Little Real Estate Loan Officers and Robert O. Marshall, Operating Loan Officer, together with Area Supervisors Gilbert McAlister of Albuquerque, William Coinman of Roswell and George Smith of Tucumcari will also attend.

The Farmers Home Administration has recently lounched new programs almed at developing income producing recreational facilities on farms, financing special housing for senior citizens in rural areas and various shifts in land use into grazing, forestry and recrea-

Programs to help develop inadequate farms into family farms, assist young farmers in becoming established in agriculture and enable farmers handleapped by age and physical disabilities to improve their farm incomes have also been expanded.

Five communities have recently been assisted in improving their water systems with loans amounting to \$568,000.

During the past three years the agency's lending activities in New Mexico have more than doubled. Over \$55,000,000 has been loaned to farmers, rural residents and communities in the last ten years.

Collections on all accounts have kept pace with the increase in loans. Payments on interest have far exceeded the cost of administering the program. Money loaned through the agency's credit programs supplement credit provided by other lenders through close cooperation with all commercial and cooperative sources of cer-

The agency also works in close cooperation with other agencies of the Department of Axriculture in administering the Rural Areas Development programs throughout the state. Through their network of 18 county offices throughout New Mexico this credit and financial management assistance program provides services to all rural areas of the state.



There it is on the counter, a heart-gripping picture of a kid in a whelchair and the big colored letters that say "give." Do you drop your loose change in the slot at the top? Of course, we all have; giving to aid the children in the wheelchair er any one of many who seek funds in this way. Ever stop to think where the money goes? No, very few would . . .

it's accepted at face value. True Magazine carried an article by Ralph Lee Smith entitled "Stop the Canshakers" Shakedown!" and in this article he stripped bare the abuse of money that is donated to charity. Here's some examples as cited by Smith: "From 1948 to 1953 National Kids' Day Foundation raised \$4 million in public contributions, spent \$3.2 million of it for FUND RAISING, then went quietly out of existence without giving a nickle to underprivileged kids." Now try this one for size: According to the True article in 1958, the Disabled Amorican Veterans staffed 450 persons in its national office - about 150 worked on problems involving veterans, and 300 were paid to work

on FUND RAISING. Charity is big business - a bandwagon that a con-man. with a Madison Avenue touch, can ride down main street in broad daylight and never be questioned. He fleeces the public (that's us) and we never dare to raise our voices for fear of being branded as archfoes of the poor youngster who graces the charity display even though he may never re-

reive a penny of the proceeds. But that is not all, Have you heard of the National Foundation, the nation's largest voluntary health agency. This organization, according to Smith's article, REFUSES full financial information, not only to the public, but reputable reporting groups such as the nation's Better Business Bureaus. The man who leads this foundation draws no salary but in a recent year he supposedly turned in an expense account for \$71,000 which the Foundation paid.

Its obvious that there needs to be some ethical standard evolved before laws must be passed to limit the activities:





A strange sort of bird is McGaw

Bill McGaw, editor of the Southwesterner, a historical document published weekly at Columbus, N. M., wrote a loudmouthed bunch of crap which pleased souhtwesterners of a certain type . . . those whose views are narrowed through ignorance of our constitutional rights and who seek to run this nation with one-party rule because their thinking is not broad enough to accept opinions other than their own.

This piece of writing came as a surprise to the News editor because it is written in fine style. And, except for completely ignoring the precepts of free speech in America as well as using a pin-headed view point, the editorial, "Patriotism is as Patriotism Does", rates high. The surprise came because Bill McGaw has made a good thing of the Southwesterner as a purveyor of the many fables of the southwest - how could he miss with the exciting background of this territory. Bill does miss in this respect - he doesn't' publish a newspaper for today, Bill McGaw is still rubbing the fur off his belly against the Gold Nugget bar that closed up shop the day after Billy the Kid was shot dead.

In this writing McGaw censors the New Mexico Press Association, its editors, printers, reporters, photographers, other news media, ad men, any one connected with having a representative of the John Birch society speak at the recent Press Convention held in Silver City, Just having this man on the scene was the crime - the text of the speech is unimportant to Bill because he didn't hear it . . . repeat, he didn't hear it . . . Bill is galled between his cars because most of New Mexico editors are man enough to hear the accused before custing a verdict. In the realm of McGaw's day-to-day activites things aren't done that way. You shoot off your mouth first, then maybe find out if there is any truth in what you sald . . . in McGdw's case, maybe not.

For the benefit of Lincoln County readers — here are just a few of the filings a good newspaper should strive for.

The newspaper should put forth its best efforts to print the truth in all news situations. It sliculd strive for completeness and objectivity, guard against careleamens, blas or distortion.

A newspaper is responsible for the selection of news on the basis of its significance, interest and genuine usefulness to the public News affecting public mornts should be edited with good taste in mind, The newspaper must uphold the constitutional rights of free speech, respect rights of privacy and serve the public by helping to protect all rights and privileges guntanteed by low.

A newspaper should practice humility and tolerance in all relations with the public and news cources, and respect honest conflicting opinions or disagreement.

We believe a newspaper should vigorously support publie officials, private groups and individuals who are doing good work for the good of the community, state and nation.

the place of radical elements in American history. With great frequency the nation has profited from elements going against the tide of public sentiment.

Here are some of McGaw's choice paragraphs used to close his arguments: "But, by God! I don't have to pave their way into my country with palms and sit at their stinking feet while they instruct me in sedition." (Definition of redition Excitement of discontent against the government). The News staff gets both excited and discontented while filling out the several required tax forms each quarter.

Birchites would do away with all foreign aid. Says Bill, "Amen! say the Communists: this makes the Commie job of international conversion easier, for hungry and proverty-stricken people are their dupes." Payton says, the great majority of New Mexico editors (majority are Democrats), even after hearing the John Birch talk, would not do away with all foreign ald, but by the Lord in Heaven we surely hope they favor cuting this immense appropriation back to a level the American people can afford. Bill can't buy freinds, neither can Payton, nor can any agency of government buy friends.

Birchites would drastically reduce, or do away with complotely, our tax system, Says-McGaw, "Amen! scream the Communists for the concomitant of this is the destruction of our army, navy and airforce. the dismantling of our rocket and space programs and the total destruction of our physical defenses." We think we know New Mexico editors, most of them on a first name basis, well enough to know that they don't want the complete elimination of our tax structure . . . just the elimination of the terrible burden of bureaucracy that has continued to grow for decades to the point that personal freedom is seriousy jeopardized,

McGaw says, What the hellis the matter with the newspaper editors in this state? Thomus Paine wrote "Crisis" in 1776, in which he declared, "These are the times that try men's zouls." Our Crisis today is greater. Are the editors of our State blind? Have they no couls? Are they not men? The News editor speaking, Now Mexico does not liavo a largo proportion of fire-breathing editors facing a national crisis but its proportion of good editors is as large as that of any other state where local problems separate the men from the boys. Wo're thankful that integration is not a problem for New Mexico because neither legislation or editorials are going to solve this tough mut — a continued effort in the right direction and time, much time, will do tho job. New Mexico does not have the problem of state deficit to equal many states, nor unemployment, nor slum conditions that rouse editors in other states. Fact is, things have been go, go, go in this state for years. The problems of this state most, ly surround a growing territory and they are handled without local editors standing their hair on end.

The number one problem for all Americans is "bigness of government" which will not be whipped entirely by editorials, probably not even dented. It can be whipped by sending representatives and cenators to Washington who want to give back to the people their voice in novernment. A man has got to he able to laugh and smile occasionally when working in the editorial department of any newspaper in the state . . . because. If he tries to carry the worries of the world on his shoulders all the time he'll soon

be no good as an editor. The New Mexico Press Association has heard a great variety of speakers over the years. In January 1963 Max Thomas, publisher from Kerrville, Texas: Hodding Carter III, editor from Greenville, Mississippl. Also on the speaking program with John Rouselot of California at the 1963 aummer meeting were Bill Hooten, El Paso editor, and Elmer Brown, president of International Typographical Union.

McGaw says he doesn't want to harbor Birchites, Communists or any other half-baked radicals fanatics and aeditionists, or any other newtangled association or society which might come up in the future with the basic aim to undernine what I hold dear. The founders of this democracy were not such mentil men. They could forsee that all kinds of people would be living in the United States, that no one church, no one school, no one government could ault all these people, So ... we bare a wonderful document. called the Constitution of the United States, which allows the

select freedoms to all people

regardless of faith, creed, or color - and McGaw should be thankful, because it allows him to shoot off his big mouth, even though he is as wrong as any of the radicals not allowed in his harbor.

Bill McGaw is a strange sort of bird. He sticks his posterior in the sands of Luna County where it serves as a repository. for his head to protect the hair on his pate, each hair desperately needed while he butts his head against as honest and hard working bunch of editors as can be found in any state.



By County Agent Reigh Duniap Loan Lamb is Popular with Las Cruces Shoppers

Selling retail cuts from meatier, less over-finished carcasses has caused lamb purchases to jump 750 per cent in the past year at a large supermarket in Las Cruces, Dr. Earl Ray, meats specialist with the agricultural experiment station, New Mexico State university,

says the new type of carcass yields a high percentage of meat with less trimmable fat. Until the supermarket began the cooperative project with New Mexico State university. its meat counter averaged only two carcasses a week in retail . sales. Now the demand for lamb has increased to 15 car-

casses a week. "We can't get enough of this lean lamb to meet our customers demand throughout the year," says Bill Harrison, market manager of the Furr's Supermarket No. 3 in Las

Cruces.

The whole project started when Dr. Ray attempted to find a market for 265 ram-andwether range lambs which had been used in a study of feedlot performance. The ram lambs yielded the most desirable carcass (less trimmable fat and more lean meat) because of their faster gaining ability in the feedlot. The carcasses ranged in weight from 40 to 50

pounds. At first, the New Mexico State university meats laboratory tried to sell the carcasses to local customers and public schools, but there wasn't enough demand. Then Furr's volunteered. Since then, lean lamb has been very popular with Las Cruces customers.

Dr. Ray attributes the success of the lamb sales to (1) lean carcasses which result in retail cuts that needed little trimming, (2) young, tender, juicy cuts. (3) appealing packaging by the supermarket, (4) fresh supply of lamb, and (5) retailed cuts were all trimmed to 1/8th of an inch, which the customer evidently liked very well.

'The type of carcass that seems to be of highest merit is one that is eyoung, heavy-but not fat-meaty, and not overfinished," Dr. Ray says, "Most of the heavy carcasses on the market are heavy because of too much fat and not enough lean, salable meat after the fat is removed.

taken place at an ever-increasing rate, official statistics show. During the century ended in 1940, the average farm worker supplied products for an additional person each 27 years. During the 1940's, a consumer was added each two-year period. Since 1950, there has been more than an additional consumer yearly.

Most consumers of our farm products are residents of this country. But, in 1962, about 14% of our agricutural production went to citizens of foreign countries, Only 10 percent of the agricultural products used by us here in the United States were imported - chiefly from the tropics,

Crop production is now 70 percent higher per acre than it was in 1920, output per breeding animal is 90 percent greater. and one hour of farm labor produces more than four times-_ as much as it did then.

Some fall contracts for calves are being made with prices generally the same as last year. Choice calves are selling for \$25.00 to \$27.00 for heifers and \$27.00 to \$30.00 for steers. The calves are expected to weigh around 400 to 450 pounds.

USDA SPEEDS RESEARCH

ON WASHABLE WOOLENS Research to improve new machine-washable fabrics is being speeded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The Department is now promoting research designed to produce all-wool, light weight fabrics having improved wrinkle resistance and ability to recover from wrinkling. These qualities would enable machinewashable woolens to compete better in the apparel market with fabrics of wool-synthetic blends.

The USDA WURLAN process to make woolens washable is already undergoing large-scale dustry.

development by the textile in-Essentially, the process consists of running wool fabric

through two consecutive chemical dips that react on the wool fiber surface, depositing minute amounts of resin. This resin controls shrinkage during machine washing and reduces mussiness without loss of wool's good qualities.
