## Question Of Insurance

Where will fire strike next, when will you fall and break your leg, when will your best bull be struck by lightning, when will hail damage your roof, when will that other guy swerve across the road and hit your car . . . not knowing any of these answers is about the best reason why people buy insurance.

Going to see your insurance agent for protection is a personal matter that we recommend — but, when you get there the insurance agent will want to determine the amount of risk involved.

If a person has a record of DWI arrests, chances of getting driver insurance are slim. If a person's property is littered with trash and generally hazardous, the agent will balk at issuing fire insurance. Various codes cover installation of gas lines, electric lines, all for the purpose of cutting down on the insurance risk, and saving people lives.

When insurance will be needed is a question that can't be answered. Getting property in safe shape is something that can be done now.

Carrizozo has an old building, built in 1928, that houses a lot of children. Would you say this building is safe — just because there has not been a fire or an explosion? Would you say the lives of this 100, more or less, youngsters are worth the cost of a building where speedy exit is possible? How much of your money is a life worth?

You can say that you've never had a fire or an explosion — but, there was a bad fire in Roswell last week, a 1,000 or more over a wider area, a life lost in an explosion in Carrizozo not too far back, a trailer came unhitched and lives lost. These things do happen — generally when least expected.

The least that can be done for our children is to eliminate as many hazards as possible from their lives.

## Teaching Tenure

A tenure teacher is one who has taught in a school system for three consecutive years, and who has been awarded a fourth contract. Under such conditions there is a lot of red tape to go through before the teacher can be removed from office.

Considerable difference exists within the teaching association as to the manner and means of applying tenure, which is not the main concern of this writing.

A conclusion reached by this writer a number of years back was that "tenure" for teachers is good. That the evils and ills of tenure — such as teachers slowing down in their work to a point of laxity, losing interest in teaching — are outweighed by the good points resulting from tenure.

There is a three-year period for school administration to determine the qualifications of their teaching staff, and its up to them to select good personnel.

After the tenure law is applied many ways still exist for school administrators to keep their teachers "on the ball" if they will.

The drawbacks to a school system without a tenure law, are all wrapped up in the continuous change of teachers. First-year teachers cannot possibly do the job of teaching that is possible for the teacher who is acquainted with the teaching objectives of the administration. The teacher who is settled and acquainted in a community will do a better job than a (first year) stranger. A teacher who is acquainted with both parents and children, possible in a small town, is qualified to do a better

teaching job than the stranger. Then the matter of security is important. The teacher who feels secure in his or her job is bound to do a better job, than the one who is wondering about next year.

The N. M. Education Association has been meeting resistance in the state legislature, and from voters — because of their dictatorial and grabbing

attitude, mostly deserved. This attitude, on the part of the association, is hurting education in New Mexico.

We need good teachers. It's the job of local administrators to select a satisfactory staff, and it's up to people of New Mexico to see that their teachers have a job worth keeping. Tenure is necessary to this purpose.

ers placed in the individual events held on Saturday. Morrison and Wolf won the two-man team match on Sunday.

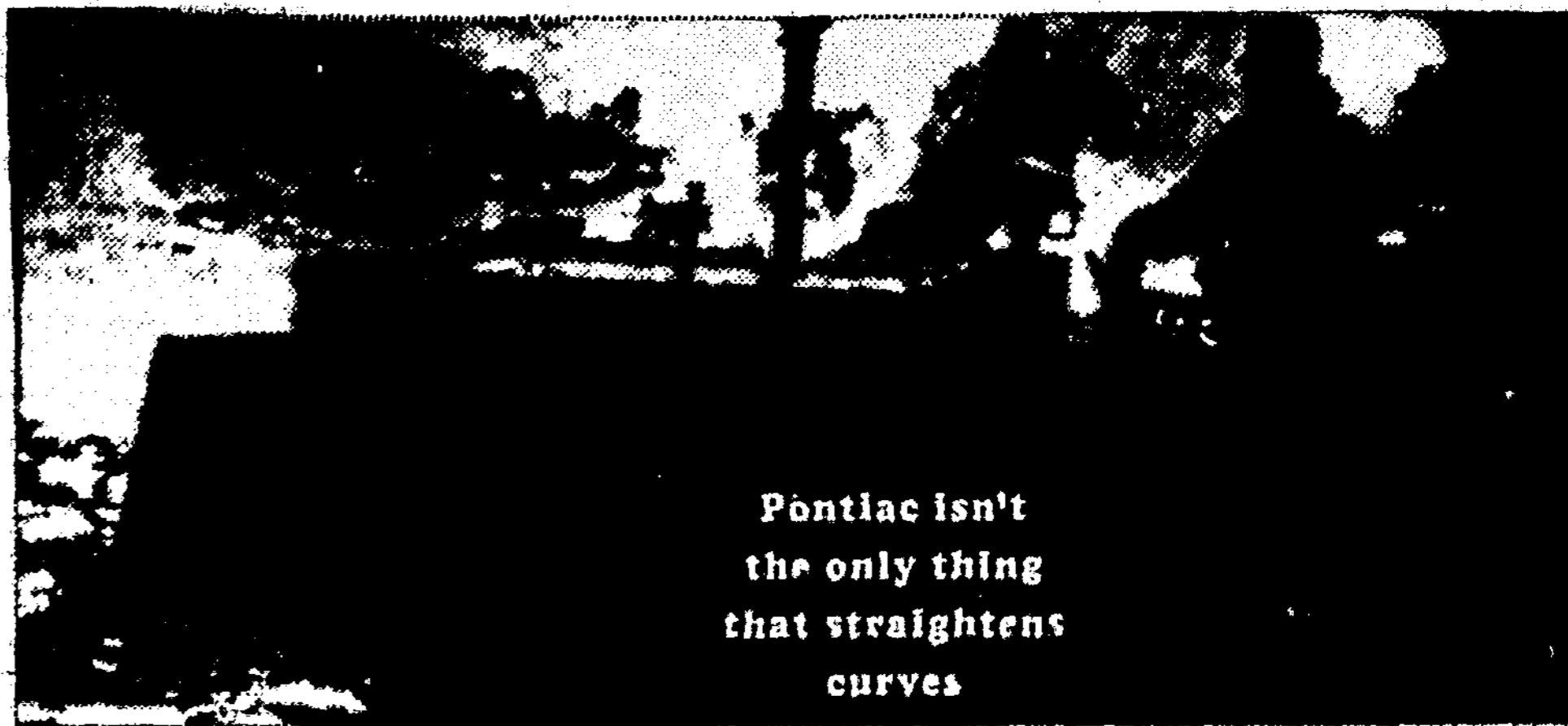
Grady Eldridge says the rifle range east of Capitan will be ready for shooting soon. All of the earth work is complete

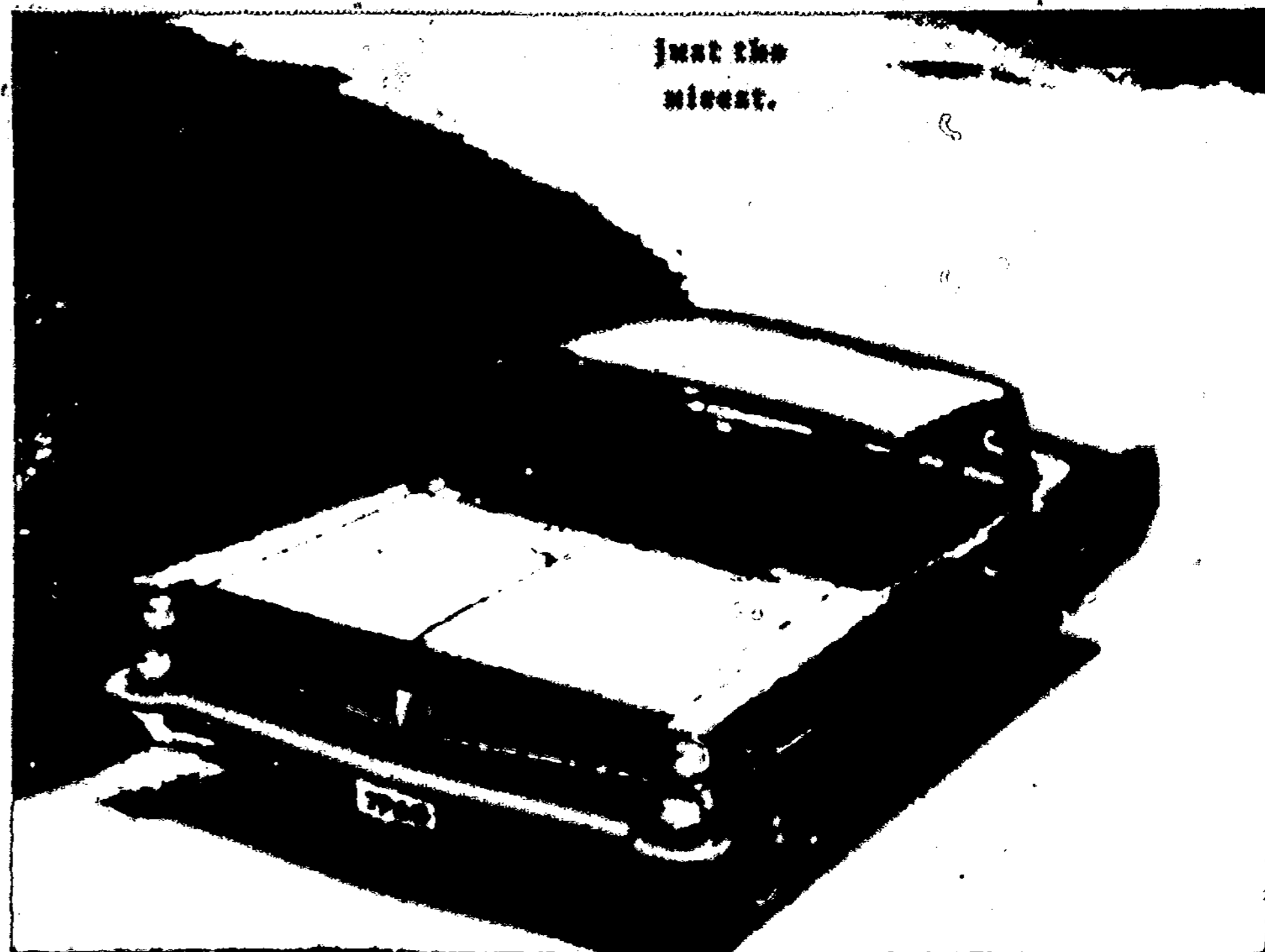

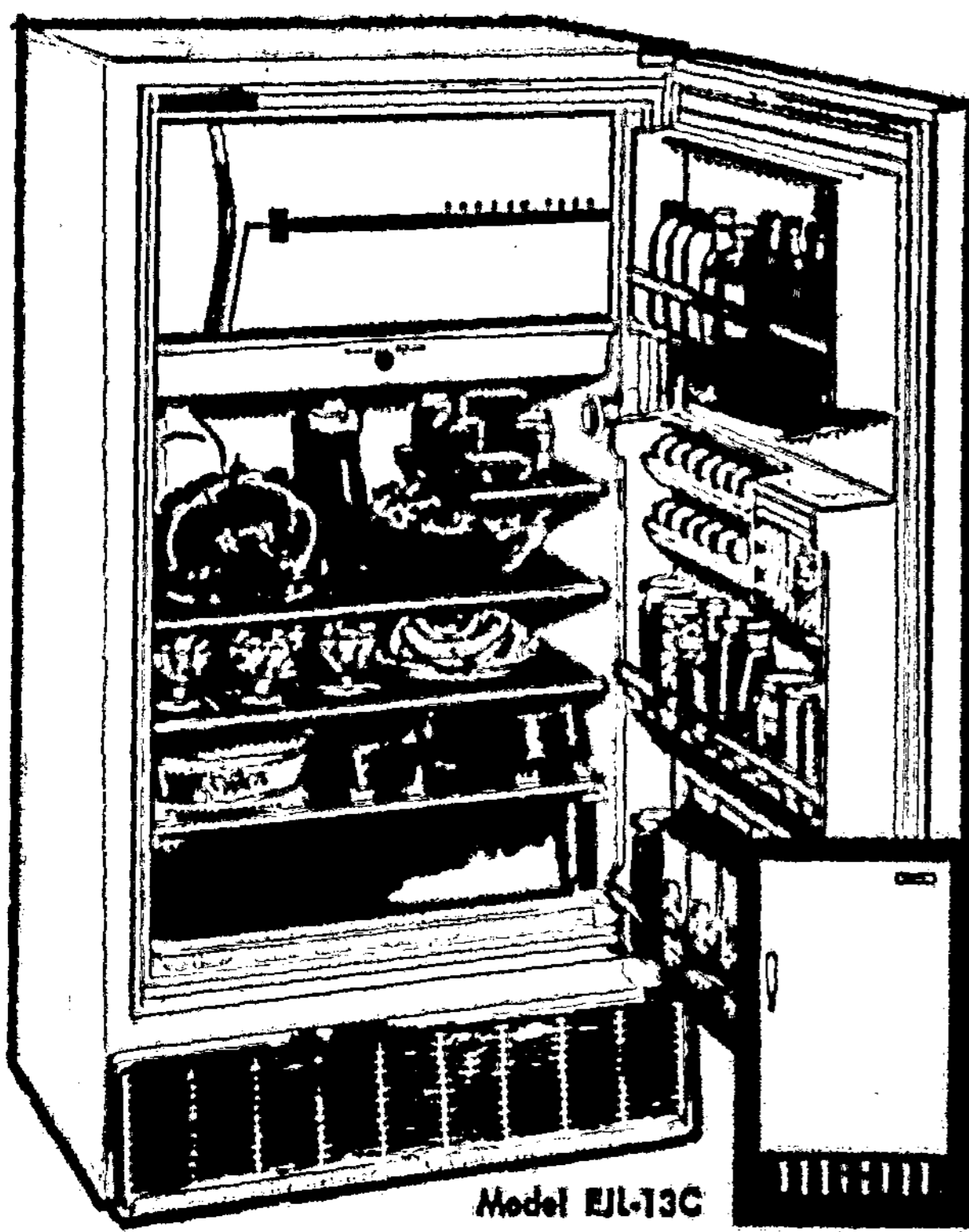

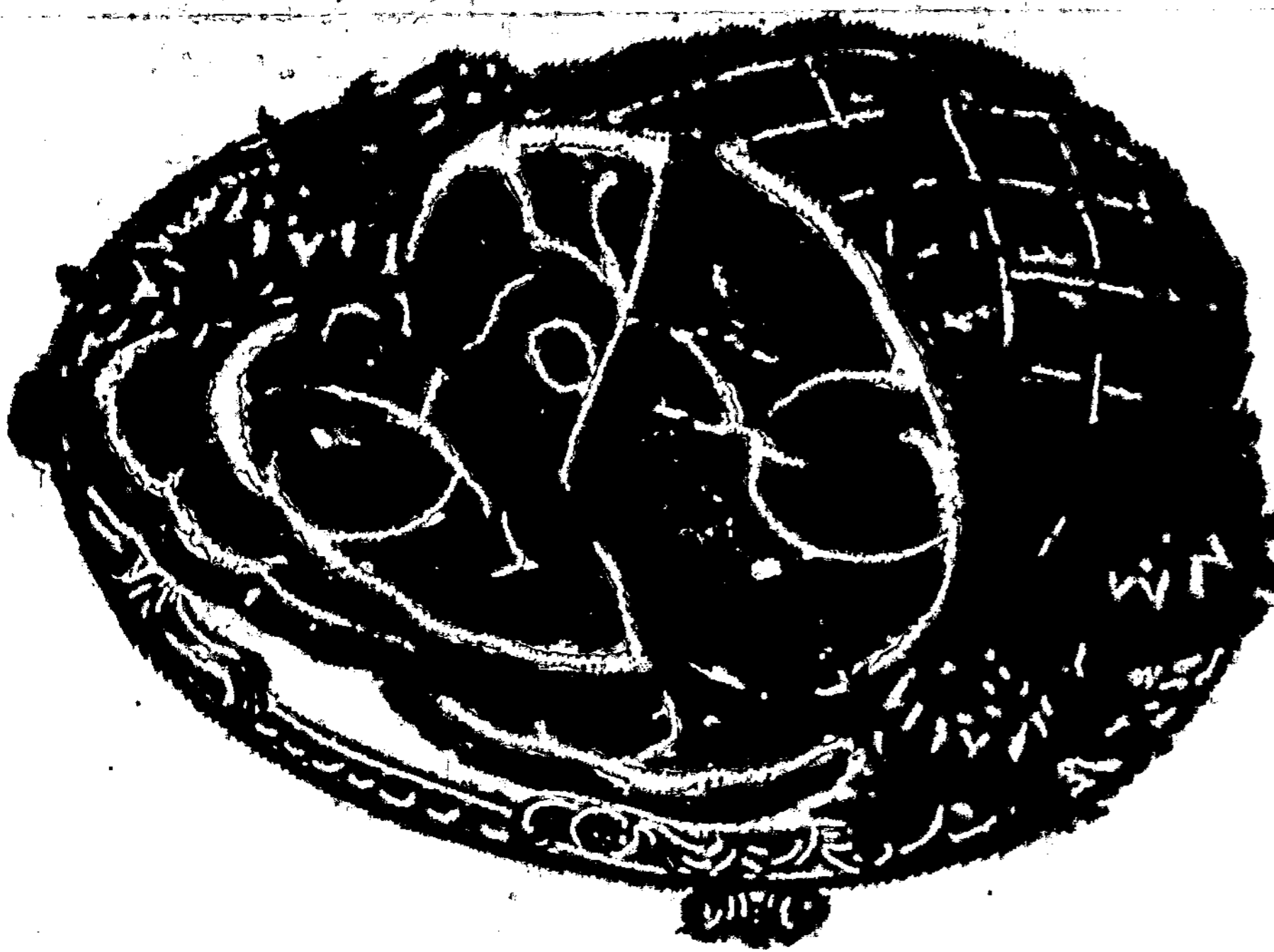

Listen to the Roswell TV Station for the daily fruit-frost forecasts. It will be on the TV Station at noon, 5:00 p.m. and 9:15 p.m. news.

Sheep Scabies quarantine was lifted within the state last Wednesday. Any sheep moving within the state will not have to be dipped. Consult the sheep inspector as to out of state shipments. At present all out of state sheep must be dipped but this can change quickly.

Report any suspected screw-worm cases immediately. Bottles are available at the County Agents office, to send samples for identification. Get the worms from the deepest parts of the wound, as they are most likely to be screwworm larvae.

No screwworms have been reported since January, but they can possibly show up anytime.

It is to your and your neighbors good to report any screwworms early.
