### A. K. Mitchel chosen cattleman of the year

The selection of Albert K. Mitchel, Albert, N. M., as Cattleman of the Year highlighted the first session of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association Convention here in Albuquerque. The Association's Beef Cattle Improvement Committee selects the individual to be honored.

Mr. Mitchel is a past President of the American National Cattlemen's Association, the N. M. Cattle Growers Association, the American Hereford Association, and the American Quarterhorse Association. He is past Chairman of the National Livestock and Meat Board and of the Advisory Committee on Livestock to the Secretary of Agriculture. He is presently Chairman of the Board of the International Stock Show in Denver. He is Trustee of Cornell University.

Mr. Mitchel is currently Chairman of the National Livestock Tax Committee and was introduced before a State Committee in Washington, D. C. by Stephen Hart, the committee's attorney, with the following comments:

"He has probably had a broader experience in the tax, scientific, economic, practical and governmental problems of livestock than anyone in the industry, and I think he is the most universally respected livestock man in the United States."

In selecting Albert K. Mitchel as Cattleman of the Year the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association concurred wholeheartedly with Mr. Hart's remarks.

### IN Lincoln County Cook Book

#### Upside Down Cake

From the kitchen of Mrs. A. W. Windman.

1 tablespoon butter  
 1/4 cup brown sugar  
 1 cup crushed pineapple  
 1/2 cup pecans  
 2 eggs  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1/2 cup sifted flour  
 1/2 teasp. baking powder  
 1/2 teasp. salt  
 2 tablespoons water  
 1/2 teasp. vanilla

Melt butter in pan, add brown sugar, crushed pineapple and a few pecans. Beat egg whites stiff, and egg yolks continue beating. Gradually add 1/2 cup sugar and sifted flour with baking powder and salt. Add water and vanilla. Pour over fruit. Bake in slow oven 325 degrees about 30 minutes.

#### Surprise Sugar Nuts

2 cups sugar  
 1 cup sour cream  
 1/2 teasp. salt  
 2 1/2 cups walnut meats  
 2 teasp. grated lemon rind

In large skillet combine sugar, salt, cream. Mix thoroughly, stirring constantly. Bring to rolling boil; then add nuts and lemon rind, continue stirring for six minutes. Pour on greased baking sheet, or waxed paper. Use forks and separate the nuts for individual bite size pieces.

## Death takes

### Father Markey

Word has been received in the archdiocese of the death, after a long illness, of Father George Markey in his home town of Veurne, Belgium, on March 18.

Funeral services for the well known Southwestern missionary, who retired to Belgium last year, were held March 23, at the parish church of Steinkerke.

Father Markey served both the Diocese of Oklahoma City and Santa Fe, being received in the Archdiocese of Santa Fe in 1937.

Born August 16, 1894, he was educated in Belgium in local schools and completed his theological training at the North American college in Louvain, Belgium, where he was ordained on July 22, 1922. While working in the Oklahoma diocese, Father was pastor of Guymon and Woodward. His first assignment, the Archdiocese of Santa Fe was in Clayton.

Father also served as pastor of Bernalillo, El Rito, and Ruidoso before his assignment, THE LAST before retirement in T. O. C.

Father Markey had been in failing health for some time, but is remembered for his quiet zeal in the duties of the priesthood. Testimony of his devotion to the priesthood is found in his last will, which leaves his only material legacy: an insurance policy made out for the education of seminarians.
