Elfred Jones who own the Parson Hotel acreage where the new road will bottom; were present at this meeting together with Le-Roy McKnight, county road foreman, and Tom LaMay, road maintenance man in Bonito.

Most of these men will meet Friday afternoon at the Parsons Hotel to walk out the new road which will be staked Wednesday and Thursday. Following this trip the county commissioners will have some idea of the cost of construction and will be able to make a decision about going ahead with construction.

The special use permit issued by the Forest Service will be issued to the county, which will be obligated to maintain the road. Machinery for the old Parsons Mine was hauled by wagon up Nogal Canyon and down to the mine and this wacon road used for a number of years but it has not been maintained for some time.

All parties to the construction of this new road were working together in good harmony Monday. The mining people will furhish dynamite, air compressor and some survey equipment. County road funds are pretty well obligated now but the commissioners indicated they would do what is possible and put equipment to work in the immediate future. The Forest-Service people are interested in seeing a good road constructed, one that will serve other purposes as well as mining and are helping all possible. Jones and Penfield will have to give rightof-way through their patented land and said they would be agreeable.



Section 5. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part of any ordinance heretofore re-

Dealest Section 6. That became of the fact the Tours does not now have adequate streets, this ordistance is necessary by

preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the inhabitants of the Town of Carrizozo. Lincoln County, New Mexico, and is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need; and therefore, immediately upon its final passage, the ordinance shall be secorsed in the book of decimances of said Town kept for that purpose. authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and Town Clerk, shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in said Town, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days after such publication.

It could seem to folks living outside of Carrizozo that the county seat town is asking for too much, too fast, We don't believe that is exactly the case and will give our readers some reasons,

School bonds were recently voted by the district, which includes a lot of voters outside of the Town of Carrizozo. This bond issue was not brought to a vote by popular demand of the people of Carrizozo, rather it was put before the people of the town by a school board who thought that new facilities were needed at the school, Obviously in voting the town agreed because it went along with the school district in voting for the bonds, about 4 to 1 in favor.

Not too long after the school bond vote came a protest hearing on a new paving district, This should have been no surprise to Carrizozo people because at election time several of the town council expressed themselves as being for paving and having the intention of pushing for a paying district this long before the school board called for a bond vote.

It should be cited that the paving district was certainly not put before the people by popular demand, Rather it was brought about by a town council that was attempting to do its duty for the town, Obviously the people of the town agreed with the council's thinking, 70% being for the paving, and 30% protesting.

Now there is a courthouse addition in the offering. Here again this did not come about by popular demand of the people of Carrizozo. The demand that does exist comes from those people who know courthouse offices are crowded, that a 50year old building is in bad repair and maintenance costs high. This group of people, both in and out of Carrizozo; was enough to influence the county commissioners in their thinking - that the people of Lincoln County should have the right to vote in fixing up these bad conditions.

Carrizozo is not grabby at all, as a town. The reverse is actually true because Carrizozo has

lived with rutty streets, common school facilities, and an old courthouse for many years, enough to learn to get along with things as they are. A combination of circumstan-

Society, Marx says, is decided by the current way or mode of production. Man, he also claims. is nothing but a product of this society.

One of the basics of Communism doctrine is that man receives impressions from his surroundings and acts upon these impressions. Therefore, if man lives in a particular society, his ideas, thoughts, and actions are going to be right in line with the society in which he lives.

According to this theory, man is but a mere puppet controlled

by society. He has no mind of his own or even freedom of

The mode of kind of production man continues, determines the kind of society at the same time. Slaves were once used as a means of producing. The feudalistic society was a result of this kind of production. A whole society, with the king and his lords as the dominant class and slaves and the lower class, was built around the kind of production done at that time. The seris were bound by certain laws which kept them on the land and producing.

Now machines, workers, and employers make up the current mode of production. The employers are the dominant class and are principally in power. The workers are called the exploited class. With a new mode of production, the type of soclety has changed and a new one has been built around the present type of production.

Another basic Communist theory is that history has been one long struggle between classes. The struggle is now supposedly between the dominant class and the exploited class of the present society,

The father of Communism further claims that the laws created by a country are to protect the current mode of production of that country, Since the dominant class has more power over the production, these laws are basically protection for the dominant class, Therefore the state "protects the ruling class."

Even religion, according to the Markist theory, is nothing but a tool used by this class to protect itself and its power. Those that are not satisfied with their life here are promised rewards later on. Thru religion, suffering and humility become virtues, and these virtues are an advantage to the dominant class. 


