BLOOD RUNS IN BONITO

(Possibly the last letter written by Hugh Grafton who died in June was addressed to Louise Rummels, Bonito correspondent for the News.)
Lincoln, N. M.
Sunday Night

Dear Louise:

I will try and answer your letter just recently received. I will first start off on what little history I know about Bonito City, that was started in December of 1880. The first settlers of Bonito City were a group of Germans, along with the Mayberrys, Charley Berry, and perhaps a few others that I don't know about. The names of the Germans that I recall were Herman Beck, Joe Beckman, Herman Conbruch, Beiderman, Rodamaker, Schultz and Huber. There were two Swedes, Mart Nelson, and Pete Nelson.
The old Christmas tunnel I believe was about the first mine, that they opened up. I am sure Arvel knows where that old Christmas mine is. I heard Herman Conbruch say that one time he was wheeling truck out of the Christmas, and when he came out of the tunnel he saw an Indian standing not far away, and he became frightened and ran back in the tunnel. Back in those days the Apaches roamed the White Mountains at their pleasure.
As we all know, Bonito City is remembered mostly for the killing that took place there on the 5th of May, 1886. Mart Nelson was

the one who killed the 7 people. The first one he killed was Dr. Flynn from back east. Eddy Mayberry, who was five, was his second victim. I've heard that little Eddy wouldn't sleep with anyone else except Mart.
He then killed Johnny Mayberry who was 17. Mr. Mayberry ran up stairs to see what was going on, followed by Mrs. Mayberry. Mayberry was killed on the landing at the head of the stairs, and Mrs. Mayberry was shot, perhaps mortally, for she was supposed to have made the bloody footprints on the stairs.
I have heard some say that the Mayberry girl, Nellie who was 13 walked through the blood on the floor upstairs and made the prints. Anyway, Mrs. Mayberry and Nellie went outside at the back end of the house, which was the north end, and Nellie was bathing her mother's wound, when Nelson came up on them. He shot Mrs. Mayberry again, as she ran around to the front of the house. He also shot Nellie in the side, and she pleaded so for him to spare her, that he told her he would if she would. After he left she hid behind some boxes in the cellar under the north end of the house. Later on he came back and tried to find her, perhaps intending to kill her. Conbruch stepped outside the door of the house just west of the Mayberry Hotel to see what was

going on as Mrs. Mayberry ran toward him and he caught her by the arm, as she said, "Oh, he has killed us all", and she immediately collapsed.
By that time Mart Nelson appeared on the scene and told Conbruch to get in the house, which he did. Nelson then threw Mrs. Mayberry's body in the ditch that ran in front of the houses, with the footlog on top of her.
Pete Nelson showed up on the scene then, and called to Mart to give him his guns. Mart told him to come and get them and held them out toward him and when Pete reached out to get them, Mart shot him with both guns, setting his clothes afire.
Mart then went up on the hill to the south, and looked back and saw Joe Beckman standing in the door of his cabin, and he immediately cracked down on him and Beckman fell back inside the room, like he was dead, as they heard Mart say, "Well, I've sent another one to hell."
Louise, I know you are getting tired of all this but I will try to soon wind up the killing part.
Nelson then dropped over to Rodamaker's cabin and found Mrs. Rodamaker alone as Rodamaker was out looking for Nelson. He had Mrs. Rodamaker give him some breakfast and then went back to where he could overlook the town again and saw Herman Beck standing out in his yard, and shot and killed him from where he was standing by a big tree up on the slope to the south of the city. I believe the tree is still standing.
Nelson then came running down the hill, and reached the front of the Mayberry house, when Rodamaker, Schultz, and Charlie Berry were "reversing" by Pete Nelson's saloon, and fired at the same time, and Nelson fell dead in front of the door.
They never knew which one it was that killed him. Later all the dead were placed in Pete Nelson's saloon while the coffins were being made.
I would be glad to talk over old Bonito City with you and Arvel. I am sending two tracts you might like to read. I hope Mr. and Mrs. Rummels are both well.

THE TUNSTALL-McSWEEN STORE
SOME people might not be attracted to it very readily, judging from the outward appearance by others only if they are looking for it. But it's there, much the same in FUTURE as during the day and age of its zenith of power. It's one of the older landmarks of Old Lincoln, in Lincoln County, and unparalleled in pages of colorful history of the Early West.
ON the Rio Bonito in the early 1850's a few Spanish pioneers settled at the present day site of Old Lincoln, and called the site La Placita del Rio Bonito, or The Little Town by the Pretty River. The first settlement consisted of a few adobe structures and a Torreon, a fortified tower as a protection against Indians. It in its original design stands today much as it did then.
As time passed and the settlement grew, it shortly became known as La Placita. In 1863 the name was changed to Lincoln, and became the county seat of the rapidly developing Lincoln County. Much interesting history took place in the era from 1863 to the turn of the century around the settlement. The frontier Fort Stanton was located not far distant to afford protection for the frontier settlers. The region was attractive to pioneers and rapidly expanded. New enterprises were formed in the village and the region was subjected to constant "growing pains."
One of these early-day booming enterprises, which has much blood mixed with the pages of its history, was the Tunstall-McSween Store. Its proprietors were J. H. Tunstall and Alexander McSween, who commenced their operations in 1877. The same year, John S. Chisum, a prominent frontier figure and leading rancher of the Territory, became associated with them when the Lincoln County Bank was opened in the same building. All in all, it was a hub of supplies for the people of the rapidly developing area, and the center of much activity. A booming business took place, and the enterprise was prosperous.
However, business was not remaining the same as the Lincoln County War clouded the horizon, with its much blood-spill, and the two merchantile leaders were gunned down. The Tunstall-McSween establishment, in time, fell by the wayside as the two founders were killed during the war.
But today the old store with its exterior wall of original masonry, and some reproduction, remains to

mark the booming, adventuresome days. The old landmark is a portion of the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, created by an act of the New Mexico State Legislature in 1943, with John Boylan as curator of the historical monument.
Inside the old store are to be found such old fixtures as the old vinegar barrel, the old-time coffee grinder, bins where once staple groceries were displayed to the frontiersmen, cheese slices, old coal oil lamps, old-time clocks, lamp-chimneys, and very many items that were necessary during the day and age for the merchants to deliver their wares to the customers, which were many. All are the original fixtures, with no replicas of the era being added—much the same as when the doors were closed for business the last time.
Upon entrance of the old store a visual insight of the colorful era of Lincoln County can readily be obtained, as the visitor would see the throngs of frontiersmen pouring through the doors and purchasing supplies for their operations in the vast surrounding area, doing the banking, livestock trading, and land transactions. The worn, original plank flooring of the large old store tells a story of much passage.
Mrs. Jewel McMichael, for the State Commission under Curator John Boylan, is hostess for the many tourists, students, and sight-seers who pass through its doors, to be intrigued by the many things placed within. She is eager and anxious to assist the visitor with information on the contents of the old store and its history, and very apt to make the visit entertaining and of a studious nature.
To the rear of the store is to be found a small comfortable park for picnickers, and those who enjoy a rest bite as they deep into Old Lincoln's history. Two headstones, immediately to the rear of the building, are to be found—those of the store's founders—John H. Tunstall, 1853-1878; and Alex A. McSween, 1843-1878. The markers depict the short-lived partnership in the merchandise business, as they were victims of the Lincoln County War.
THE LONG AND SHORT OF IT IS . . . When you visit Old Lincoln, don't pass up the old Tunstall-McSween Store. You'll marvel at its interior and the fixtures of the pioneer merchants—and the coziness the ladies wore in those days, for, too, they are to be seen there—without occupancy!

Rattlesnakes coming out with continued rain

There have been several reports of rattlesnakes being killed and reports of seeing them cross the highways.
Ken Means killed a small rattlesnake in his back yard on Tuesday. Ken said, "The snake was small but large enough to let you know he was around."
Edgar Daniels killed a large snake on his ranch near Oscura on Saturday afternoon. The snake was about two inches taller than his daughter, Sue Daniels.
Mrs. Ken Means and Victor Jaramillo related that they saw rattlesnakes crossing the highway. Mrs. Means saw one crossing the road near Sidwells. Mr. Jaramillo reported seeing one on the highway south of Ancho and it could have easily measured almost six feet.

David A. Vanderah, a soldier from Fort Bliss, was involved in a one-car accident on Sunday afternoon one mile south of Oscura.
A driver behind the Vanderah car reported to Sgt. W. J. Kruse that Vanderah was traveling at a normal speed for the highway but lost control of his car on the slick road.
The soldier was thrown clean from his Austin-Healey convertible and sustained two facial wounds.
He was taken to the Lincoln County Hospital by Sheriff Glen Bradley, driver of the ambulance.

A mother and her four children sustained multiple bruises and lacerations in a one-car accident six miles south of Corona Wednesday evening.
Mrs. Mary Dages, 31, of 1902 N. 22nd St., Phoenix, Ariz., lost control of her car after passing over a wash on the highway. The car slid off the shoulder, down the embankment and turned over 1 1/2 times. Mrs. Dages and her children Michael 13, Patrick 10, Diana 9, and Monica 6, remained in the car. State Police Officer Jess Brooks investigated the accident.

The eye can be deceived!

Lambs with Feathered No 1's feathering between the ribs on the lamb carcass or the fat showing between the ribs on the inside of the lamb carcass. This is one of the points used in grading lamb carcasses.
The eye can be deceiving when it comes to estimating the value of a lamb on foot. The best looking lamb did not have the top carcass yield. Eight lambs were judged on foot and later evaluated on carcass yield. The top carcass was worth 4 cents a pound more than the bottom carcass when rated on lean meat, fat covering and weight of fore quarters and hind quarters.
Dr. Karl Ray, specialist, has found that when retail cuts of lamb are trimmed to one eighth of an inch of fat, he cannot keep enough lamb to supply the demand. The same experience was related by a grower in the Deming area, where he increased lamb from 2 carcasses a week to 12 carcasses a week in a local market.
Growers learned to grade wool

the wool school at University Park, last week. Several hours were spent in learning wool grades and shrinkage. In the wool judging contest, Punch Jones placed first, Joe Milms second, Carrol Shanks third, R. B. Harrington fourth, John Cooper fifth, and Punk Cooper sixth.

James Goodrum, manager of the Roswell wool and mohair company, urged the growers to grade and tag their wool so that it would bring the most money. He cautioned the growers to avoid many small lots.
Dr. L. E. Bodenweiser brought the growers up to date on the scabies situation. No new scabies cases have been found in the last three months. He stated that the Sheep Sanitary Board is in bad financial shape, due to the heavy work load.
The Sheep Sanitary Board has recommended that the northern and western part of the state have the Federal quarantine lifted. This suggestion has received favorable comments from the federal personnel but no definite action has been received.

Calf prices for fall contracts are higher than 2 weeks ago. Two contracts were written during the past week for 28 and 29 cents per pound for the heifer calves and 30 and 31 cents for the steers calves. These calves are expected to weigh under 400 pounds.
The first lamb contract that I know of in this area was for 15 cents per pound. I expect to see some 16 cent contracts before the marketing season is over.
Several Lincoln County 4-Hers and leaders will attend the state 4-H camp next week at University Park. On the Livestock judging team are Roodilo Straley, Punk Cooper, Betty Lou Jones and Pam Hall. 

FOREWARD

The folk pageant centering around the life of the legendary outlaw, Billy the Kid, was first presented in the year 1940 as part of New Mexico's Quatrocentennial celebration. Its performance was resumed in 1947 by the Lincoln County Historical Society as a means of raising funds to maintain the Old Lincoln County Courthouse State Monument. In 1949 the Courthouse' safe-keeping was delegated to the newly Created Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission, a State agency, but the Historical Society continued to sponsor the pageant and to improve the outdoor theatre facilities. In 1961 the Society transferred to the Commission the pageant grounds and the sponsorship of the pageant, the agreement between the two associations being that the life of such a spontaneous community undertaking should be continued for the benefit of Lincoln County and for the entertainment of all.

The episodes of the pageant are based on historical facts of the notorious Lincoln County War, and in particular its focus is centered upon the best-remembered of its fighters, Billy the Kid. From the killing of John Tunstall which precipitated Billy's wrathful vengeance, to the Battle of Blazer's Mill in which the courageous Buckshot Roberts stood off Billy and his 12 cohorts, to the siege of the McSwain House, to Billy's incarceration in the Lincoln County Courthouse and his remarkable escape, the players of present day Lincoln County will take you. Many of them are descendants of the War's participants. All of them are every-day players of the Western scene.

AN ORDINANCE RATIFYING ALL ACTION TAKEN BY AND FOR THE VILLAGE OF CORONA TOWARD CONSTRUCTING A MUNICIPAL GAS WORKS, TOWARD ISSUING REVENUE BONDS TO DEFRAID ALL OR A PORTION OF THE COST THEREOF, AND TOWARD HOLDING AN ELECTION TO AUTHORIZE SUCH CONSTRUCTION; PROVIDING FOR SPECIAL ELECTION ON FRIDAY, THE 17 DAY OF AUGUST, 1962, IN THE VILLAGE, FOR THE SUBMISSION TO A VOTE OF THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE VILLAGE OF A QUESTION OF CONSTRUCTION OF SUCH MUNICIPAL GAS WORKS, THE COST OF SUCH CONSTRUCTION TO BE DEFRAYED IN WHOLE OR IN PART WITH PROCEEDS DERIVED FROM THE ISSUANCE OF THE VILLAGE'S REVENUE BONDS; PROVIDING FOR THE ELECTION PLACE, THE FORM OF THE BALLOT, THE FORM OF THE ELECTION NOTICE AND ITS PUBLICATION; PRESCRIBING OTHER DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH; CONDITIONALLY DIRECTING SUCH CONSTRUCTION; PROVIDING FOR OBTAINING THE APPROVAL OF THE NEW MEXICO PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION OF SUCH CONSTRUCTION COST AND OF THE REVENUE BONDS DEFRAYING IN WHOLE OR IN PART THE COST THEREOF IF THE ELECTORS FAVOR SUCH CONSTRUCTION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Village of Corona, herein sometimes merely designated as the "Village", in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, is a legally and regularly created, organized and existing municipal corporation under the laws of the State of New Mexico, its full corporate name being "Village of Corona," and has existed as such since August, 1948; and

WHEREAS, said Village does not now own or operate a municipal gas works (sometimes herein referred to as the "natural gas system," the "system" or the "utility"); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of said Village has determined, and does hereby determine to construct and operate a municipal gas works; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees hereby declares that the interest of the Village and of the inhabitants thereof, and the public interest and necessity, demand:

(1) The construction of an adequate municipal gas works to serve the Village, its inhabitants and the territory adjacent thereto, at a price of not to exceed \$125,000.00; and

(2) The making and issuance of the Village's revenue bonds, payable solely out of the net income to be derived from said utility; and the pledging of irrevocable such income to the payment thereof; the proceeds thereof to be used solely to effectuate the aforesaid purpose and defray a part of the cost thereof; and

WHEREAS, such construction is necessary and proper and will provide for the safety, preserve the health, promote the prosperity, and improve the order, comfort and convenience of the Village and its inhabitants; and

WHEREAS, the statutes of the State of New Mexico authorize the issuance of revenue bonds payable solely out of the net income to be derived from the operation of any municipally owned utility or utilities, the proceeds thereof to be used solely for such aforesaid purpose when authorized by ordinance adopted by the affirmative vote of three-fourths of the members of the entire governing body; and

WHEREAS, the statutes of the State of New Mexico (Statutes 14-38-34, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953) further provide that no such revenue bonds shall be issued until the question of the purchase or construction of any such utility shall, at a regular election of municipal officers or at a special election, be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the municipality; and a majority of those voting upon the question by separate ballot shall vote in favor of such purchase or construction; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees hereby determines, and does hereby determine, that upon the construction of such utility the net income to be derived from the operation thereof will be in excess of requirements for operation, maintenance and sinking fund

and retirement purposes of said utility; and the net income therefrom may be pledged to secure the redemption of revenue bonds issued for the purpose of defraying in whole or in part the cost of constructing such utility; and

WHEREAS, in order to provide funds with which to defray in whole or in part the cost of so constructing the utility, the Village proposes to issue the revenue bonds of the Village, payable as to principal and interest solely out of the net income to be derived from the operation of said utility; and

WHEREAS, the statutes of New Mexico (Section 14-38-15, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953) also provide that in the event the electors have voted in favor of the purchase or construction of any utility, and the amount, date of issue, maturity, rate of interest and general provisions contained in the revenue bonds or other securities so to be issued for the purchase or construction of any such utility, shall be submitted to and approved by the New Mexico Public Service Commission.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CORONA, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That all action (not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance) heretofore taken by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Corona, and the officers thereof, directed toward the construction of a municipal gas works, toward the issuance of revenue bonds to defray in whole or in part the cost thereof, and toward the holding of an election to authorize such construction, be, and the same hereby is, ratified, approved and confirmed, including, but not limited to, giving notice of the election on the question of such construction.

Section 2. That a special municipal election is hereby called for the Village of Corona, Lincoln County, New Mexico, to be held on Friday, the 17 day of August, 1962, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the Village the question set out in the form of proclamation and notice in Section 9 of this ordinance.

Section 3. That the question so submitted shall be voted upon at said election, and the polls shall be open between the hours of 8:00 o'clock a.m. and 7:00 o'clock p.m. of the day of the election; the area of the entire Village shall constitute one voting district (election division); and the polls shall be located at Village Hall in Corona; the election judges shall be those designated in the Proclamation and Notice of Election set out in Section 9 of this ordinance; and the election shall be otherwise conducted in the same manner as municipal elections.

Section 4. That the electors qualified to vote as aforesaid shall vote by ballot on said question in the form hereinafter prescribed, which shall be deposited in a ballot box provided for the particular purpose of receiving the votes cast upon said question.

Section 5. That except as herein otherwise specifically provided or necessarily implied, said election on the question to be submitted shall be called, conducted and the returns thereof canvassed and certified as in near the same manner as possible as that prescribed for general municipal elections.

Section 6. That the ballots to be used for voting upon the proposed question shall contain a general description of the property to be constructed, shall make provision for each voter to indicate by a cross whether he favors or opposes such construction, shall be prepared and furnished by the Village Clerk to the judges of election to be by them furnished to the qualified electors, and shall be substantially in the following form, printed in both English and Spanish:

EDUCATION BOARD IN POLITICAL STALL

SANTA FE - The recently created state board of education that was supposed to take schools out of politics has been stalling on the replacement of two Democrat members and refusing participation in the state personnel operation.

Board Member Beverly Agnew of Los Alamos has been in Franco since the first of January and reportedly resigned July 5, but at the end of July the governor had not been notified and could take no action toward replacement.

Since mid-June the board has been looking the other way on the status of member Gilda Lopez who is no longer eligible to serve as an employee of the state corporation, commission which has come under the personnel law that forbids employee to hold political office.

WON'T TAKE PART IN PERSONNEL PLAN The education department with around 150 employees has continued to exclude itself from the personnel act aimed at breaking up special interest politics and which now covers all the Republican areas of the statehouse and the Democratic head office and corporation commission.

The education office is the biggest hold-out among the few agencies that are still not participating

In the program, State School Superintendent Tom Wiley said professional and technical requirements of many positions in his department made it inadvisable for the school office to participate in the personnel program. It has been pointed out that the education department has been operating under a similar personnel plan for nearly thirty years.

FIVE COUNTIES UNREPRESENTED The absence of Mrs. Agnew since the first of the year has left Santa Fe, Los Alamos, Rio Arriba, San Juan and McKinley counties without representation on the education board.

Lopez, whose replacement is overdue, represents San Miguel, Mora and Guadalupe counties.

The stalling of the two members is critical because their places are supposed to be filled in the November election, with nomination of candidates by both the parties and a reasonable time allowed for campaigning.

Virgil Henry of Hobbs is chairman of the board.

EDDY DEMOCRATS TAKE A STAND

Jack Campbell, the governor-running Democrat, is encountering considerable trouble in his plan to recruit a campaign force without using people from the defeated John Burroughs administration.

Eddy County Demo Chairman Joe Gant has bowed his neck in support of Arair Gossett, the conspicuous \$11,000-a-year civil defender in the Burroughs period, for one of the four state vice chairman places in the Demo organization.

As this was written Campbell favored Clovis banker Joe Siler for the outside vice-chairmanship.

DEMPSY HEIRS IN COURT FIGHT

The heirs of the late John J. Dempsey, two times governor of New Mexico and five times a congressman, are in court fighting over what he left.

Mrs. Gladys Dempsey, the ex-governor's widow, won a round in district court here for an audit of the Dempsey Realty Co. which is owned in part by Mrs. Dempsey and operated by David McNeill, husband of Dempsey's daughter, Marie. A second daughter, Mary, and a son, William, are also part owners. They are children of the former governor by an earlier marriage.

CANDIDATE AVOIDS MORE CHURCH TROUBLE

Political politicians here figure that Jack Campbell, the Democrat for governor, is avoiding the coat-tails of President Kennedy because they are both Catholics. Campbell encountered serious church opposition in the primary. He has been going on his own without any effort to benefit from the popularity of the President.

FRUGAL REPUBLICANS FACING CHALLENGE

The Republican boasting about saving \$2 million in the operation of the welfare department is backfiring in the northern counties where a third of the people are on welfare. It could become an election issue.

REPUBLICANS REPEAT DEMOCRAT FIASCOS

Democrat Governor John Burroughs (1950-60) got in political trouble for buying a \$10 million mortgage on an oil tanker and for trading a state airplane and \$39,000 to boot for a second-hand craft.

Republicans exploited the deals in their campaign and in 1962 bought a \$21 million mortgage on an oil tanker and traded a state airplane and \$95,000 to boot for a second-hand craft.

SEEK NEW LAW TO CURB PROFITS

The legislature council and the attorney general are trying to draw proposed laws that would block state officials and board members from doing business with their own agencies. The subject has been in the air since the disclosure of New Mexico State University buying a \$2,000 insurance policy from University Regent Seaborn Collins.

Trip of the Week

LINCOLN, NEW MEXICO - Lying on U. S. 380 in a valley of the rugged White Mountains of south-central New Mexico, is the historic town of Lincoln; historic mainly because of Billy the Kid.

New Lincoln and surrounding area is known as "Billy The Kid County," a title that has, over the years, gained Lincoln national recognition.

The anticipating visitor to Lincoln is never once disappointed from the time he arrives in the town until the time he departs.

First off, he visits the restored and long-preserved Lincoln County Courthouse where, in 1881, several months before his death at the hands of Pat Garrett, Billy the Kid made his daring escape, killing Sheriff Bell and Deputy Sheriff Bob Olinger. The room where Billy was killed preserves still intact, as was the bullet holes in the wall, made by Billy's banking 44, after they had passed through Sheriff Bell's body.

Outside below the railed balcony on the second floor of the old courthouse, in where Bob Olinger was killed by Billy, a few minutes after the young desperado had killed Sheriff Bell and freed himself of shackles. And there is a room inside the building, near the entrance, which Pat Garrett shared with Billy before he caught up with the Kid at Fort Sumner, later on in July. Behind the courthouse still stands an old scaffold, used for hanging convicted prisoners.

Nearby is the old Tunstall-McCraw general store, now re-

stored, inside and out, to its original status back in 1881. It was once the scene of a brutal gun battle between the McSweenes and the Murphy factions, during the Lincoln County War. Billy the Kid, with McSween, slinging plenty of lead at the Murphys who surrounded the place, later escaping in a hall of bullets after the McSweenes were killed and their house set afire. Today, a headstone behind the store marks the final resting place of the McSweenes.

Down the street from the McSweenes store is a small adobe building that Billy allegedly stayed in when he came to town. And not far from here is a saloon, in front of which are Billy's knife-carvings of "KID".

Last, but by no means least, is a perfectly preserved "torreon," or stone tower, that was used by the settlers to protect them from Indian raids during the late 1800's.

On August 3-5 of this year a reenactment of The Last Escape of Billy The Kid will be held in Lincoln, with local participants acting out the parts of the Kid, Sheriff Bell, Deputy Bob Olinger, and others.

The pageant will thrill those visitors who have a lust for real western action, and reservations can be made at the Worthy Hotel, in Lincoln-another restored and inhabited site on the laid known as "Billy The Kid County."

Colonel Jones, former resident, dies in jail

Colonel Jones, 74, who was a retired employee of El Paso Natural Gas Company and a former resident of Carrizozo died unexpectedly July 23 at his home in Jal.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones, who were from Tuscaloosa, Alabama, came to Carrizozo from Lawn, Texas about 1933. They homesteaded near Red Hill until 1939 at which time, they sold their property to Mr. W. R. Lovelace.

The Jones then moved to Carrizozo where Mr. Jones managed the Harvey Station (now the Old Timer station) for Mr. Harvey for several years. He also worked at the Chevron station for a year. Mr. Jones then established a laundry near the home of Roy Harman and he and his wife moved to Negal.

Colonel Jones and his wife Velma, who celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1960, moved to Jal about 1950.

According to reports, Mr. Jones had planned to play golf Wednesday afternoon and had laid down for a short rest. His wife noticed that the weather had cleared about 3 p. m. and decided to call him for the game as he had requested. But she was unsuccessful in getting

him to respond. An ambulance was called, and he was rushed to Winkler County Memorial Hospital in Kermit, Texas, where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

Funeral services for Colonel Jones were held July 27, at the Calvary Baptist Church in Jal with Rev. Reagan Carr, officiating. Burial took place at the Kermit Cemetery, Kermit, Texas.

Surviving besides his wife are sons, three grandchildren about sons, three grandchildren and one great grandchild. His sons are Hollis of Snyder, Texas, and Howard of Deming.

Also surviving is one sister, Mrs. W. M. Clements of Florida; two brothers, R. Jones of Abilene, Texas and F. L. Jones of Mobile, Alabama.


