
Molvin Romero, Capitan won 1st football contest

Polio vaccination Will be county-wide

Lincoln County has an opportunity seldom before presented to a community . . . to take another step towards completely eliminating poliomyelitis.

Since the introduction of the Salk vaccine in 1955, the incidence of polio has been cut back sharply. But even one case of a crippled child, or of a stricken parent is one case too many.

To help wipe out polio from our community for good, the New Mexico Medical Society has organized a drive to provide Polio Sabin oral polio vaccine (AT THE MODERATE CHARGE OF 25c) of (FREE) to those unable to pay to all residents of Lincoln County.

The Sabin vaccine requires no injection. It need only be swallowed. We urge all citizens of our community to get behind this push to wipe out polio. Let's show that when we are given the opportunity to do something for ourselves, for our families, and for our neighbors, we are not too apathetic or uncharitable to do it.

Sabin Oral Sunday Under the auspices of N. M. Medical Society.

DATES—September 23 and 30 for Type I

October 23 and November 4 for Type III

December 9 and 16 for Type II

Each person goes only one of the Sundays for each type of vaccine.

COST—A contribution of 25c is more is required, but will be given free to those unable to pay.

FORMS—Fill in a family pre-registration form before you go to each clinic.

DOSEAGE—Each person must receive one dose of each type - that is, 3 doses in all. A course of 3 doses confers immunity to polio for at least 10 years, possibly for life.

REACTIONS—There are no reactions to the vaccine. There are no shots, injections or needles - the vaccine is given on a sugar cube. Small infants will have 3 drops put into their mouths.

Everyone from 0 weeks of age onwards should receive vaccine. Diabetics will not be affected by one sugar cube.

Everyone, whether sick or not, can receive vaccine. There is no known reason for not taking it.

Whether you have had the Salk polio injections or not, makes no difference.

More detailed information will be published in next week's paper. The pre-registration forms will be available about Sept. 15th, and may be picked up in the schools, the bank and various business houses.

County records 7th traffic fatality

Daniel M. (Benny) Balcolm, 43, operator of Frontier Motors in Ruidoso Downs, became the 7th traffic fatality of the year in Lincoln County on September 10. Balcolm, who was answering a wrecker call a half mile east of Hondo, died instantly of a broken neck and internal injuries when he lost control of his vehicle and was pinned under the wreckage, one mile west of Glencoe. State Police Officers Ken Wilson and Bob Miller who investigated the accident, reported Balcolm was traveling east on U.S. 70 when his 1949 Studebaker 2-ton wrecker left the right side of the roadway. It overturned one and a half times pinning the victim beneath the vehicle. The accident was attributed to the fact that the large vehicle was traveling with angle, rather than multiple rear wheels and in trying to make a curve, the top-heavy wrecker tipped, then rolled over. Funeral arrangements for Balcolm, who is survived by his wife, Truly, and daughter, Jaciite, are pending.

REPUBLICANS PASS UP RACIAL CANDIDATE

SANTA FE — Republicans passed up a chance to pick a Spanish-American candidate for state auditor and are going it this year for the first time in the history of the New Mexico party without a Spanish-name candidate for any of the statehouse offices.

When Fred Comstock, the Republican primary nominee for auditor, resigned from the ticket it was widely assumed that the Republican executive committee would replace him with a Spanish-name candidate to match the Democrats' Alex Armijo, the only Spanish-American that party has on its statehouse ticket.

Instead, the Republicans chose to go with Paul F. Corey, an Albuquerque certified public accountant who ran in 1958 and was defeated by Bob Costner by 40,000.

THREE OFFERED FOR GOVERNOR

Republicans, more than Democrats have tried to balance their tickets with Spanish-American representation.

They offered Spanish-American candidates for governor in 1940. Maurice Miera, in 1948, Manuel Lujan, and in 1952 the Republican nominee was Joseph F. Poudre of Valencia county who is of French extraction but widely regarded by Spanish-Americans as one of their own.

TWO OF GROUP ELECTED GOVERNOR

The last time the Democrats proposed a Spanish-American for governor was in 1918 when Felix Garcia was the party candidate and was defeated by Octaviano A. Larrazolo, Republican, by 23,725 to 22,453.

There have been two Spanish-American governors of New Mexico, Larrazolo, Republican elected in 1918, and Ezequiel Cabeza de Baca, a Democrat elected in 1916 but never able to serve because of falling health.

MAJORITY IN '72, 28-PER CENT NOW

When New Mexico became a state in 1912 and started electing its own officers Spanish-Americans were of greater number than the anglos.

The present count seems to be about 28 per cent Spanish-Americans.

The federal Bureau of the Census won't release a count, apparently in the feeling that Americans shouldn't be separated into national origins, although the Spanish-American people of the southwest do have a distinct identity, and their own culture and traditions.

GROUP HOLDS HALF CONGRESS PLACES

While the racial group has suffered a steady decline in the number of elective statehouse offices held it has held half of the state's congressional places since the first of 1943.

That is with Sen. Dennis Chavez and U. S. Reps. Tony Fernandez and his successor, Joe Montoya.

70 PER CENT JOBS IN THE CAPITOL

The Spanish-Americans, even without much representation on the party tickets are getting higher recognition than their number indicates.

This is explained by some Spanish-American leaders in both the Republican and Democrat parties who have been telling that their people would rather have the appointive salaried jobs in public service than the elective places.

This attitude shows up in a count of the payrollers in the two biggest of the political patronage agencies of the statehouse, the bureau of revenue with 380 employees, and the motor vehicle division with 190.

SMARTTEST POLITICOS IN THE COUNTRY

The Spanish-Americans of New Mexico are perhaps the most effective ethnic political group in the country.

They not only hold half of the state's congressional delegation and most of the statehouse jobs but get a whole's share of political attention and money in the state elections.

\$42 MILLION AND BROKE

The state's awful money situation in which it is spending up to \$14 million more this year than it will have to meet the bills, has turned more attention on the \$42 million that the state is carrying in banks around the state.

The \$42 million is vague money. It is dough stored up for bond and interest payments; money held for future spending by the highway and welfare departments; cash for future school needs.

A considerable part is tax payments made under protest which cannot be touched until the courts rule on the protests.

A large chunk is the balance held in the state's general checking account.

GET AT MONEY TO AVOID TAX

Many are scheming ways to get at this chunk of fat, much of it not drawing interest from the banks that hold it, as a means of averting a big tax increase by the legislature that meets next January.

The huge sum held by the banks goes up all the time. There are occasional dips in the amount on deposit but the line rises from year to year.

Officers in both the legislature and governor's departments are probing the bank holdings for relief from this year's overpending.
