STATE SOUR ON TANKERS

Robert Mead, the new state investment officer, has been directed to sell the mortgages the state bought for \$37 million on two oil tankers and invest the money in less hazardous securities.

'ANGLERS RESIST LICENSE HIKE

REPUS TROUBLE GETTING WORSE

The Republican central committee meeting at Taos did not settle the dispute between State Chairman Joe Skeen and his critics but probably made it shade worse.

A new fire was lit against Rep. Bill Shreengost of Lincoln who offered a resolution that would have expired Skeen's term in November instead of May. Several friends of Skeen, who is also from Lincoln, have been talking about defeating Shreengost for renomination.

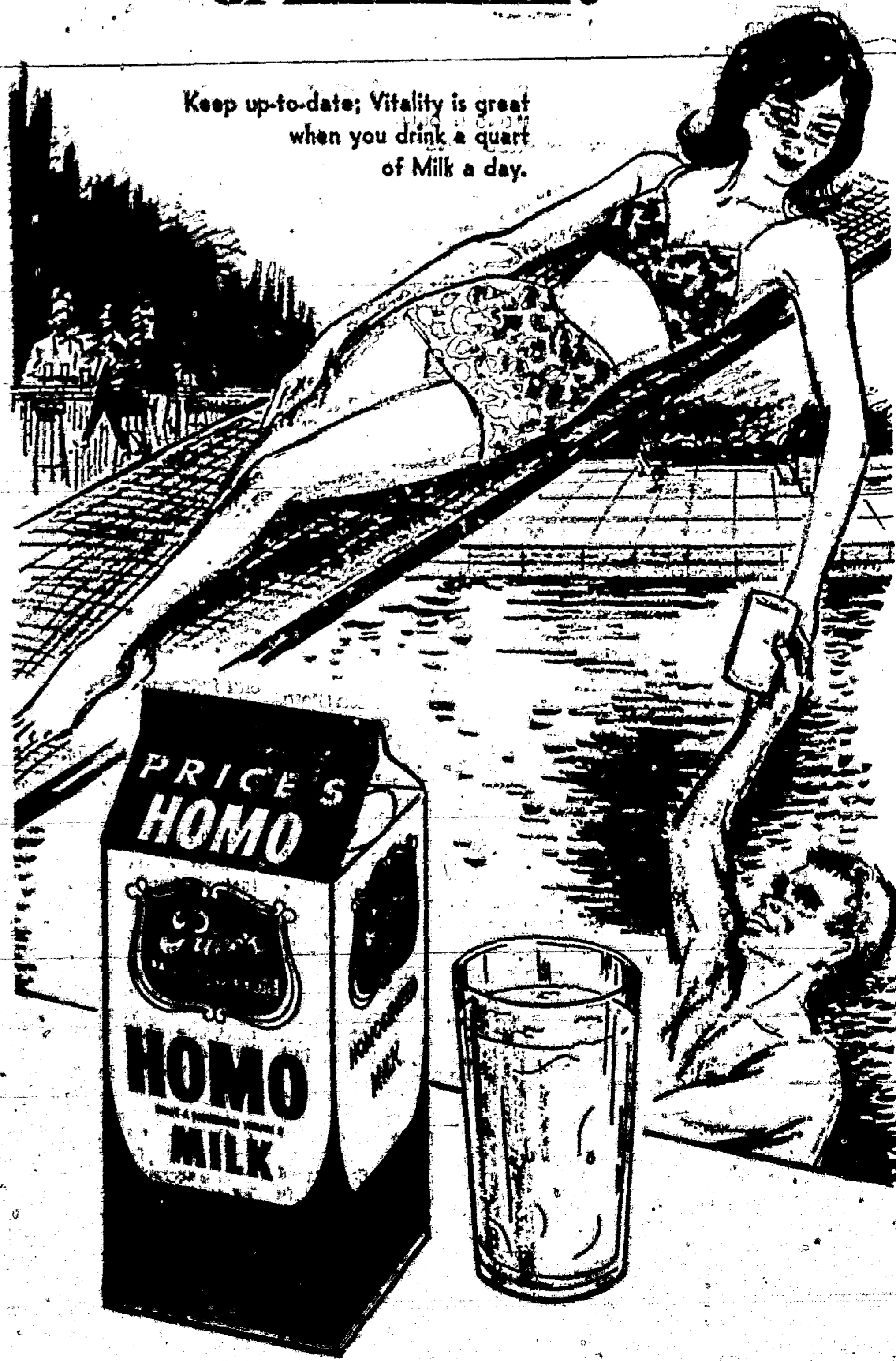

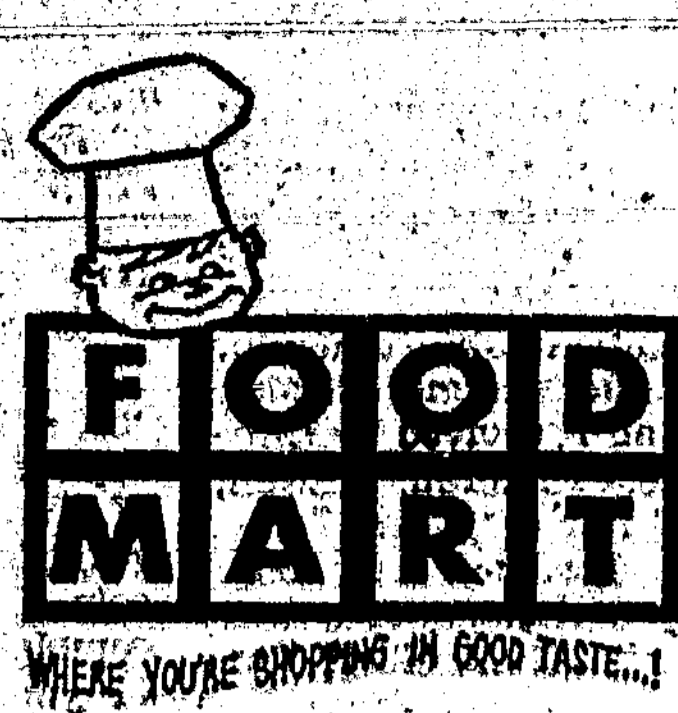

(3) The Board of Trustees, together with a competent engineer, has made out an assessment roll pursuant to Section 14-37-20, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953, as amended and supplemented; and

(4) The Board of Trustees will forthwith (a) cause such roll to be filed in the office of the Town Clerk, and (b) fix a time and place when objections thereto by the owners of such property will be heard; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined, and does hereby determine, that the notice herein provided for such hearing is reasonably calculated to inform the parties of the proceedings concerning the District which may directly and adversely affect their legally protected interest.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That in connection with the local street improvement district known and designated as "Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1," created and established within the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, for the purpose of making certain street improvements on designated streets and of assessing the cost thereof to the property benefited thereby, the Town Clerk be, and he hereby is, authorized and directed to give notice of the filing of the assessment roll for the District, as filed with the Town Clerk, and of the time and place of hearing upon the same:

(a) By publishing a notice in the Lincoln County News a newspaper of general circulation in said Town, at least two times, once a week for two consecutive weeks, provided that at least twelve days shall elapse between the date of the first publication and the date fixed for the hearing; and

(b) By mailing notice thereof, postage prepaid, as first-class mail, at least twelve days prior to such hearing, to each last-known owner of land within the District whose property will be assessed for the cost of the improvements, at his last-known address, such addresses and owners being those appearing on the real property assessment rolls for general (ad valorem) taxes of the County of Lincoln, wherein said property is located, from records of the Town of Carrizozo, from the Town Directory, and from such other sources as the Town Clerk deems reliable, proof of such mailing to be made by affidavit of the Clerk and filed in the records of the Town, provided that failure to mail said notice or notices shall not invalidate any of the proceedings in said District.

Section 2. That whenever any notice is mailed as herein provided, the fact that the person to whom it was addressed does not receive it shall not in any manner invalidate or affect the legality of the notice thereby given.

Section 3. That the officers of the Town of Carrizozo be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 4. That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any remaining provision of this ordinance.

Section 5. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repeal shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part of any ordinance heretofore repealed.

Section 6. That because of the fact that the Town does not now have adequate streets, this ordinance is necessary for the

preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the inhabitants of the Town of Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need; and therefore, immediately upon its final passage, the ordinance shall be recorded in the book of ordinances of said Town kept for that purpose, authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and Town Clerk, shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in said Town, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days after such publication.

Said District is the area to be assessed for grading, graveling, macadamizing, paving, curbing, guttering, draining, and otherwise improving the streets in Carrizozo, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 1, as finally determined by resolution of the Board of Trustees passed and adopted on the 20th day of June, 1963. Such area includes all property abutting said improvements.

Said Board of Trustees will meet to hear and consider objections to said assessment roll by the owners of said property specially benefited by the improvements in said District, and proposed to be assessed, by any party interested to the regularity of the proceedings in making such assessments, and by all parties aggrieved by such assessments, on Wednesday, September 4, 1963, at 7:00 o'clock p.m., at the Town Hall in Carrizozo, New Mexico. The owner or owners of any property which is assessed in such assessment roll, whether named or not in such roll, may on or before September 3, 1963, i.e., within ten (10) days from the first publication of this notice, file with the Town Clerk his or her specific objections in writing.

Said assessments shall be due and payable at the office of the Town Treasurer within thirty (30) days after the ordinance levying the assessments becomes effective without interest and without demand; or all or any part of such assessments may, at the election of the owner, be paid thereafter in twenty substantially equal semiannual installments of principal until paid in full, with interest in all cases on the unpaid and deferred installments of principal from the date of publication of said ordinance at the rate of seven per centum (7%) per annum. 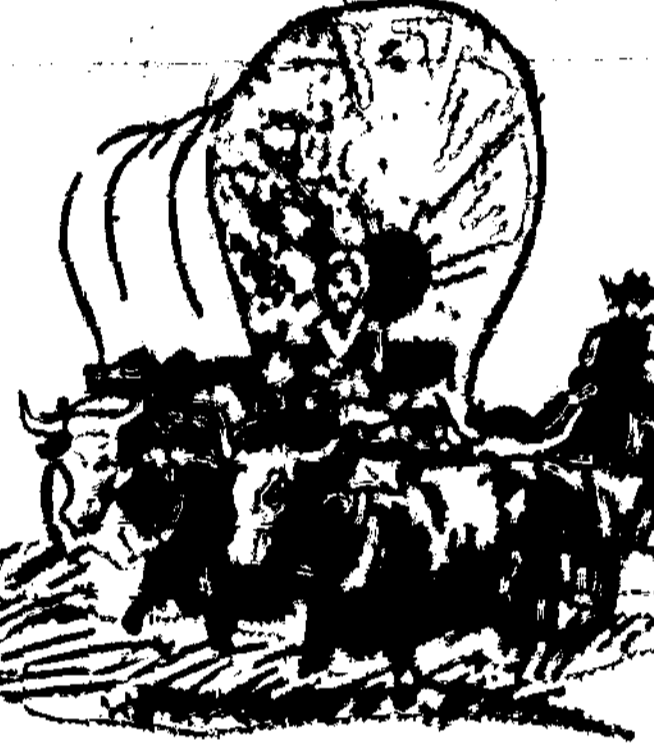

Two Horses, Different Colors

The presidential election of the year 1964 could well be called the rainbow poll. . . color is the theme. Red, white, black, pink, and the several blends resulting from the natural mixture of those colors, give a person crossed eyeballs just from reading all the colorful and semi-factual reports.

Republicans meeting in Taos Saturday had a big day whacking the Democrats with such "Whereas" as the Republican Party in domestic affairs still believes in the American way and condemns the Democrat-socialism, and

This bond issue was not brought to a vote by popular demand of the people of Carrizozo, rather it was put before the people of the town by a school board who thought that new facilities were needed at the school. Obviously in voting the town agreed because it went along with the school district in voting for the bonds, about 4 to 1 in favor.

Not too long after the school bond vote came a protest hearing on a new paving district. This should have been no surprise to Carrizozo people because at election time several of the town council expressed themselves as being for paving and having the intention of pushing for a paving district — this long before the school board called for a bond vote.

It should be cited that the paving district was certainly not put before the people by popular demand. Rather it was brought about by a town council that was attempting to do its duty for the town. Obviously the people of the town agreed with the council's thinking, 70% being for the paving, and 30% protesting.

Now there is a courthouse addition in the offering. Here again this did not come about by popular demand of the people of Carrizozo. The demand that does exist comes from those people who know courthouse offices are crowded, that a 50-year old building is in bad repair and maintenance costs high. This group of people, both in and out of Carrizozo, was enough to influence the county commissioners in their thinking — that the people of Lincoln County should have the right to vote in fixing up these bad conditions.

Carrizozo is not grabby at all, as a town. The reverse is actually true because Carrizozo has

lived with ratty streets, common school facilities, and an old courthouse for many years, enough to learn to get along with things as they are.

A combination of circumstances has brought about considerable improvement in a short time. One needed about as bad as the other — as evidenced by the expressed wishes of the people — and the courthouse addition needed most of all because it houses the objects of greatest value to the most people in the county.

COMMUNISM—The Threat What It Means
By La Verne Zick
(No. 5 in a series)
Communist Theory on Society
Society, Marx says, is decided by the current way or mode of production. Man, he also claims, is nothing but a product of this society.

One of the basics of Communism doctrine is that man receives impressions from his surroundings and acts upon these impressions. Therefore, if man lives in a particular society, his ideas, thoughts, and actions are going to be right in line with the society in which he lives.

According to this theory, man is but a mere puppet controlled

by society. He has no mind of his own or even freedom of choice.

The mode of kind of production in a country, determines the kind of society at the same time. Slaves were once used as a means of producing. The feudalistic society was a result of this kind of production: A whole society, with the king and his lords as the dominant class and slaves and the lower class, was built around the kind of production done at that time. The serfs were bound by certain laws which kept them on the land and producing.

Now machines, workers and employers make up the current mode of production. The employers are the dominant class and are principally in power. The workers are called the exploited class. With a new mode of production, the type of society has changed and a new one has been built around the present type of production.

Another basic Communist theory is that history has been one long struggle between classes. The struggle is now supposedly between the dominant class and the exploited class of the present society.

The father of Communism further claims that the laws created by a country are to protect the current mode of production of that country. Since the dominant class has more power over the production, these laws are basically protection for the dominant class. Therefore the state "protects the ruling class."

Even religion, according to the Marxist theory, is nothing but a tool used by this class to protect itself and its power. Those that are not satisfied with their life here are promised rewards later on. Thus religion, suffering and humility become virtues, and these virtues are an advantage to the dominant class. Even the Ten Commandments are instruments of power with such phrases as "Thou shalt not steal" and "Thou shalt not covet."

What causes this conflict which divides society against itself? Private property! The dominant class has it and the exploited class doesn't. This is the cause of the class struggle. If this private property is eliminated, taken completely away, then there will be no reason to struggle and therefore no need for the State. Which includes all laws and regulations. Only then, Marx says, can man be truly free.

Roadwork Underway

A state highway department crew, with equipment moved into Alto, northwest of Ruidoso, last week and began work on a three mile segment of the road running west from Alto to the Sierra Blanca ski area.

The route will be blacktopped from Alto to the Mescalero Apache Indian reservation gate area on South Eagle Creek.
