Pauline McKnight to be charged with first degree murder in death of husband

The State, according to a statement made to the News Tuesday by Asst. District Attorney Richard Parsons, presently intends to prosecute Mrs. Pauline McKnight with a charge of 1st degree murder in the shooting of her rancher husband, Wilbur McKnight, on the night of January 26 at their ranch some near Hondo.

Investigation and autopsy reports give evidence that Mr. McKnight was shot four times. State officials theorize from Mrs. McKnight's statement and the investigation which followed that the first bullet fired knocked Mr. McKnight down and that three more shots were fired at close range, two of the bullets into the back and a third directly into the heart. One shot was fired against the body, and the others about six to twelve inches away. One bullet was recovered from under a chest in the bedroom where the shooting took place.

The State will attempt an early preliminary hearing and arraignment for a speedy trial in March or by the 1st of April if at all possible.

Bennie Herrera is hospitalized with multiple lacerations of the head, fractured right ankle, three fractured ribs and light concussion. 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Court Directs Carrizozo Suit to be Reopened

SANTA FE—A court case involving a \$36,000 judgment against New Mexico Copper Corp. at Carrizozo was directed Thursday to be reopened.
The decision was made when the State Supreme Court reversed a Lincoln County District Court ruling of Dist. Judge W. T. Seoggin.
The involved issue came to the courts when James J. Mellif, who was operating the facilities at Carrizozo, sought a restraining order in district court to enjoin I. Reuben Goodman of Baltimore, Md., and the Lincoln County sheriff from selling property of the corporation.

The court records showed that Goodman held a judgment of \$36,000 against the New Mexico Copper Corp. which resulted from a suit filed by him. Goodman was a director of the corporation. Mellif was a large stockholder in the corporation.
Mellif, in order to protect the corporation from execution of the judgment, the court record said, entered into an agreement with Goodman in Lincoln County. The agreement called for Mellif to purchase the judgment, paying \$10,000 cash and the balance of \$26,000 in semiannual installments of \$6500 each.

Mellif assigned to Goodman a mortgage which was held against the corporation securing money advanced by Mellif to the corporation. Goodman agreed he would not execute the judgment so long as Mellif did not default on the agreement.
Subsequently, the court record said, the corporation defaulted in interest payments to Mellif. Goodman then threatened to foreclose the mortgage against the corporation and execute the judgment.

The 65 acres of land owned by the corporation at Carrizozo, the ore mill, available water, and buildings of the corporation were to be sold to recover the judgment.
Mellif went to court seeking a restraining order to enjoin Goodman and the Lincoln County sheriff from holding the sale.



The Weekly Press

The weekly press is regaining the prestige and influence it has had at the turn of the century. After the first decade of the 1900's, the weeklies around the country began to slide downward. The reason was William Randolph Hearst. Whatever one may think of Mr. Hearst's life and politics, he put a new vitality into his papers around the country. He applied the personal touch: he made contact with the people and kept it for thirty years. The people in the cities, in the countries, and in the country grabbed his papers.

GRADUALLY the weekly press took a back seat, and coming out of the Depression, the weeklies were associated mostly with the lists of delinquent country taxpayers, or the medium used by lawyers to divorce notices and other legal to make sure that no one connected with the case would see it. But all of that has changed. As fast as the weekly press continues

to go up, the daily press is going down. I do not mean down necessarily in earnings.
The dailies made mistakes during the wave of prosperity and easy advertising dollars. The major mistake was that the daily lost contact with the people. Into this breach the weekly press jumped with both feet.
THE VIGOR OF the daily press is slowly disappearing, and in its

place we have what is known as "objectivity" which the weekly press most wisely has not embraced.
The weeklies are informing their readers; they are not so much obsessed with the idea of entertaining, and they are providing food for thought with every paper that rolls off the press — HARRY GOLDEN in "Enjoy, Enjoy." (Reprinted by permission)

A SHOW DOWN AND A SHOW CASE
 - SAN FEA - The special meeting of the legislature next week will bring a showdown in the battle over how much the schools are to have next term and will put on display the two major candidates for Democratic nomination for governor, Speaker Jack Campbell of Roswell and Sen. Ed Mead of Albuquerque.

NOT MUCH CHANCE FOR THE SCHOOLERS
 It is a top-sided fight with every indication pointing to defeat of the school groups and another year of austere school operation.

That would be with the same teacher pay as now plus increases ranging from \$75 to \$200 a year for most of them and with a few additional teachers as justified by increased school attendance.

OTHER WOULD COST \$94 MILLION
 The New Mexico Education Association, the state education department and many PTA groups want a \$94 million program which would provide \$400 a year raises for teachers on top of the \$75 to \$200 contractual increases and would add about 650 more teachers.

The \$94 million would also provide \$450 to \$500 a year raises for school superintendents. The contention between the legislators and the organized school people is more than a debate about school money. There is deep seated personal animosity in many of those involved which carried over from the 1961 legislature and the days following when the New Mexico School Review, NMEA, publication, topped off two months of bitter fighting with impenetrable and rash attacks on the legislators.

THE SPOTLIGHT ON CAMPBELL
 Campbell, with the biggest post in the legislature as speaker and the probable fall carrier for this legislature, leaders' program, stands to steal the spotlight from his senate rival.

Mead is merely a member and although he has proposed a program of his own for paying for the school operation would be on dangerous ground if he attempted to substitute it for the leaders' program.

Mead's proposal, a not very exciting one, would borrow money against future sales tax collections to meet current school costs. Both candidates, you may be sure, will try to use the session to advance their campaigns for governor. It is not likely, however, that either will get behind the big \$94 million school fund.

DISTANCE NARROWS BETWEEN RUNNERS
 Campbell will go into the election after a sprint that appeared to close the gap between him and Mead.

Half a dozen Demo precinct chairmen in Mead's Albuquerque came out for Campbell, word was passed that he would have the support of the Demo party organizations in McIntosh, San Miguel, San Juan, Las Alamos, and Santa Fe. Anderson, word was passed from sources close to Sen. Clinton Anderson that he would have the senator's support, and Mead suffered a setback in important Lea county.

EASLEY UPSETS MEAD'S PROGRAM
 Mack Easley, the Democratic Chairman of Lea, decided to run for lieutenant governor after the highly effective Lea Demo organization appeared to be in Mead's pocket.

The Easley entry changed that and leaders in the Lea group are now telling that they are for Easley for lieutenant governor and neutral in the governor race.

TIME APPROACHING FOR CLINT'S WORD
 Our Clint the Senator is in a painful spot. When he voted John Burroughs out of the race for governor he told the press that he would name his choice for the nomination after all the entries were in March 6.

That was early January and March seemed a long way off but it is close now and it looks as if the senator will have to choose between two very strong and closely matched candidates and possibly three if Santa Fe Mayor Leo Murphy can get out of low gear. It is an unpleasant position for a U. S. Senator even if he is on a term that runs through 1966. He could wince around his January statement and say he liked

all the candidates and privately help the one he liked best. That would be in the classic political pattern.

Anderson's chief value is the money he can steer into a candidate's campaign. Many political donors have much confidence in his choices.

MURPHY ONLY RIDER OF JFK'S COATTAIL
 It is a strange political situation that finds only one of three Democratic candidates riding the Kennedy coattail a year after he became president, and he's the far behind third-runner Murphy.

Murphy, a liquor dealer and like Campbell, a Catholic, has had trouble jelling support in any but a few counties of heavy Spanish-American population. He looks good in Santa Fe, Rio Arriba and Socorro, but has a big potential if he could get his Kennedy appeal rolling.

Mead and Campbell have had very little to say about the President so far.

They are: Gailie Morris, Allie Mae Parker, Hilda Key, Linkey Shreeley, Everett Robinson, Rocco Dean, Annie Parker and Louise and Maude Fritz. The picture now hangs in the hall of Capitan High School with the other graduating classes.

Of the nine pupils, two still remain with us. Hilda Key, who is now Mrs. Hilda Young, catches the first grade here. Louise Fritz, now Mrs. Louise Ferguson, teaches the sixth grade.

In 1926, the school was located where the fair grounds are today. The exhibition building was once the high school gymnasium. The school was a two story brick building with eight classrooms. In 1950, the upper story was destroyed by fire. The building was not in use then but many valuable records were lost. After the fire, the whole building was torn down and the school was moved to its present location.
