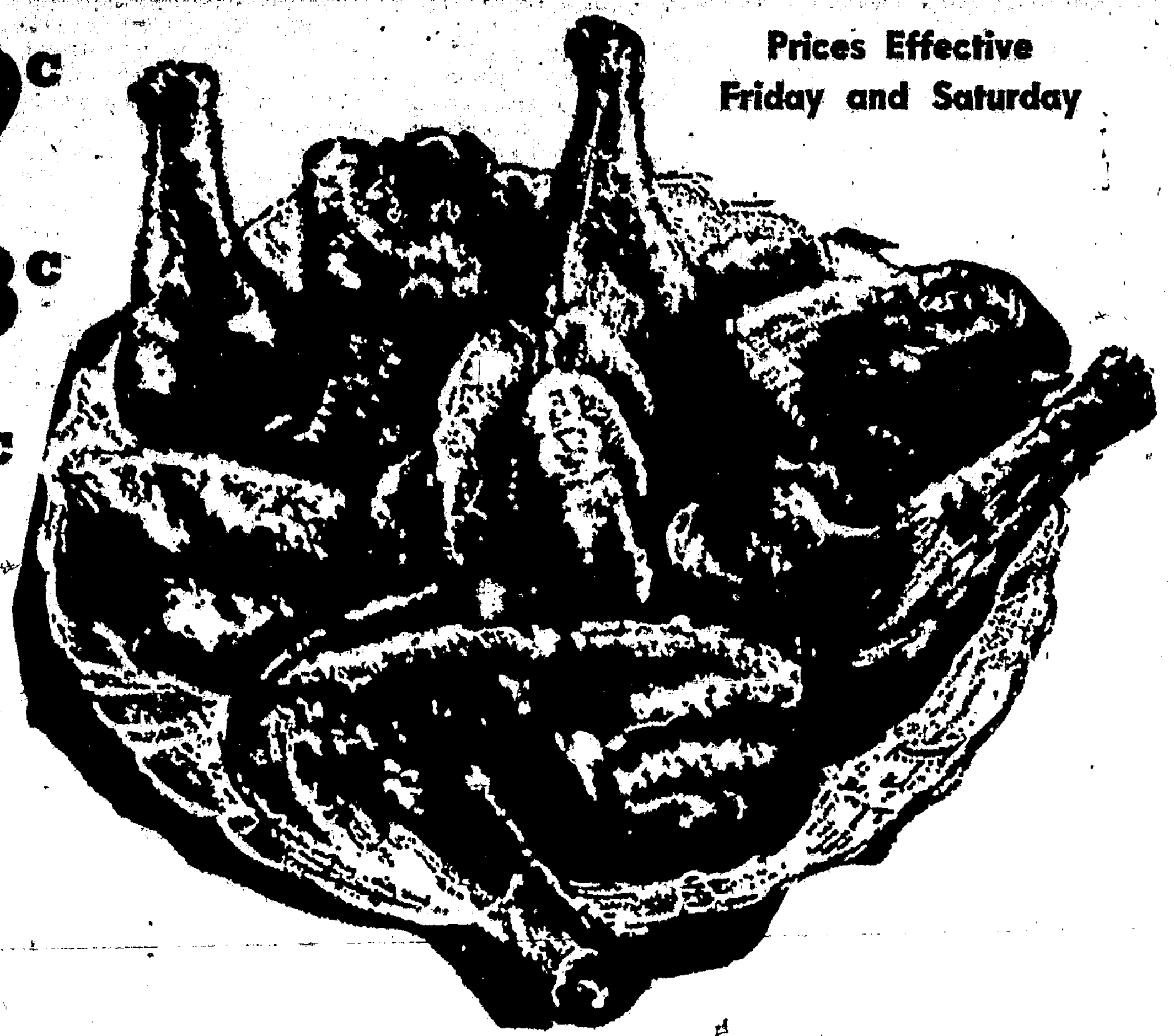

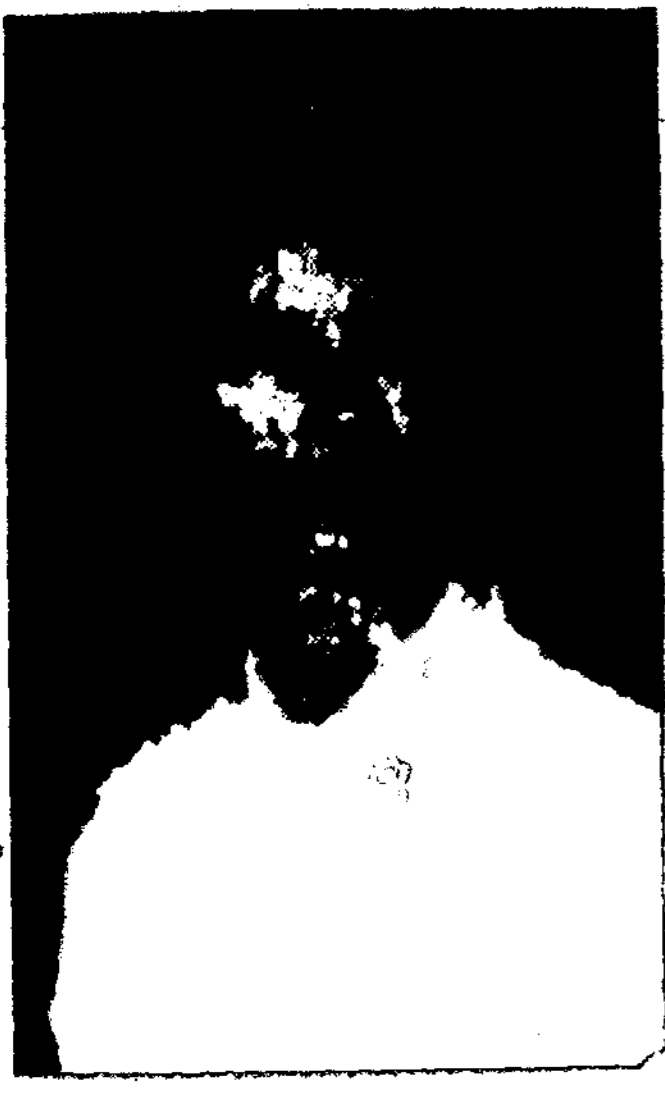

- 1 1/2 cup sugar
 - 1/2 cup shortening
 - 2 eggs, slightly beaten
 - 1 cup commercial sour cream
 - 1/2 teaspoon soda
 - 3/4 cups flour
 - 2 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- Cream sugar and shortening together. Add eggs. Add soda to sour cream, then add this to egg mixture. Combine the flour, baking powder, and salt together and sift. Add gradually to the egg mixture. Add vanilla. Drop from teaspoon on greased cookie sheets. Bake at 375 F for 15 min. or until slightly browned. Makes 6 dozen.

Mal Pais made state park by legislature

The New Mexico House of Representatives passed a bill March 5, creating Valley of Fires State Park near Carrizozo in the lava bed just off U.S. 54.

Rep. William Shreengost, R-Lincoln, in urging passage of the bill, said the lava flow was close to the youngest in the United States—only about 1,000 years old.

Shreengost said the area is about 40 miles long and about 10 miles wide. At its thickest portion, the bed is about 100 feet deep, he said.

He said the name "Valley of Fires" came from an old Indian legend of finding many small fires and a lot of smoke in the area.

The bill calls for a \$1,600 appropriation for land acquisition around the volcanic crater.

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Lincoln County declares war on cholla cactus

"When I bought this cow ranch fifteen years ago, only a few scattered cholla were to be found in the draws. Now, the cactus are so thick that I can't ride through them. As a young man, herding sheep from the Hondo to the Pentsco, we saw very few of these cholla cactus."

These and many similar remarks may be heard from almost any rancher in Lincoln County as you ride over their ranches with them.

Cholla cactus (*Opuntia arborescens*), or buckhorn, staghorn, devil's walking stick, has spread over the grasslands so quickly during past years that it has become a grave concern to ranchers from southwest Texas to the central plains of Colorado, with Lincoln County in New Mexico being in the center of the area. Here the thickest and tallest stands of cholla are to be found.

During the past fifteen years, while working with ranchers in southern and central New Mexico, I have noted that these cactus are making a rapid increase on areas with deeper soils. On many sheep and cattle outlets, the cholla density is so great today, that the livestock no longer are able to properly utilize the grasses growing in the area. As I have been told by a local rancher - "I can't ride through them, much less work cattle among the cholla." In the foothill country east and south of Corona, it is commonplace to count 1000-1500 cholla plants per acre and in a few scattered spots, 1800-2000 plants per acre have been counted by the Soil Conservation Service technicians. For size, we can go to the bottomlands south of the Hondo to find 10-12 foot cholla with 14 foot specimens not uncommon.

Ranchers claim many types of damage to the livestock from grazing areas infested with cholla cactus. These vary from sour mouth and wool damage in sheep to sore eye and lump jaw

in cattle. Death, although more common in sheep than cattle, occurs every day from eating the spine covered pods and branches of this plant. One rancher friend of mine claims a three per-cent sheep death loss average over the years, with a big portion of this loss due directly to cholla. Another stockman had a registered bull down with an intestinal block caused from eating cholla seed pods.

Not only are ranchers experiencing physical damage to their stock, but they are also witnessing damage to their grasslands and ranges. Pastures that once carried 250 sheep yearlong, with no apparent overuse, now become overused in seven to nine months grazing with the same number of sheep. The usual excuse - "doesn't rain as much as it used to" - does not always account for all the drop

water, thereby producing even more grass growth than in the past.

What is the future for Mr. Cholla? With cholla in New Mexico becoming thicker and more widespread every year, the Soil Conservation Service, together with other Federal and State agencies and private contractors, are constantly trying newer methods of cactus control.

Every effort is being made to increase the efficiency of controlling the cholla cactus, keeping a sharp pencil on costs per acre. Perhaps future generations of Lincoln County ranchers will know of another Lincoln County War - On Cholla Cactus, through stories told by their parents or grandparents.

SENATE JOINT MEMORIAL NO. 1 INTRODUCED BY ALL MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE

A Joint Memorial In Memory Of The Honorable Dennis Chavez

WHEREAS, the people of New Mexico were shocked and saddened by the sudden death of the Honorable Dennis Chavez on November 18, 1962; and

WHEREAS, in his death the people of New Mexico and the nation have lost a great man and a dedicated public servant; and

WHEREAS, during the long span of his life, from his birth at Los Chavez in Valencia County on April 8, 1888, on land granted to his ancestors by King Phillip II of Spain during the sixteenth century, to his death in Washington, D. C., in the twenty-seventh year of his service as United States Senator from New Mexico, he kept constantly before him the needs of his people; and

WHEREAS, with this great compass of interest in people from all walks of life, he was able to deal effectively with his colleagues in the Senate, and was at home in the company of presidents; and

WHEREAS, he was thoroughly acquainted with the difficulty of obtaining a living from our sparse, dry land, and fought for projects and funds for accomplishing them which would spare his fellow New Mexicans loss from the twin plagues of drought and flood; and

WHEREAS, his concern for the welfare of his people made him secure an education at great personal sacrifice and put it to use as a public servant first as representative of Bernalillo Co. to the Sixth New Mexico Legislature, later as United States Representative during the Seventy-second and Seventy-third Congresses; and finally as United States Senator, serving his first term by appointment of Governor Clyde Tingley on May 11, 1933, and continuously from that time until his death, as the successful candidate in hard-fought elections; and

WHEREAS, his long membership in the Senate made him fourth in continuous service at the time of his death, and thru this seniority he held the chairmanship of the Senate Public Works Committee, the Senate Office Building Committee, and a position as senior member of the Senate Appropriations Committee; and

WHEREAS, his efforts in the United States Senate helped secure authorization of such irrigation and flood-control projects for the state as the Rio Grande Canalization Project in Dona Ana County and the Arch Hurley Irrigation Project at Tucuman; the Middle Rio Grande Flood Control Project; the Socorro Flood Control Project; and the Two Rivers Reservoir at Roswell; and his efforts have advanced the adoption of the Upper Colorado River Storage Project, the Navajo Dam Project, and the San Juan-Chama Diversion Project; and

WHEREAS, through his concern for the betterment of New Mexico's economy he secured the reactivation of Cannon Air Force Base at Clovis, kept alive Walker Air Force Base at Roswell, secured appropriations for Kirtland and Sandia Bases at Albuquerque, Holloman Air Force Base at Alamogordo and for the atomic city of Los Alamos; and

WHEREAS, his leadership in

the United States Senate and his devotion to the national welfare earned the tribute of the Senate Committee on Public Works in a resolution adopted September 21, 1961; and

WHEREAS, for his interest in good relations with our neighbors of Latin America, President Adolfo Lopez Mateos of Mexico conferred on him the highest honor of the Mexican Government, the order of the Mexican Aztec Eagle, First Class; and the American Legion awarded him its Citation for Meritorious Service in Public Works and Latin American affairs,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, on behalf of the people of the state, that sincere sympathy is extended to his family; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to his widow, Mrs. Imelda Espinosa Chavez, who with her husband, had celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on November 9, 1961, and to his three children, Dennis Chavez, Jr. of Washington, Mrs. Ysabel Chavez Dixon of Washington, and Mrs. Maria Chavez Tristani of San Juan.

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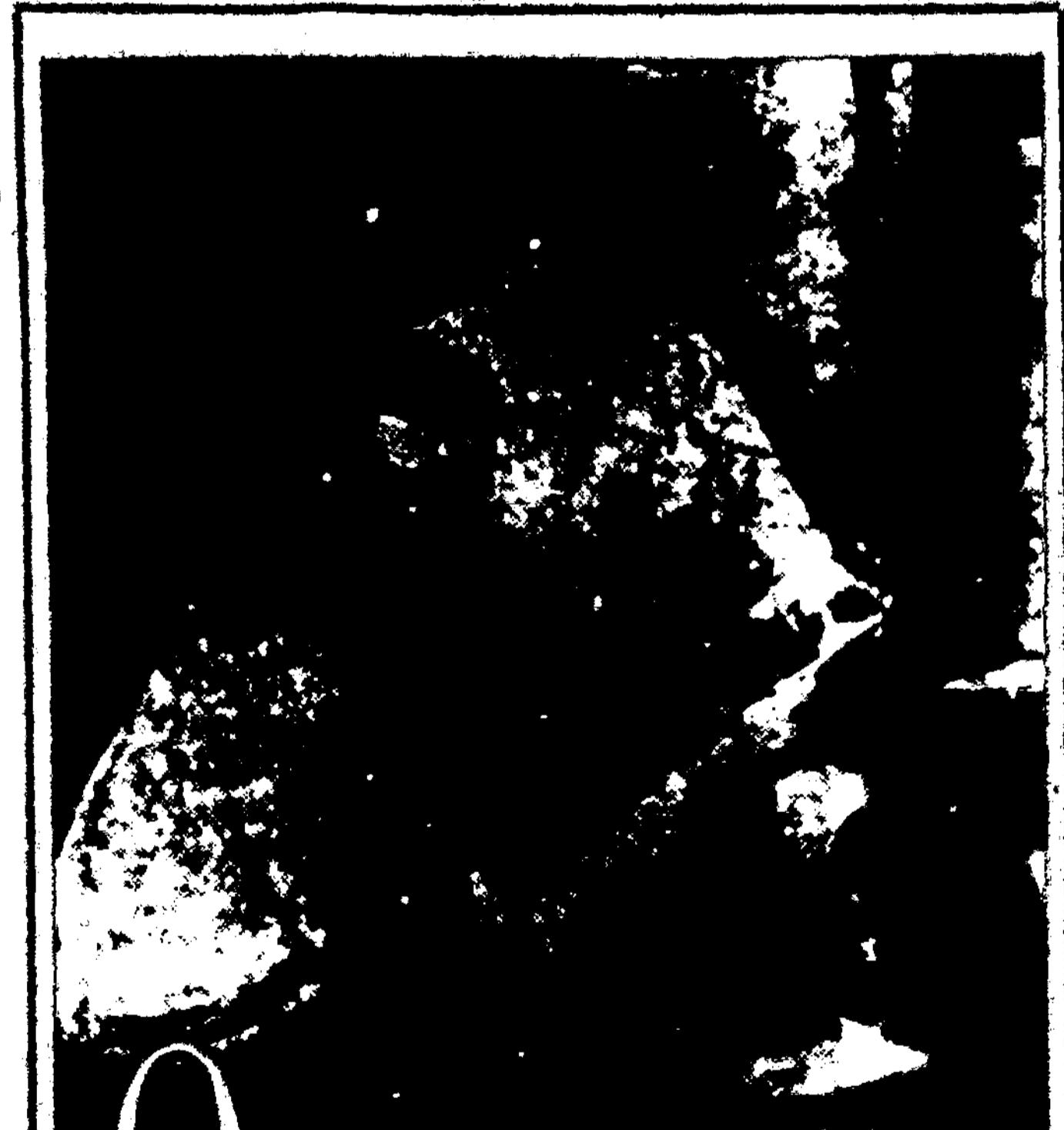
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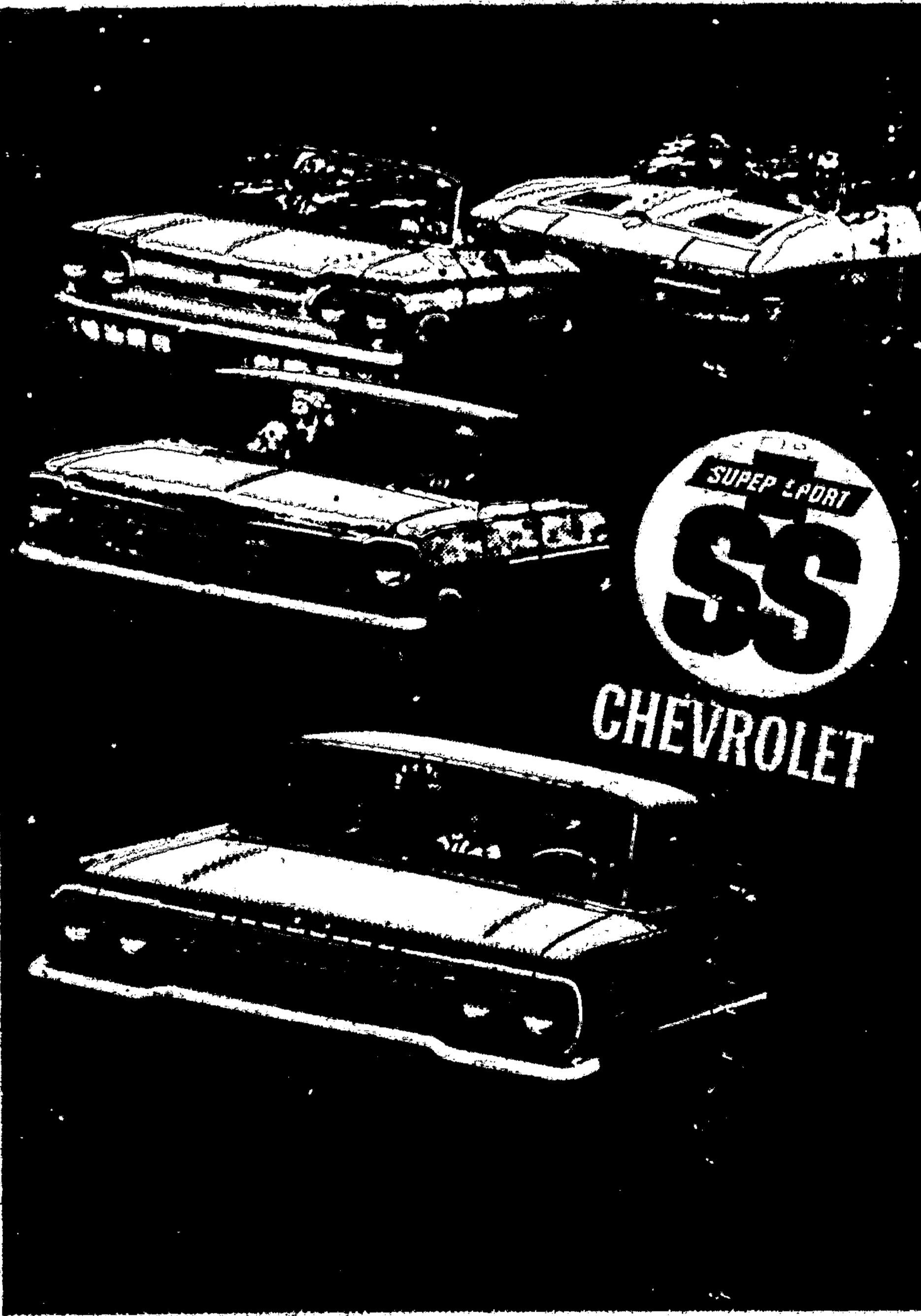

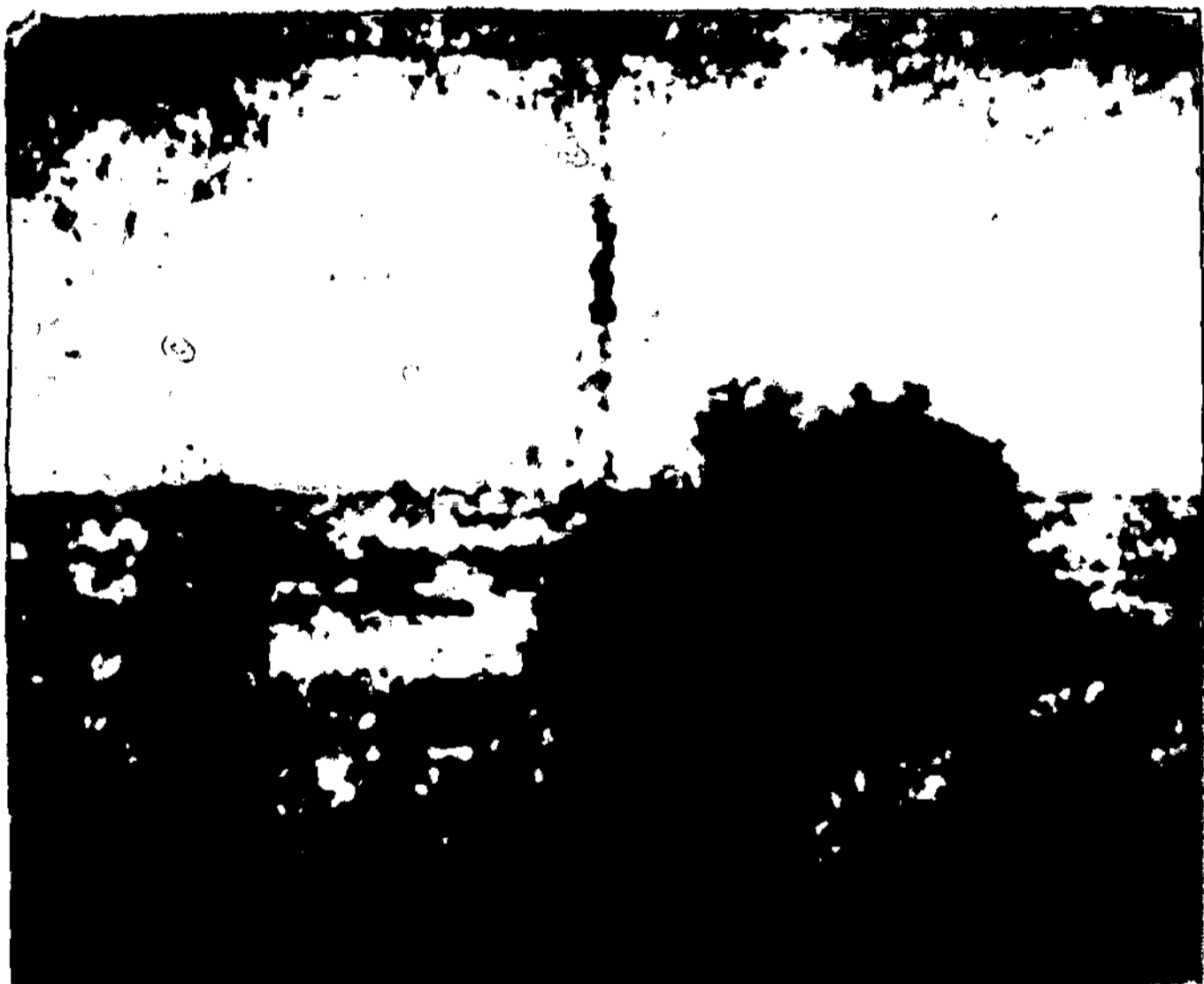
