-32.

Eristee Gomez, Dies

The death of Eristee Gomez, age 33, of Lincoln is being investigated by the Sheriff's department and State Police. Sheriff Glen Bradley and State police, Sgt. W. J. Kruse and Darrell Austin were called to the Ft. Stanton hospital early Sunday morning. Police learned from Mrs. Gomez that her husband had sustained the gun shot wound at his home two miles south of Lincoln and that he had died on his way to the hospital.

Mr. Gomez was a cook at the Ft. Stanton hospital and a resident of Lincoln for the past three years. He and his wife had been married seven months. A coroner's jury held at Lincoln Sunday evening ruled that Mr. Gomez' death was by reason of a gun shot wound in the left breast. The gun was a .22 caliber German made six shot revolver.

Graveside services will be held on Dec. 13, at 2:00 p.m. at the Lincoln cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, Tomasito; his mother, Mrs. Amanda Gomez of Kingsville, Tex.; four brothers, Nicacio, Guadalupe, David, all of Kingsville, and Trinidad of El Paso; one sister, Rita Guerra of Kingsville, Tex.

The family of Wade Lane escaped certain death at their home in Ruidoso on Dec. 4. Mr. Lane, who operates the Taste-Freez in town, was staying over with Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Sherrill. He was called on the phone Wednesday morning by his son, Alfred Jene who told his father that he and the rest of the family were awful sick and to come home quick. Shortly after, Alfred collapsed.

Mr. Lane arrived home to find his wife, Barbara, and children, Alfred, 17; Joe Dan, 15; Lois Ann, 15; Wade Jr., 12 and Kevin, 9; violently ill and semi-conscious. The doctor arrived and treated the family saying that they must be suffering from food poisoning. Wade stayed with his family and in the afternoon, he found himself becoming ill. It was discovered that one of the vents on the gas heater was clogged, letting the carbon monoxide fumes into the house.

The family was then brought to Carrizozo and stayed at the home of the Lane sisters.

The Grand Jury convened November 19 was asked two questions by Judge W. T. Scoggin before he accepted the final report from the jury. One, would more time help in your findings. Two, if you heard the trial again would it make a difference. The jury retired to vote and returned with unanimous answers, "no", to both questions.

Whereupon the Judge cautioned the jury members that "secrecy forever" was a part of their oath. That a Grand Jury cannot be questioned except in case of perjury. The jury was thanked for their service and discharged.

The complete text of the final report follows:

In the third judicial district court, within and for the county of Lincoln, State of New Mexico.

FINAL REPORT OF GRAND JURY

Empaneled on the 19th day of November, 1962, in the District Court of the Third Judicial District of the State of New Mexico, within and for the County of Lincoln, and during the regular term thereof, begun and held at Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico, on the 8th day of October, A.D., 1962.

The Grand Jurors of the State of New Mexico, taken from the good and lawful men women of the County of Lincoln, in the State of New Mexico, duly elected, empaneled, sworn and charged, during the term aforesaid, to inquire in and for the body of said County and due presentment make of all offences against the laws of the State of New Mexico, committed within said County, and to inquire into the misconduct in office of county, district and precinct officers within the said County of Lincoln, and into the administrative and physical conditions of the several county offices and state institutions, and into the various city offices; and after having been in session since the 19th day of November, 1962, and being present and at the disposal of the citizens of Lincoln County since said date, on their oaths do respectfully present to the Court this, their Final Report:

We, the Grand Jury, recommend:

That the County Commissioners of Lincoln County, New Mexico, comply at all times with the statutes of the State of New Mexico, relative to the conduct of their office.

That the funds accumulated by the Justices of the Peace of Lincoln County, New Mexico, be maintained by those Justices of the Peace in a trust account separate and apart from their own personal funds.

That prisoners sentenced to jail for the period sentenced, and shall not be allowed to work at any job, other than a governmental or civic agency. It is further recommended that the jails be adequately disinfected and more adequately ventilated.

It is the recommendation of this Grand Jury that the affairs of the Village of Ruidoso Downs be thoroughly investigated by the office of the District Attorney, with special attention being given to the utter lack of cooperation between the Village officials and the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department. Further, that the officials of the Village of Ruidoso Downs conform in all of their actions to the laws governing municipalities of the State of New Mexico.

That the State Fire Marshal set out in clear and concise form the manner in which the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department shall conduct its affairs.

That the District Attorney be allowed special funds from whatever source is available, to conduct this investigation.

We recommend that the County Commissioners and the Hospital Board of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, give serious consideration to the extension of kitchen facilities of the hospital, by a coordinated move to finance such extension.

It is recommended that the Village of Ruidoso, the State Police Board, and the County Commissioners, consider sharing the expenses of the dispatcher employed by the Village of Ruidoso, who handles work for all three agencies.

We recommend that the school authorities of Carrizozo, New Mexico, cause to be instituted an inspection of the electrical wiring of the schools, by a competent electrician, to determine if the wiring is adequate, or whether it should be re-done, taking safety into consideration.

We recommend that the

County Commissioners consider the possibility of providing adequate space for the keeping, preserving and protecting of Lincoln County, N. M., records, at the earliest possible date.

11. We recommend that Mr. William C. Palmer be thanked for appearing before the Grand Jury, and advised that nothing was found to warrant any action being taken in the matters he brought before the Grand Jury.

12. We recommend that hereafter, when compiling their annual audit of the records of Lincoln County, N. M., that the auditing firm report directly to the County Commissioners of Lincoln County, N. M., any unsound fiscal policies which they may have discovered while making the audit, and having reported to the State Auditor.

13. We recommend that the Board of County Commissioners, and the County Officials, of Lincoln County, N. M., take immediate steps toward building a new court house as soon as possible.

14. We recommend that as soon as possible paving or graveling be done on parking areas of schools and hospitals in the County of Lincoln, N. M., according to requests heretofore made by such institutions to the Board of County Commissioners.

15. We commend the Village of Ruidoso, for the condition of its jail facilities.

16. We commend the Ruidoso High School, for the manner in which they serve the students of their school cafeteria, and quality of the food served.

17. We commend the foresight of the Village of Ruidoso officials, for the purchase of the billing and posting machine, which is most adequate and which will continue to be adequate if the population of the Village of Ruidoso increases to any considerable extent.

18. We commend the manner in which the Hondo Schools and facilities are kept.

19. We commend the manner in which the Capitan Schools and facilities are kept.

20. We commend the superintendent and staff of the Corona schools for the manner in which they are conducting the affairs of the Corona School System.

21. We commend the manner in which the Carrizozo schools and their facilities are kept.

22. We commend the management of the Lincoln County Hospital. It was very clean, and well kept.

23. We commend the manner in which the Ruidoso Schools and their facilities are kept.

After carefully weighing all the evidence presented, the Grand Jury returns, by a proper vote, no indictment and no accusation.

The members of the Grand Jury thank the District Attorney and his staff, for the cooperation and help they have extended in conducting the duties of the Grand Jury.

Having completed the work brought to its attention, and finding no further business to transact, the Grand Jury respectfully requests that it be discharged.

A Lincoln County visitor suggests communities get together on water

Dear Mr. Payton,
Your editorials are most interesting. You will soon be appearing in The National Observer in their "Grass Roots Philosophy." I am moved to certain observations by your, "There Should Be Room," and "Who Is For Lincoln County?" in the Nov. 29 issue. Your two subjects dovetail nicely.

The Amish are organized. Their organization has an aim, including sub-aims, one of which seems to be to live conservatively in a sedate community requiring a minimum of local taxes. As anyone might surmise who lives in a "progressive" city and finds municipal taxes far outrunning state and county exactions, the Amish doubtless have achieved their sub-aim.

As to "Who is for Lincoln County," it looks like not many. The County lacks organization. Each community seeks its own interests independently, and perhaps guards its water rights with a jealousy that is destructive to the interests of the county as a whole. Water, of course, has become King of any local industry. With it, any place in the sunny southwest is bound to grow, without it, will become an interesting ghost town.

Organization is our need. By an organized effort that was just a breeze, Captain suddenly moved from the corral to the best water situation in, if not the State, at least the county. Zozo has got it made as to potential. Your water-bank is the mountain from which flood water bores off down the gulches and hikes on out of sight forever in the Mal Pais. Nobody below, from Tularosa to the Gulf of Mexico, can rightly fuss with you over this waste.

As to these holding rights above you, they could hardly be anything but happy to cooperate. For instance, the spring-feeding seepage from a dam above the Stearns place would yield more water than normally runs through Nogal, to say nothing of the storage. Again, there is a beautiful basin for a lake above White Oaks, against Pates Mountain. A tiny dam would do the job. Again, a short canal off southward and upward on a fantastically inviting route could intercept the runoff from Church Mountain and Nogal Peak and feed a reservoir at the town, with build-in pressure.

But dams, like pioneers cabin-building once did, require log rolling. Since coming here I have watched, step by step, the 32 million dollar project we call Twin Buttes congeal from a mere ambiguous vision to the closing of the great gates scheduled this month. The leg-work and paper-work have been hardly less than the dirt-work. It is a multi-purpose project. An independent organization formed by the irrigators represents the \$9,000,000 commitment of the farmers. Another represents the \$14,000,000 of the city. A big federal contribution comes under reclamation, Flood Control, Recreation and other extra-area benefits, as does a state interest in Fish and Wildlife, Parks, etc.

Already profitable, the city Water Dept. stands to copy against the small sum to be amortized in 40 years.

Why not let the watchmen of the various community water interests consider getting together to claim the floodwaters. It should be easy to divert runoff at the source to either direction over Indian Divide, and easy to calculate the quantity diverted. So could most of the people of the County trade water as advisable, and still bar lower interests from claim to the calculated amount.

But let the organization not be called something bureaucratically onerous, like, "Association for the Conservation and Distribution of unclaimed flood waters of Lincoln County." Gosh! A corporation need not express its charter in the title! Try to write that all on a check, or cramp it out, tediously, thousands of times! Maybe "Lincoln County Waters, Inc." or something still shorter and more poetic, like "Aqua-Lin-Co, Inc."

"Organization" is an interesting word. "Erg" is a unit of energy. An organ implies a unity of Ergs directed to a special use. It took organs in organization to build the Pyramids, the Taj Mahal, the Panama Canal, whether for good or evil. An epitome of human organization is enscrolled in the small package we are watching on its journey to Venus. It could not resist this tribute to Marine 2, not less for this mission, failed or fulfilled, than for its everlasting subsequent destiny.

Out In The Open

The Lincoln County Grand Jury, released from duty Monday afternoon, commented favorably on the care and keeping of all school facilities but didn't have a kindly word to say about the manner in which the county's most valuable possession, its records, are being kept.

No reflection intended on the people at the courthouse, they are doing the best they can with facilities available. The need is great for adequate and safe facilities.

The Grand Jury made two comments in this regard. One, that something be done immediately about facilities for safe-keeping of county records. Two, that the county is in bad need of a new courthouse.

The need for a new courthouse, which would have plenty of vault space for records, has been obvious to a succession of county commissioners — but this need is likewise considered poor political fodder so it is pushed into the background — during which time just a minor disaster, like a fire, an explosion, is all that would be needed to destroy these records for all time.

When the horse has run away it is a little late to close the gate.

The Grand Jury is right in its recommendation that something be done — and done in the immediate future. It would seem foolish to do half the job, for instance building vaults for the records, when the entire courthouse is in need of rebuilding.

This Grand Jury was elected to represent Lincoln County, if the rest of Lincoln County citizens were to view the situation first hand, as did the Grand Jury, there would be little argument about the need for a new courthouse.

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





He had it all figured out how to go to Juarez, and after nightfall he went to the tool chack, broke the door and pushed the handle pump car on the main drag. When he got to the cection house, the wife and boy and a sack full of "cordas" were waiting and when he yelled "Abordo," they pumped and pumped until they got to Luna and saw the headlights of an oncoming train. He took the boy under one arm and the bag of tortillas under the other and jumped, but left the poor woman to her own fate. When daylight came, they found the wheelage and mama asleep under a tree. Don Cacahuate flared up, "Why didn't you jump?" "Eccuase my reboco (shaw) got caught on a handle bar and I saw all kinds of stars," replied the Senora.

Don Cacahuate was given a Black Ball and he went to sheepherding for Pick Warden. After the family cotted down to home life at Ancho and Don Cacahuate had dispersed the revolution, sotol and his cuchillo from the inner recess of his troubled mind, they bought a team of burros and wagon and often visited Corona and Carrizozo. The boy went to school, grew up and got to be foreman at the Ancho Brick Kilns. Juan Pacheco of Carrizozo was his godfather and named him Juan de la Cruz. In a drunken pool hall brawl in Corona, George Clements ripped Pacheco's hind pocket, but Pacheco carried the back screen door with him. Ask Pacheco at the courthouse and enjoy a good laugh!

To quote Pacheco "That Vaquero was a big man and he chased me around a pool table like a greyhound chasing a eared jackrabbit. He snatched my hind pocket, but luck was with me when it ripped. MECHEM STRENGTHENS CONSERVATIVE GROUP

SANTA FE — Senate conservatives, mostly southern Democrats, gained a new recruit in New Mexico's Republican Sen. Ed Mechem.

New Mexico governors, particularly Republicans serving with Democratic legislatures, don't have much voice in fashioning liberal or conservative government, but Mechem was around long enough to show that he is against big government and big debt and a backer of state's rights and individual enterprise.

If he carries on true to the past he will stand left of the deep south segregationists but considerably right of the middle.

VOTING TREND HERE IS CONSERVATIVE

If he pursues that course in the Senate and is able to get it back to the voters at home it should help him in 1964 when his Demo opponent will probably represent the opposite philosophy.

It would be futile for the Republican to try to out-Democrat the Democrats, and besides there are indications about that New Mexico is moving toward conservative voting.

The straws in the wind, or some might say the blowing haystack, were Mechem's record breaking four elections in a state lopsided with Democrats the huge majority rolled up for the conservative Democrat Rep. Tom Morris in last months election, and the remarkable run made by conservative Jack Redman against Rep. Joe Montoya.

SPECIAL ELECTION SCHEME IS DEAD

Public revulsion to a scheme fostered by some Demo politicians has crushed the possibility for an early special election to get Mechem out of the Senate before the 1964 voting.

With a special election out of the picture it means that three of Mechem's prospective opponents who are presently in office would have to give up re-election to gamble for the big job — Reps. Joe Montoya and Tom Morris and Gov. Jack Campbell.

Any of them could run in a special election without resigning but being forced to wait until the 1964 primary each must choose his target.

MONTOKA SEEKING AN EARLY START

There is already activity in the state toward getting the

course, which will probably emerge in the formation of Montoya for Senator clubs in 1963.

There is serious sentiment for Morris if the modest Tucumcari farmer could be included into the gamble, and it would be a gamble. He seems set to continue in the House as long as he keeps running.

Many observers think that Jack Campbell will be interested in the Senate by running time in 1964. The decision to have no special election serves his ambition for the Senate, if he has such an ambition. He couldn't have stood as a candidate in a special election a few months after taking office without looking bad.

Former Gov. John Simms of Albuquerque is the only other prominently mentioned figure at this date nearly two years in front of the election.

SEVEN APPOINTED THREE ELECTED

Mechem is New Mexico's tenth senator and the seventh to go in by appointment if you consider that the first two, Albert B. Fall and Tom Catron, were appointed by the state legislature.

Others who started by appointment were Holm O. Bursum, Bronson Cutting, Carl Hatch and Dennis Chavez.

Elected directly were A. A. Jones of Las Vegas, Sam Bratton of Clovis, and Clint Anderson of Albuquerque.

LARRAZOLO SENATOR FOR FOUR MONTHS

There was an eleventh senator who never participated in Congress, A. O. Larrazolo, a powerful figure in early day politics.

Larrazolo was a leader of the Democrats before and shortly after 1912 statehood but in 1918 was elected governor as a Republican. He was not nominated for a second term but continued a figure of influence.

In 1928 after Sen. A. A. Jones had died in the Senate barber chop and Bronson Cutting had been appointed in his place, the lawyers and the politicians figured a scheme to reward Larrazolo and also keep him in the Republican ranks, by nominating him for a so-called short term Senate place in the election of that year.

By agreement with Cutting who was running for a full term to start the following March, the old date for opening Congress, Larrazolo ran for the remaining time of Jones' term, from election day until March. He got the pay and title but since Congress was not in session never served on the floor.

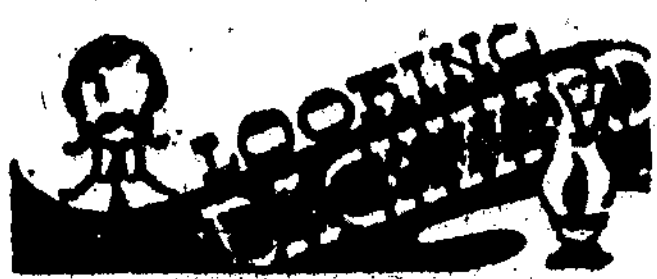
BENNY SANCHEZ GETS A SECOND CHANCE

Gov.-Elect Jack Campbell has chosen as his motor vehicle commissioner Benny Sanchez

and was in peril of prosecution until rescued by the 1961 legislature.

Sanchez acting in violation of the law, designated one plate instead of two for automobiles, authorized plates for more than one year, also against the law, spent \$152,000 for Scotchlite products for coating the plates after an earlier legislature had disapproved the product sold by Demo politician Fata Leonard, and overspent his budget by \$330,000 in the last six months of 1960.

The legislature picked up the \$335,000 deficit and passed laws temporarily legalizing the one plate per car and the use of plates for longer than one year.

The Internal Revenue Service has just published a new set of guidelines for calculating depreciation on buildings and equipment. These guidelines reflect the recent changes designed to liberalize depreciation rates.

Some representative guides from the new publication are: Farm machinery and equipment, 10 years; farm buildings, 25 years; dairy cattle, 7 years; light trucks (less than 13,000 pounds empty), 4 years; autos used in business, 3 years; logging equipment, 6 years; saw-mills, 10 years, and truck tractors, 4 years.

However, the county agent states these guidelines do not place absolute depreciation rates, but are "reasonable standards."

For more details a copy of the bulletin Depreciation Guidelines and Rules, Internal Revenue Service, Publication No. 456 can be obtained for 25 cents from Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D. C.

If you want to cut labor cost in the orchard, consider getting a tree squirrel or "space basket." The space basket fits on the regular orchard tractor, like a front end loader. A man with pruning equipment stands in the basket and manipulates levers to move himself up (maximum height 13 feet), down, left or right.

How long should you keep cancelled checks? Depends on the purpose. Hold all checks at least two years, counsels the American Bankers Association. Checks for items claimed for tax deductions should be kept a minimum of three years, while cancelled rent checks should be kept for as long as you occupy the premises.

New Mexico is in the second phase of its war against sheep scabies, a disease caused by a parasitic mite. Many ranchers are dipping their lambs this fall within 10 days of delivery time to guard against any possible spread of the disease, says J. R. Stauder, sheep specialist with the New Mexico University extension service.

Last winter and spring all infected flocks and herds that were exposed to the disease were dipped. The scab mite is not particularly active during the summer months and most

inspections by regulator officials are made during the fall or spring period, the sheep specialist says.

The above picture of a dipping operation was taken on a southeastern New Mexico ranch last spring. The sheep were dipped before they were dipped. The dipping was a precautionary measure as the sheep were pastured adjacent to an infected herd.

Sheep which are moved within or out of a quarantine area must be dipped, Stauder points out. Fat lambs going to market are not required to be dipped.

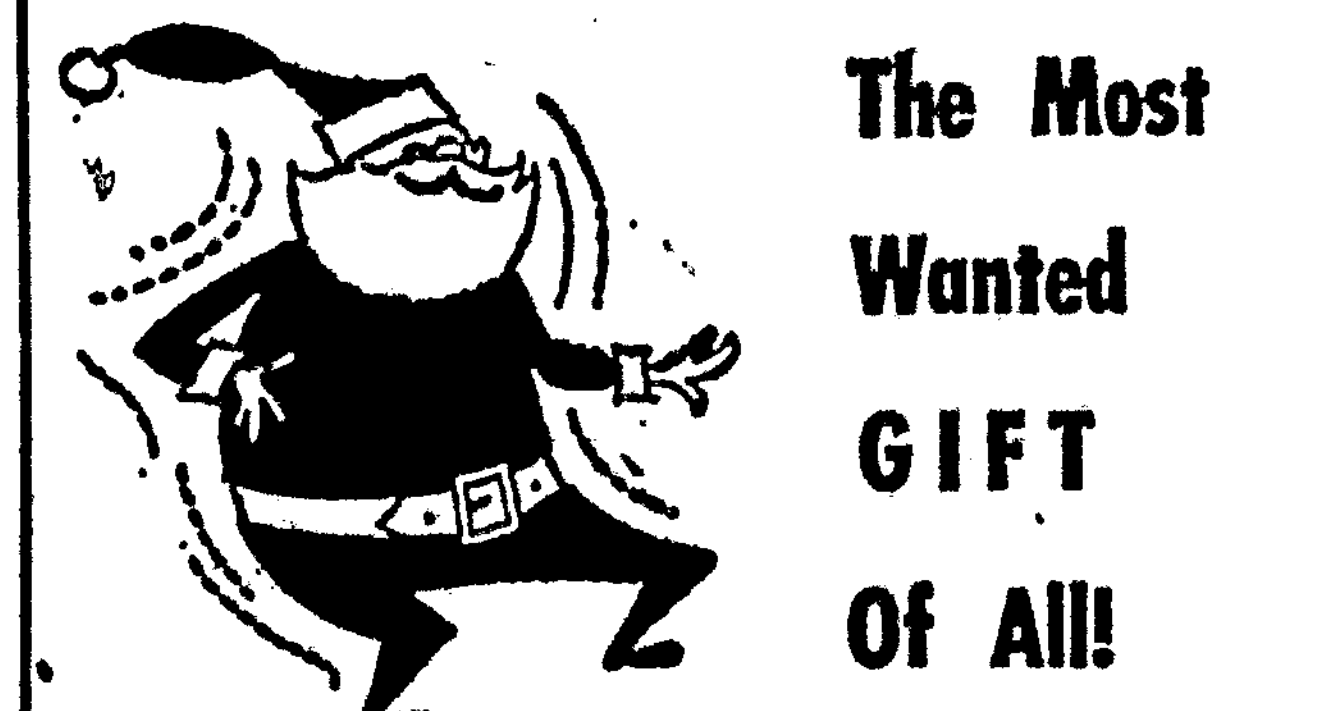
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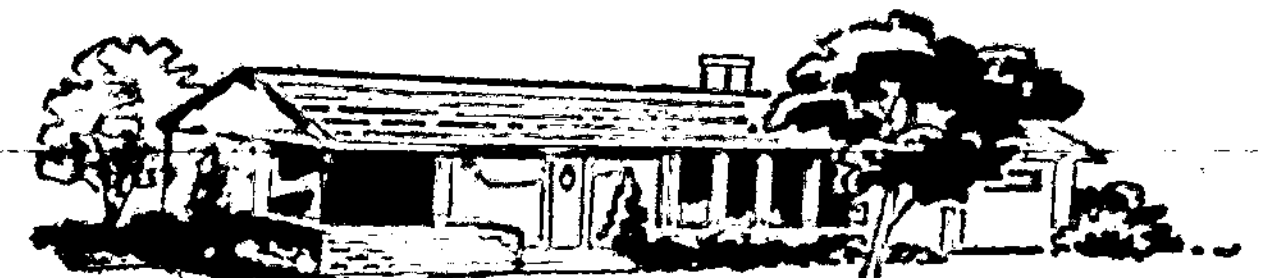

The early Egyptians thought they had played hell—and had—when they constructed the mighty pyramids in the desert sands of their country, to preserve the mummified bodies of their rulers forever and eternity. One of them, the Great Pyramid of Khufu, covered roughly 13 acres, was 768 feet square and 482 feet high—a gigantic piece of work effected for only one purpose, to entomb the corpse of a ruler. Other pyramids were almost as large and were constructed for the same purpose.

Piece by piece of native materials and in a gigantic operation, almost 3,000 years B. C., the servants of those rulers built the sepulcher to encase the masters at their death. They are recognized as one of the Seven Wonders of the World.

The Old West had cagey and dogged characters, too—just as crafty, hell-bent and conniving in their determination as were the Egyptians! That was proven when the Bank of Vernal of Vernal, Utah, was built!

There was an era of the Old West when freight wagons, drawn by either oxen or mules, afforded the only means of bulky transportation. And it was in this era which the Vernal Bank building was constructed. Freight was high in those days and travel through hostile Indian territory over the rugged uncharted trails was perilous. Construction went at a premium and money was scarce.

The Bank of Vernal was to be constructed of brick, not planks—the organizers planned a structure of endurance, as did the constructors of the Pyramids. The nearest brick kiln was located at Salt Lake City, some 250 miles away. The freight alone for the transportation of the bricks figured into an enormous sum. The directors scratched their heads in deep contemplation, and sought with dexterity a manner in which they could defeat the high, overland, freight rates.

The United States Postal System fell victim to their devious studies and schemes. Parcel post rates were reasonable, and after computation, they had a plan! They would put it into effect. As a result, the local post office of Vernal was swamped by hundreds and hundreds of parcels—great jobs of them—each containing a well wrapped brick—from the brick kiln in Salt Lake City.

Hurried postal department officials rushed onto the scene from Washington to clean up the jam. They stroked their beards and moaned over the situation. But nothing could be done about it. The constructors were within their legal bounds. The postal officials retired to their offices in the Capitol City, to moan and groan over the plightful situation. They could do nothing else.

Thus was constructed the only office building in the world ever to be sent through the mail.

Soon afterwards, however, the postal regulations were revamped! A new regulation was issued limiting parcel post packages to a certain number that could be sent from one party to another during a given period!

Understanding Radiation

One of the best ways rural residents have of surviving a nuclear attack is by understanding radiation and avoiding it.

Any enemy attack would probably be directed against military and large industrial centers. But these areas comprise less than seven percent of the total land areas of our country.

The biggest hazard in rural areas is caused by fallout, most of which will have fallen within two days after a blast.

Gamma rays and beta particles are the two most important types of radiation. Gamma rays are the greatest immediate danger as they are very penetrating and can injure living tissue. (Unless damage is too severe, the body is repaired in time, much like a burn heals.)

Man and animal can be protected by remaining under shielding materials that absorb radiation until its density decays to a safe level. Gamma rays do no damage to food or water.

Beta radiation is quite different. It is not very penetrating, however, it can cause skin burns and, if ingested, could seriously injure internal organs of man and livestock. Beta isotopes could become a food hazard.

We can protect ourselves from beta radiation by avoiding contact with radioactive dust and by keeping it out of our food and water. Regardless of the amount of radiation you might be exposed to, you yourself will never become radioactive.

County Agent Explains USDA'S What Is Rural Areas Development (RAD)? It is a nationwide effort supported by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. RAD is designed to help local groups, state agencies and private organizations develop the total resources of rural areas.

RAD aims to help increase income, improve living standards and make more jobs available. It is concerned with total economic development and includes, but is not restricted to, agricultural development. Success depends on local initiative. Various agencies and organizations are available to the community to help get the job done.

An important step is to have local leaders meet to discuss the possibilities of a long-range program of community development. Such leaders should represent a wide range of interest such as agriculture, industry, churches, local governments, schools, women's groups and similar organizations. Such a group could then make progress by analyzing the problem.

The Cooperative Extension Service of New Mexico State University has assumed responsibility for assisting local leadership in educational programs and in organizing for community development. Local extension agents are available in each county for such consultation and assistance.

There are many sources of assistance for groups which have decided on specific plans of action. Such assistance can be both financial and technical. County extension agents can also direct groups to the sources of information.

Good Cookery Improves Venison.
If there is a hunter in your household, maybe his game bag can help pare down the grocery bill. It's a good idea to have your cooking tips handy, just in case this is the lucky year.

If you are the least bit timid about your ability to serve up a tasty dish of venison, try these suggestions.

Most of the strong disagreeable flavor in venison is due to inadequate bleeding, delay or carelessness in dressing, failure to cool promptly or thoroughly, or blood from a shot would spread along the membrane between the muscles.

The characteristic flavor seems to be concentrating in the fat and if strong, trimming away excess fat will help. Venison is a rather dry meat, however, and is improved by adding of suet, butter, or other fat when using dry heat methods.

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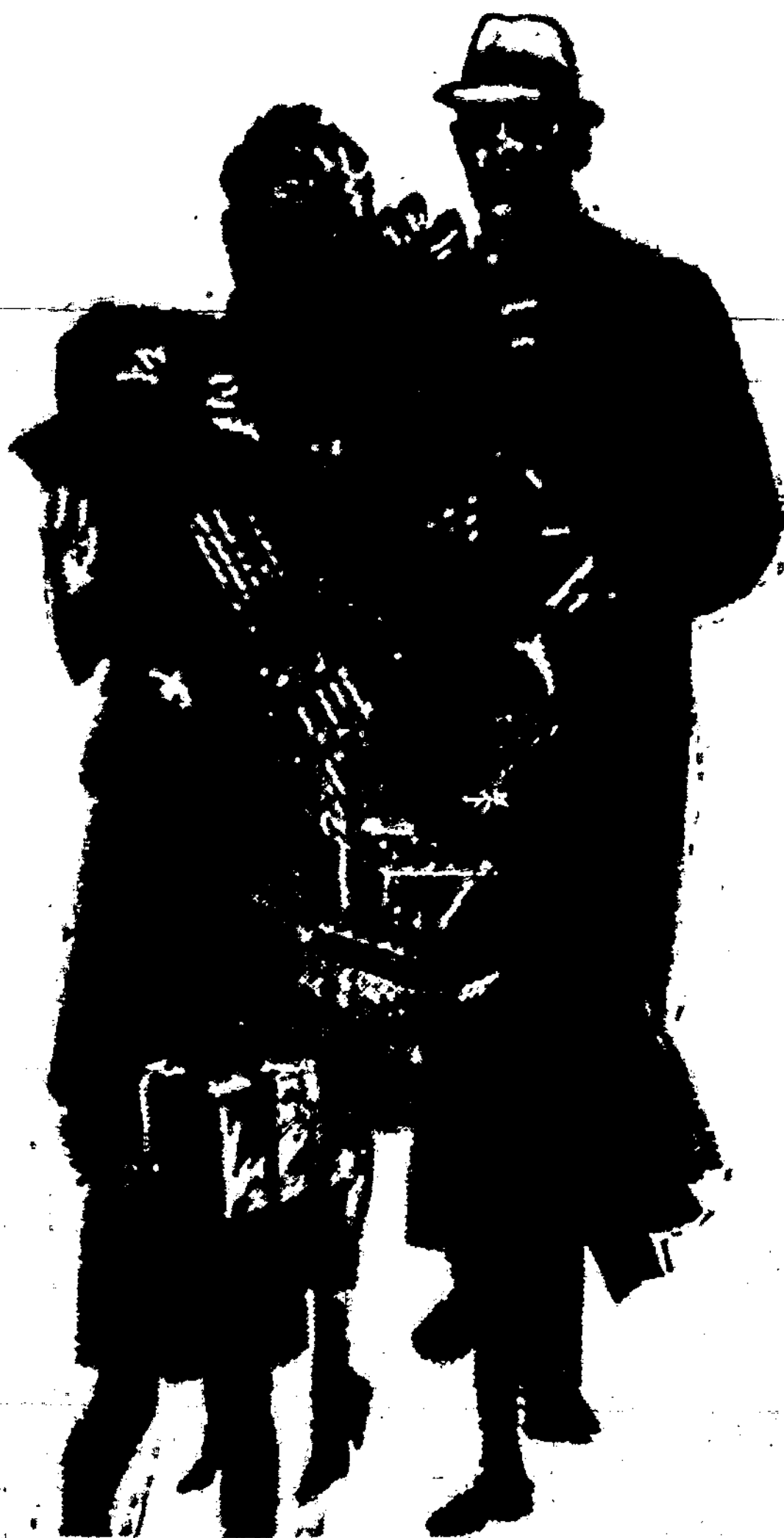

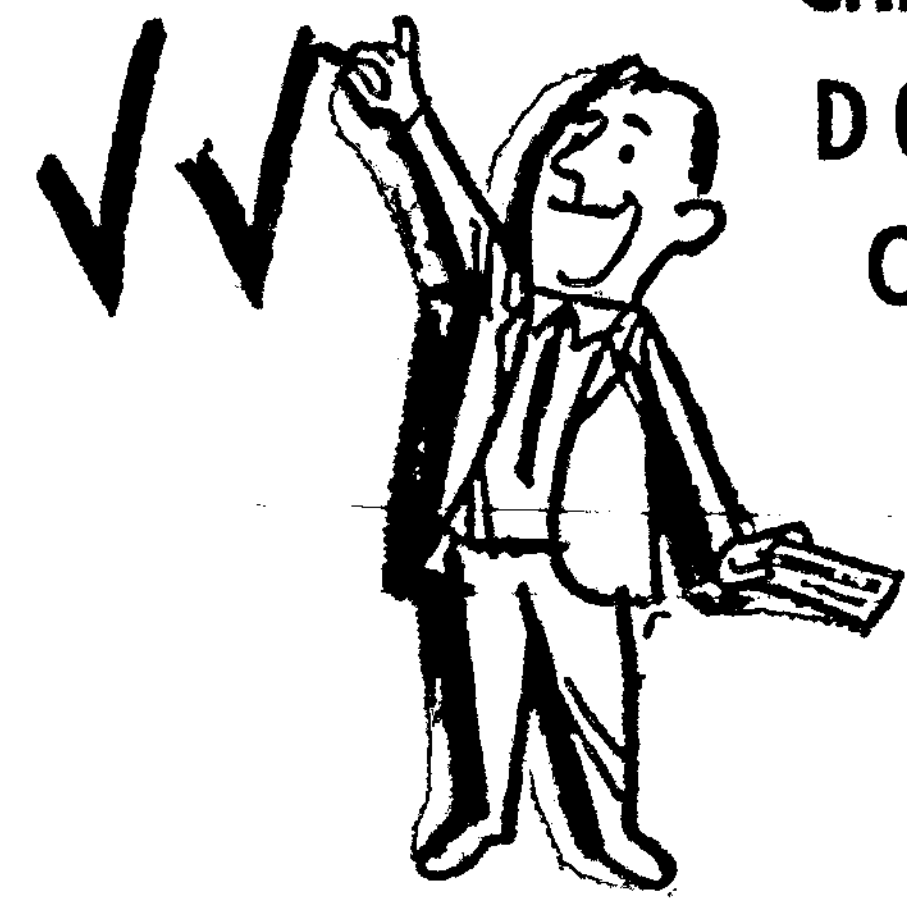
