Frontier Rodeo Cowboys Association has announced the approval as member a stock producer who produced over 25 shows during the past year.

This is the Ratjen Bros. Rodeo Company, operated by Jack and Dick Ratjen of Happy, Texas. Ratjen Bros. will produce the Smokey Bear Stampede July 3 and 4 in Capitan, an evening show on the 3rd and both afternoon and evening shows on July 4.

Jack is well-known throughout the Texas Panhandle, New Mexico and Oklahoma as a producer. He's a native of Happy and has been in rodeo business since 1954. A team with his most successful shows this year were events at Tulla, Hereford and McLean. The company normally has about 250 head of bucking broncs and bulls.

Aside from the rodeo business, the Ratjens run 1,000 head of cattle and farm three sections of wheat on their ranch between Happy and Canyon.



Reminiscence



He decided this would be a good joke so he made the A and the

teacher kept her word. Also, Carlton Britton bought Glenda Peters a friendship ring.

There were so many fourth graders they were divided into two groups. Mrs. Peters teaching half and Mrs. Aldrich the other half. Mr. Frolland came back and taught Lobb and Patsy Sanchez left. The Smith and Sue McCreary joined the class.

Richard Zamora—the rooms remained divided. Mrs. Aldrich and Mr. Cummins were the teachers. This year Carlton Britton left and Jimmy Montoya came. Notes were the rage; every place you looked there were mailboxes—the pencil sharpener was an excellent place to pass notes, hiding them under glasses cases, and mailboxes were made out of milk cartons and taped to the side of everyone's desk.

The sixth grade—the class was again reunited and Mr. Cummins was our teacher. Carlton Britton came back and James Taylor joined the class of '50. The main thing we did was play Chinese checkers. Judy Smith was mad at Steve Bonnell one day so she wrote him a hateful note, but was afraid to give it to him. LaDell Hatch visited school and Judy had LaDell give the note to Steve.

The seventh grade was a hard year. We were in the high school building and had a dozen different teachers and 33 pupils. We had junior chorus and home ec that year but that was the final year for both. Judith Lobb again joined the class and LaDell Hatch was a new addition.

The eighth grade was an easy year. We had Mr. Jones and a lot of fun. The same ones were in our class of '54 that were in the seventh grade who stayed to graduate. The main work we did was that every time we needed punishing we had to write a 1,000 or 2,000 word theme that night.

Freshmen! 32 of them! What we didn't pull must not be possible or any fun. Our class members who stayed to graduate were Steve Bonnell, Carlton Britton, Jake Chavez, Joe Freeland, LaDell Hatch, Sue McCreary, Jimmy Montoya, Rosa Padilla, Mike Peralta, Glenda Peters, Patsy Sanchez, Diane Shaw, Judy Smith, James Taylor, Cecilia Trujillo, Eliser Vigil and Richard Zamora.





GRAN QUIVIRA'S LEGENDARY HIDDEN TREASURE

SHORTLY following the American occupation of the New Mexico Territory, after the Mexican War, along in 1853 Major James E. Carleton and Lt. Sturgess, by an assignment of the Army, conducted a reconnaissance of the country, and made reports.

They viewed many interesting and colorful old settlements, telling of a long-time occupancy of the territory. Many of the ruined ruins they found and the stories they were told covered the era before the bloody Spanish-Indian revolt of 1680. Among their accounts were tales of hidden treasures and lost mines which the Spaniards had operated during their first occupancy of the country — dating back almost to the days of Columbus.

In the central portion of New Mexico they came upon an old mission ruins and an old treasure tale at Gran Quivira, located south of Mountainair, and reported it. An excerpt from the "Ninth Annual Report of the Board of Regents of the Smithsonian Institution, showing the operation, expenditures and conditions of the institution up to Jan. 1, 1855," is the following. The report needs no dressing-up or rehashing; it is explicit within itself:

"OLD MR. CHAVIS, who overtook us soon after our arrival at Gran Quivira, informed Major Carleton that he had been told, when in his youth, by very old people, that a tribe of Indians once lived here called the Pueblos of Quivira; that the Spanish priests came and lived amongst them, in peace and security, for 20 years; that during this period these large churches were erected; and that at the time of the great massacre there were 70 priests and monks residing here — all of whom were butchered excepting two, who contrived to make their escape; that, previous to their massacre, the priests had had intimation of the approaching danger, and had not only buried the immense treasures which had been collected, but had concealed likewise the bells of the churches; that many years afterwards the people of Quivira died off until but few remained; that one of these a descendant of the chief, knew where the treasures were buried, that the remnant of the tribe afterwards emigrated and joined other Pueblos below El Paso, and that many years ago an old man, one of the last of the tribe, had told in what direction from the church these great treasures had been concealed. So far as the building of the churches and the massacre of the monks and priests are concerned in this account, as well as the final decrease and removal of the people who once lived here, there is no doubt but the story told by Mr. Chavis is in the main, correct. The account of the depositing of the bells and the treasure is said to have been written down as given from the lips of the last cacique of Quivira who, at the time he made the disclosure, was living away below Mesilla, on the Mexican side of the river. A copy of this paper has been secured, and is here inserted in the original language, for the benefit of those who might take interest in such matters."

(Here is deleted the Spanish notation and its English translation inserted.)

"In the cemetery of the great parish church, in the centre of the right side according to figure No. 1, there is a pit, and by digging will be found two bells. By taking the line of the opening left by the ten bells, there will be seen to the east along the lane left by the old church and the town, a hill, at the distance of 300 yards, more or less, which forms precisely a line with the bells. At the foot of said hill is a cellar of ten yards or more, covered with stones, which contains the great treasure."

"Mentioned by Charles Fifth of Quivira."

"The grammar of this document is preserved, as is the original. There can be no doubt but the belief that a large amount of gold and silver has been buried here has for a great number of years been seriously entertained. We find in the cathedral and in the chapel, in every room in the monastery, in every mound of stones in the neighborhood, and in every direction about the ruins, large holes dug, in many places to the depth of ten feet, by those who have come from time to time to seek for these hidden treasures. Some of these holes look as if they were made more than a century ago, while others appear to be quite recent. Even the ashes of the dead have not been left undisturbed during these explorations. Near the east end of the chapel we saw where the people who had been digging had thrown up a great many human bones, which now lie scattered about. From these we have selected six skulls to send to someone who is skilled in the science of craniology, that he may determine, if possible, to what race of people they once belonged. These skulls are thought to be unusually large."

"The ruins of Gran Quivira have hitherto occupied the same position with respect to the boundless prairies which the fabulous island of Atlantis did to the ocean in the days of antiquity. No one seemed to know exactly where this city was situated. But the uncertainty of its locality seemed to make no difference in regard to the interest

that was felt concerning it; for people would believe in its existence, and receive great pleasure in listening to traditions about its marvelous beauty and accounts ran counter to probability.

"Men of genius and distinction have taken great pains in following up mazes in the labyrinth of reports concerning it, whether oral or written, and in their glowing descriptions it has appeared almost like a city of enchantment. To them it had paved streets, and fluted columns, and ornate friezes, and sculptured facades; it had the remains of aqueducts and fountains; it had long colonnades, and even barbaric statuary; it had the gilded arch, the shoudering buttress, the quaint gargoyles, and everything in outline and in detail that could betoken skill, and taste and opulence. It was a city, they said, whose inhabitants departed it so long back in the gloom and mists of the past as to leave in utter obscurity all other records concerning them.

"The sphinx, they said, about whose bosom the sands from the Lybian desert had drifted for unknown centuries, was no more an enigma than this was. Here were palaces and temples, and deserted courts, and long-echoing corridors, and grass-grown streets, and reigning over all a silence so profound as almost to be heard.

"Historical societies had taken up these descriptions, and filed them away among their transactions as documents of deep interest. Venerable and learned ethnologists searched in dusty manuscripts and blackletter volumes of antiquity for some authentic account of that race of men who reared and then abandoned such a city. But to this moment their researches have proved fruitless, and the story they seek is still recorded in an unsealed book.

"Our business is not that which will permit us to clothe with imaginary grandeur these vestiges of a people whose name has been erased from the book of nations, nor that which will allow us time to indulge in abstract speculations as to their race or their language. These things belong to the poet and philosopher. With all these pleasant reveries and romantic fancies which these ruins away here on a desert are so wonderfully calculated to awaken we can have nothing to do. We came here to note realities; and now the facts we have seen, the theories we have read which were of value, the traditions we have . . ."

"THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS . . . Since Gran Quivira is a national monument, permission to explore for the treasure would be most difficult to obtain, due to regulations of the Department of Interior.

However, the treasure which legend has buried there had a source. A search for it would be reasonable, as the region is declared to be mineralized, and cer-

tain ancient smelters have been found in the mountains of the surrounding sections, showing that the early-day Spanish people dug gold from that section. The old mines remain yet to be found.

The reason God hasn't done anything for us is because we haven't called upon His name in sincere prayer and we have sinned so much that God won't hear our prayers until we ask forgiveness of our sins.

If people would just ask for forgiveness of their sins they could ask God to keep them through this hour of trial. I just hope that people haven't sinned so far that God will let us go into captivity for punishment. The world has to depend on God and believe that He can and will save them and He will. Pray tonight, and let God do the rest.



Historic Missions

The first white man to "discover" New Mexico was a priest, Fray Marcos de Niza. And the men who followed him, the conquistadores, the explorers, the colonizers were all accompanied by dedicated men of the cross who came to bring Christianity to a pagan land.

Using the crude materials at hand, the Franciscan friars built mission churches. Rancho de Taos Church, pictured here, is one of the most beautiful of the original Franciscan missions. It still stands and still serves the Taos Valley people, as it has for more than 300 years.

The New Mexico Missions were built 150 years before the missions that span the length of California and some were started

even before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth Rock. They have played a dramatic role in history — they are a precious part of New Mexico's great heritage of the past.

DUNLAP A demonstration on chemical control of cedars and ant control will be held June 9 at the Sid Goodloe ranch north of Capitan. The demonstrations will start at 2 p.m. and will be followed by an evening barbecue. Several new chemicals to use for brush control will be demonstrated by Du Pont and Archem representatives.
