



Tennessee Fruit Cake — Rinse and place in a colander over boiling water for 15 min.; 1 lb. seedless raisins. Cut into small pieces with scissors: 1 lb. pitted dates, 2 lb. candied cherries, 1 lb. pineapple and 4 cups pecan meats. Cream together: 1 cup butter and 2 cups sugar. Add to the creamed mixture one at a time and beat well: 6 whole eggs. Sift and measure: 6 cups flour. Add 1 cup of the flour to the prepared fruit and resift the remaining with 5 tsp. baking powder, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tsp. allspice, 1/2 tsp. ginger and 1/2 tsp. nutmeg. Add the sifted flour mixture to the creamed one alternately with: 2 cups cornmeal molasses. Bake in a large stem cake pan in a 275 oven for 3 1/2 hours or divide into 3 loaves and bake in a 300 oven for 2 hours.

EDITORIAL

"A page for independent thought"

In The Report

If a person or an organization wants to pay the fee, they can get a report that will make it seem logical for all of Sandia operations to be located in Lincoln County, or better yet on the moon.

One of the biggest hazards for readers of the daily news sheets is to sort out the actual and factual from the imaginary and fictional. This calls for much judgment, considerable knowledge of current affairs — and a suspicious nature. Few people are so equipped.

The Albuquerque Journal takes its turn this week at printing the "gospel according to Dick McAlpin". McAlpin states that the Albuquerque area is the only logical area for construction of additional institutional facilities for delinquent boys. McAlpin does not say so in these words, but the big reason for this logic is that Albuquerque has the most delinquent boys.

Politics have hamstrung the boys school at Springer, and this school has had its troubles — moving the school to Albuquerque will not eliminate the politics.

Quoting McAlpin, "The location of the school at Springer poses a 'tremendous handicap' in recruiting a professional staff who expect amenities of life which Springer (pop. 1500) simply cannot provide".

Springer's amenities are about the same as those in Carrizozo, though Springer has done a much better job of town-cleaning over the years and looks better today. These amenities include a lot of neighborliness, knowing every one in town, having church socials, basketball games, brides parties, being able to walk slowly across most streets in town at any point in the block, in general the small town life such as a great many people enjoy and would not trade for all the amenities in the world.

The first definition of "Amenity" is, 1. Quality of being pleasant or agreeable; civility; suavity. We wonder if Albuquerque claims their sidewalk area, only one in the state, as being pleasant; or the jam of traffic in their down-town area as being agreeable; chopping in Albuquerque means driving to all the centers, and Albuquerque thinking would term such as suave.

The course of all the information favoring Albuquerque as the future home of additional institutional facilities in the 1960 Brewer Report, requested by, and partly financed by N. M. Legislative Finance Committee, Edgar W. Brewer, western director of field service for the National Council on Crime and Delinquency, directed the compilation of the report.

A remedy is needed for Springer — a change is coming Jan. 1 when political patronage shifts — and this is not the remedy. Mr. Brewer could well write on the whims and fancies of N. M. politics because Springer's success at present hinges on the kind of governor and legislature N. M. has.

Excessive Advantage To Vets

Veterans tax exemptions were a part of the last election in Lincoln County, though not a major factor — a more violent battle may be fought out in the next session of legislature. The practice at present is to

deduct the \$2,000 veterans property tax exemption for the assessed valuation which gives the veteran a greater advantage than he needs; or, in many cases, wants.

The equitable way, and legislative action will probably be taken to deduct in this manner, is to deduct the \$2,000 vet exemption from the total assessed valuation.

The veterans tax exemption should not be removed, at least that is the thinking of this writer, but it should be put on a basis that will let this exemption continue to the benefit of veterans without being unfair to non-veterans.
