## Campaign down to the wire

Voting machines will be used in the primary election May 8 in Lincoln County and over New Mexico voters around the use of voting machines for the first time.

The most curious concern regarding the use of voting machines is the fact that the total vote by machine will be compared to total years by ballot is a good question.

On the Democratic ticket there are contests for State Representative, S. M. Ortiz of Carrizozo and Lloyd L. Davis, Jr. of Ruidoso; and for Sheriff between J. P. Bobo of Ruidoso and Abraham B. Sanchez of Nogal.

Running unopposed on the Democratic ticket in Lincoln County are Roman Nunez, for commissioner first district; Charles A. Jones, commissioner second district; C. S. Gresswell, commissioner third district; Gertrude Allen, clerk; Phoenix May Taylor, treasurer; Louise Coe Runnels, assessor; Earl Malcolm Petree, probate judge.

Justice of Peace candidates include Leo A. Joiner, Precinct 2; Alton Gray, Precinct 10; Elijah D. Jones, and R. L. Sherrill, Precinct 14 (contest); Harold M. Graham, Precinct 19. Constable candidates include Bert T. Judia, Precinct 10; and Frank Barajas, Precinct 19.

There are two races for county office—on the Republican ticket Kenneth Nosker and James V. Tulley are on the ballot for commissioner third district, Daniel E. Ortiz and W. G. Bradley both seek the sheriff's office.

Running unopposed on the Republican ticket are William G. Shroenest, state representative; Ignacio Torres, commissioner first district; Alice King, clerk; Gladys Knox, treasurer; Lloyd Vigil, assessor; Marvin H. Roberts, probate judge.

Santiago D. Herrera is a Republican candidate for justice of peace in Precinct 2. Serapio Montes is running for constable in Precinct 9.

## Poll shows Mead leads for governor

### SURVEY SHOWS MEAD SHOULD WIN TUESDAY

SANTA FE — An extensive survey of voter sentiment in the 16 major population areas of the state has revealed strong indications that State Sen. Ed Mead of Albuquerque will win the Democratic nomination for governor in next Tuesday's primary election.

The survey which was made in most places from two weeks to one week before the election pointed to Jack Campbell of Roswell, speaker of the state house of representatives, running second, and Leo Murphy, recent mayor of Santa Fe, third.

**VOTERS UNINTERESTED, CANDIDATES UNKNOWN**  
The survey disclosed a statewide lack of interest in the election and very little public knowledge of the candidates and what they propose to do if elected governor in November.

The reports forecast a light vote of perhaps 105,000 or less as compared with 124,000 in the Democratic primary of 1960.

Advertising has been light throughout the state and plans for election day spending indicate much less than usual for election workers.

**EAST AND SOUTH AND ALBUQUERQUE**  
The conclusion that Mead should win was based on reports of heavy favor for the Texas-born candidate in the Texas bordering counties of Curry, Quay, Union, Eddy, Lea, and Roosevelt, which account for almost 30 percent of the Democratic primary vote, and Mead's home town of Albuquerque which casts about 20 percent of the state vote.

Mead also showed strong in the Mexican border counties of Dona Ana, Luna and Hidalgo which have nearly 19 percent of the state vote.

**CAMPBELL LACKS MAJORITY AREAS**  
Campbell, the survey showed, has significant support in almost every county in the state but only a few spots are heavy majorities indicated for him. Among them: Chavez, his home county, Los Alamos, Farmington, Sandoval, San Miguel. They don't figure to produce enough to overcome the Mead favor in the heavier voting eastern section of Albuquerque.

Campbell and Murphy, both pitching for the old organized Democratic vote and both Catholics going against the Baptist Mead, are definitely dividing a big section of the Democrat strength that either of them would command if the other were not running.

**HARD TO SUCCEED WITHOUT EASTSIDE**  
Almost complete lack of backing in eastern New Mexico seems to preclude Murphy from the nomination. Like Campbell, he shows a few spots of heavy favor — Santa Fe, his home, Rio Arriba, Socorro, Taos.

There have been conspicuous signs that the Kennedy administration likes Murphy, an early supporter of John F. Kennedy for president. If this is getting through it should show in the voting results from Dona Ana, Otero, Chavez, Albuquerque, Curry and Los Alamos where there are heavy federal payrolls.

**SPANISH COUNTIES DEEPLY DIVIDED**  
The more northern and river counties of predominant Spanish-American population which usually have highly organized Democratic machines and produce about a quarter of the Democrat primary vote are split three ways and all together are not likely to give any candidate more than a thousand lead.

They are Santa Fe, Chabala, Mora, San Miguel, Rio Arriba,

The banquet was well attended as 119 were served roast beef, scalloped potatoes, peas, corn, cole slaw, milk, coffee, and cake. The Quarterback Club is looking forward to seeing many of the same boys and fathers and men next year.

Mr. Warren B. Woodson, athletic director and football coach at NMSU and speaker at the banquet, expressed an unusual degree of satisfaction in the athletic program which now exists in Carrizozo. He was somewhat amazed that we have 55 boys who actively participated in football during the season when the total enrollment of our high school is approximately

140. He referred to his first coaching experience which was back in the 1920's when he took his first job as a young coach at Tulare. He well remembers that the school team basketball on an outdoor court when the wind was blowing about 40 miles per hour and the snow falling at a very rapid rate. These were "the good old days!"

In his address, Mr. Woodson stressed and brought forth the tremendous growth in all colleges and stated that the N. M. State University now had 4000 students with some 1100 in engineering even though the college was basically agricultural. He expressed the importance of mental growth as well as physical growth and further stated that physical growth seldom went beyond mental growth and willingness to try in all pursuits of life as well as in the athletic field.

He was very much in harmony with the physical fitness program which President Eisenhower during his administration initiated and which President Kennedy has continued to foster. He quoted many statistics and statements made by people of authority with references to the need of a well-rounded college education which took care of the physical and mental development of our young people. He expressed a feeling that all young people should set a goal in life and do everything possible to reach this point. He reviewed with a great deal of enthusiasm and pride the accomplishments of many of the students from N. M. State University who are making good and holding top notch jobs in the fields of engineering, physical education and other pursuits of livelihood.

He spoke very highly of the accomplishments of Coach Laabs, Coach Dode, and Coach Sadler for the teamwork which they have done in the last three years with this group of boys, carrying them to District Championships for three years and to State Championship for the past two years, losing only two games during this period of time. This is a record which few high schools will ever accomplish.

His address was well accepted by the 119 boys and parents who were present for the annual banquet, the largest in attendance at the Carrizozo High School.

## Remember the school census

Mr. J. T. Clegg, Supt. of Schools, would like everyone with school children to please remember the school census.

An accurate school census is very important this year since all proposals for federal aid of any kind are based upon the number of school-age children in each state.

The census shall only include all unmarried persons, resident of School District Number 7, over which the Carrizozo Board of Education has supervision, who will be six years of age or over, and not eighteen years of age on the first day of January, 1963.

In view of the fact that bills before the Federal Congress concerning Federal Aid to Education in the states, we have been asked to include in a special report as school age children, all children age five (5). We will list separately all five year olds who will become five (5) on or before January 1, 1963.

**Served under West's colorful sheriff**

The under sheriff who served under one of the West's most colorful sheriffs, S. M. Ortiz of Lincoln County, is offering his candidacy for sheriff of Valencia county. He is Ben A. Smith.

For three and one-half years Smith was under sheriff with Ortiz, perhaps one of the most famous sheriffs New Mexico has had since the days of Lincoln County's famous Pat Garrett, who brought the gun slaying days of Billy the Kid to a finish.

It was under Ortiz that Smith trained for law enforcement duties. Ortiz became widely known for his tracking down of the slayers of Mike Nalda, well-known rancher, for his smashing of the gambling gangs at Ruidoso, and for his adept handling of juvenile delinquents in Lincoln County.

Smith with his father came to New Mexico the hard way. When he was only five years of age, he rode horseback, like the pioneers of the Old West from Spur, Tex., to Corona, N. M., in 1927.

After Sheriff Ortiz completed his last term as sheriff of Lincoln County, Ben Smith decided to continue in law enforcement work, and he applied to the N. M. State Police for a position. He passed the examinations, and he served from 1953 to 1959 in western Valencia County.

For the last several years he has engaged in farming. Ben is the son of the late J. D. Smith. His mother, Mrs. Georgia Smith, now lives in Aztec. He is married to the former Myrtle Hobbs of Peralta. The Smiths have four children, Sharon and Gay, Bennie and Johnnie Lee.

I am somewhat puzzled by Mr. Erwin's letter in your issue of April 5. I do not know what he is trying to prove, but the general effect created is that I failed to give credit where credit was due in writing you about John Wallace Olinger.

Let me make things unmistakably clear. I am not in touch with Mr. Robert N. Mullin. He contributed nothing whatever to my investigation of Olinger and I have no idea what he may know about him. I know nothing of Mrs. Clark other than indirectly. My statement that he was born in Indiana rests on the information contained on his death certificate and is in no way whatever attributable to her. I have never had any correspondence or conversation with any of the Jones or Slaughter family with regard to Olinger.

I informed Mr. Erwin of my discovery of Olinger's death certifi-

cate on December 25, 1961. On December 29, 1961, he replied: "Thank you for the Xmas news in finding J. W. Olinger. That was a very historic find fitting in with the Lincoln County story. . . I was glad at least to learn the certificate gave his nativity as that of Indiana."

The foregoing should completely clear me of his imputation of using data without credit to the source. I should appreciate your publishing this, as I do not care to remain under this cloud.

**Government regulations are easy to violate!**

Last Friday being the 13th, and in the very shadow of the Federal Income Tax Deadline — makes this week as good as any to quote from a recent commentary of News Editor Bob Wilson of the Brady (Texas) Standard:

"From time to time," he writes, "this newspaper receives releases from various Federal agencies telling us that assorted members of our community have violated some Government regulation."

"The regulation, of course, does not amount to a hill of beans, but the defendants are hauled off to the nearest Federal court where they quickly plead guilty and pay outrageous fines — on the theory that you can't beat Uncle Sam."

"We don't print these releases," Mr. Wilson emphasizes in bold face. "To hear the bureaucrats tell it, these men are criminals. We know they are no such thing."

"In sending us this 'news,' these bureaucrats are not extending a simple courtesy to this newspaper. They have an axe to grind. They hope we will print the story to serve as a warning to others: 'The boogie-man will get you if you don't watch out!'"

Editor Wilson goes on to cite some examples of attempted (and all too often successful) intimidation-by-regulation and stresses the fact that the victims were not accused of violating "some law which was enacted by the duly elected representatives of the people", but a ruling "designed by petty, pinhead tyrants who think they can run this man's business better than

he can run it himself". And this editor says: "There is hardly a businessman or private citizen in Brady or elsewhere who isn't continually hounded by some Government agent wanting to look at the books, telling him how to run his own affairs, and trying to collect taxes."

"And the more regulations, agents and auditors you have," Mr. Wilson concludes, "the more taxes they are going to want."

As noted above, this extra-legal hazing goes on not only in Brady, but "elsewhere" — which is everywhere. And right now, while we are bleeding profusely from the

annual vivisection of income tax is a good time to ponder what, if anything, we are going to do about this increasing abuse.

The best thing any editor can do is to check the speeches and voting record of the man who will be coming home from Washington seeking re-election — and publish the facts — whether he is working for his constituents, or toward a welfare state directed by bureaucrats, or wobbling from one side to the other. Once the people know who is working for whom, there can be fresh hope for that 'change' that nominee Eisenhower once said it was time for. — Bob Wilson

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

Mrs. Sara Salazar was outstanding pioneer

Lincoln, New Mexico, April 28, 1962

Mrs. Sara Salazar, lifelong resident of Lincoln, N. M., died April 25, 1962, at the age of 88, in the Carrizozo Hospital, after a year's illness. She was the last living daughter of Capt. Saturnino Baca, distinguished pioneer of Lincoln County, who, as Representative from Socorro to the New Mexico Territorial legislature, introduced the bill giving Lincoln County its name in 1859. He came to Lincoln after he had made a military record in the Civil War, and had been mustered out. In Lincoln County he held numerous public offices. Mrs. Salazar's mother was Juanita Chavez, also from Socorro.

Sara was one of five sisters, who, according to Sophie Poy, in her book, "Buckboard Days," "were among the prettiest señoritas to be found in New Mexico." Their mother, Senora Baca, Mrs. Poe described as a "woman of parts who not only ruled her own family like some Dona of Old Spain, but also dominated the social life of one segment of the town." The other Baca daughters were Carlota, Saturnina, Eldora, and Josefa. There were three Baca sons: Roman, Juan, and Bonifacio.

Mrs. Salazar is survived by five daughters: Mrs. Emilla Dorsey of Silver City; Mrs. Juanita Chavez, Albuquerque; Mrs. Sara Sedillo of Roswell; Mrs. Frances Vigil of Captain, and by one son, Ben Salazar of Santa Fe. One daughter, Mrs. Colina Queenberry, died just a month and a half before her mother, in El Paso, of a heart attack. Forty grandchildren survive, and many great grandchildren preceded her in death in 1935. She had spent her entire life in Lincoln, and had lived the past two years with her daughter, Mrs. Rafaelita Fryro. She was a devoted Catholic.

All of her living children, and grandchildren from California, Denver, and many parts of New Mexico were present for the funeral mass held at San Juan Church in Lincoln at 9:00 o'clock, Friday, April 27. She was laid to rest in the Lincoln Cemetery.



MOISE, NOBLE

The performance of the New Mexico Supreme Court in recent years has been in accord with all the rules of high ethics and correct conduct.

The Supreme Court, all Democratic in its membership, has been wholly non-partisan in its operation. Not a hint of politics or favoritism has been observed in its deliberations and opinions.

When a state has been fortunate enough to get a good and efficient high court the people should make sure to keep it that way.

Which brings up the candidacy of two members of the court now running in the May 8 primary. They are Justice Irwin S. Moise and Justice M. E. Noble. His New Mexico legal career, in addition to long years of private practice, includes city attorney in Las Vegas, district attorney in the Fourth Judicial District, president of Highlands University Board of Regents and president of the State Bar Association.

Justices Moise and Noble qualify for top quality judicial service.
