### Albert Roberts got the biggest

A buck's head with a prize winning trophy rack of 14 points was stolen last Wednesday from Sidwell's meat locker plant.

Two men in a green (or blue) Dodge pickup with a large dog riding in the bed of the truck were observed by Mrs. Sidwell who thought that they were at the plant on business. The men, apparently unlucky hunters, took Roberts' prize possession and headed north on Highway 54.

The police investigated the case but were unable to locate the thieves.

### Ruidoso marshals set in-out record

The town of Ruidoso seems to have a big problem regarding their city marshals. The first to be given a "leave of absence" was J. B. Bobo who was in the race for sheriff of Lincoln County as a Democratic nominee. Bobo, it was reported, asked for a 6 month leave but the time specified was left out of the city council's minutes.

Following into office after Bobo was Bob Jurney, a former state policeman. At a board of trustees meeting on Nov. 15, Jurney was asked to resign after a tie vote was broken by Ruidoso Mayor Warren Tucker. Now holding the position of temporary marshal is T. J. Sanders who will hold the office until November 29 when Mayor Tucker submits to the board of trustees his choice for a permanent officer.

The Grand Jury of Lincoln County was impaneled Monday afternoon in District Court and began their first session at 9:00 a.m. Tuesday, November 20th.

The jury chosen to hear the case consists of 12 members. The indictment against the accused is returned if there is enough evidence for trial before an ordinary jury. Until a witness or witnesses are subpoenaed for a case, the jury sessions remain closed to the public.

Members of the Grand Jury are Albert Taylor Roberts, Foreman; Mrs. Dan Swearingin, Clerk; Willos Hill, Miguel C. Gonzales, Fred Wells Pfingsten, Mrs. Elmo C. Carter, Erwin F. Crockett, Kister P. Randolph, Martine Sandoval Vega, Mrs. Walter G. Meeker, Mrs. Tull Stansell and Ernest Sultemeier.

Balliffs are Sonny Smoot and Natalia Vega and they will be assisted by the District Attorney, Dan Sosa. Ester Smith of Las Cruces is the Grand Jury stenographer.

### Robbery suspects change pleas

Two of the three suspects, George Sisk and Edward Frazee, involved in the armed robbery at the Nike Tavern on Oct. 29, changed their former pleas of no contest entered in Justice of the Peace court at the time of their arrest, to not guilty pleas in District Court on Nov. 19.

The three men, each charged with robbery while armed and grand larceny were George Sisk of Pampa, Texas, Edward Frazee and Jimmy Oakley both of Amarillo, Texas.

Sisk was represented by Leo Cathoy of Roswell. Frazee was represented by Elfred Jones of Carrizozo who was appointed by the court.

Oakley, represented by Albert J. Rivera of Alamogordo, requested 24 hours to enter his plea. (At the time of his arrest, Oakley pleaded guilty in the J. P. court.)

Trial dates for the three suspects will be set at a later date. Other cases on the District Court agenda were:

George Kelly — charged with DWI. Kelly entered a plea of guilty to the charge and was sentenced to serve 22 days in jail. He was given credit for time already served.

Clyde Sherman — charged with drawing and handling a deadly weapon in a threatening manner. He was represented by C. C. Chase and entered a plea of not guilty. His case is to be continued.

Emilio Zamora — charged with reckless driving. Zamora entered a plea of guilty. His social driving privilege was suspended 6 months and he was placed on probation 6 months. He was assessed \$150.00 cost.

Robert Joe Ayers — charged with DWI and reckless driving.

The charge of DWI was dismissed. Ayers was represented by Donald Brown of Roswell and entered a plea of guilty to reckless driving. He was placed on probation for one year and his social driving privilege was suspended for one year. He was assessed \$150.00 probation cost.

Owen Downey — charged with DWI and reckless driving. Downey, who was represented by Ellis J. French, entered a plea of not guilty to the DWI charge and pleaded guilty to the charge of reckless driving. He was assessed \$100.00 costs.

Juvenile from Ruidoso — charged with speeding. The youth admitted the allegation and was assessed \$5.00 costs. The next District Court will be held November 26.

### Judge Designated

Judge George Reece, Jr., of Roswell has been designated by the New Mexico Supreme Court to hear the petition for the removal of Kenneth Noshker.

C. C. Chase of Alamogordo, lawyer for Noshker, filed a motion to dismiss the case. Reasons given by Chase for the motion to dismiss were that a grand jury was called within 20 days after presentation of the accusation and that the District Attorney is without jurisdiction to present an accusation when there will be a grand jury called within 20 days.

## Optimism expressed at development meeting

### Early-day gowns prompt biography

Several gowns modeled at the Gran Senora tea which had belonged to Mrs. Paden, wife of an early day Carrizozo physician, prompted this short biography of Dr. Paden, written by Mrs. R. E. Leman.

Dr. Melvin G. Paden was one of the old time country doctors who traveled by horse and buggy all over Lincoln County during the early days.

He was a native of Padensville, West Virginia, coming to White Oaks in the year 1880. Later he returned East where he finished his medical training and married Belle Williams. The doctor and his bride settled in White Oaks where he opened the first Padens Drug store and practiced medicine.

Three children were born in White Oaks, Grant, Melvin Jr., and Virginia. The latter died in infancy.

He moved to Carrizozo in 1907, becoming the physician for the railroad which had just established its division here, and also doing general practice of medicine. His first office was the small building in the rear of the present Padens Drug store, the first story of which he erected in 1909, later adding the second story which was equipped for a hospital. The present Padens Drug store still contains the original fixtures of the White Oaks store.

Dr. Paden's son, Melvin, Jr., after graduating from medical school, returned to Carrizozo to join his father in the practice of medicine. Shortly after his return he became seriously ill and died in 1914.

Mrs. Paden died in 1910, and his son Brent died a few years later.

Heartbroken and lonely he continued his practice here until his health forced him to give up the work he had so long followed and loved. He moved back to White Oaks to the old home and there spent his last days. At the age of 94 he passed away and was buried in White Oaks cemetery with the other members of his family.

### Senator Chavez laid to rest

The body of Sen. Dennis Chavez lay in state Tuesday in the New Mexico Senate chambers in Santa Fe where an army of friends paid their last respects.

Chavez' friends included the rich and the poor.

He was especially beloved by the poor. He was their idol and inspiration—a poor farm boy whose boot strap efforts raised him to an influential national position.

The senator's relatives alone formed legions.

Chavez died in a Washington hospital Sunday morning. The body was returned to New Mexico by military transport Monday night.

Chavez, a man who wrestled for and won for New Mexico, large government projects including defense investments, was buried at Mount Calvary Cemetery on Wednesday in the shadow of the Sandia Mountains where Chavez had planned a retirement home.

### CAMPBELL WOULD PICK CANDIDATE

The candidates for such an election would be nominated by state party conventions perhaps thirty days or six weeks before the special election.

The Republican appointed to the Senate would presumably be that party's candidate for the special election and Gov. Jack Campbell would probably control the nomination of the Democrat for the race.

### JOHN SIMMS STANDS AS NO. 3 CHOICE

While Senator Chavez was still on his tier politicians established the congressmen as the two first prospects for the party nomination and named former Gov. John Simms (1955-56) as No. 3 boy in the list.

Simms is close to Campbell and was an officer in his campaign. He has overcome much of the unpopularity which in 1950 led to his becoming the first governor defeated for a second term in thirty years, but still has many critics and outright foes among Democrat politicians. It would be hard to get him through a party convention.

### LAWYERS AT WORK SUNDAY MORNING

Democrats went to work early Sunday after hearing of the senator's death on planning an early election.

### FILL A VACANCY, MAKE A VACANCY

SANTA FE — The two top prospects for Democratic nomination for the Chavez Senate seat are the state's two U. S. Representatives with the election of either creating another vacancy in the state's congressional representation and perhaps calling for a second costly special election.

Rep. Joe Montoya who's ambition to go to the Senate is public knowledge, and Rep. Tom Morris who looked like a political powerhouse in the recent election are currently the favored—Demo—prospects for a special election expected to be authorized by the legislature for sometime in the spring to fill the place left by the death of Sen. Dennis Chavez last Sunday.

### DEMAND THEY QUIT BEFORE THEY RUN

Already there is talk among Democrats that if either of the congressmen get the nomination he should resign immediately and his successor chosen in the same special election.

That would cause Montoya and Morris to take a long, hard look before entering the gamble, and would brighten the prospects of others hoping for the nomination.

### SPECIAL ELECTION IMMEDIATE RESPONSE

Republican Co. Ed Cochran's appointment under present law would serve until the next general election in November, 1964.

Democrats, in charge of the legislature and of the governor's office after Dec. 31 are not in a mood to tolerate a Republican senator that long and within an hour after Senator Chavez' death were plotting a plan in which the legislature would enact a law authorizing Gov. Jack Campbell to call a special election to fill the Senate place. It would be in the spring around the first of May.

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

## We called the place 'Bonito'

(The original manuscript of this story about Ol Bonito was given to Hugh Grafton and is now the property of Mrs. R. G. Stewart of Capitan, whose parents were among those hardy settlers who came to the Bonito Creek when it was still Indian country.)

In December 1880, three prospectors (I was one of them) landed at the upper Bonita Valley about 14 miles above Fort Stanton, Lincoln County, New Mexico. They liked it so well that they concluded to stay and went prospecting and built the first cabin.

At that time this land was part of the Mesquero Indian

Reservation, which was the reason there were no Mexican or other people living there but as soon as some more prospectors had come in and lots of mineral bearing veins were found cropping out of the hills, the government cut off two townships of north side of the reservation and put it on the other side.

This opened the land for prospecting and mining and sure enough a good many fellows from other places came here. Then a man started building a good size store and there was some more people built houses near this store. We held a meeting and called the place "Bonito" (Bonito is the Mexican name for beautiful) and as this

is really a very beautiful place among the hills, covered with the finest timber, as properly named.

We soon got a Post Office and Bonito was the voting place for the new precinct. Peto Nelson erected a good size dance hall with a fine floor and people from the vicinity came to the several dances and had a good time. In the meantime several farmer families, mostly from Texas, had taken up land along the Bonito Creek and we soon got milk, eggs, butter and some fine vegetables, and as we always had some wild turkey and deer and fish from the creek, we could live high.

## No Lack Of Projects

The flatland section of Lincoln County where the county seat is located need not be idle a single moment during the next several years. There are numerous projects that need attention, by all the county, and by the county seat.

Paving is a local project, but completion of paved streets would please any Lincoln County citizen coming to town to do business at the courthouse, hospital, school or store. This project is moving in good speed.

Redistricting is a county project. No big gain or loss for any one section of the county over this issue, this being true in spite of some political issues that may arise. The major towns of the county are all in one commissioner district... this project needs push.

A new courthouse is a county project. Probably local people know best the dire need for new facilities to house Lincoln County business. Many county records are almost priceless documents, property titles, and all county records would be hard to replace, if not impossible.

In the recent candidate meetings the statement was repeated about the county not being able to afford. The time will never arrive when all Lincoln County citizens think the county can afford a courthouse. At the same time the "can't afford" remark is made, comes the statement from several sources that "the county is wealthy." A new courthouse is a county consideration and should be vital to all of the county.

Highway 3 improvement is of state interest. The shortest route from El Paso, through Lincoln County, to Cheyenne, Wyo., and on north to Highway 54 to Duran, across dist Highway 3 to about Chapelle on Highway 83 and stay on 83 the rest of the way north. This stretch of dirt could be a vital connection link for southbound to come through Lincoln County as well as the shortest north-south route.

Highway 87, Angus to Nogal road improvement. Is important to most of Lincoln County, as completion of a road that is paved on both ends.





quickest, for it seemed like ages to us. He took his pencil and pad and wrote, "You looked so scared, I was laughing inside of me. That's the only kick I get out of strangers and I can't help it. Those who know me, the first thing they ask, is for me to cut their throats. I have a license and I am in my right faculties, so thank you and come back, but don't put strangers wise to my way of making their acquaintance."

#### End of Prohibition

We would like for Joe Candelaria to tell when he and the late Juan Baca put Nathan Adler away on election day (via the moonshine route), but the Republicans only elected Sam Kelsey for Sheriff and the unbeatable Ernest Key for County Clerk. That was the same year the late Milton Lesnett and Martin Vega went on the war-path and ruined a large, expensive radio in Democratic headquarters, and scouted everyone in the place when Martin wrapped his arm around the stovepipes. It was more like Halloween night, the way some of the fellows carried on that election night. The more sober-minded Heps turned Democrat when the last returns kept pouring in, for there was no other alternative than to act the part and be good sports. Sunday morning you see a long line of weary and old hitch-hikers on Highway 70, leading from Tularosa to Mesquite, but the Otero County officers and Highway Patrol forbid anyone giving them a lift for the simple reason that alcoholic beverages are still prohibited to enter the Indian Reservation. Manuel Sinceros was discharged and left for home in Wagon Mound.

The postoffice, the Administrative and Medical offices and the O. T. were closed on Veterans' Day. The maintenance crew had the day off, too. Will Rogers of Capitán and Joe Chavez of Carrizozo are new attendants in the Ft. Stanton Kitchen. Will looks like the late Cowboy Will Rogers, even to his chyness and freckles on his face and arms. Joe is no relation to the writer, but only one of many instances by the same name in every dogpatch in the Land of Enchantment. There have been six of a kind in our ancestry and the only redeemable feature is that even a new born baby can call us by our first name. No one has to break a jaw or refer to an ancient Almanac in order to spell and pronounce our name.

A number of cats with non-resident hunters came to Ft. Stanton on opening day of the hunting season. Apparently, they were not familiar with these regions and when they hit a dead end here, they either had to turn back or take the Devil's Canyon road. They were well equipped, and even had trailers with horses to get their kill out of remote canyons. Local hunters have had no luck so far, but if things get from bad to worse, the girls have an overabundance of does and fawns in ceramics at the O. T. Antlers have to sprout, so they have no bucks.

The Ysabel Aldaz family of Albuquerque was over for the funeral of Mrs. Aldaz in Carrizozo, and they visited Ft. Stanton, where he worked for many years, and to visit their son, Tommy and family.

Rev. Wm. R. Brown has returned from a vacation of several weeks in the East. Mrs. Brown served as one of the clerks at Lincoln on election day.

Ladies Klatley and Frovine, looked at some deer covered with a tarp in a pickup in Capitán. "That one in the middle is a big one," said Frovine. Raising the tarp, "And also my Jersey milk cow!" cried Patricia, "call the Sheriff!"

When some women were saying grace at the dinner table, Tommy Aldaz said, "No need for them praying, we have the best cooks and dishwashers in Ft. Stanton."

Perry Zamota was over from Alamogordo and returned with a deer. Glad for Perry. Roy Ba-

ca, 15, killed his first deer not far from Ft. Stanton. Mr. and Mrs. Lope Baca attended funeral of Mrs. Aldaz.

calling a special election, said he did the Sunday work in anticipation of being required to write an opinion on the question.

MONTOYA ELECTED IN SPECIAL VOTE

Joe Montoya got in Congress in 1957 in the first special election for a congressional position in New Mexico since Sep. 20, 1921, when Republican Hol- O. Bursum of Socorro defeated R. H. Hanna of Albuquerque for the place vacated by Sen. Albert B. Fall who was appointed Secretary of the Interior by President Harding.

The law under which the special election for the Senate was held was repealed in 1927 and there is presently no legal provision for such an election.

BOLACK CLOSER THAN REDMAN

U. S. Representatives cannot be appointed by the governor and all along there has been a legal procedure for special elections to fill vacancies in the U. S. House.

Montoya got the nomination from a Democrat convention for the place left by the death of U. S. Rep. Tony Fernandez and defeated Republican Tom Bolack.

Bolack, a novice in politics at the time, ran Montoya a closer race than did Jack Redman this month. He lost by less than 8,000 votes, some 4,000 closer than the Redman run which established Redman as a big figure in Republican politics.

ALL APPOINTED WON ELECTIONS

Having the title and being in the Senate even on appointment is a distinct advantage for one standing for election.

New Mexico in its 51 years has had two Democrats and two Republicans appointed to the Senate and each went on to win election to the place.

The United States Senate is the greatest prize in American politics aside from the presidency itself.
