Enjoy one of the most exciting rodeos being staged today as rancher and ranch-hand, space-age cow waddies and cowgirls, greenhorns and other rodeo enthusiasts get together with a bunch of rough and ready stock, fresh from the surrounding range, to offer a rodeo of the Old West, a reminder of those halcyon days when families got together to enjoy one another and whatever entertainment was at hand.

Enjoy a day of real fun as you meet your neighbors in the coolness of the mountains in this historic spot where, at the turn of the century a boisterous, rollicking mining town existed. White Oaks, where Territorial Governor Lou Wallace penned parts of his book "Ben Hur" while he waited to see if Billy the Kid would take advantage of the amnesty offered, where miners from the Yukon and others from Sutters Mill dug gold from the surrounding hills by day and played Monte with cowboys from the Bar Wa the night in the Little Casino at night.

Architects meet with commissioners in planning on a new court house

A regular meeting of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners was held June 6.

Several architects met with the commissioners in regard to doing some preliminary sketches and planning on a new court house in the future.

S. B. Boykins, Ruidoso and F. G. McCrory, Nogal requested road improvements from Parsons City to Nogal Canyon. Most of work would consist of dozer work over mountain road approximately one mile in length. Ramon Nunez made motion with Mr. Kenneth Nosker seconding the motion that this work be done. Unanimously passed to have work on road completed as soon as feasible.

Several residents of Carrizozo met with the commissioners in regard to the paving of Carrizozo streets. Commissioners explained they were not taking sides as it was a municipal project and not county. That if the paving project was passed upon by a majority, the county would pay its share on county property.

Something that needed to be done, more especially right now with the paving district moving along at a rapid pace, was replacing some old water lines in Carrizozo. No one seems to know when these lines were laid, they were underground when the new water system was installed in 1955.

The G&L Construction Co. of Alamogordo is doing the work, putting new lines on D Street, from Highway 54 to 7th; on B Street from 14th to 10th; from B Street to E; from 8th through 8th; from 4th to the Crossroads Motel on Central.

There will be 5,250 linear feet of 6-inch asbestos, 2,170 feet of 4-inch asbestos pipe, 7 fire hydrants and numerous fittings installed on this project.

The work is in progress this week.

High in the center of Lincoln National Forest the home of Smokey the Bear annually entertains several thousand people for two days of top rodeo events, one of the biggest free barbecues in southern New Mexico, selection of a queen to represent Lincoln County at the state fair, a parade, dance, and just plain visiting to round out the program.

This event is the 5th annual Smokey Bear Stampede and rodeo held at Capitan, on July 3 and 4.

Work Day Friday

A good many ranchers, business men and people from around Capitan will gather Friday to give the Lincoln County Fair and Rodeo Grounds a general repair and overhaul. Quite a lot of painting will be done, work started on a new set of bleachers, and cleanup of the premises started. More work is laid out than can be done this day... but there will be another. Come out and help get ready for the biggest Stampede of all.

The Stampede gets under way with the queen contest in the rodeo arena at 7:00 p.m. under lights. As many as a dozen of Lincoln County's most beautiful and talented young ladies are expected to contest for the queen's crown which will be worn during the Lincoln County Fair September 6-7 and again as a contestant for the title of state fair queen.

The first round of rodeo events takes place Wednesday evening, July 3, following the queen contest. Ratjen Bros., of Happy, Texas, are the rodeo producers. They bring a string of rodeo stock used in the best rodeos all over the Texas Panhandle.

The Smokey Bear Stampede adds \$75 to the bareback bronc riding event, and \$50 to each of the other events on the program which includes calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, bull riding, and ladies barrel race. This makes a nice pot for the cowboys and cowgirls, and also brings in the best rodeo hands from a wide area.

The Aggie Ramblers, one of the southwest's most popular dance bands, will play for dancing both nights, July 3-4.

Thursday, July 4, is the big day starting with a parade in downtown Capitan at 10:30. About the time the parade, expected to have more entries than ever this year, comes to a halt the barbecue meat will be coming out of the pits to feed rodeo contestants, tourists, county visitors and friends of Smokey from a great many states in the United States.

The July 4 afternoon rodeo starts at 2:00 with a complete run of events. There will be a calf scramble for boys and girls, 12 and under, both days. The rodeo finals will be held Thursday night when cowboys will be "going for broke" to win the jackpot and added money.

Rodeo headquarters are in the Capitan City Hall, Walter Jones, secretary. The altitude at Capitan is around 6,500 feet and cool enough you'll want jacket when the sun starts dropping down behind the mountains.

Corona board of education sets up new bus transportation routing

The Corona Board of Education used its regular June meeting to attempt to set up the transportation system for the 1963-64 school year. The school attempted to keep a bus in each large section of the district.

Upon recommendation of the State Department of Transportation, three bus routes have been discontinued for the coming year. This reduces the number of buses used in the Corona School System to nine.

The Leonard Hobbs route was combined with the Robinson and Lackey routes. L. K. Merritt's route is to be combined with the McCloud and Gallo routes. The two buses coming from the Claunch area have been reduced to one 16-passenger bus which will be operated by Alton Talley.

According to Fire Chief, Kenneth Means, a lit cigarette was probably the cause of a small fire on the south-east corner of the Old Train Depot on Thursday night.

Little damage was done to the building, which is in the process of being torn down.

Ruidoso fuels on new airport fence

A dispute between the city of Ruidoso and a flying service erupted into a court battle Saturday.

Ralph Brown, owner of the Brown Air Service, obtained a temporary injunction against the city preventing a wire fence from being erected around his property.

The injunction, signed by Dist. Court Judge W. T. Scoggins of Las Cruces, was served on Ruidoso Mayor Warren Tucker. A section of the three-foot high fence was taken down after the injunction was served.

A hearing before Scoggins has been set for 10 a.m. June 24 in Carrizozo on whether the injunction should be made permanent or dismissed.

Mayor Tucker said the fence was put up by the city council to get Brown in a motion to pay some taxes.

The fence would have prevented Brown from entering the new \$500,000 airport without city permission.

All of these moves were carried out as recommended by the Transportation Director, J. T. Reese, who was represented at the meeting by his staff member, Carl Wittmore. The exact routing of the nine buses is not fully completed, but when it is, all parents will receive a letter from the school stating the bus schedule for the 1963-64 school term.

Two new teachers moving in soon are Harold Fields, industrial arts, and Mrs. Wanda Riley who will teach English and girls' physical education. The school still has need for a second and fifth grade teacher; and in the high school, vacancies exist for social studies and math teachers. At present, 12 of the regular 14 employees are under contract.

Billy the Kid shoot down August 3

The annual Lincoln County Fastdraw Contest will be held August 3, at Old Lincoln Town, N. M., where shooters from several states will show their skill to win the special "Billy the Kid" trophy, the only one of its kind made by a New Mexico artist.

The Fastdraw contest will be a part of the Billy the Kid pageant days August 3 and 4 at Old Lincoln Town. The Fast-

draw Contest will start early Saturday morning and run all day. The first showing of the pageant will be that evening.

Sunday is "Old Tinsers Day" in Lincoln, a day when most of the old timers of the area get together for some old-time fiddling, folk dancing, square dancing, and other special features arranged by the Old Lincoln Memorial Commission, sponsor of the pageant. The second showing of "The Last Escape of

"Billy the Kid" will be given Sunday night at the pageant grounds in Lincoln.

The 1963 Fastdraw contest was won by a Texas, C. E. Hook of Brownfield who won the standing reaction-walk and draw wax shoot both days and took home the Billy the Kid trophy made by Pat Smith of Corrales, N. M.

Fast Draw artists from Texas, Arizona, California, Colorado, Illinois, Nevada, New Mexico,

entered the 1962 contest. The firing times were as good as any recorded in the nation that year.

There will be both standing reaction, walk and draw shoots and sudden death walk down during the one day contest with the special shootout for the Billy the Kid trophy as the last event on the day's program.

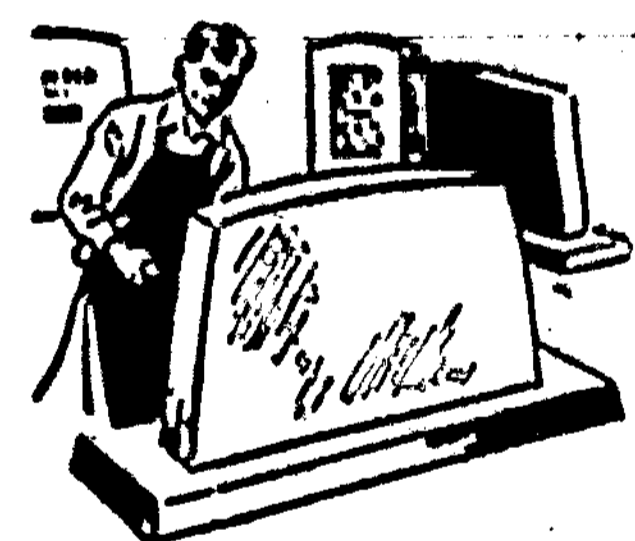
Armstrong - Farrus wedding vows said

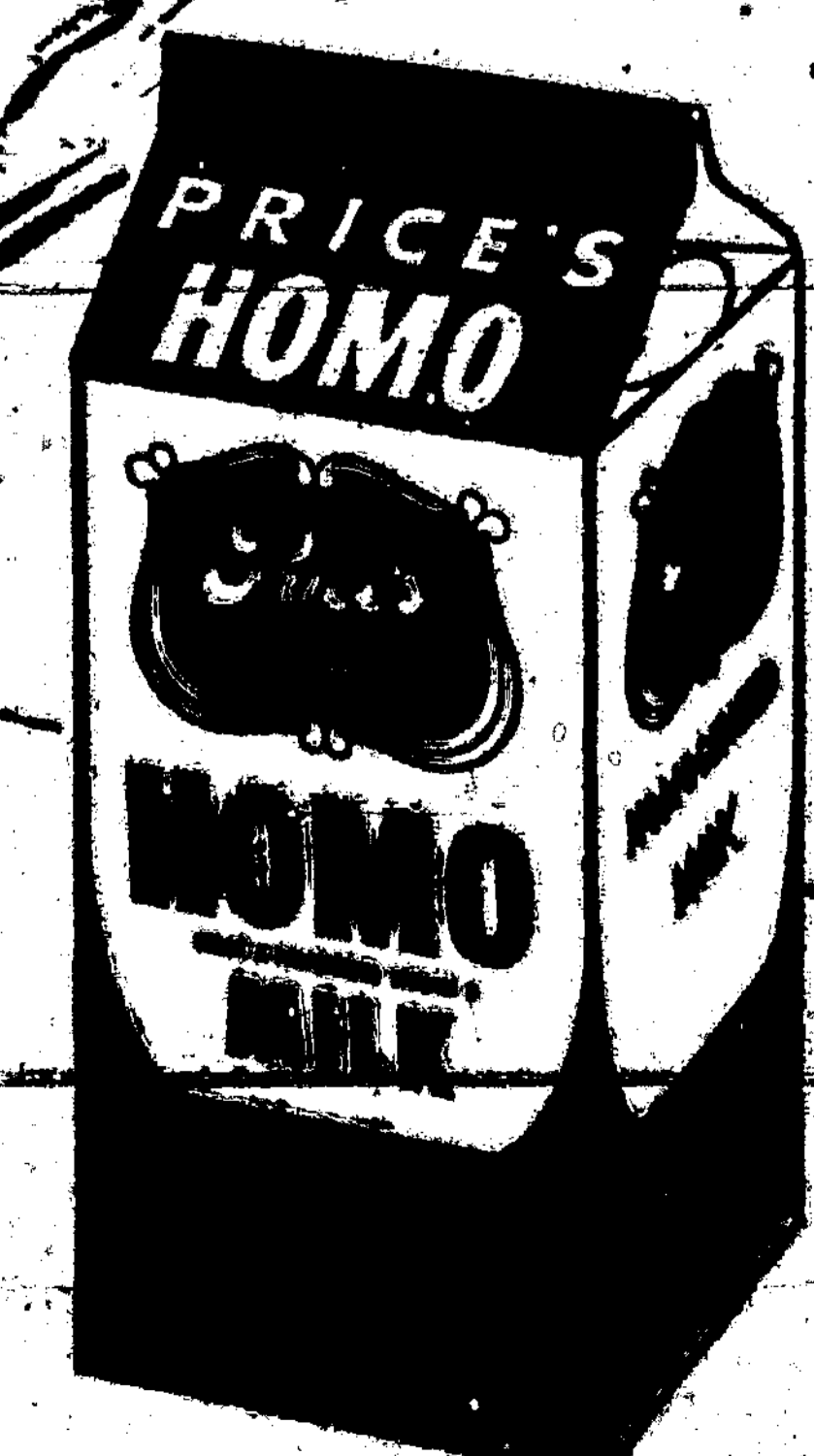

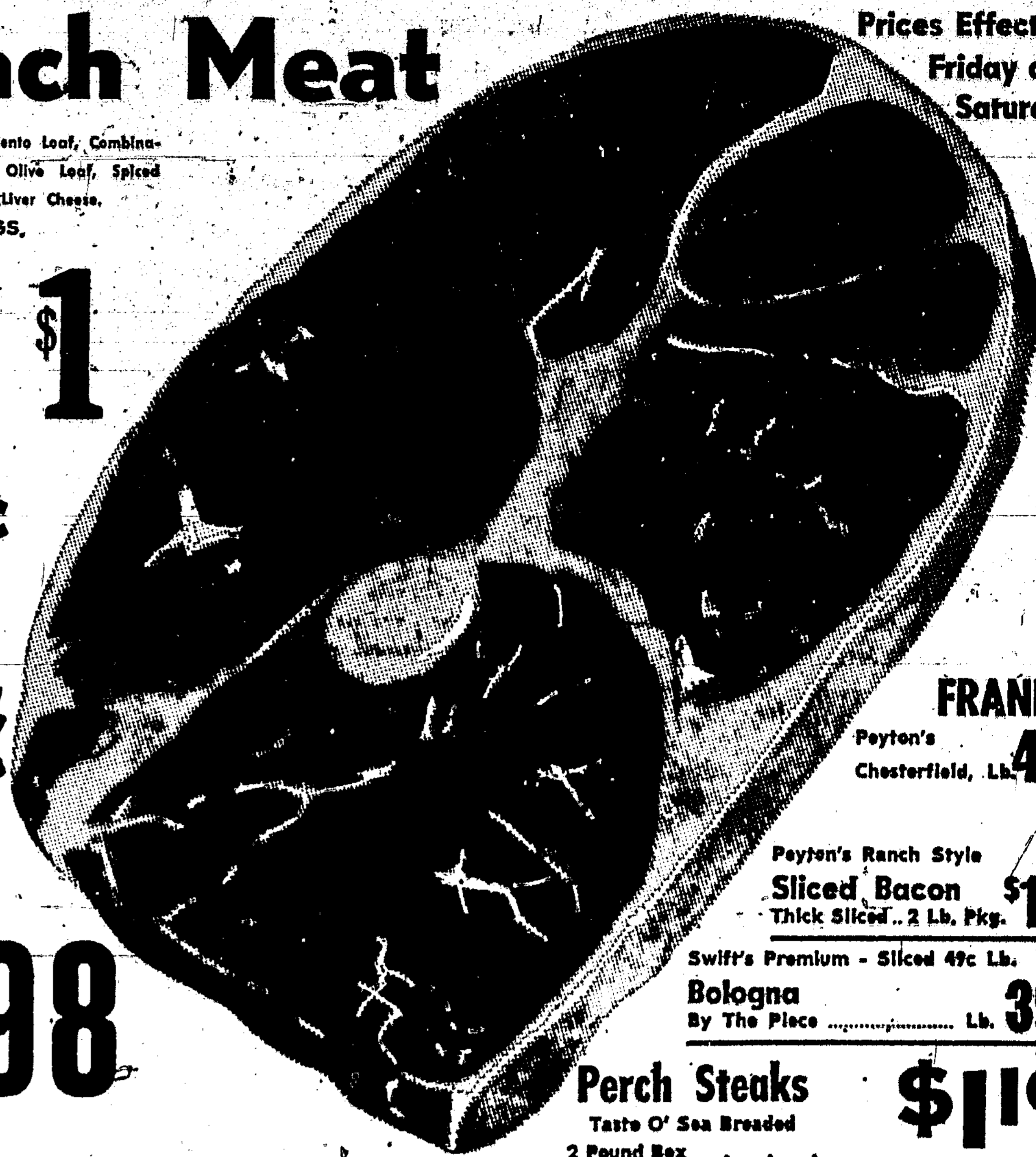

SHARP RISE REPORTED IN SCREWORM INFECTIONS
A sharp rise in the number of screwworm infestations has occurred recently in the southern half of New Mexico.

A report compiled by the Animal Disease Eradication Division of the United States Department of Agriculture in Albuquerque lists 60 confirmed cases for the week of May 20-24, by far the highest number of the year.

Counties involved are Catron, Dona Ana, Eddy, Grant, Hidalgo, Lincoln, Luna, Otero, Chaves, Sierra, and Socorro. This news is both good and bad. It is unfortunate that this troublesome and costly livestock pest is still prevalent. However, the fact that livestock producers recognize the importance of the eradication program and are cooperating by sending in samples is very encouraging. This is the most important step in the campaign to stamp out the screwworm in the Southwest region.

Livestock men are urged to obtain addressed sample bottles from their county agent's office, in Carrizozo, so that they will be prepared to send in eggs or maggots at once for identification.

Ranchers should be sure to complete the questionnaire on the bottles, and making sure to give the location of the suspected case by township, range and section — a ranch headquarters may be many miles from the location of the outbreak.

Planes will probably be dropping sterile flies over infested spots within 24 hours after a case has been confirmed. Animal Disease Eradication workers will also contact the producer and offer to spray all of his livestock in a 10-mile radius of the spot. There are no charges for these services.

Livestock producers and organizations, sportsmen's groups and the agricultural press were instrumental in starting the screwworm eradication program in the Southwest last year, following the complete success of a similar campaign to wipe out the costly pest in the southeastern U. S.

Half the money for the 12-million dollar project was contributed by these private groups.

B. E. Lawson receives N. S. F. scholarship

Mr. Basil E. Lawson, teacher in Carrizozo High School has received a National Science Foundation Scholarship to study advanced mathematics at Carleton College, Northfield, Minn. This course is being offered from June 24 to August 2.

These scholarships are made available only to instructors who are outstanding and have a high rating of excellence in their profession.

Mr. Lawson and his family are leaving here on June 5, and will visit relatives and friends in Oklahoma and Missouri enroute.

No fires allowed in Lincoln Forest

Because of tinder dry conditions all land within the Lincoln National Forest, except in the Guadalupe Mountains, has been closed to smoking and camp fires, except in especially designated areas.

The closure went into effect at 8:00 a.m. June 7, under orders from the acting regional forester at Albuquerque. A resolution from Albuquerque was delivered to the US Forest Service June 6 setting forth the closure under regulations made by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman.

It was explained that the Guadalupe Mountain district had not been closed because that section had received adequate rainfall.

Campers will be prohibited from smoking while traveling through the forest on foot. Smoking will be permitted while traveling through on paved or surfaced highways, places of habitation, and in designated and posted forest camps and posted camping areas. Camp fires are not permitted except in designated and posted camp grounds and posted camping areas except with a permit issued by a forest officer with authority to issue the same.

Not included
A camp fire does not include any cooking or heating device consuming kerosene, gasoline or gas, provided such device meets the fire underwriters specifications for safety. Charcoal broilers, wood and coal stoves are strictly prohibited by the order.

While the Tularosa Basin has been having an extremely dry year, so has the mountainous area only a few miles away. This is unusual in that showers are frequent in the higher elevations when arid conditions prevail in the basin.

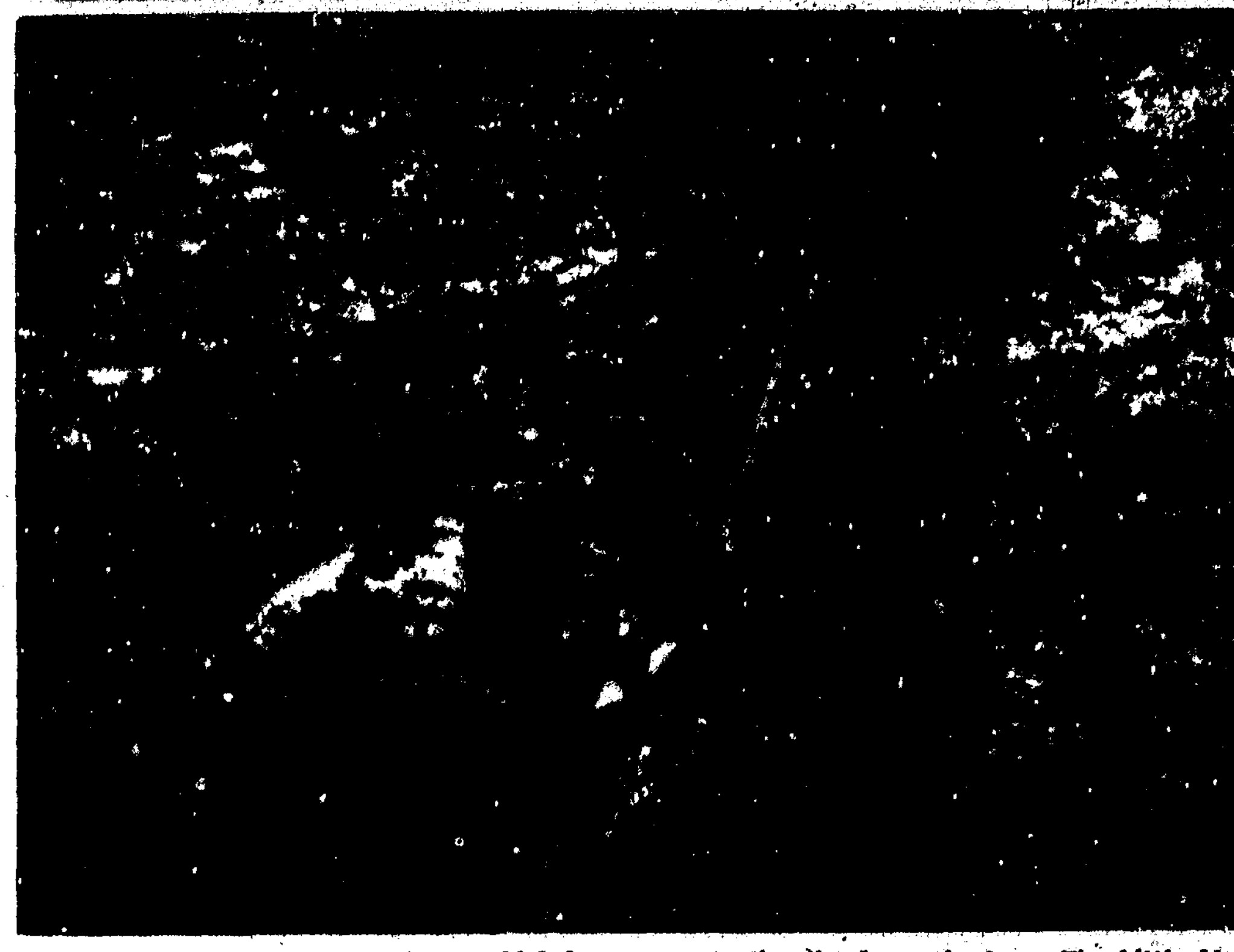

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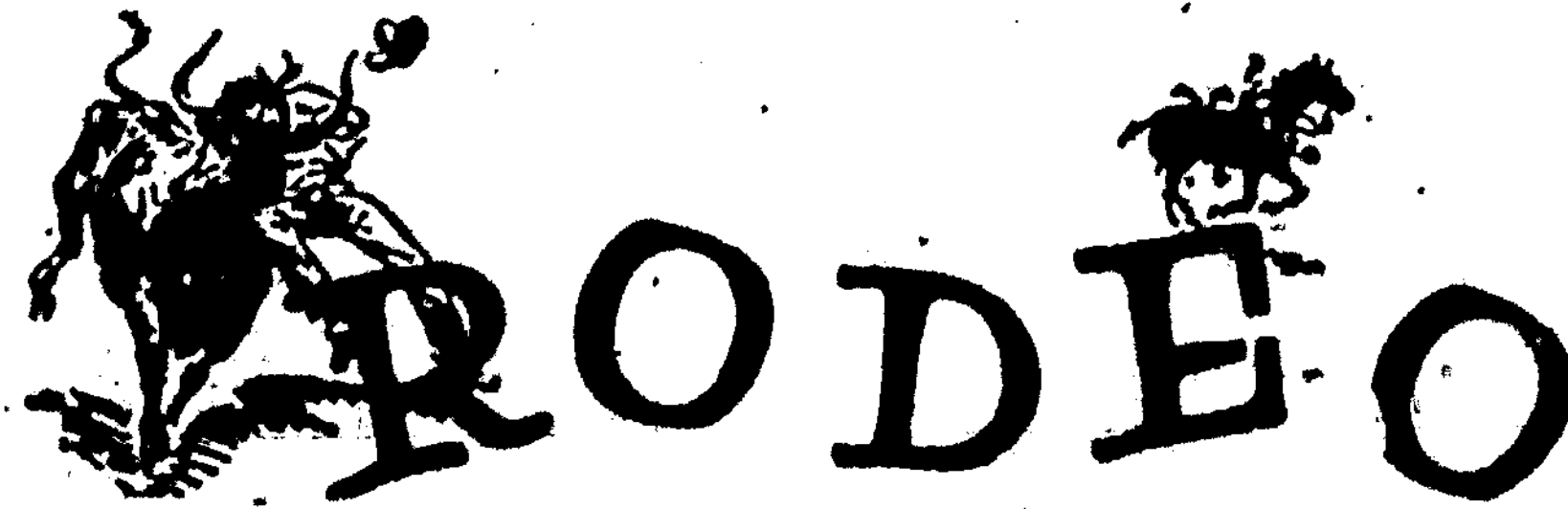

\$2,000 SPREAD IN TEACHERS PAY

SANTA FE — There's a \$2,000 spread in classroom teachers pay under the new formula of distributing state school money.

The 16 teachers at Roy are on new contracts that give them average pay of \$4,500 a year, lowest in the state.

Jai and Eunice of Lea county, among the highest paying districts in the state have an average of \$6,655.

RICH GET RICHER IN NEW SYSTEM

The new method of dividing state school money, worked out by Sen. Al Green, of Farmington, was intended to help the poor schools and hold the line on the rich ones but didn't come out like that in all cases.

Gallup, loaded with Indian dough, advanced from average classroom teacher pay of \$6,073 to \$6,569 for the term that starts in September. That was while Roy was held to an advance of \$146.

NEW AVERAGE NEAR \$6,100

Here are some of the new averages reported by School Finance office Harry Wugalter:

The state average for the next school year will be around \$6,100 a year which is pretty good for the teacher's 180-day work-year.

BOLACK AND MECHEM UNDER ARMISTICE

Republican Tom Bolack is still dodging questions on whether he is running for governor but is writing so many letters and making so many speeches that there is not much doubt that he is a candidate. Valencia Republicans endorsed him for the nomination.

Bolack and Sen. Ed Mechem have apparently consented to tolerate each other for the duration of the 1964 campaign for the good of the grand old party. They've been in a couple of huddles.

It could result in two campaign funds and two organizations with Mechem and Bolack running, politely but independently.

LACK OF DOUGH HURTING FAB

State Sen. Fabian Chavez of Santa Fe has been getting more favorable publicity from his liquor reform efforts and justice of the peace program than any other figure in the state government but hasn't gotten off the starting line in his hope for Demo nomination for Congress.

Chavez whose name has become familiar all across the state is rated far behind Land Commissioner Johnny Walker, Lt. Gov. Mack Esley, State Demo Chairman Calvin Horn, as a prospect for Congress mostly because he doesn't have the kind of campaign money the others can raise.

NEED MUCH MONEY FOR JOE'S PLACE

With U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya stepping out to shoot for the Senate against Mechem he will leave an opening that is likely to cost the Demo winner \$60,000 to \$100,000.

Walker and Esley could probably raise such dough, Horn has it in his checking account, but Chavez isn't likely to raise such a kitty.

Chavez is the only Spanish-American prospect for the place that has been held by Tony Fernandez and Montoya for 31 years. New Mexico has had one Spanish-American in the House since the state was given two members after the 1850 census.

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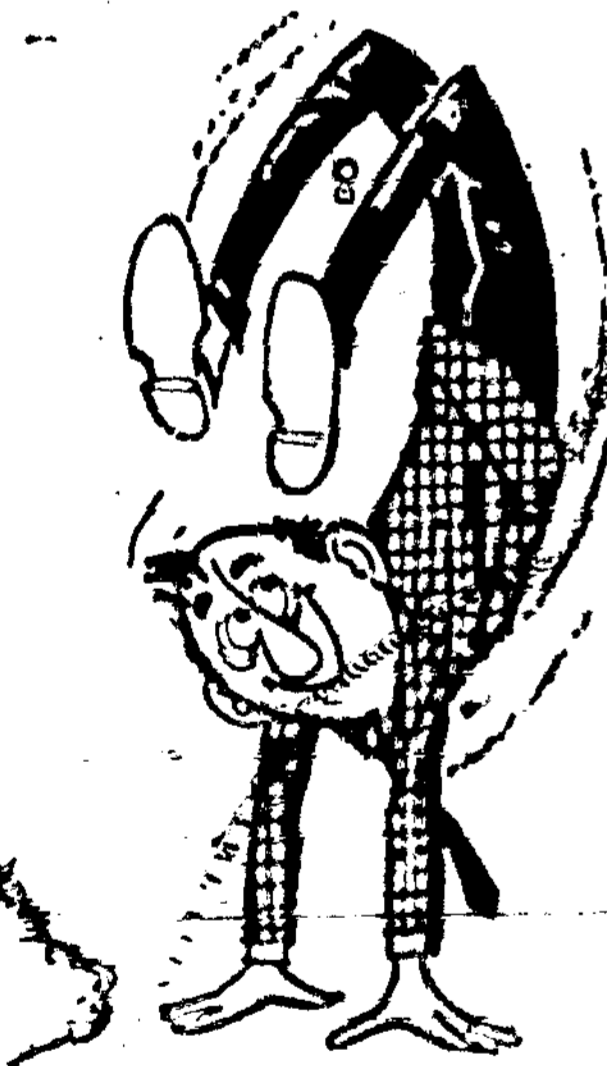
