The fair opens at 8:00 a.m. Friday, September 6 when all junior home economics, horticulture, flower exhibits, range and open class livestock must be on display with a deadline of 9:00 and 9:30 a.m., see rules for details.

Friday's program calls for judging livestock, home economics, flower show, horticulture exhibits, roping and riding events.

On Saturday starting at 8:00 a.m. is the quarter horse show, range beef cattle judging, range sheep judging, and parade, at 10:30 a.m. The parade is expected to start right on schedule this year.

Riding and roping events start at 1:30 Saturday with trophy and award winners for the fair announced at 3:00 p.m.

# Paving equipment ready to work

Marshal Wylie of Wylie-Brothers Construction, and Alan Wylie, superintendent of the Carrizozo paving job, met with the Town Council Tuesday night and said they would be in business grading this week and expected to start pouring concrete by Monday. The concrete batching plant was expected in Wednesday and will be set up immediately.

The first paving work will start around "D" Street and on connecting street.

Special requests from property owners for paving lots, driveways and such should be given to Charley O'Mara of Mann Engineering, or the request left at city hall for Mr. O'Mara.

The main problem confronting the Town as the paving project

gets under way is lower several blocks of water lines which will be too close to the surface after grade work.

The Board of Trustees will meet to hear and consider objections to the assessment roll by property owners on Wednesday, August 28, starting at 7:00 p.m. in the city hall. Property owners may file their objections in writing within 10 days from the first publication of the notice which will be published August 15.

The assessments are due and payable within 30 days after the ordinance levying the assessment becomes effective with date will be August 28. Property owners may pay cash with no interest charged during this 30-day period. After that time pay-

ments on the paving costs may be made in 20 equal payments, but can be paid off at any time, with interest due at the time of payment.

The trustees passed Ordinance 82 which directs the Town Clerk to give notice of filing of the assessment roll for the paving district, and the time and place of the hearing of objections to the assessments as filed.

The state highway department has requested that "E" Avenue and 5th Street be 48 feet wide instead of 45 as in the original planning and the department has kicked in \$3,000 for this extra cost. These two streets will be 48 feet wide.

Gladney Stubbs and J. H. Fulmer, Jr., representing the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce,

met with the Trustees to discuss plans for presenting the need for a courthouse addition to people of Lincoln County.

Tom Mann told the group that increased work at White Sands had made considerable impact on the Alamogordo and Tularosa area. Where Alamogordo had 1200 vacant houses in January and February, none are vacant now, 90 trailer houses reported in one area at Tularosa.

Minutes read and approved, bills allowed. Attending the meeting were Mayor Jete Voss,

Trustees Arrell Posey, Leandro Vega and T. B. Smoot. Officials Edward Penfield, Elfred Jones, Wayne Withers, Russel Ming, representing Stern Bros., bond buyers, Tom Mann and Charles O'Mara of Mann Engineering.

# Wool tourists will view selective program at Fuller Ranch

## University Park, N. M. —

The annual New Mexico sheep ranch tour and the Miss Wool of New Mexico contest will be held in Roswell August 16-17 in connection with the quarterly meeting of the New Mexico Wool Growers, Inc.

The Miss Wool contest is usually held at the annual convention of the Wool Growers, but was moved up this year to give the winners more time to prepare for the national contest at San Angelo, officials said.

Seven girls will compete in the finale this year. They are Camilla Emerick, Las Cruces, and Sandra Glass, Anthony, both students at New Mexico State University; Robin Reed and Susan Rundles of the University of New Mexico; Mary Beth Tischer, Santa Rosa, and

Donna Kearich, Las Vegas, students at Highland University; and Carol Bowman, Roswell, former student at the University of New Mexico.

The winner will receive her crown from Michele Mitchell, Albuquerque, the reigning Miss Wool of New Mexico. The coronation will take place on the night of August 16 at the Roswell Country Club. It will be preceded by a buffet banquet and a style show, and followed by a dance. Mrs. Robert Corn of Roswell is director of the contest.

The sheep ranch tour caravan will leave the Holiday Inn on Highway 70 at 7 a.m. August 16. Ranches that will be visited are the Fuller Ranch, the J. P. White Ranch, the Mennecke Ranch, and the McKnight

Ranch, all west of Roswell.

A noon barbecue will be held at the Robert O. Anderson headquarters in the Hondo Valley, followed by a short association meeting.

On August 17, the group will tour the new Roswell Saline Water Conversion Plant and Walker Air Force Base.

At the Fuller Ranch, visitors will view the results of a selection program that has been carried on in cooperation with New Mexico State University for the past 16 years. The Fullers use a squeeze machine invented by Prof. Emeritus P. E. Neale of the NMSU Experiment Station staff as a tool for picking superior ewes.

Mr. Fuller who is president of the New Mexico Wool Growers, runs about 1,300 breeding

ewes which produce from fine to three-eighths blood wool, with an average of one-half blood.

He also is cooperating in a Great Plains program for water development and cholla cactus control on the sheep ranch, and on a cattle ranch near Dunlap which he owns.

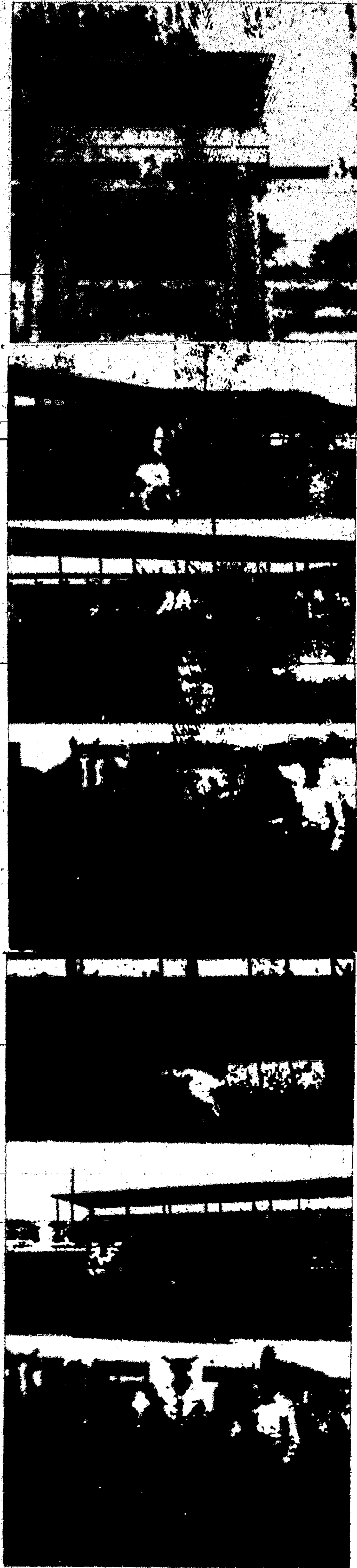
The tour party will inspect the sheep-working corals, pipeline work, and mesquite-control program at the J. P. White ranch. The ranch is cooperating in a 1,300 acre Great Plains program aimed at eradicating mesquite.

J. P. White and his son Phelps White, have been cooperating with the NMSU sheep improvement program ever since it started. They run about 3,000 fine wool ewes and a few Angora goats on the ranch. Phelps White is president of the New

Mexico Sheep Sanitary Board and also chairman of the New Mexico Screwworm Committee.

An unusual pipe-line project will be featured at the Mennecke ranch. Clyde Marley and Ellis Whitney, owners of the ranch, are now putting in 40 miles of pipe-line. When the project is completed, livestock on the ranch will not have to go more than a mile to water. Carol Shanks is manager of the 125-section spread, on which he runs about 5,000 breeding ewes, mostly one-half blood, and about 500 Hereford cows.

The lamb-feeding operation will be the principal item of interest at the McKnight ranch, owned by J. P. "Juddy" McKnight. He has his own feed and pellet mill and feeds out about 3,000 head of lambs per year.

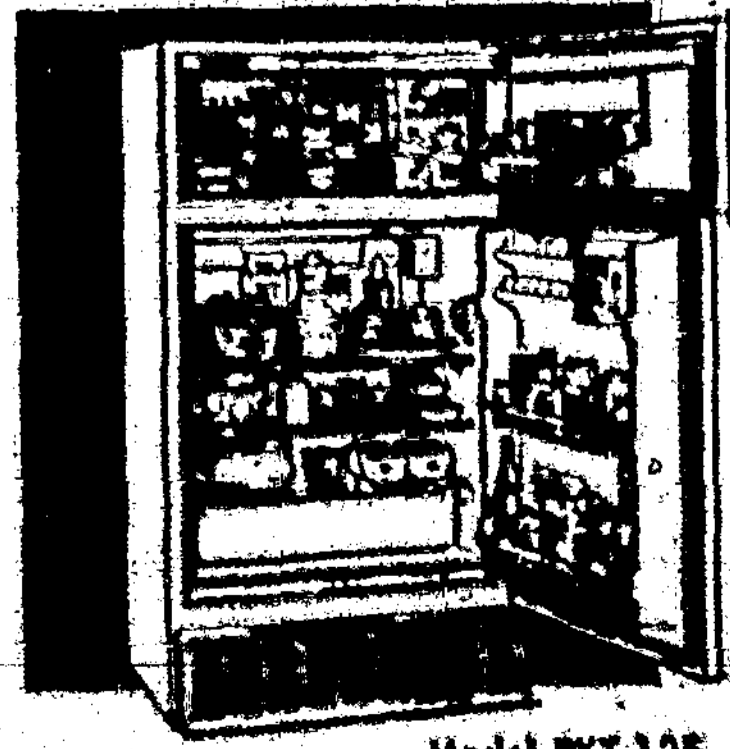

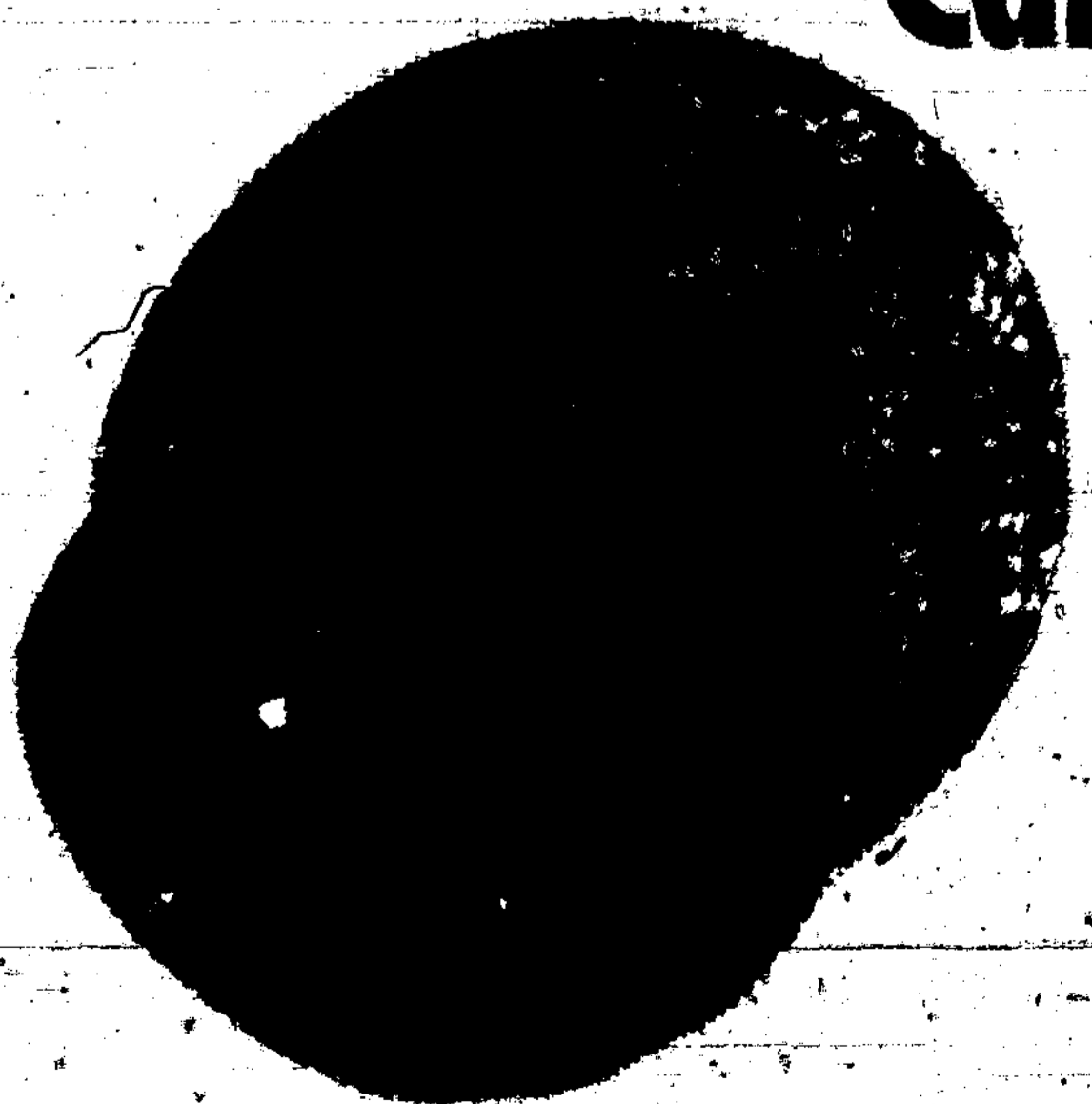

# Death of Gen. Pat Hurley revives talk he contested wrong election

## DID PAT CONTEST WRONG ELECTION

SANTA FE. — Gen. Pat Hurley's death revived talk among politicians that had been heard much in the past to the effect that he had contested the wrong election against Sen. Dennis Chavez.

Hurley ran against Chavez in 1946 and lost by 4,000 votes but did not contest.

He ran again in 1952 and lost to Chavez by 5,000 votes which set off the most famous election contest of New Mexico records and one of the big ones in the national list.

## EVIDENCE BETTER, POLITICS WRONG

There was more encouraging evidence for Hurley in the 1946 election than in 1952 but the Republican did not contest because he realized the futility of bringing his Republican case before the Democratic administration of that period.

The Republican Senate committee of 1953 upheld Hurley and voted that he be seated but the committee report was defeated on the floor of the Senate.

## CLOSED OLD WOUND WITH ED MECHEM

Hurley made it known immediately after the 1952 election that he questioned the results that had been announced by the press and the secretary of state and was deeply aggrieved when Rep. Gov. Ed Mechem voted to give the certificate of election to Chavez while Hurley was demanding that it be held up.

This remained a sore spot with Hurley until a few days before his death when, as fate would have it, he climbed on a platform and told a huge political rally at Espanola that Mechem should be returned to the Senate.

## TELEPHONE INSULT WAS TOO MUCH

Pat Hurley was an individual who will breed stories forever. A true one came up in the 1952 campaign when the Republicans state administration was opposing his nomination for the Senate.

One of the administration people particularly disliked by Hurley called him an insulting name over the telephone.

## CALL HIM THAT ON HIS SHOES

For a man of Hurley's make up an insult over the telephone was about the most engaging thing possible.

Pat's answer to the guy should live forever. "When I call you that," he said, "I'll be standing on your shoestrings."

## FLEW A PLANE UNTIL THE END

I flew up to Denver with General Hurley just a few years ago in a chartered plane with pilot.

I was in the back and about half way along the trip over one of the most treacherous flying areas on the continent I noticed that Pat, who wasn't far from eighty, was flying the plane.

The general took us from Santa Fe to Denver and the landing was made by the professional pilot, perhaps in courtesy of a consideration of legal requirements.

## RACE QUESTION IN SENATE RUN

Hurley and Chavez have both passed on with consequences that stand to carry on the fighting qualities of both of them.

U. S. Rep. Joe Montoya has chosen himself as the one to recover the Senate seat from the gringo Republican, Ed Mechem, who had himself appointed to the Senate after Chavez' death.

The fight that is taking form for 1964 is much the same that went on in 1948 and 1952 when there was great enthusiasm among the Spanish-Americans to retain Chavez as senator.

Montoya is driving for election this time in anticipation of almost unanimous support from the Hispanics.

## HURLEY ATTACKED AS CARPET BAGGER

In those early elections Hurley was attacked as a carpet-bagger who had only recently come out to New Mexico to exploit the state politically.

Hurley, an Oklahoman, shifted his family to Santa Fe in the mid-1930's and stood office some ten years later in 1946 against Chavez.

## TWO NATIVES THIS TIME

Mechem, the Republican's 1964 entry for the Senate, was born in the state, getting underway at Alamogordo.

Montoya was also born here, in Sandoval.

Montoya incidentally attended the Hurley funeral and Mechem did not.

Supt. Glen Ellison will have some Corona School news next week, including a list of Corona teachers for the coming year.

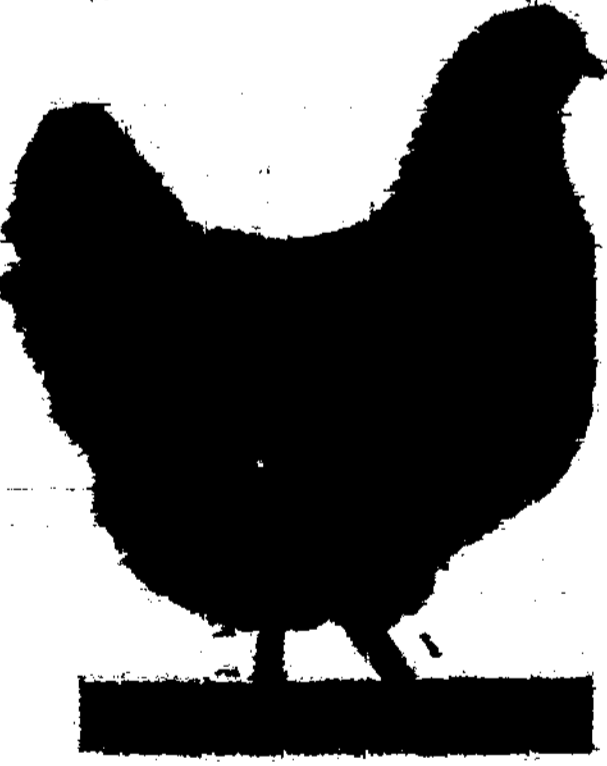

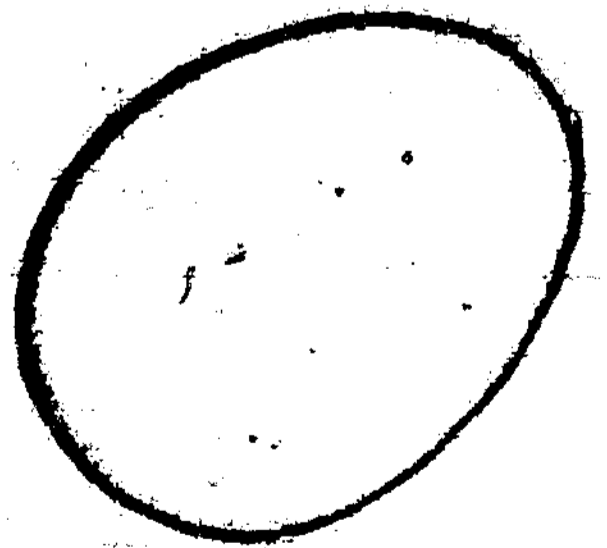

## Looks Like A Natural

Looking at the photographic map of Carrizozo one gets a bird's eye view that is different. Old roads, trails, cow paths, playgrounds, foundations, and all that sort of landmarks show up. Some of them bound to be a long time in the making, they show a history of where Carrizozo people have shortcut thru lots and bypassed the regular roads to get where they were going the shortest way possible.

Bypass is getting a lot of consideration in New Mexico as a result of the no-bypass legislation passed in the last session which is sure to get a going over in the next legislative session because of federal money tied up and a general slowdown of road work in the state.

A look at the photographic map shows one of the obvious means of forestalling a highway bypass around Carrizozo — this route would take Highway 54 thru town right next to the tracks, 13th St., which would make an ideal truck bypass or alternate route thru (instead of around) Carrizozo.

There are drawbacks but the thinking here is that we might as well face up to them today when we might have some choice in the matter instead of waiting until the Highway Department comes along and says U.S. 54, and/or 380, will go this way — taking a wide sweep around town. Then the town will be looking for options that probably won't exist.

Some tourists might use the alternate route, to the disadvantage of business places catering to highway traffic. Most trucks should use such a route, but very little of this type of service is performed now along U.S. 54 down town.

The advantages would be greater than just forestalling a complete bypass. The worst eyesore, as seen by thousands of railroad travelers each week, would be eliminated. Widening 13th St. to accommodate a truck bypass would make necessary the elimination of many of the old buildings along this street.

The State Highway Department is going to be invited to modernize Highway 54 in the near future — they might as well be asked to do a complete job, which would include an alternate route through town along the obvious route.

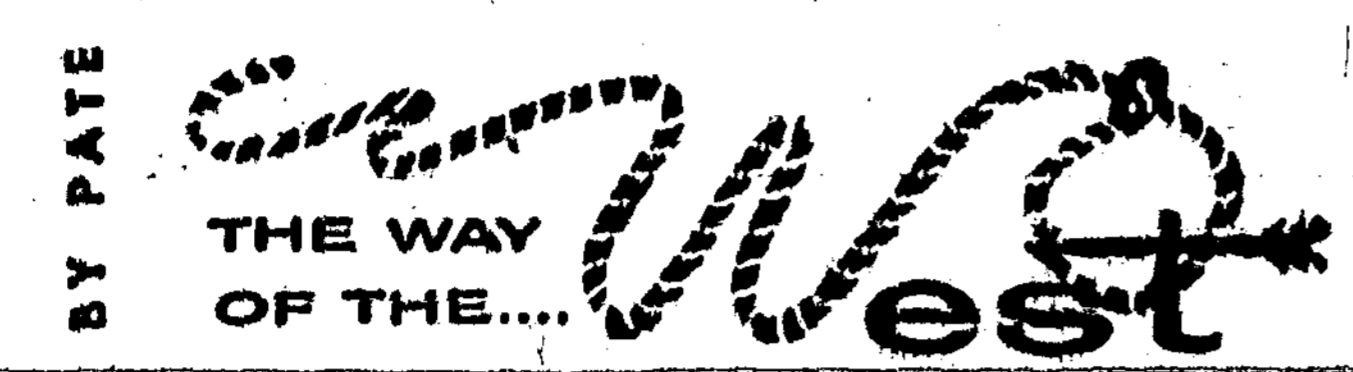

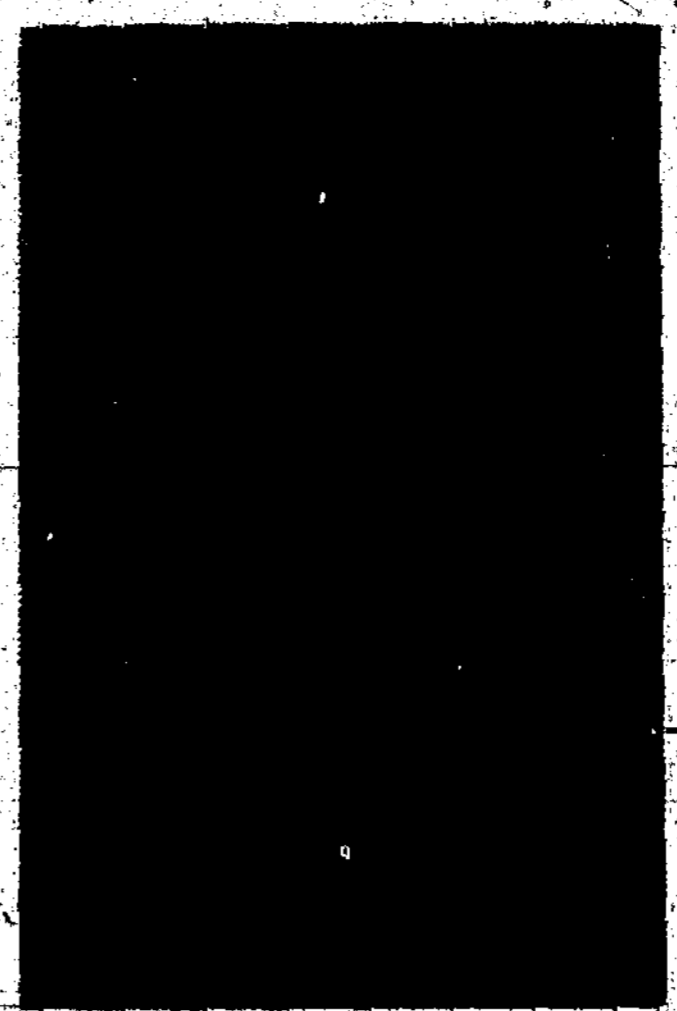

Stop at Communism! because this new world under Communism would be perfect classes (the philosophy in Communism is based upon the idea that everyone owns everything), stateless godless. ## Smith Peters of Corona appointed member of County FHA committee

Mr. Smith Peters of Corona has been appointed as a member of the three-man Lincoln County Farmers Home Administration Committee, Richard Floyd, FHA County Supervisor, announced today. The appointment is for three years beginning July 1st. Mr. Peters succeeds Hery Hale whose three-year term expired this year. The other member serving with Mr. Peters is Tom Babers of San Patricio. One member is still needed to replace the vacancy caused by the resignation of G. Simeros of Tinnie.

The local Farmers Home Administration County Committee reviews applications from farmers and other rural families for six different types of agricultural, housing and water loans made in Lincoln County. During

the past fiscal year ending June 30, a total of \$522,670 in FHA loans was made through the agency's office in Roswell which services both Chavez and Lincoln counties. Each loan is accompanied to the extent necessary by technical farm and financial management assistance.

### GARRETT EXONERATES MAXWELL

There is a disposition on the part of a good many people to censure Pete Maxwell for harboring Billy the Kid, the finding and killing of the desperado in Maxwell's house having given rise to much talk on the subject. In view of this state of affairs a reporter of the NEW MEXICAN had a talk with Sheriff Garrett yesterday afternoon knowing that he would be more likely to know and more likely to tell the true state of things than almost anyone who could be found. Garrett does not think that Maxwell was in with the Kid at all or that he deserves to be held responsible for the presence of the cut throat in his house on the night upon which Billy met his death. He says that Pete was intimi-

dated and was afraid to speak above a whisper when the Kid was around, otherwise he would have given notice of his whereabouts. Garrett knows Maxwell well and knows that this is in keeping with his disposition. He says that Pete acknowledged that fear kept him from informing the Kid, and told him that if he could have found any safe way of letting Garrett know that his man was there he would have done so.

"How did the Kid happen to stop at Maxwell's house?" asked the reporter.

"He didn't stop there," replied Garrett. "He had only made three visits to Summer since his escape and just came in unexpectedly while I was there. You see I went in to see Maxwell and ask him where the Kid was. I asked him as soon as I got in whether the Kid was in the country and he became very much agitated, but answered that he was. Just then a man came in at the door and spoke to my men outside in Spanish, supposing them to be Mexicans. I didn't recognize him. He then came in and approached the bed, and after speaking to Maxwell, asked who were those outside. I had not had time to fix my revolver, and had not expected to see him there. I therefore reached around and adjusted it, and Maxwell started in the bed. The Kid pulled down on me, and asked 'Who is it?' He must have then recognized me, and I fired in the same direction again; and I was ready to shoot the third time, but I heard him groan and knew he was struck. All this however, has been told. What I want you to say is that Maxwell is not guilty of harboring the Kid."

"I shall do that but I also want to ask you a few questions first. How do you account for the Kid not shooting when he first recognized you?"

"I think he was surprised and thrown off guard. Almost any man would have been. Kid was as cool under trying circumstances as any man I ever saw. But he was so surprised and startled, that for a second he could not collect himself. Some men cannot recover their faculties for some time after such a shock. I think Kid would have done so in a second more, if he had had time."

"It is said by some people that Kid was cowardly, and never gave a man a chance."

"No, he was game. I saw him give a man one once. I have seen him tried. He would fight anyway. I've known him to turn loose in a crowd of Mexicans, and get away with them. He would lick Mexicans that would weigh twenty-five or fifty pounds more than he did. He was quick as a flash."

"Was he a good shot?"

"Yes, but he was no better than the majority of men who are constantly handling and using six-shooters. He shot well, though, and he shot well under all circumstances, whether in danger or not."

"Why do you suppose he hung around Lincoln county, instead of leaving the country?"

"Oh, he thought that was his safest plan. In fact, he said so. He said he was safer on the plains, and could always get something to eat among the sheep herders. So he decided to take his chances out there where he was hard to get at."

After some conversation, into which Mr. Garrett entered more freely than in his wont, and another reference to the Maxwell affair, the reporter left.

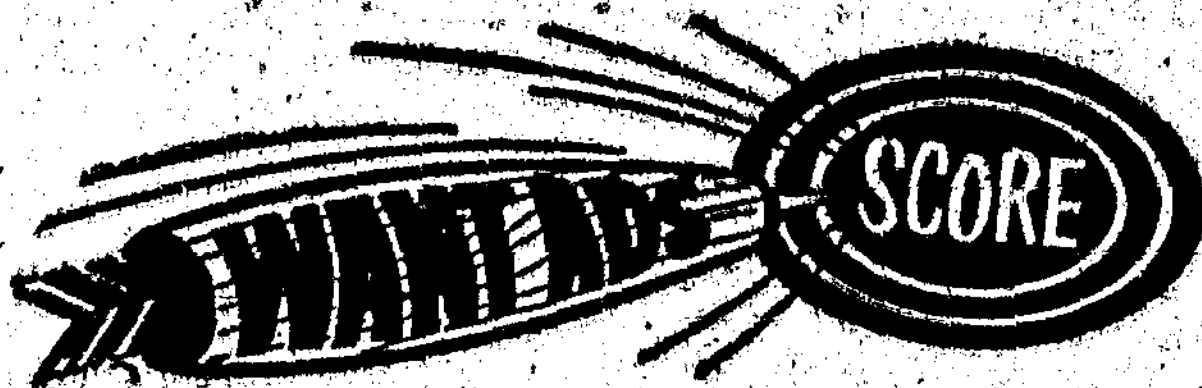

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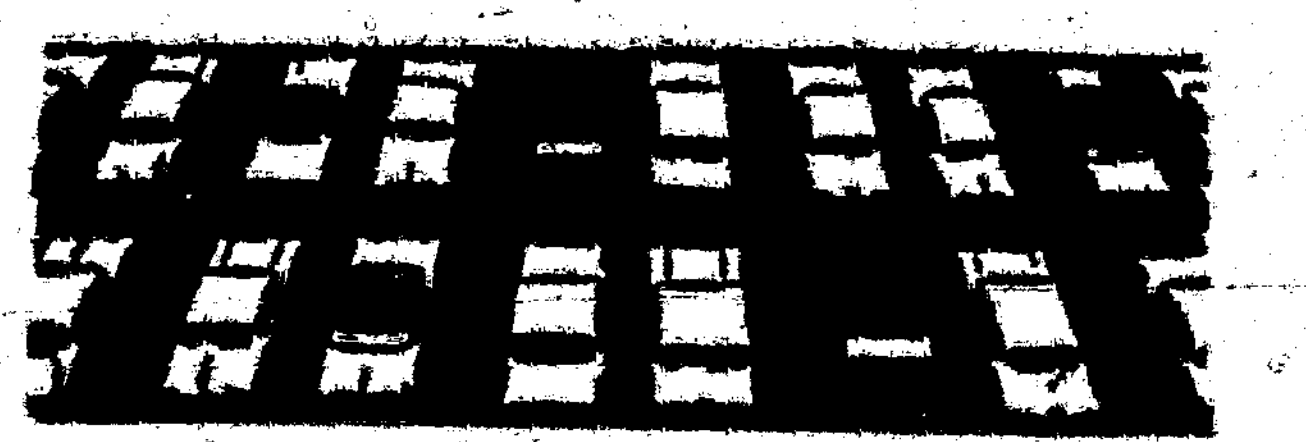

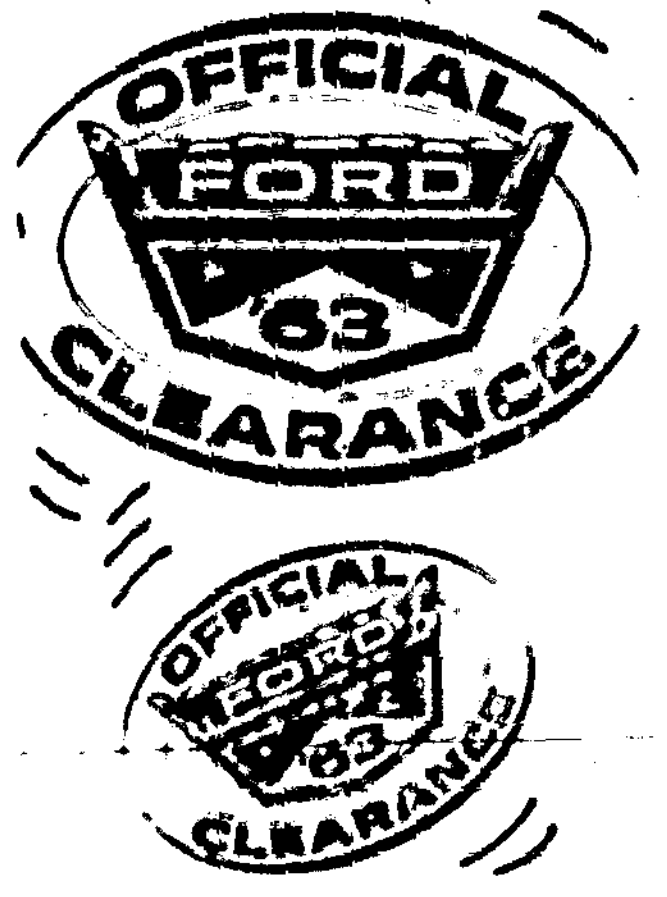
